SILVER CHURCH HOSTS CONFERENCE

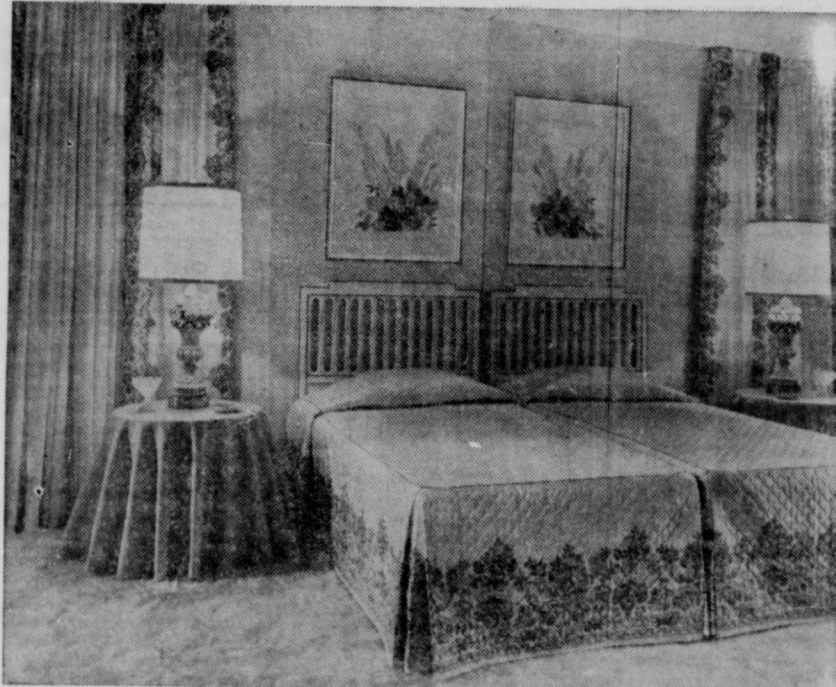
The First Baptist Church of Silver hosted the regular meeting of the Mitchell-Scurry Workers Conference.

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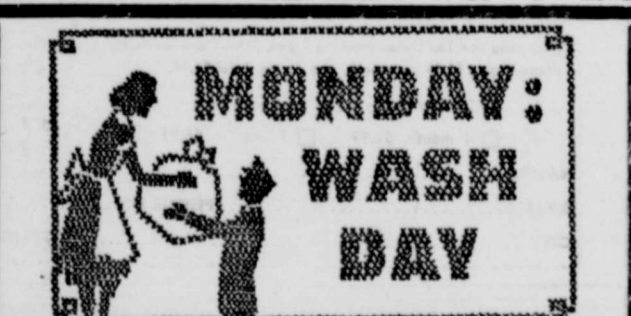

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Conservation Program on Walker Farm Under Great Plains Program by William L. Penny

Soil Conservation Service
Complete Conservation in three calendar years.
That is what Noble Walker, farm equipment dealer and farmer, of Colorado City, Texas, is doing on his 320 acre farm three miles east of the city. The work is being done under the Great Plains Conservation Program.

In 1959 while working on a Great Plains Program for Warren Anderson, William L. Penny, local S. C. S. Soil Conservationist, found it impractical to assist Mr. Anderson, until the land above was treated. He immediately contacted Noble Walker explaining the needs of all the land on the watershed and also explained how the Great Plains Conservation Program would help all land owners in need. Noble stated, "that's the program for me". In the weeks that followed a sound soil and water conservation program was worked out by Noble with the assistance of Penny. The contract was approved and Noble started to work. He being a farm equipment dealer made ready the right size tractor and plows, and began his terracing program. During the two years following, he constructed 19 miles of terraces which, he says, "I can work with my tractors". This year due to heavy rains in May and June all terraces in the District were given the supreme test, with lots of damage. Noble said, "My terraces worked fine, I had little damage, only 2 or 3 breaks, which was due to not enough dirt on fills, while constructing." These will be repaired as soon as crops are out.

