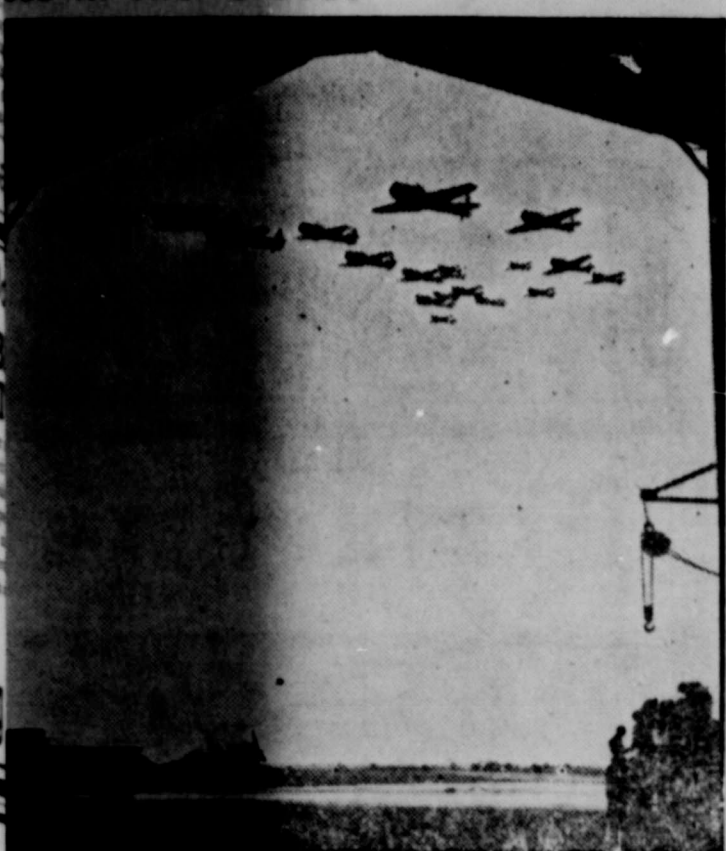

The second four weeks period of

Texas Adds 34,530 to Se- lective Service

Total Selective Service registra-
tion in Texas on July 1 was 34,530.
General J. Watt Page, State Direc-
tor, announced following tabulation
of reports received from the State's
351 local boards.

As in the first registration last
fall, Harris County led with 2,759
registrants. Dallas County was sec-
ond with 2,415.

General Page said that 34,126 of
the new registrants are young men
who have reached the age of
twenty-one since the first registra-
tion day on October 16, 1940.

General Page pointed out that
the 21-year-olds who registered on
July 1 will not be placed ahead of
after the older registrants on their
local boards, but they will be in-
tegrated proportionately. For exam-
ple he said, if there should happen to
be ten new registrants in an area
and 100 old registrants awaiting
call, one new registrant would be
placed after each group of 10 old
registrants.

tional defense items may request
release from military service of
former civilian employees who
held key positions prior to induc-
tion or enlistment.

Men who have served in the
active National Guard are re-
quired to register immediately
upon expiration of their service,
even though they are not, under
certain conditions, liable for fur-
ther peacetime training and ser-
vice under the Selective Service
Act.

Wheat Harvest Is Delayed By Rains

Despite Rain, Hail
Losses Cash Returns
Greatest in Years

With an estimated 50 to 60 per-
cent of the wheat acreage harvested
it now looks like the 1941 produc-
tion for the Perryton area will go
down in history as an average year
instead of the bumper crop that
was predicted a few weeks ago be-
fore continued and excessive rains
took their toll of damage. Yet with
all the loss from down wheat, hail
rust and worms, the increased price
will make the cash return to the
farmer the greatest since 1930.

The cash return to the farmer
will be even greater when the
bumper oat and barley yield is ad-
ded to the 1941 small grain total.
Then there is the finest prospect in
years for feed crops, so when the
crop year ends, the most prosperous
farm year in a decade is predicted.

Rains continue to delay harvest.
0.3 of an inch on the 11 and 23 of
an inch Tuesday evening. The
Tuesday evening rain was confined
to the territory adjacent to Perry-
ton. July rainfall to date is 2.18.

Due to wheat being down and the
weeds getting higher every day
some fields may be abandoned.
Most farmers with wheat in this
condition are planning on windrow-
ing it and if it does not make mar-
ketable wheat, using same for feed.

Year 'round live stock farmers
will be able to salvage many dollars
out of such wheat that to the town
and "suit-case" farmer will be a
total loss.

low-income farm families in this

Serving with these committeemen
on the County Council will be: W.
B. LaMaster, Perryton; P. P. Rog-
ers, Farnsworth; F. B. Sumpter,
Perryton.

