**Adoption Awareness Month** November is National Adoption Awareness Month. In 1998, Texans adopted 7,097 children. Of those, 3,434 were children adopted by relatives and 3.633 were children adopted by non-relatives. There were 621 foreign

born chidren adopted in the state.

The Central Adoption Registry is a part of a voluntary mutual-consent system that enables persons who are 18 years or older to list their name on the registry to locate other family members who are also listed. The unique registry is the only one that has the authority to request a search of sealed or confidential records to confirm a match.

On this date in 1477 William Caxton, using a wooden press, produced the first book to be printed in England, Dictes or Sayengis of the Philosophres. In 1820 Captain Nathaniel Palmer, aboard the *Hero*, a forty-four-foot sloop, became the first American to sight the continent of Antarctica. In 1916, after nearly five months of mass slaughter, General Douglas Haig, commander of the British Expeditionary Force in World War I, called off the Battle of the Somme in the Somme River region of France. In all the battle totaled more than 1.25 million soldiers killed, wounded or missing.

### Escaped prisoner caught quickly

The stolen pickup, which began the incident, belongs to Edward Antonio Solano of El Paso. Franzoni was reportedly traveling to Temple in the truck when he stopped on the roadside near the local cemetery. Trooper Torres noticed the parked vehicle and stopped to see if Franzoni needed assistance. He routinely radioed in the pickup's license plate number to the Sheriff's Dept. dispatcher who advised Torres the truck was listed as stolen.

Franzoni provided officers with driver's license in the name of Terry Ray Bulls and identified himself as Bulls. On Wednesday morning, November 17th, Deputy Arispe received confirmation of Franzoni's true identity. It turns out he is connected with the theft of a Schleicher County pickup from the County yard on April 9th of this year. That pickup was later found on property belonging to Franzoni in Bell County.

According to Arispe, Franzoni has an extensive criminal record and is wanted on several outstanding warrants including: burglary of a habitation, unlawful carry of a firearm, possession of marijuana and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. Locally charges of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, felony escape and failure to identify himself to a police officer are pending against the man.



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