Noble claims and it is verified by Penny that terraces alone will not do the whole conservation job especially during storm conditions, it takes a combination of conservation practices. I think my cropping system is as important in controlling wind and water erosion as a terrace system, however, if you are really going to get the job done, it takes both. I crop all my C slope land (3 to 5%) in high residue crops such as maize, sorghum, alfalfa, and small grain. I planted my thin land in blue panicum. My flat land I crop in cotton, maize, small grain in rotation. This not only helps my terraces on steep slopes during heavy rains, but will graze livestock, which has supplemented farm income.

At times a 2-4 skip row pattern is used with cotton which makes the land more vulnerable to wind erosion. To off set this sorghum or small grain are planted in the middle 40 inches space which will not only give the needed wind erosion control, but will give ample high residue for soil improvement. Sorghums are planted around the 15th of August and if using small grain, in September or October. This doesn't appear to take any moisture from the cotton.

Noble further states, "I now have my land under control and have made it possible for my neighbor below me to take care of his land, thanks to the Great Plains Conservation Program which has helped make it possible. I would recommend the Great Plains Program to any farmer or rancher providing it fits his plans.

Anyone interested in a similar program may obtain information and assistance from his local Soil Conservation District office.

NATIONAL LEADER WILL SPEAK AT CONVENTION

Denton-National Farm Leader, President James G. Patton of the National Farmers Union, will keynote the Friday night Banquet on December 8th at the State Convention of Texas Farmers Union, to be held in Waco at the Raleigh Hotel. Because of the growth of Central Texas membership in Farmers Union, President Patton has varied from the precedent of addressing two state convention successively and will

be in Texas for the second successive convention. The Senior Senator from Texas, Senator Ralph Yarborough, will highlight the Saturday morning session with an address to the convention. John Hutchison, Director of Extension Service, Texas A & M College, will speak to the convention on Friday afternoon. Other state and national figures will be in Waco to greet the convention.

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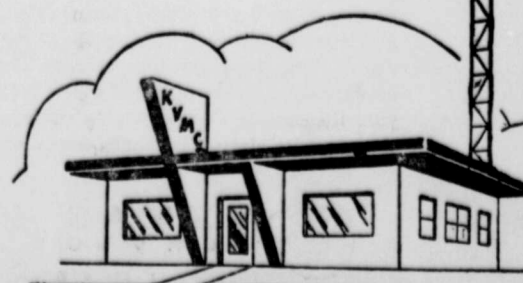
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National Debut For Debbie Sue As March of Dimes Poster Child

Debbie Sue Brown, a five-year-old winsome young lady of Clarkston, Wash., who is annoyed because she must wait a few years before marrying the boy next door, was selected this week as the 1962 New March of Dimes Poster Child.

Debbie Sue won out over hundreds of small children, afflicted with birth defects, arthritis or polio—health fields embraced by the program of The National Foundation—March of Dimes. The Poster Child lives a life both exciting and glamorous. If physical condition permits, there usually are visits to the White House, to Senators, Governors and other prominent persons as well as radio and television appearances during the New March of Dimes in January.

She will star in a January TV special, "The Scene Stealers," and her picture will appear nationwide on thousands of March of Dimes posters, coin collectors, and mail appeal envelopes.

Debbie Sue, high-spirited and active today, although doctors once believed she wouldn't survive the open spine with which she was born, lives in a valley of the Clearwater Mountains near the banks of the Snake River.

She is brown-eyed and blonde, the daughter of Jack C. Brown, a state highway surveyor, and Barbara Brown, who have a younger daughter, Carla, one year old.

Debbie Sue's birth defect of an open spine was not immediately apparent. But a few days after birth her grandmother, Mrs. Fred Benning, a registered nurse of nearby Orofino, Idaho, recognized that a serious disorder was present; and the parents then drove 400 miles at headlong pace to Seattle's Children's Orthopedic Hospital. (The mother collapsed on arrival and was herself hospitalized.)

At the hospital the parents were told that Debbie Sue's spinal defect was of such severity that the infant probably could not live beyond three months. If she were alive at

six months, however, she was to be brought back. "We drove home sadly," Mrs. Brown relates, "trying to adjust ourselves to the tragedy of losing our beautiful baby. But our spunky Debbie Sue had no idea of leaving us at three months. At eight months, we returned to Seattle where her spine was mended. When she came out of surgery, she was so mischievous that she succeeded in wrenching free from the lion's-transfusion and the needle used for intravenous feeding. Doctors told us she must lie face down on the night train riding home. Instead, she insisted on sitting up, jabbering without end and keeping all the passengers awake."