The function of the Rural Re-
habilitation Committee, Mr. Turner
said, is to assist the county PSA
personnel in developing among bor-
rowers and applicants an under-
standing that sound, long-time
farm and home planning, keeping
accurate records of income and ex-
pense, and home production of feed
and food are important to success-
ful farming.

Other functions of this commit-
tee, Mr. Turner explained, include
assisting in solving problems of dis-
tressed farm families, help and
guidance possible in the PSA pro-
gram.

The Farm Debt Adjustment Com-
mittee will study the financial situa-
tion of PSA applicants and bor-
rowers and other low-income farm
families, and explaining their prob-
lems and plans for rehabilitation to
the creditors, affecting where possi-
ble, adjustments profitable to both
creditors and debtors.

A careful study of the tenure sit-
uation, and assisting in working out
more satisfactory and profitable
lease arrangements for landlords
and tenants, will be among the
other primary functions of this
committee. It will also seek to im-
prove the living standards of tenant
families and to protect the land re-
sources of the landlords.

Panhandle Farmers Aid National Defense by Conservation

AMARILLO, Tex., July 15.—Conservation of the soil so their land will be in condition to give maximum long-time production for national defense requirements is one of the greatest contributions that Texas and Oklahoma Panhandle farmers and ranchers can make to the country at this time, according to H. H. Pinnell of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

"Already, 2,670 farmers and ranchers of the Panhandle are carrying out complete soil and water conservation programs on 2,475,296 acres," reports Pinnell, who is the Southern Great Plains regional conservator for the Soil Conservation Service with headquarters in Amarillo.

Practically every county in the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles is represented by the more than 2,600 farmers and ranchers who are carrying out conservation practices in cooperation with the Service, the conservator reports. Complete plans have been worked out whereby every acre of the farm or ranch is put to the best use.

On cultivated land, erosion by wind and water is being checked through the use of such practices as terraces, strip cropping, contour tillage, crop rotations, the growing of cover crops, field border strips, and others. Range conservation practices include regulated grazing, contour furrows, water diversion and spreading systems, check dams, stock water ponds and spring development.

The growing interest of farmers and ranchers in conserving their soil is evidenced by the fact that during the last year erosion control practices have been applied on 577 farms including 561,056 acres, Pinnell states.

The soil conservation program is being carried out by the Service in cooperation with the soil conservation projects, water facilities development areas, farm forestry projects, land utilization areas in which the federal government has purchased submarginal land, and with the Farm Security Administration unit reorganization and tenant-purchase projects, the Extension Service and others.

"By preserving their soil, the Panhandle farmers and ranchers not only can be in a position to meet national defense demands for food as needs may arise, but also can maintain and improve the productivity of their land," declares the regional conservator.

Stress Employment Of WPA Workers

AMARILLO, Texas.—Training and reemployment in private industry for WPA workers will be emphasized during the current fiscal year of WPA operation, District Manager A. A. Meredith reported today on his return from a statewide meeting of officials of the Federal agency in San Antonio.

Creation of a new administrative division for expanding the WPA training and reemployment program is now being perfected in Washington, Meredith said, and the new training program will be placed in effect in Texas immediately.

Development of a reservoir of public improvement projects as a cushion against possible widespread unemployment as a result of slackening or cessation of the current national defense program will be a vital task of WPA during this fiscal year, Meredith reported. A public works reserve project has been formed to carry out this activity and will begin work immediately.

WPA has forwarded the national defense program by several months, Meredith was advised at the San Antonio meeting through reports received by State Administrator H. P. Drought from representatives of the Secretaries of War and Navy. Currently, 190,000 WPA workers are engaged in national defense work in the nation.

Under the present reduced WPA appropriation, which went into effect on July 1, national employment by the agency will be limited to approximately one million workers per month, the lowest in the history of WPA. Employment will be distributed between states and between districts on the basis of relative need, officials said.

In the community service division, District Managers were advised, priority will be given to public health activities, education, recreation, and to such cultural projects as music and writers projects. In the operations division, priority will continue to be given to national defense projects.

