



Advantages Of Dry Milk Are Pointed Out

College Station. - Homemakers interested in trimming the food budget or keeping family figures in line, can rely in non-fat dry milk solids, or dry milk, to help, according to foods and nutritions specialists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dry milk is high in food valueonly the fat, vitamin A, and some of the amino acids contained in whole, fresh milk have been removed. This means fewer calories.

It is less expensive than whole, fresh milk, and can be stored withcut refrigeration in its dry form. After it has been converted to liquid form, it should be refrigerated.

There are many ways to use this nutritious food in family meals. It can be whipped for use as a dessert topping, chilled and used as a beverage, converted into delicious buttermilk, or used in any recipe that calls for milk.

To make buttermilk, convert the dry form to liquid and add 1/4 cup of cultured buttermilk to each quart of liquid.

Use it in the dry form in prethe liquid.

Convert dry milk solids into fact) for about an hour. This makes liquid form for use in beverages, around 2 gallons. soups, sauces, custards and dishes such as scrambeld eggs and creamed vegetables.

Use these proportions for mixing, or follow directions on pack age: 1/4 cup non-fat dry milk solids plus 1 cup of water for each cup of skim milk desired. The package may call for less dry milk, but specialists suggest using the above proportions to improve flavor and increase food value.



Since the district began operation there have usually been more is conserved. terraces ready for construction than contractors to do the work. Due to the fact that there have been few contractors to construct terraces, District cooperators have used their farm equipment to construct terraces. By using their farm equipemnt and available contractors, a good number of terraces have been constructed.

Nearly every farmer sees the need for terraces in his well rounded soil and water conservation plan. The need for a terrace that can be farmed with ease and will conserve the maximum amount of soil and water is also recognized.

The advantages of terraces built with a bull dozer are numerous. Terraces constructed with a bull dozer do not have any barrow ditch above the terrace. All the dirt used in the terrace is moved from the downhill side. By eliminating the barrow ditch the water held by the terrace is more evenly distributed on the area above the terrace. This is due to the fact that there is no barrow ditch to fill up with water before the terrace begins to back water up the slope. The area immediately above a terrace with no barrow ditch will dry up and be ready to farm much sooner than a terrace with a barrow ditch. This is due because there is no evacuated area for the water to pour in.

By moulding the dirt used in constructing a terrace with a bull dozer from a wide area below the terrace, the barrow ditch below the terrace is also eliminated. By gradually increasing the cut being made from the starting point to the terrace, the evacuated area can be made practically level. This is an advantage in that more water will be held which will result in better crops on this area. Since more water is held on the leveled area below each terrace the next terrace down the slope will not receive as much water as it would otherwise

By eliminating the barrow ditches and distributing the water over a wider area, fields will be ready to plant or farm sooner. This planting date is very important in producing a good crop in that they must have time to make. Crops
