Hundred Families Are Marooned By Flood Waters Selection Of Jury Difficult In Brady Murder Trial

No Jurors Chosen With Questioning 1st Thirteen Men

Objections Of Veniemen
To Death Penalty, Fixed
Opinions Stand In Way
Of Selection Monday

Pleads Not Guilty

Former Appeals Judge To

COURT ROOM AUSTIN, Jan. 20. Fixed opinions and objections to the death penalty stood in the way of counsel trying to select a jury to try John W. Brady on a murder charge and late today when the former civil appeals court judge was led back to his cell not a single juror had been chosen from the 13 veniremen examined.

Eight of those questioned had beliefs they testified, evidence could not change and three couldn't under any circumstances, conscientiously assess the death penalty. Two were challenged peremptorily—one by the prosecution and one by the defense. About 55 men were left in the present panel.

Pleads Not Guilty.

Brady, standing stiff and straight and gazing into the eyes of young District Attorney Henry Brooks, pleaded not guilty immediately after Brooks, not much more than half his age, stood in front of the dock and read the indictment, charging him with fatally stabbing Miss Leila Highsmith, 28-year-old

Three Meet Death As Train Wrecks

Between 25 And 40 Injured
When Passenger Plunges
Into Open Switch Near
Birmingham; Aid Enroute

(By Associated Press)

BIRMINGHAM, Jan. 20. (AP)—At least three persons were reported killed and between 25 and 40 injured tonight when passenger train No. 4 of the Louisville & Nashville railroad en route to Chicago plunged into an open switch near Trafford, Ala., about 40 miles north of here.

"First reports said the dead included Tom Lee Harrison, engineer, of Decatur, Ala.; Max Egan, fireman of Decatur, Ala., and an unidentified white man.

The train was composed of between 10 and 14 cars and only three cars, the last two passenger and the diner, remained on the track.

Persons in the three cars remaining on the track began an immediate search for victims in the overturned cars, bringing them clear of the wreckage while others made for nearby telephone and called Birmingham and Calhoun for relief.

A train was dispatched from Birmingham with relief workers.

A freight train running slightly behind the passenger was stopped just short of the wreck. Arrangements were made to couple the freight engine to the three cars and attempt to push the dead and injured back to Birmingham.

Officials of the Louisville and Nashville railroad could not be reached immediately for a statement and others connected with the railroad could give no accurate estimates of the number of persons on the train.

Amarillo Congressman Out

AUSTIN, Jan. 20.—Congressman Marvin Jones, Amarillo, is charged with negligence toward his constituents and with being out of harmony with the democrats in congress to a degree that nullifies his usefulness as representative from the Eighteenth district, in a statement issued here today by Thomas S. Christopher, Lamesa, his opponent.

The statement alleges discourtesy toward Marvin's constituents because of failure to answer their letters, special stress being laid on an alleged lack of attention to correspondence of ex-soldiers.

Four Men Killed Under Snowslide

SONORA, Calif., Jan. 20. (AP)—Four men were killed by a snowslide in the mountains 12 miles from here today. The men were repairing a power house flume when the slide engulfed them. Fear was felt for the safety of 30 other workmen.

The dead were: James Lerma, Manuel Pena, George Mianovich and Steve Banichiff. The body of Banichiff was not recovered.

Other workmen set out to repair the damaged flume, and it was feared they would be trapped should a second snowslide occur.

SHOT ACCIDENTALLY

M. B. Newberry Painfully
Hurled By Shotgun

M. B. Newberry, 512 Avenue R, was painfully injured late Monday afternoon when a shotgun which he was carrying was accidentally discharged, the bullets entering his left hand.

He was taken to the Lubbock sanitarium for emergency treatment and examination revealed that the injured member was badly torn. Physicians stated that he might possibly lose his hand.

Newberry was getting out of his car at his home when the accident occurred. He was carrying the shotgun in his right hand and slipped on a piece of ice. In the fall the gun discharged.

Way Cleared For Consideration Of State Pen System

Fourth Called Session Of
41st Legislature Begins
Work On Centralization
Of Prisons, Fee System

Face Two Subjects

Two Penitentiary Bills Are
Introduced; Solons Will
Visit Texas Plants In
Body As Moody Suggested

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Jan. 20.—The fourth called session of the 41st legislature, convening today, cleared the track for consideration of prison centralization and reformation and amendments to the laws governing operation of the fee system, the two subjects Governor Moody submitted in his proclamation calling the law makers back to Austin.

Two penitentiary bills were introduced, and both houses adopted a concurrent resolution providing for the legislature to go in a body for an inspection of the penitentiary system as suggested by Governor Moody several days ago.

Moody To Speak

Gov. Moody will present his message to a joint session of the two houses tomorrow at 11 a.m.

Although the house completed organization and adjourned after an hour's session, the senate worked almost the entire day, taking time out for caucuses incident to organization.