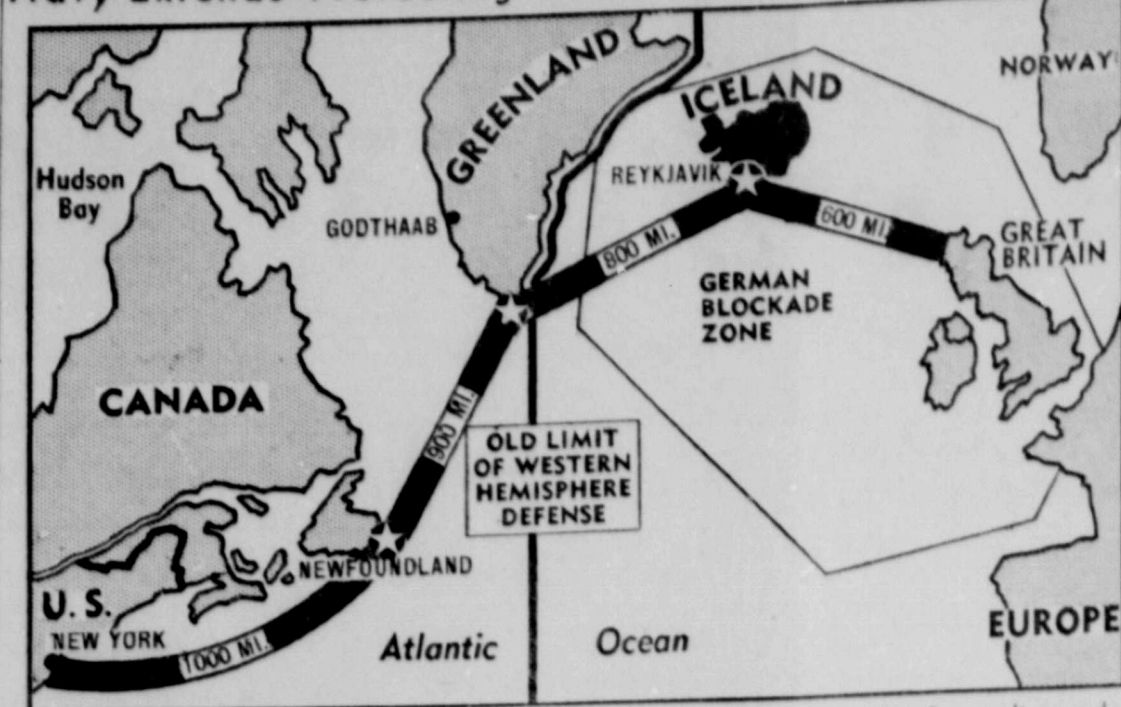

Care of Plants to Preserve Moisture

COLLEGE STATION.—What some people call "good luck" in growing trees, shrubs, and flowers is instead good management, in the opinion of Sadie Hatfield, specialist in landscape gardening for the A. and M. College Extension Service.

During the dry, warm summer months, a period when plants especially need intelligent care, they often suffer from more mismanagement of moisture than from any other one thing, she says. Shrubs and trees set out this year or last need an ample supply of moisture until they can establish a good root system. Even the native and hardy introduced plants require about two years in getting well enough established to withstand dry weather unaided.

Miss Hatfield quotes R. E. Dickson, superintendent of the Spur Experiment Station, as saying: "An intelligent use of God-given rain will mean more to the beautification of Texas than all other factors combined." In places where there is scant rainfall, Miss Hatfield recommends depressions, contours, and small dams for diverting water to trees, shrubs and flowers. These same devices will help hold the water for a few days after each rain.

Once moisture has soaked into the soil, mulches may be used to keep it there. Well-rotted leaves, rotted straw and hay, and rotted barnyard fertilizer may be put on in layers of one or two inches. All of these materials when worked into the beds next year will help hold water in the soil as well as when used on top as a mulch.

The specialist warns against deep cultivation as it may destroy roots. However, shallow cultivation is good for keeping a loose top on the soil prevents evaporation from below.

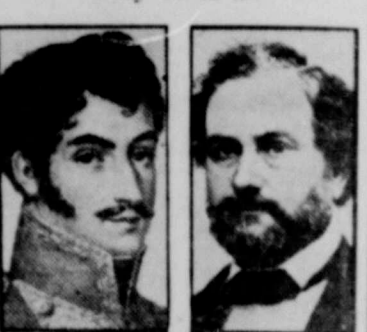
WHEN Executive Galento found out that his opponent was to be Executive Levinsky, he balked rather strenuously. In explanation, he gave forth with this epic quotation:

Modern Farming Calls for Farm Roads and Lanes on the Contour

Contour tillage, strip cropping, terracing, and attempts to divide their farm into fields based upon the type of soil and capability of the land have radically changed the attitude of conservation-minded farmers toward the system of farm roads that they should have, according to H. A. Finch, camp superintendent of the Soil Conservation Service at Perryton.

"The old method of laying out all farm roads and lanes in line with the points of the compass, over hill and down dale, is as much outmoded in a conservation farming plan as is horse-drawn artillery," Finch says. "In the type of streamlined conservation farming that many up-to-date farmers are using, most of the farm roads and lanes, like the field boundaries and tillage practices, should follow the contours of the land."