The Astoria County Chapter of The National Foundation—March of Dimes promptly offered assistance and, since 1958, it has financed much of the cost

of Debbie Sue's treatment, braces, medicines and the check-up trips to Seattle, the breadth of the state away. Happily, in her case serious crippling has been averted. At least 250,000 infants are born yearly in the United States with birth defects—some even more severe than Debbie Sue's. The National Foundation, with March of Dimes financial support, is seeking the answers to this largest unmet childhood medical problem in the nation today.

When the 1962 New March of Dimes National Poster Child isn't scooting around the Lewis and Clark countryside with Daddy on his motorcycle, she plots how to provoke a proposal from Stevie, the six-year-old next door. Although it will be some time before she can consider marriage, Debbie Sue's idea is to get her man committed now.

RESURFACING OF U. S. 80 THROUGH C. CITY OKAYED

The Texas Highway Commission today approved the expenditure of \$75,000 for highway safety and betterment in Mitchell County during 1962, announced District Engineer J. C. Roberts of Abilene.

He said a total of 4.5 highway miles in the county will be involved. The work will be under the supervision of Ben Wilkinson, Supervising Resident Engineer, Colorado City.

This work is part of the 1962 State Highway Safety and Betterment Program just authorized by the Highway Commission.

Under this program, a total of 2,433 miles of U. S. and State highways will be improved. Work will be done on 373 projects in 156 counties.

Purpose of the annual program is to continue the improvement and modernization of U. S. and State highways for increased safety and convenience of travel.

The annual Safety and Betterment Program is one of the prime factors responsible for a significant 26 percent drop in the number of traffic deaths in primary highways during the last seven years, the Commission said.

"Together with programs for new construction and careful maintenance, the Safety and Betterment Program has helped achieve a meaningful reduction in traffic fatalities on the primary highway system," said Herbert C. Peiry, Jr., Chairman of the Highway Commission.

Peiry termed the Safety and Betterment Program as "not only desirable but essential for the safety and comfort of people who travel Texas highways in record numbers." The program, he said, will "perpetuate and protect the taxpayers' investment of well over \$2 billion in the Texas highway system."

Highways are due for improvements such as surface widening, bridge widening and replacement, base strengthening, and rebuilding of shoulders.

District Engineer J. C. Roberts said a total of 21.0 miles in this highway district would be involved, at a total cost of \$827,400.

The following improvement project will take place in this county: US 80 from Interstate 20 West of Colorado City to Interstate 20 East. Approximately 4.5 miles of additional surface at a cost of \$75,000. \$496,400 is reserved for seal coats over this district.

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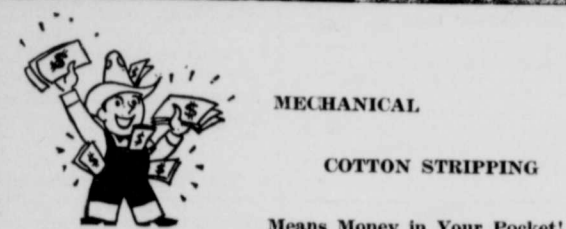

STATE TESTING PROGRAM COMPLETED IN LOCAL SCHOOL

The seventh grade was administered the Tests of Educational Ability Monday and to make-up students Tuesday. This test completes the State Testing Program in which the seventh, tenth, and twelfth grades have been participating. The school is reimbursed for the cost of this testing program under the National Defense Education Act, according to Mr. J. B. Cushing, Superintendent of Schools.

All test booklets, answer sheets, and other testing material are being supplied by Science Research Associates, Inc. of Chicago, Illinois. All tests are machine scored by SRA and individual scores are prepared and returned to the pupils and to the Texas Education Agency at Austin. Profiles, which are charts showing the pupils' strengths and weaknesses, are prepared by Preston C. Lightfoot Supervisor-Counselor, after the test results have been received. The test results and profiles will be discussed with each student. The parents have an invitation to come to the school to discuss with the counselor the test results for their children. It will possibly be after the Christmas Holidays before the test results will be sent to our school.