Senator Thomas B. Love of Dallas, candidate for governor, stirred the first acrimonious debate in the senate when he introduced a resolution requesting the attorney general for his opinion as to whether any executive committee of any political party, has the power, under the laws of this state, to bar any person from participating in a party primary, either as a candidate for office or as a voter, because such person has voted against a nomination.

Another Cold Wave Is Due To Reach Lubbock Tonight

Possible Snow Seen
For Area To End
Balmy Weather

AFTER experiencing two days of almost spring-like weather, Lubbock and vicinity are due for another visit of winter today with lower drops in temperature, according to weather forecasts issued last night.

The forecast for West Texas Tuesday is unsettled, preceded by occasional snow flurries in the north portion; much colder with a cold wave Tuesday in north and west portions and in the southeast portion Tuesday night.

Temperatures in Lubbock Sunday and Monday were well upward of the freezing mark though some sleet fell Sunday night. Temperature yesterday reached 41 degrees in the afternoon.

Freezing weather continued Monday night to grip parts of north and west Texas. A slow drizzle fell, freezing as it struck the ground and making highway traveling dangerous. Precipitation also was reported in other districts.

In Dallas, Texarkana, Paris and other north Texas cities numerous minor accidents were reported because of icy sidewalks and streets.

Move to Curb World Armaments Started At Welcome Fete

LONDON, Jan. 20. (AP)—The five power effort to curb the ever-mounting costs and risks of naval armaments was launched tonight by a welcoming banquet at the Savoy hotel given by the British government.

Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald described the hope and confidence of his government to representatives of France, Italy, Japan and the United States. Henry L. Stimson, United States' secretary of state, in replying for the visiting delegations expressed the conviction that the conference was one of the rare occasions in history out of which a permanent step toward peace might gain impetus.

Delegates Welcomed.

Leading representatives of the five powers were welcomed during the day by Premier MacDonald at 19 Downing street and by King George at Buckingham Palace. Tonight after the banquet MacDonald held a reception for all delegates, experts, advisers and their wives.

In the shadowed spaces of the great gallery, where King George will convene the inaugural plenary session at 11 a. m., tomorrow, a minute inspection of the arrangements for the historic meeting was carried out. From the golden throne chair and the king's silver microphone to the lighting-effects that will enable photographers to get pictures without flashlights, every detail was pronounced perfect.

The eve of the conference has arrived and passed without the cropping out of a single incident to mar the progress toward successful conclusion of a program for naval disarmament and furthering the peace of the world.

Stimson Speaks

Secretary Stimson spoke to the assembled delegates, pleading for a spirit of frankness and good will for realization of the lofty purpose of the conference, and his words seemed to call a deep note of response from the other delegates and the distinguished guests.

Seek Local Negro In Double Slaying

Officers Scout City After
Two Blacks Are Shot To
Death In Shooting Fray
Here Sunday Night

Though a widespread search was made early Monday morning for Herman "Bub" Robinson, negro, alleged slayer of Willie Bruce and Thomas Hammond, local officers last night were continuing to scour the entire city in hopes that the negro's hiding place would be brought to light. No success had greeted their efforts at a late hour and Sheriff Wade Hardy expressed opinion that Robinson slipped out of the city shortly after the killings. Warnings have been broadcast to surrounding cities.

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The slayer fired one shot from a double barreled shotgun into the body of Bruce and then turned on Hammond. Bruce fell to the floor of the sandwich shop while Hammond was shot while he was in front of the cafe.

An ambulance was called and the latter was rushed to a sanitarium. Both shots took effect in the stomachs of the victims and Robinson fled from the scene of the shooting before officers arrived.

The shooting was said to have occurred after an argument had developed over a gambling debt.

"The Kid" of Custer's Army Laid to Rest

Dr. Felix, who died here Friday, had been pastor two decades of St. Mark's Lutheran church. He held a congressional medal of merit for having saved the life of his friend, William F. (Buffalo Bill) Cody, was national chaplain of the Veterans of Indian Wars, and grand chaplain of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows.

Indications Seen For Producer In Well Near Ropes

Depth Of 4645 Reached By
Wildcat On Spade Ranch;
Another Producer Is
Brought In Near Hobbs

Unofficial reports to the Morning Avalanche last night stated that the World-Oil company's well on the Spade ranch, six and one-half miles north of Ropes, had reached a depth of 4,645 feet with what was termed "average indications" for success in bringing in a producer.

Contract depth of the well is 5,000 feet and the reports showed what up to the present time there have been no showing of either oil or gas though drilling is going forward in line such as was encountered in the Marland well near Lehman.

Cable tools are being used and little trouble has been experienced with water, about one barrel an hour being made.

The well was started about two years ago but considerable delay has been occasioned from time to time. Drillers expect to reach the contract depth within about three weeks if no bad luck is encountered.