Practically all conservation plans worthy of the name provide for contour field boundaries and roads and lanes, the conservationist points out. The principal advantage of having the farm roads and lanes on the contour are that they will not erode so easily because the contour roads do not make drainage ditches up and down the hill to catch large quantities of run-off water and cut out severe ruts that eventually may grow into large gullies. Of course, it also is obvious that if the field boundaries are placed on the contour it is almost necessary to place the roads on the contour, if they are not to cross the middle of a field.

"We all know that the shortest distance between two points is a straight line, but the shortest road is not always the best road," Finch says. "The buffalo herds, antelope, and Indians of primitive America recognized that it usually was easier to walk around a hill than it was to walk over it. Certainly the railroad engineers recognized this principle when they laid out their roadbeds around the hill as nearly on the level as possible."

Farmers who must draw heavy loads across their fields with limited power will soon recognize the fact that it is much easier to pull the load around the hill on the level than it is to pull it straight over the hill."

The job of maintaining roads that are placed on the contour usually is much simpler than maintaining a road which attempts to go straight across draws and hills, the conservationist advised. "The principle of building roads on the contour, as well as carrying on other operations that way, is simply an attempt to make the farming layout and farming methods fit the land, instead of trying to have it fit the man-surveyed section lines that were laid out by government engineers during the early days."

Dispelling the Fog

Ex-President Herbert Hoover and Senator Wheeler, of Montana, are both very much worried over the advent of Russia into the war. Mr. Hoover told us in a radio speech the other day that it made our participation in the struggle a "gargantuan jest," and added that when we made our promise to aid Russia "the ideological war to bring the four freedoms to the world died spiritually."

Both the Senator and the ex-President have been describing eloquently the brutality of the Stalin regime; the treachery of the Soviets, the intolerance and fifth-column maneuvers of the Communists—with the implication that we are conniving with all these manifestations of tyranny, when we indicate that we are going to help Russia stand off Hitler. In some parts of the world, plagued by rats, they use snakes to destroy the vermin. That hardly means that the people of these countries have any purpose of embracing serpents.

The same newspapers that carried the word that we were permitting Russia to buy arms and munitions here carried the story of the conviction in our courts of various Communists of violating our espionage laws.

The Senator and the ex-President are nearly together in their isolationism, though Mr. Hoover in his recent talk veered pretty far when he announced his position on aid to Britain, and said: "To prevent these supplies from being sunk I

proposed we hand over to Great Britain the same convoy warships we would use if we joined the war." Yet a short time ago Mr. Hoover showed anything but enthusiasm about our turning 45 overage destroyers over to England, in exchange for naval bases on her Western possessions.

Is the Senator now a Hoovercrat? However, the Senator and the ex-President are grouped together in their general attitude as to the war situation.

Come to think of it, these two have been on opposite sides for ten years and there have been some pretty sharp exchanges between them over this period. The Congressional Record shows the Montana Senator inserting in the Record various statements indicating the low esteem in which he held the then Chief Executive, from 1928 to 1932. Both are now conveying the thought that our aid to Russia taints this administration with sympathy for, if not conversion to, the Red ideology. Would it be safe to apply the same sort of logic, and figure from it that Senator Wheeler is now a Hoovercrat?

Incidentally, Senator Wheeler who is now so fierce in his denunciation of Bolshevism as being at least as menacing as Nazism, was not always thus. In 1930, after a long Russian tour, he wrote a series of articles—later reprinted in the Congressional Record—in which he reached this conclusion: "Russia for thirteen years has maintained a stable government—much more stable than have most of the South American and Latin American countries. They have maintained order within their borders. . . . They have met promptly the obligations incurred by them since they

came into power.

"By all the rules of international law and practice they are entitled to recognition."

Of course, the issue is not that of Senator Wheeler's consistency, or ex-President Hoover's vagabondage. What is involved is the righteousness, wisdom and expediency of our taking full advantage of Russia's joining the war against the Axis powers.

It Depends on How You Measure—Mr. Hoover scoffs at the Japanese peril—stating that Japan is 6,000 miles away from continental United States. Well, Alaska is part of the United States and Tokyo is not much farther from Alaska than is San Francisco. If Russia is conquered by the Hitler legions, the Pacific shores of Siberia might become either Hitler outposts, or be taken over by Japan, whose itch for conquests in that direction perhaps exceeds her desire to spread out to the Dutch East Indies, and the rest of Oceania.

As Walter Lippman phrased the situation recently: "The question posed by the Russian War is whether ports and airfields of Eastern Siberia are to remain in independent Russian hands, or are seized by Japan, or are to be controlled by some sort of puppet government under Nazi, or Japanese, or Nazi-Japanese control."