On October 23-25, the 10th grade had the opportunity to take the Flanagan Aptitude Classification Tests. These 19 aptitude tests will help them to see specific kinds of jobs that they can do well and also those that they cannot do so well. These tests can be very helpful to the students in deciding about their future vocation, according to Mr. Lightfoot.

On October 30-31, the Senior Class was given the Iowa Tests of Educational Development. These are achievement tests which are designed to measure how well a student can apply what he has learned. They measure his ability to read and interpret sciences, social studies, literature, and to think quantitatively. Also, these tests are used to give one indication of the size and college that a student should consider and to indicate the type of training that should be considered if college is not probable.

The purpose of the 7th Grade Tests of Educational Ability is to estimate scholastic ability and to provide a basis for judging the pupil's potential for success in his current school work.

Most of the other tests of the Loraine Testing Program which are given annually are scheduled at the regular time throughout the school year. These tests include reading readiness for the grade; mental ability for the first, third, and eleventh grades (the Tests of Educational Ability replaces the mental ability for the seventh grade); achievement in Grades 2, 4, 6, and 10; interest tests in Grades 9 and 11; and clerical aptitude for business students. The 7th Grade achievement and 12th Grade Iowa Tests of Educational Development under the State Testing Program will replace the same tests given to the 8th and 12th Grades, respectively, in the regular testing program.

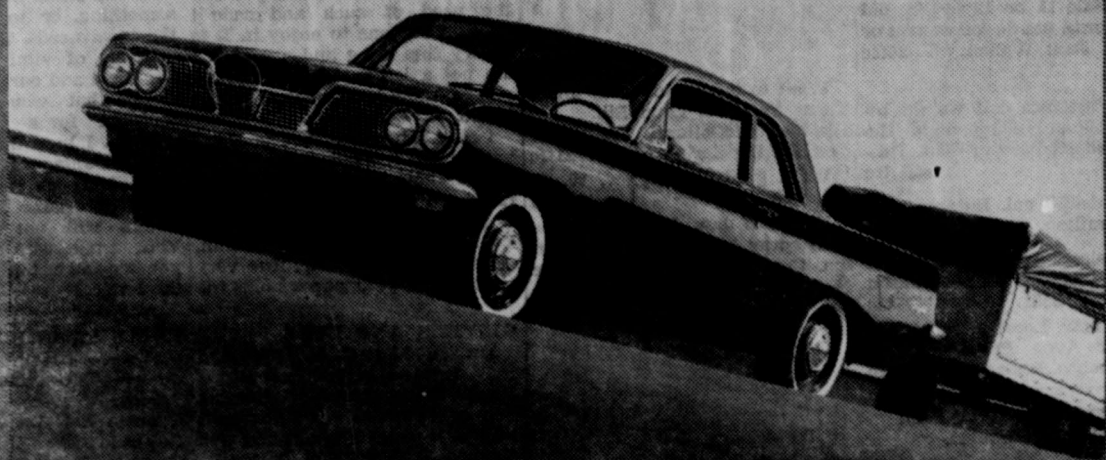

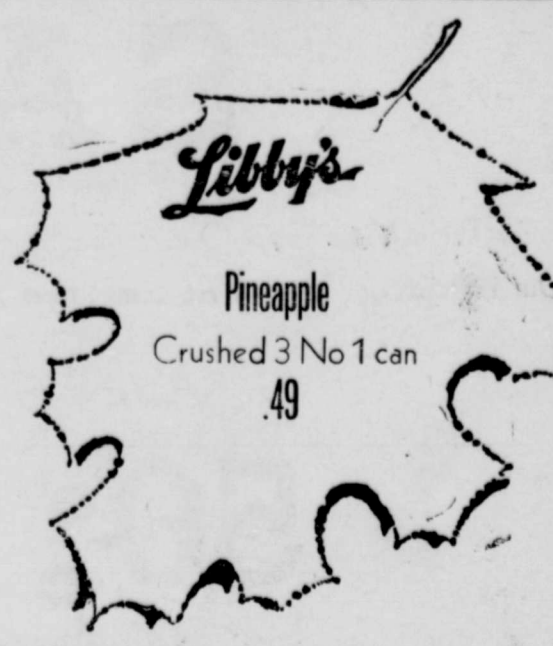
