Wheat Referendum Voting Is On Today

"Schleicher cuonty wheat growers will join with other producers throughout the nation on August 24, to decide if marketing quotas will be in effect on their 1962 wheat crop," County Agent W. G. Godwin announced. Quotas will be in effect only if at least two-thirds of the producers vote "yes" in the referendum. Here are the options in a nutshell.

If farmers vote "yes":

1. The price of wheat will be pegged at \$2 per bushel or about 84% of parity for those who comply with program provisions. 2. There will be a mandatory

acreage reduction of 10% 3. Payments will be made for diverting wheat acreage and for devoting it to a conservation use. 4. Additional voluntary reduc-

tions may be made. If farmers vote "no": 1. Price support on wheat will be \$1.19 per bushel or 50% parity for those producers planting within acreage allotments.

2. There will be no limit on mar-

All farmers who have produced more than 13.5 acres of wheat in at least one of the last three years are eligible to vote, Godwin said. Complete information on the proposed wheat stabilization program can be obtained at the county agent's office, or by contacting Schleicher county ASC office manager Wilson Smith .
"We do not have a 1962 wheat

program now," Smith emphasized. That will be up to the farmers to decide today, August 24.





The big, fine high school gymnasium, less than three years old, has been developing serious structural flaws in the past few months, and the school is faced with an expensive repair job that will probably cost over

The trouble is not in the big

main room, but is in the boys' locker room along the south side of the building. The floors have cracked and pushed upward, the tile walls are split, doors and windows are out of plumb, and water pipes and other service lines are being subjected to severe pressure.

On the other side of the building, the girls' locker rooms are starting to be affected the same The damage has progressed rapidly in the last three

Various confractors, architects and engineers have been called in to diagnose the trouble and

recommend repairs. The whole floor on these two sides must be removed, they say, and rebuilt. The lowest estimate, so far, is \$32,000. School board members, and administrators invite public to come by and see the damage for themselves. "We hate it just as much as you do," they add.

Warden Title Fades Out In Re - Organization

Austin.—An old title in conservation and law enforcement in Texas will fade into history after September 1, with the reorganization of the Game and Fish Commission. In the future, wardens will be known as "conservation officers." In some states where this title is used, the name has been shortened to "conservators."

The title of warden is a handy name, easy to remember. The name of conservation officer denotes a little more the real duties of the enforcement men.

There are approximately 200 of these uniformed oficers in the employ of the Game Commission. They started out strictly as law enforcement officers, but as times have changed and thinking progressed, the yhave been much



A program for the county is to be developed by the chairman of the county ASC Committee, and he designated Soil Conservation Service technician prior to the next meeting date of which is to be, September 20, 1961. The program and cost share rates are sent with a letter of transmittal to the Area Conservationist who will review them with the ASC District Farmer-Fieldman. If everything is in order they will sign them and forward them to the SCS State Office for review. If the State Conservationist approves, they are returned to the Area Conservationist and then to the respective designated Work Unit Conservationist.

The program for a county will have been officially developed when these steps have been taken.

New Game Licenses Are Now On Sale

Austin.—Mail sacks containing approximately one and a half million hunting and fishing licenses were filled, to reach license dealers of Texas by Monday, August 21. These will be the new hunting and fishing licenses for the 1961-62 season, which will become effective September 1.

September 1 is the date also for the opening of the dove season and the quail season in Texas.

The hunting license will sell for \$3.15, and the fishing license for \$2.15. A non-resident hunting license will cost \$25, that entitles a person to hunt any of the wild game animals and wild game birds during open season. A non-resident may hunt migratory birds for 5 consecutive days with a \$5 license. The \$2.15 fishing license applies to both resident and non-

A hunting license is not required of anyone under 17 or over 65 years of age outside of the county of their residence. A license is required of anyone hunting deer or turkey. An exempt license may be obtained by persons under 17 or over 65, or by a person hunting on property on which he resides A fishing license is required for all persons 17 years of age to 65 who fish outside their home county or who use a rod and reel.

