Department of Public Safety Trooper Steve Torres arrested Fran zoni at 5:05 p.m. on Saturday, No vember 13th after he learned that the pickup Franzoni was driving was reported stolen in El Paso.
Schleicher County Sheriff's Deputy Jason Chatham arrived at the scene to assist Trooper Torre and Franzoni was handcuffed and placed in the patrol car. While the two officers searched the 1998 Ford Ranger pickup Franzoni had been driving, the prisoner wriggled his legs through his handcuffed wrists, bringing his arms in front of him. He then rolled down the vehicle's window, reached out and opened back were again locked behind his the door from the outside and ran was booked into the Schleicher into the adjacent pasture near the

On Monday, the high court in the classroom in 1962, said that it will review a U.S. appeals court wing that the Santa Fe I.S.D. violated the constitutional restrictions on church-state separation by allowing student-led prayers at football games and will decide whether high school students may recite Christian prayers at football games.
The court will hear an appeal by the school district, which said students should be given the right to participate in student-initiated group prayers at football games. Texas Gov. George W. Bush, quickly announced his support for the appeal and urged the court to reverse the lower court's ruling. Officials from Alabama, Colorado, Kansas, Louisiana, Mississippi,
Nebraska, South Carolina and Ten Nebraska, South Carolina and Tennessee joined Bush's plea.
Texas Attorney General Joh Cornyn said he was pleased the court will decide whether students
pressed optimism the court will
protect the First Amendment rights of students.
The Supreme Court will hear arguments in the closely watched case before the end of April; with
decision due by the end of June.
The appeals court struck down he policy allowing student prayers o be read over the public address system at home football games, even if the remarks were "nonsecarian and nonproselytizing.

The ruling also applied to other similar school functions, the school district said in its Supreme Court appeal.

## Too Much Soft Bedding Endangers Infants in Cribs

QUESTION: I have great fear that my baby will die when I put her in her crib. What is known about now about sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS)? Have researchers figured out what causes these tragic cases where seemingly healthy babies die while sleeping?
DR. DOBSON: Sudden infant death syndrome is still a major concern, killing about 6,000 babies each year in the United however, about the circumstances that are often associated with this terrible event. A study was conducted by the U.S. Consume Product Safety Commission with
the collaboration of researchers at the University of Maryland and the University of Maryland and the Washington University School
of Medicine in St. Louis. The reof Medicine in St. Louis. The re-
sults were presented at a meeting sults were presented at a meeting
of the Society for Pediatric Reof the Society for Pediatric Research in 1996.
The epidemiologist who directed the investigation, Dr. N.J. Scheers, said, "We have not found a cause of SIDS, but our results show that specific items of bedding used in the U.S., such as comforters and pillows, were associated with an increased risk for death to prone-sleeping infants whose faces became covered, compared to infants on their sides or backs without soft bedding under them."

It was concluded that babies placed on their stomachs in soft bedding are more likely to re-
breathe their own carbon dioxide that is trapped in the blankets and pillows around them. About 30 pillows around them. About
percent of the 206 SIDS deaths in percent of the 206 SIDS deaths in
the research project were found with bedding pressed against their noses and mouths. Most of them
ere under 4 months old and uld not extricate themselves. The advice now being offered by doctors is that parents place their infants on their backs, not on their stomachs, and that a minimum amount of loose bedding be kept in the crib. Following this advice won't eliminate all cases of SIDS, but it could save thousands of lives every year.

QUESTION: My husband's parents are wonderful people and we love them very much. They have always refrained from interfering in our family - that is, until our daughter was born. Now they're arguing with us about how we're raising her and undermining the things we're trying to teach the want to base Amy's teach. We ant to base Amy's upbringing on biblical principles, but not being Christians, my in-laws don't really understand this. How can we deal with this situation without offending them?
DR. DOBSON: It is time to have a loving but candid conver- tim sation with your in-laws about ould your child will be raised. I would suggest that you take them o dinner some evening during which this topic will be addressed. When the moment is right, tell them of your concerns Make it clear that you love them granddaughter. But the responsibility for how she is being managed must rest entirely with you and your husband
Remind them that they had eir day when the decision about child rearing were theirs mean. Spell out the issues tha mean the most to you, including ur desire to raise your daugh
ter according to Christian prin ter according to Christian prin-
ciples. Try to help them underciples. Try to help them unde stand your reasons, but recog-
nize that their world view might make it impossible for them to agree. If that is the case, they'll need to honor your wishes any way.
It is likely that sparks will fly during this conversation. If so, try to remain calm and stand your ground. If the worst occurs and the dinner ends in an emotional walkout, I sug gest that you give your in-law ome space while they're coo

## ing off.

## A sign you're in danger or just a bad gardener? <br> 

If you find dead or dying vegetation near a green, growing area, it could signal more than the absence of a green thumb. It's also one of the warning signs of a natural gas leak. Other signs include a distinctive odor like rotten eggs, or a hissing or roaring sound.

If you suspect a natural gas leak, take the following steps:
Leave the area immediately on foot.
Avoid creating sparks that could ignite the gas.
Do not light a match, start an engine
or turn on/off electrical equipment. Call 911 or the local fire and police department.
Immediately call the pipeline operator.
For TXU Fuel, call (214) 969-7221 collect.
For TXU Lone Star Pipeline, call (214) 741-1671 collect.
Remember, if you suspect a natural gas leak, your first concern should be your safety and the safety of the people around you.
