Smith, President of Pioneer Gathering System, Inc., Amarillo, Texas, has announced the signing of gas purchase contracts with Magnolia Petroleum Company and Pan American Petroleum Corporation covering the purchase of gas in the Clayton Ranch Field and the Addie Field in Crockett County, approximately 10 miles east of Ozona, Texas.

So that these wells may be tied into its gathering system, Pioneer Gathering has applied to the Federal Power Commission for the construction of 14 miles of 4½-inch pipeline and a dehydration plant.

Construction is expected to begin as soon as a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity is granted by the FPC.

About a month ago Pioneer announced that they had signed purchase contracts for gas in the shut-in Buckhorn field in Schleicher. Pioneer Gathering System, Inc., a subsidiary of Pioneer Natural Gas Company, is already buying gas in this area and delivering it to Permian Basin Pipeline Company in Schleicher County.

Local Airport To Be Paved; Lighting, Fencing To Follow

An all-weather runway——long regarded as "must" for Eldorado—has finally gotten past the talking stage, and will soon be a reality, as a result of action taken by the Schleicher Commissioners Court in their regular session here Monday.

Following a lengthy discussion in which a number of interested citizens took part, the commissioners voted Monday to carry out the airport improvements without delay until they are completed. This means completing the caliche strip which is well under way, then adding a gravel sub-base and finally completing the strip with two coats of asphalt. The run-way will be 50 feet wide and 3150 feet long. The paving job will cost about \$4,500. ored and were presented with

Among those working for this improvement, and appearing before the commissioners Monday, was E. H. Topliffe, chairman of the transportation committee of the Chamber of Commerce. A flyer himself, Mr. Topliffe has worked for some time on this project. He has also secured lighting equipment which will be installed on the field when the paving is completed—thus providing for nighttime landings. Other improvements call for fencing the strip by the city and county.

Adapting the airport to all-weather and night-and-been day use is a major project for this year. Fire Razed Businesses 35 Years Ago This Week

This building was just built and Mr. Sweatt's loss was about \$300, no insurance; the flames next spread to the Haynes' confectionery, owned and operated for 20 years by Mrs. E. C. Haynes. She reports her loss to be about \$8,000, no insurance; the Haynes building and the building occupied by the El Dorado Hardware Co., joined; the hardware building was owned by the First National Bank of El Dorado and John W. O'Neill, of San Angelo, valued at about \$1,500, with some insurance. Mr. Hill reports that the Hardware's loss was about \$6,000, this loss partially covered by insurance; some goods were saved from the Hardware and Haynes building, also a machine and two saddles from the Sweatt building.

The origin of the fire is unknown. From reports of men who first discovered it, the flames started in southeast; this corner was used to hang clothes in, also had a small table in it.

It is not known whether the fire started on inside or outside of building. Men at the phone office were up at four o'clock and saw no signs of fire; the fire was discovered by these same men at fourthirty and by daylight the entire half block was smouldering in

The high wind from the south blew fired shingles across the street and for awhile the block opposite the fire was threatened.

Those burned out will re-enter business, some to rebuild. The Hardware was building at time of fire; at present they are located in Hoover building.

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