That is how Mr. Hoover's 6,000 mile security belt shrinks in the light of present possibilities. Some of the Russian air bases are within a hundred miles of our Alaskan stations. Actually, the easternmost point of Russian possession and the westernmost outpost of the United States are not much farther apart than Baltimore and Washington.

Perhaps in view of the potentialities of the Russo-German War, the importance of material aid to the Soviet outfit may be appreciated. It amounts to a great deal more than our distaste for Bolshevism or Bolshevist habits, customs or excesses—which have no more to do with what the defense of America demands, than Joe Stalin's pipe or complexion.

Wheat Producers Collect Insurance

COLLEGE STATION, July 15—All-risk wheat insurance claims already have been approved for 801 Texas wheat growers E. R. Duke, state crop insurance supervisor, has announced.

These claims cover a total indemnity of 396,965 bushels on 75,733 acres and represent only a small percentage of the indemnities which will be paid producers who have suffered partial or total losses of their 1941 crops because of flood, rust, plant diseases and excessive rains at harvest time which caused a growth of weeds so heavy that harvest was impossible.

Wheat growers in various parts of the state, Duke said, improvised different devices in an attempt to save a part of their wheat which had been badly damaged by wind and rain.

Producers making claims may collect their insurance in two different ways. They may request indemnity to be paid immediately in the cash equivalent, or they may request that settlement be deferred until later. If the deferment plan is used, certificates of indemnity may be issued and converted into the cash equivalent at a later date.

A total of 11,040 Texas wheat growers insured their 1941 wheat crop with the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation on a production of 4,943,435 bushels.

Add Salt to Drinking Water in Summer

AUSTIN, Texas—If your work is such that it causes excessive perspiration, add a pinch of ordinary table salt to each drink of water you take to help prevent heat cramps. This is advised by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, to prevent a possible increase in the number of heat victims as the Texas thermometer hits 95 degrees and above.

Laborers, mechanics, farmers and white collar workers whose work causes them to sweat profusely, are in danger of having their body salt content become deficient with heat fag, salt heat cramps or heat stroke. Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat; the body may lose as high as 40 to 50 grams of salt during hot days.

In industry, a method of preventing heat cramps is to take a tablet of pure salt of mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. Workmen whose duties require muscular exertion should be es-

pecially careful to add more than the usual amount of salt to what they eat and drink.

Salt deficiency may be prevented by taking salt in various ways. Where prepared tablets are not available, table salt may be added to each drink of water. Milk is a source of the deficiency caused by sweating. Alcoholic drinks should be avoided.

Heat cramp is characterized by pains (cramps) in the abdominal region, headache, and in severe cases, by nausea and vomiting. The body temperature remains about normal, likewise the pulse rate; body salt losses occur without the knowledge of the individual until there is a deficiency; then the abdominal muscles begin to cramp.

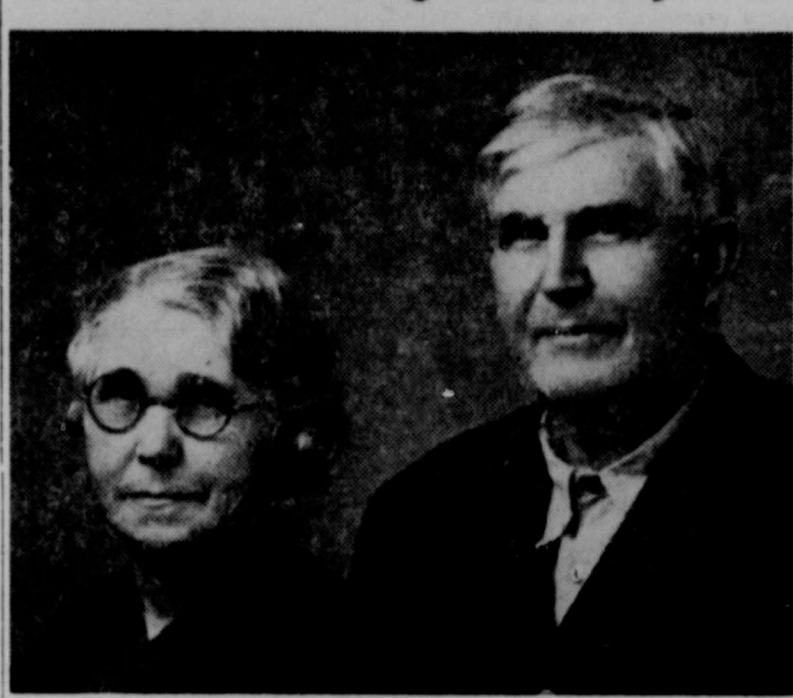

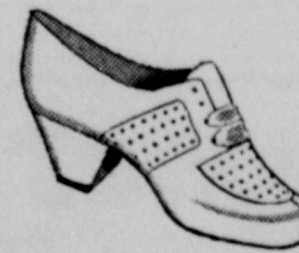

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Tolerant Attitude Serves Best

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for July 20.
Text: 1 Corinthians 5:9-13; Titus 2:1-8.

