

Humble Oil Company Observing Its 40th Birthday

West Texas-back in 1926-did not figure much in the production picture of Humble Oil & Refining Company. Yet, two years later, this area was supplying nearly half of that company's total oil production.


The difference was a highly successful exploration program in the Permian Basin-highlighted by the Hendricks field discovery in Pecos County-which jumped Humble's West Texas production from a 200,000-barrel trickle in 1926 to a 7,000,000 total in 1928. West Texas has been a major source of Humble crude ever since.

Forty years ago this month, in Houston, Humble Oil & Refining Company came into corporate existence-the pooled properties and experience of a group of pioneer Texas oilmen who believed in themselves, each other and the future.

Although June is the company's official anniversary, the story of Humble begins months earlier. Without a charter or a single signature, the company began its operations on March 1, 1917, under a gentleman's agreement among the principals. For three months and three weeks, until the charter was received on June 21, oral promises and individual integrity preserved a merger that involved \$8 million in properties and a net daily production of some 8800 barrels of oil.

In a way, Humble Oil & Refining Company dates from Spindletop, for it was there that most of the men who later organized Humble met and became friends. W. S. Farish, who was one day to become chairman of the board of Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, came where he had practiced law. At the same time, R. L. 



> The Depression was felt heavily by Humble's sales and production organization. From 1932 until 1935 retrenching operations were carried out. Unprofitable outlets were pruned away and production was cut back to conform to market demand-but Humble personnel suffered no large-scale layoffs. What work there was-and there was still plenty to be done, was spread among the employees, resulting in some cases in shorter work weeks.

By 1935, Humble had beaten the Depression. Still serving threefourths of the state's population, the company began to build production and sales again. From 1935 to 1941, gasoline sales gallonage increased by nearly 40%.

When war came in 1941, Humble was ready for the challenge. The Baytown refinery already was sup-





Plentiful Foods 1870 1800 Announced For July wo

College Station. ____Turkey, and ice cream are the featured foods on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's July plentiful foods list. These two foods will get special promotions during the month: Mid-Summer Turkey Time, July 25 August 4; and Ice Cream Festival, July 1-31.

Turkeys have long been thought of in terms of Thanksgiving and Christmas, but changes in production methods have made this old favorite available the year round. Ice cream just goes with summer time and increased supplies of milk and butterfat have also increased the amount of ice cream available.

John J. Slaughter, southwest division chief of the USDA's marketing service, says monthly surveys form the basis for determining the plentiful foods.

Fresh fruits are prominent on the July listing and include pea ches, lemons and limes. Frozen strawberries will also be in good supply. Milk and other dairy products, in addition to ice cream, will continue seasonally plentiful. Eggs are another high protein plentiful.

Texas new crop of onions will be abundant, but other fresh vegetables are not listed for the state. Peanuts and peanut butter and vegetable fats and oils are shelf items included on the July list.

Longhorn Cavern Deemed Million Years in Making

Texas Longhorn Cavern, spec-tacular scenic masterpiece of Na-ture, was at least a million years in the making, geologists estimate.

The huge cavern is awesome evidence of the changes wrought through the ages by variations in climate, earth movements, the rise and fall of the seas and the slow solution of limestone by water.

Longhorn Cavern, located near Burnet in the Highland Lakes region northwest of Austin, is one of the state's favorite attractions for tourists and sightseers. Guided tours are conducted daily through the explored portions of the cave, which is one of the world's largest.

Richard W. Rush, assistant professor of geology at the University of Texas, has traced the sequence of events which led to the development of the cavern from the time when Texas lay beneath a huge sea, approximately a half-billion years ago.

The stone in which the cavern was eventually carved out was formed from limy muds deposited at the bottom of this sea. Over countless centuries this mud deposit gradually rose out of the sea, only to sink beneath it again, a process which was repeated a number of times.

Finally slow uplift raised Texas above the sea for the last time and the limestone which had hardened from the mud deposits lay exposed to the elements for over sixty million years.

At that time Central Texas was a humid swampland in which gi-gantic dinosaurs and other rep-tilian monsters roamed.

As the glaciers retreated, about 50,000 years ago, the climate of Texas became drier and the ground water level began to drop, lissolving the limestone as it fell. Underground streams flowing through the cave helped to carve out the labyrinthian passageways and huge rooms, until the cavern was excavated to its most remote chamber, an eerie 130 feet below the surface of the earth.

Prehistoric cavemen probably depths of the cavern to avoid be-ing devoured by the fearsome mammals which ranged the countryside in dim ages past.

The main approach to the cavern entrance is through a collapsed sink or deep depression in the limestone, with remnants of the original roof preserved as a natural bridge over the steps leading to the cave mouth.
