

But, the men didn't behave much like criminals. Instead of hiding their treason from public view, they went to great lengths to publicize it.

They weren't ordinary men, these signers of the Declaration of Independence...far from it, they were Patriots.

Today we revere them as our nation's Founding Fathers. There are statues and memorials dedicated to them, but little thought is given to the very real danger these men faced.

Had the Revolutionary War failed, and it nearly did, they would have been hung. The British Army carried warrants for the arrest of the fifty-six men. Half were to be executed on American soil, at least one in each of the thirteen colonies.