THIS lesson is in two parts, one of which might be called negative and disciplinary, and the other idealistic and constructive.

The first part from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians deals with the matter of discipline within the Church. Paul had written the Corinthians that they should have nothing to do with those whose practices were contrary to Christian morality and teaching. Some evidently had interpreted this to mean that Christians should virtually retire from the world or assume a harsh and censorious attitude toward all with whom they came in contact.

Paul points out that this was not what he meant, that to assume such a course it would be necessary for Christians to go out of the world. What he did mean was that within the Church there must be no compromise with immoral and evil practice.

If one reads the earlier history of many churches, the impres-

sion spreads that there were individuals whose religion consisted chiefly in the delight that they took in disciplining others. In general it may be said that the Church has been far readier to adopt Paul's suggestions about discipline than it has been to put into practice Paul's much more important teaching concerning love as the greatest thing in the world.

A good cause is never well served by intolerant attitudes. There is such a thing as being intemperate, even in our advocacy of temperance.

The temperance cause has been served most ably by those who have first of all practiced temperance, and who in their total life and conduct have manifested the beauties and graces of Christian living.

From this standpoint, it is a pleasure to turn to Paul's constructive words in his letter to Titus. Here he sets forth the things which, as he puts it, "befit the sound doctrine." It is a plea for temperance, sober-mindedness, love, and patience, for well-disciplined, noble living, the sort of thing that will never bring shame upon ourselves or disgrace upon the Church.

Shelter Belts of Trees Prove Worth In Protecting Farms in Prairie States

BY RALPH HERBERT

SOME seven years ago, when vast areas of the prairie states were being converted into dust bowls, the government planned to save other areas from a similar fate by planting shelter belts of trees. The scheme embraced the states of North and South Dakota, Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma and northwest Texas. It was estimated that planting 2½ million acres of trees would give protection to 50,000,000 acres of farm lands.

The work was started by executive order of the President in 1934. Actual tree planting began the following year. To date, one-tenth the original plan has been effected. If the rate in the past is maintained, it will be 54 years before the whole scheme is consummated. An average of 40,000 acres of trees has been planted since the plan was started. Twenty-seven thousand farms have been provided with tree shelter belts. Sixteen thousand miles of trees have been planted. This means about 190,000,000 trees.

They came from nurseries operated by the U. S. Forest Service. The government plants the trees, the farmers guaranteeing for some years to look after them by hoeing the ground, getting rid of weeds and killing rodents. The total cost to the government so far has been about \$9,000,000.

TREES selected are those which it has been found thrive best in the prairie states. Those most favored are cottonwood, green ash, Chinese and American elms, Osage orange, hackberry, black locust, Russian olive, catalpa, tamarisk, willow, chokecherry, ponderosa pine, blue spruce and wild plum.

The trees are planted in from five to ten rows. The center rows have the trees which grow tall. The back and front rows are planted with trees which are more on the bushy type.

It has been found in the prairie states that the greatest enemy of the farmer is the wind. The

shelter belts are designed to protect farms from those winds.

It is claimed that the belts shield growing plants from being burned by hot winds; prevent wind from blowing the fertile top soil off the land; keep high winds from actually blowing seeds and young plants right out of the ground; prevent rapid evaporation of the water in the ground after a rain fall; slow up

transpiration of moisture from the growing crops; and give shelter to wild bird life, the latter in turn helping the farmer by beating insects which otherwise would be free to attack the crops.

In addition, it is claimed for these shelter belts that they give the farmer something which is very precious in the prairie region—wood for fences and posts and fuel.

What Is 100 Per Cent Americanism?

(Editor's Note: The following article written by Miss Nell Reynolds of Dimmitt was first place in the Americanism contest sponsored by the Past Presidents Parley of the American Legion Auxiliary in May of this year.)

In 1781 John Witherspoon, President of Princeton University, introduced the term, Americanism, into the language of our thriving country. It designated, at the time originated, any word or combination of words, which, becoming archaic in England, had continued in good usage in the United States. At the beginning of the eighteenth century there was a considerable body of archaisms which spread rapidly and occupied an important part of the American language, so gradually the term began to receive a varied meaning. Today, when we speak of Americanism, we do not mean the second hand words from our mother country, but rather, the word has come to represent a quality possessed by all true Americans denoting a passion for liberty and humanity.

