



New Laws Affect Use Of The Telephone

State legislation which will affect telephones was called to the attention of Texans this week by General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

The three bills which have been passed are Senate Bill 309, which has to do with fraudulant use of telephones; Senate Bill 366, which deals with obstructing the use of a party line during an emergency; and House Bill 921, which deals with destruction of obstruction of telephone, telegraph or electrical transmission equipment.

"Some pathetic things have happened here in Texas when persons would not give up the line for an emergency call and telephone companies and individuals are being cheated out of thousands of dollars through fraudulant use of the telephone, according to the telephone company district manager. 

Ferdniand Flake was the correspondent for the Galveston News which had moved its plant to Houston when Galveston Island was ordered evacuated in 1862. Flake used the military telegraph line between Galveston and Houston to end his dispatches to the News.

He was later credited with being the first reporter to give "movenent, order and perspective to the action, while his follow-up stories were splendid examples of interest in the human side of the conflict. Home Demonstration Agent's Column By MRS. VIDA KREKLOW

So many have called and asked for the pizza pie recipe that I have decided that it may be more popu lar than thought at first. This following one is the same as was made for demonstration purposes at the bread making school last

Italian Pizza Dough

- ½ teaspoon active dry yeast 2 tablespoons warm water 3/4 cup warm water
- ½ teaspoon salt. ½ teaspoon sugar
- 1 tablespoon olive oil. 2 2/3 cups flour

Combine the yeast with the 2 tablespoons warm water and let stand for 5 to 10 minutes. Mix the 3/4 cup of water with salt, sugar and olive oil (any cooking oil will do). Add to the yeast mixture, stir in half the flou arnd beat until smooth. Add remaining flour. Stir until dough comes away from sides of bowl. Knead until smooth 8 to 10 minutes. Roll into very thin sheets. This will make 3 pizzas 8 inches in diameter.

Tomato Sause Filling

- 1 No. 2 can tomatoes, drain well. 1 small can tomato sauce 1 med. sized onion, chopped fine
- ½ cup chopped salami 1/4 cup chopped Italian pepper-
- oni sausage.
- Salt and pepper to taste
 1 pkg mozarella cheese
 2 tbls shredded parmausau cheese.
- Olive oil to brush crust
- ½ teaspoon oregano ½ teaspoon sweet basil ¼ teaspoon thyme.

Mix together onion, tomatoes, tomato sauce, salt, pepper, salami, and pepperoni. Spread this mixture on rolled out pizza dough which has been brushed with olive oil. Cover filliing with mozzarella cheese strips and sprinkle herbs on cheese. Bake in hot oven (450) and bake for 15 to 20 minutes or until crust is brown and filling is dairy specialist. hoto and bubbly.
