worked for some time on this project. He has also secured
lighting equipment which will be installed on the field
when the paving is completed-thus providing for night-
time landings. Other improvements call for fencing the
strip by the city and county.
Adapting the airport to all-weather and night-and-
day use is a major project for this year. Because of level
terrain and absence of hills and treacherous air currents,
it is predicted that the Eldorado airport will become one
of the more popular ones in this West Texas area