But whom do we consider true Americans—only those who are born in our country and receive publicity from accomplishments in political parties? No, a true American is any citizen of the United States who can proudly salute our flying colors and, with a lump in his throat, remark, "Thank God, I'm an American."

100 per cent Americanism lies in the attitude that one of our presidents, Grover Cleveland, expressed when he gave his interpretation of the democratic rule—"The people support the government and not the government the people." Yes, our nation would suffer if the government does not receive the full support of its citizens, because the government is the people. Many doctrines, laws, forces, and creeds are at work in America to break down and destroy Americanism, but as long as we maintain those principles which make us the greatest, happiest, freest, and most tolerant people on earth, we will cooperate and have a government fully supported by the people.

Americans possess five basic tenets which indicate the genuine American spirit offered by democracy. The first of these is equality of opportunity. Our guiding principle—"all men are created equal"—presents as much chance for success to the youth of today as it did to Washington, Lincoln, and other American leaders. Second, we recognize the demand for security as a necessary principle upheld by the unimpaired state of democracy. There is no security in store for the war stricken areas of Europe, and we are gratified with the opportunities which we are offered to make the future more secure. Third, an essential quality of 100 per cent Americanism is the respect for private property. All we Americans enjoy the assurance that we have the right to own and to keep, without having to fight for it, personal goods.

Fourth, insistence on balance of power is an attribute of our nation. Government should be exercised and performed by equal, independent, and coordinate branches. Legislative, judicial, and executive de-

partment are the three main divisions by which our government functions. Fifth, one of the most important duties of our nation is the method of selecting our leaders. The equality of the ballot affords United States citizens the privilege of maintaining the most proficient way of selecting government officials in the world. 100 per cent Americanism consists of these five basic tenets.

The American way includes two philosophies of life—our political or civil liberties and our economic liberties. Americans firmly believe in the right to choose government officials. We believe in freedom of speech, in freedom of assembly, in freedom of the press, and—perhaps most important of all—we believe in the right of our people to worship God according to the dictates of our own conscience. These rights, although guaranteed by the constitution, form important ideals upheld by Americanism. To stand securely and uphold these ideals is a trait of 100 per cent Americanism.

Cimino, "Scribner's" commentator said, "I, for one, do not believe that the current signs and symbols are merely spasmodic return to simplicity, or a short lived patriotism whipped up by our radios and newspapers, but rather a return to natural Americanism, a discovery of America again. The world, having been too much with us, we are returning like travelers from far voyages and find it good to be home once more."

100 per cent Americanism is the fight for national defense. Our navy, army, air corps, or our manufacturers cannot carry on this task alone. Every American citizen must offer full support if he desires this great undertaking to be a success. We who do our part, no matter how insignificant it may seem, are doing a great part to forward Americanism. James B. Fitzgerald told a group of Legionnaires in Kensington, Maryland, "Americanism is of little value without national defense." This illustrates the importance of the relation between the two.

100 per cent Americanism is thinking, talking, and practicing Americanism. This unflinching and undying love of our country and our flag will effect loyalty to our institutions and their ideals, eagerness to defend them against all enemies, and a burning desire to secure the blessings of liberty for ourselves and our children. Energy, enthusiasm, and frugality indicate a spirit of Americanism which is strong.

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proud to own the three privileges designated in the salute—one indivisible nation, liberty, and justice.

The "Supreme Law of the Land," which was written in the early years of our nation by some of the first statesmen and leaders has as its purpose to develop 100 per cent Americanism. The object of its constitution is revealed in these words: "We, the people of the United States in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this constitution of the United States of America." What more could any nation desire?

Americanism is not the laws by which our nation is governed, nor a common or unwritten law, but it is a love and desire to individualize our nation with ideals and sacred patriotism superior to that of any country on earth. This desire, when it has become a reality, is 100 per cent Americanism. When every citizen of the United States works together to promote these ideals, we will live in a country strong enough to withstand the forces of any nation which tries to infringe on or take these rights from us. Nationalism, Communism, and Fascism, are at work now to destroy Americanism, but as long as each citizen assumes the full measure of responsibility to fight for the objects named in the constitution to the extent that each will daily live the democratic principles of America, the world symbol of the democratization of opportunity, it will contain elements we will be proud to hail as 100 per cent Americanism, the best "ism" of all.

Delinquent Taxes

Pay Now and Save!

A new law, House Bill No. 76, passed recently by the legislature and duly signed by the Governor, and now in effect, releases interest as well as penalty on state and county taxes delinquent on or before July 1, 1940.