In addition to the licenses for sportsmen, some 30 other licenses are offered to cover trapping, netting, and commercial fishing. Licenses may be purchased at practically all sporting goods stores, from the county clerk, game warden and many other locations where license dealers are avail-





During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Oliver will be available to assist cattlemen with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Mr. Burk.

Cattlemen interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. A. M. Whitis, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Mr. Oliver Burk. An entry fee of \$2.00 will be charged. Beef Cattle Short Course Certificates are to be presented ot each cattleman who attends all the training ses-

Mr. Oliver states that the field of beef cattle production must take a close look at efficiency of production in the future. With land prices, feed, and taxes rising the producer is meeting more and more competition for the consum-ers dollar at the meat counter. From the economic view of the beef cattle business, there is every indication that in comparing the producer of yesteryear and the producer of tomorrow, beef must der to be a profit making business. Mr. Oliver indicates that the beef cattle short course will deal with the methods of producing beef at a lower cost and the ways of producing the kind of beef that the housewife wants to buy. He also states that the course will include such very important fields as the meat type steer, selecting bulls and repacement heifers, proper range use, supplemental winter feeding and will be adapted to the wishes and interests of the farmers and ranchers enrolled.

"Short courses in beef cattle, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the new cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M College," stated E. V. Walton, head of the Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M, who coordinates the program for Texas A&M College.

"This cooperative program" says Walton, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people."

Specialists are now available in the fields of beef cattle, insect control, farm management, farm electrification, farm welding, swine production and tractor mainten-







This sample is placed under a microscope and evaluated. This test enables the cattleman to know in advance whether or not his bull is a "calf-getter" well enough to repeat to others if necessary. Physically, he needs to be fairly independent and well-trained. He should be able to dress and undress himself, take care of toilet needs, and eat wholesome food

A survey made by A&M College on 1,369 bulls in all areas of Texas showed that 84% were satisfactory breeders, 9% were questionable, and 7% had cull semen. These seem like pretty good odds and the cattleman could gamble, but what if he lost?

Look at the question carefully, says Thompson. Suppose it costs \$80 per year to keep a cow, and \$10 to have the bull tested. This places the cow cost up to \$90, but the cattleman has a chance to get this and more back if the bull is fertile. On the other hand, if the bull is not tested and proves to be infertile, the cattleman is out \$80. In other words, by not having the bull tested, the producer is betting the upkeep cost of the entire herd against the price of a test. These are not very good odds.



Sales Tax Explained

Prime targets of the state's new two per cent sales tax, which becomes effective September 1 are furniture, household and kitchen appliances, clothing with some exceptions, household supplies, toys, restaurant meals, and gas and electric utility bills.

But those are not all by any means, as you'll soon discover. However, groceries, housing, medical and dental bills, insurance, and telephone service will not be covered by the new levy.

One break for the taxpayer came with the new tax bill. The 3% tax which was on television sets, radios and air conditioners, will be reduced to 2%. Cosmetics tax will be lowered from 2.2% to

It should be some consolation, at least, to know that all sales taxes under the new law are consumer taxes and thus deductible from the federal income tax.

Daniel Accedes To Sales Tax Governor Daniel filed the sales tax bill with the Secretary of State, unsigned. This permitted it to become law without his signature. He said to veto it at this time,

School Bus Prices Fixed?

An anti-trust suit has been filed by Atty. Gen. Will Wilson against l6 persons and firms. Suit alleges that bids on school buses sold to he state have been rigged.

Wilson said something like 5,100 buses costing \$23 million are involved. Allegation is that those named agreed to "fix, maintain and increase the price at which school buses are sold in the State of Texas.'

Suit asks penalties up to \$3,600,-000 for price-fixnig acts covering period from January 1, 1955 to August 16, 1961.


