On This Date

On this date in 1571 the last naval battle featuring galleys, oar powered warships, was fought off the southwestern coast of Greece. Spain's fleet defeated that of the Ottoman Empire, sinking 80 ships and killing more than 25,000 Turks. In 1765 delegates from nine American colonies gathered in New York City to protest the British Stamp Act. In 1949 the Democratic Republic of Germany is proclaimed within the Soviet occupation zone. It consisted of the German states of Mecklenburg, Brandenburg, Lusatia, Saxony, and Thuringia. In 1950 United Nations forces crossed the 38th parallel into North Korea, triggering China's entry into the Korean conflict. In 1985 four Palestinian terrorists hijacked the *Achille Lauro*, an Italian cruise ship. One man, Leon Klinghoffer, a disabled American tourist was killed and his body thrown overboard.

Internet Sales Tax Exemption

Starting this week, changes in the state's sales tax law will benefit one of the fastest growing sectors of the Texas economy.

One section exempts the first \$25 of a monthly charge for Internet access service from state and local sales tax.

Another section exempts 20 percent of the value of data processing and information services from state and local sales taxes. These services include such Internet-related activities as designing and maintaining Web pages.

SCISD trustees hold monthly meeting

The Schleicher County I.S.D. board of trustees met Monday evening, October 4th with trustees Ilse Williams, Eddie Albin, Steve Sessom, Berta Nicholson, Phil McCormick and Jo Helen Kotsch in attendance. Trustee Roxanne Adame was absent.

Before the meeting began, the trustees viewed a presentation by middle school. Fine Arts students.

Once the meeting began, a review of the district's financial reports turned into a discussion regarding the status of the high school

Rodeo Club. Trustee Phil McCormick questioned the need to have an activity account for the club when it does not participate in U.I.L. sanctioned events. He also noted that students in the club compete in rodeos for prize money and told his fellow trustees, "I'm not sure the school wants to assume any semblance of control over what those kids do when they're on trips out of town."

Supt. Hal Porter told the board that the Rodeo Club activity account is managed by the school and

that money placed in the fund at the beginning of the school will be reimbursed by the club as the year progresses. He emphasized that the school has no liability in connection with the club.

A motion offered by Eddie Albin to table discussion of the matter until such time as additional information could be provided to the board, died when it failed to receive a second.

A motion was then offered by Jo Helen Kotsch, seconded by Steve Sessom, to approve the activity fund report, gained the support of trustee Berta Nicholson. However, the measure failed to pass when McCormick, Albin and Ilse Williams voted against it.

In other business, the board reviewed and approved bids for the purchase of computer equipment from Computer Doctors in Eldorado and Power Systems in San Angelo.

SCISD technology director J.D. Doyle explained that Computer Doctors bid of \$1,319.00 per unit was \$80 per unit below the nearest competitor. Doyle noted that the savings will allow the district to purchase 22 computers instead of the 20 originally called for in the bid. Power Systems bid of \$1,799.00 per unit for three additional multi-media computers was identical to the bid offered by Bowkers of San Angelo. However, the computers offered by Bowkers failed to meet the bid specifications. Doyle also noted that the purchase of the computers is being funded with a "PS6" technology grant.

Schleicher County Appraisal District chief appraiser Ray Ballew then met with the board and sought approval for the school district's tax roll and tax levy. Ballew noted that SCISD's tax roll totals \$151,070,604.00. He also pointed out that the tax rate adopted last month of \$1.3499 per \$100 valuation results in a tax levy of \$2,035,813.04. The board unanimously approved both the tax roll and the tax levy.

Next, the trustees approved the minutes of two previous meetings. They also called a special meeting for Friday, Oct. 8th at 7:30 a.m. for the purpose of nominating board members to the Schleicher County Appraisal District.

The board then discussed contracting with a mediation team, consisting of a retired superintendent and board member, to advise the board concerning teamwork between the board and the administration. Before the discussion could advance much beyond that point, however, an executive session was called and the board went behind closed doors.

Upon emerging into open session board president Ilse Williams reported that the trustees had not reached a decision on the matter and had postponed the remainder of the executive session until the end of the meeting.

The board then took up discussion of district salary schedules. Williams asked for a comparison of teacher salaries with the minimum

The convention was hosted by the Sonora Volunteer Fire Department. The group's next convention is planned for April of 2000 and will be hosted by Eden.