Under the new law, all penalty and interest heretofore imposed will be remitted if all taxes owed on all property owned by a taxpayer are paid. However a six per cent penalty will be added if a taxpayer chooses to pay all taxes on only a part of his property and does not clean up delinquent taxes on all of his property. In order to obtain this great saving, delinquent taxes must be paid before November 1, 1941.

To get the benefits of the above remissions, all delinquent taxes must be paid before November 1, 1941.

To get the benefits of the above remissions, all delinquent taxes must be paid. Bear in mind that this new law does not effect 1940 taxes, on these the usual penalty will be collected if they are delinquent.

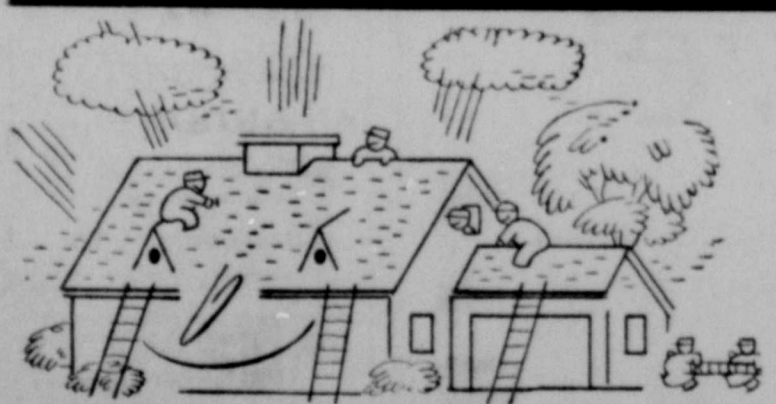

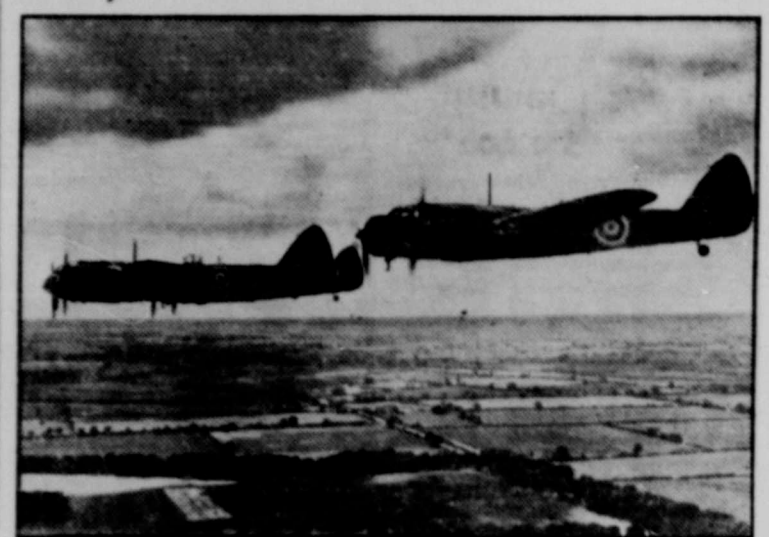

Spray Roses for Summer Mildew

COLLEGE STATION—Mildew on roses may be controlled by spraying with bordeaux mixture or by dusting the bushes with a good coat of finely ground sulphur.

Sadie Hatfield, extension specialist in landscape gardening, says that because some home gardeners object to marring their plants with yellow dust, it now is possible to obtain in some places sulphur which has been dyed green.

The symptoms of mildew, which is encouraged by excess moisture, is the grayish-white appearance of the leaves. They look as though they had been dusted with flour or ashes, and curl up and eventually die. Buds often fail to open and if they do open the blossoms are malformed. Some varieties of roses have strong resistance to mildew while others, like the Dorothy Perkins for instance, are very susceptible to it.

Shade and the sprinkling of water on the leaves encourage attack in years of normal rainfall. Infestation also is encouraged by growing susceptible varieties near resistant varieties.

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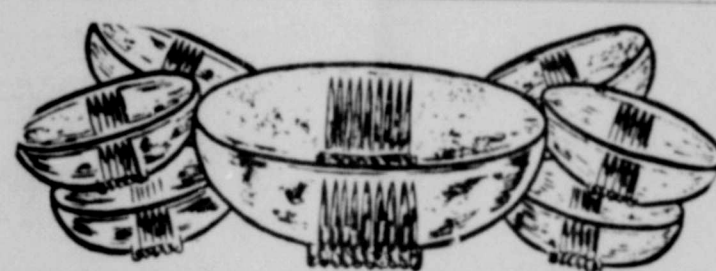