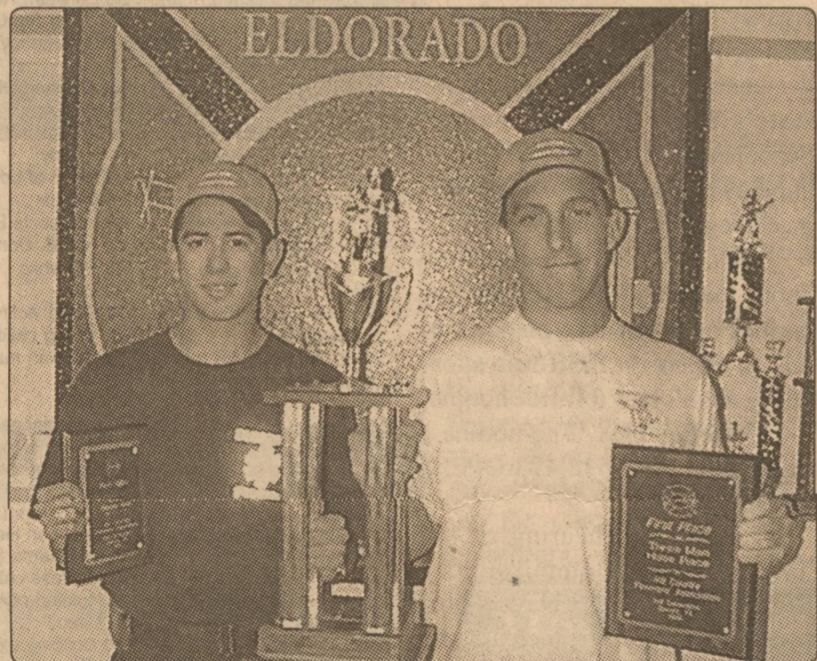

Sheep & Goat Raisers Assn. schedules membership meeting

The Fall Tri-Annual directors meeting of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Association, scheduled for Saturday, Oct. 9th at the Coke Stevenson Center in Junction, has been designated as a special called meeting of the membership. Registration will begin at 9:30 a.m. with the meeting getting under way at 10:00 a.m.

One reason for the called meeting is to act on a proposed amendment to the TSGRA by-laws. At the group's annual convention last July, the membership directed the association's officers to develop an amendment to change the collection of dues from a weight basis to per head basis for livestock. Also, the current method of warehouse deduction of dues in combination with direct billing from the asso-

ciation is being scrapped in favor of a single direct billing method straight from the association office.

Dues will range from \$35 for producers with 100 head or fewer of sheep and goats to \$345 for producers with as many as 5,000 head. An assessment of 7¢ per head will be made on herds larger than 5,000.

Also under consideration is a proposed amendment to eliminate the group's Fall meeting. If adopted the amended by-laws would require only bi-annual meetings of the board of directors.

All members of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Association are encouraged to attend the meeting and vote on the proposed amendments.

Quail Appreciation Day focuses on importance of natural habitat

Dr. Dale Rollins emphasized the importance of habitat as it relates to quail populations Thursday as he led a group of ranchers, extension agents and hunting guides in a hands-on study of the species. Rollins, an Extension Wildlife Specialist from San Angelo, demonstrated several techniques for evaluating quail habitat, including the use of radio telemetry.

A bobwhite quail was fitted with a radio-transmitter collar and released. The bird was then tracked using a hand-held receiver and antenna.

One of the purposes of the

event was to familiarize the participants with several components of quail management.

One of the components discussed was evaluation of habitat problems.

Rollins explained to the group how to survey a pasture and determine its ability to support quail, and at what levels.

The Quail Appreciation Day was held in cooperation with Schleicher County Extension Agent Scott Edmonson's office. The event was staged on the X-Bar Ranch and the Joe Ed Spencer Ranch.





The defense had another big day as they held Reagan County

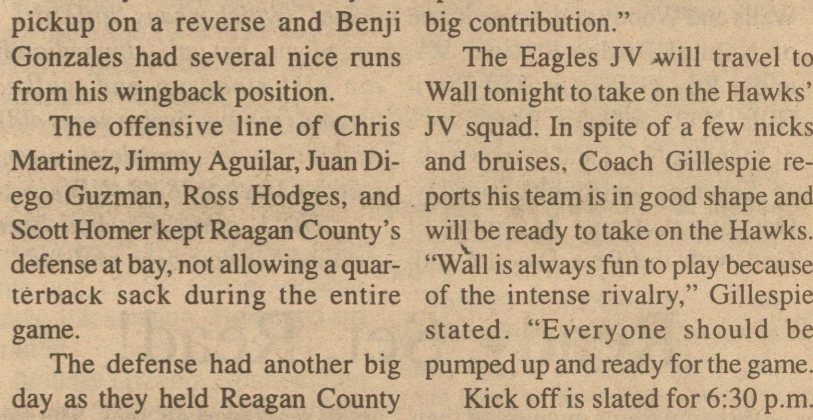
down most of the evening. Jimmy Aguilar and Luis Enriquez had quarterback sacks. Wesley Jones tallied multiple tackles and a batted ball.

salary allowed by the state. Supt. Porter explained that, on average, teachers at SCISD receive \$1,000.00 per year above the state minimum. An attempt to appoint a committee from among the board members to review the local salary schedule and offer recommendations to the board failed to garner needed support from the trustees. Supt. Porter told the board he would furnish them with salary schedules, complete with stipends, and comparisons to the state minimum salary, as well as other districts in the area.

The board next heard reports from the district's four campus principals, Ken Newman, Julie Griffin, Brian Brownlow and Bob Wanoreck, concerning recent activities on their campuses. It was noted that overall enrollment for the

district stands at 688.

Maintenance director John Kotsch also addressed the board concerning work on the football field parking lot and the implementation of a district energy savings plan.

The trustees then looked over a list of proposed resolutions which will be offered at the TASB state convention in Houston this weekend. In fact, the board meeting had been moved ahead one week specifically so the trustees could review the resolutions before Eddie Albin and Berta Nicholson travel to Houston to attend the convention. The group did not single out any specific resolutions to support, but Steve Sessom voiced his wish that the pair support a resolution supporting student led prayer.

The board then reviewed the results of two long-range planning

sessions held recently in which a group of board members, teachers, parents and community members participated. After hearing a brief report from Supt. Hal Porter and looking over confidential information concerning a student discipline matter, the board again went into executive session to continue their previous discussion concerning contracting with a mediation team. The group took no action on the matter, however, when it emerged into open session and adjourned the meeting.