The Humble Oil company well, being drilled one mile west of Hobbs, N. M., was brought in Monday afternoon. It is estimated to be producing 5,000 barrels according to a telephone report to the Morning Avalanche last night.

The report stated that this well, which has been a good gasser, makes the sixth producer for the Humble company in that immediate vicinity.

Production was said to have been reached at an approximate depth of 4,300 feet.

Bessie Tucker Is Returned To Jail

Woman Prisoner Refuses To
Grant Interview After
Physicians Discover No
Trace Of Poison

Following announcement by Dr. W. L. Baugh, county health officer, that there were no indications of poisoning Mrs. Bessie Tucker, who is being held in the Lubbock county jail on charges of forgery and who Saturday night declared that she had taken poison, last night refused to be interviewed by newspaper reporters, stating that she "didn't feel like talking."

She was removed from the West Texas hospital to the county jail. Mrs. Tucker was placed in the hospital Saturday afternoon, shortly after she fell across her cot, apparently exhausted.

"A thorough examination revealed no effects of poison," said Dr. Baugh. "She apparently has no ailment. She explained Saturday night that she believed she had swallowed a 'bichloride of mercury tablet.'"

Victims Have No Means Of Rescue From High Water

Midwestern Branch Of Red
Cross Urged To Assist In
Fight Against Rising St.
Francis River

Situation Worse

Another Two-Foot Rise Is
Predicted; Construction
Of Six Flat Bottom Boats
Planned For Rescue

(By Associated Press)

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 20.—The midwestern branch of the American Red Cross tonight was notified that between 100 and 150 families were marooned by the flood waters of the St. Francis river in the Big Lake district of Arkansas. They were without means of rescue, the Red Cross was told.

The Red Cross made arrangements for construction of six flat bottom boats at Blytheville, Ark., to bring the families out and shipped outboard motors from here to power the craft.

"The situation steadily grew worse today," the Red Cross said, "and a two-foot rise is forecast by tomorrow night. The water already is up to the eaves of some of the houses."

The families are from the rural districts of Mississippi county, Ark., and they are on the opposite side of the river from Blytheville.

Reports to the local office were made by Walter Over, disaster representative of the Red Cross, who was sent to Blytheville to direct relief operations.

Sixteen Die When Airliner Crashes

Crumpled Wreckage Marks
Greatest Disaster In Commercial
Air Transportation;
Storm Blamed

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 20. (AP)—A Pitrail, crumpled mass of wreckage in a muddy California bean field 80 miles south of here today marked the greatest disaster in American commercial air transportation. Sixteen persons, eight men and eight women, went to a quick death there last night when one of the most modern sky liners, a tri-motored aluminum monoplane of the Transcontinental Air Transport-Baldwin line, cracked up and burned.

It was a sacrifice to the storm, that snuffing out of human life, in the opinion of officials in the preliminary stages of investigation. A sudden squall from the sea pressed the great monoplane down to earth and its destruction as the pilot was seeking to turn back to safety, in the opinion of D. W. Tomlinson, chief of operations of the owning company, who today surveyed the wreckage.

Ten Billion Will Be Spent On 1930 Building Program

Expenditure For Public And Private Construction In Nation Is Expected To Establish New Record

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20. (P)—An expenditure of more than ten billion dollars for public and private construction work throughout the nation is expected during the coming year, by Secretary Lamont.

Responding to President Hoover's campaign for stabilizing business and stimulating construction, the commerce department has been collecting and coordinating data on prospective building in all parts of the country.

To Make Record
These reports indicate more than seven billions will be spent in public utility construction, an outlay that would establish a new peace time record. Expenditures for commercial and industrial structures are expected to exceed three billion dollars on the basis of last year's building.

Complete returns have been received from 26 states and partial returns and estimates from all the others indicating an expenditure for public works, including those of the federal government, of approximately \$3,725,000,000.

To Better Plants
It is estimated that public utilities, railroads and telegraph companies will spend \$2,250,000,000 for bettering their plants and equipment and that electric, gas, and street railway companies will spend approximately \$410,000,000 for the maintenance of existing plants and equipment.

It is estimated that class A railroads will initiate construction work costing \$1,550,000,000, the American Telephone and Telegraph company \$700,000,000, and Independent Telephone and Telegraph companies, short line railroads and privately owned waterworks \$100,000,000.

Seek Bootlegger In N.Y. Shooting

NEW YORK, Jan. 20. (AP)—A man described by police as a bootlegger was sought today as the instigator of a robbery attempt in which Garret, magazine writer, was shot and seriously wounded in a residence restaurant.

Garret was shot Saturday night when he ignored a command to sit still as three men entered a restaurant on West Fifteenth street.

As the leader ordered a dozen diners to "stay where you are," Garret rose, and jamming his hands into his pockets, advanced toward the robbers.

"What's this, what's this?" he asked. The robbers fired four times, and the gunman fled.

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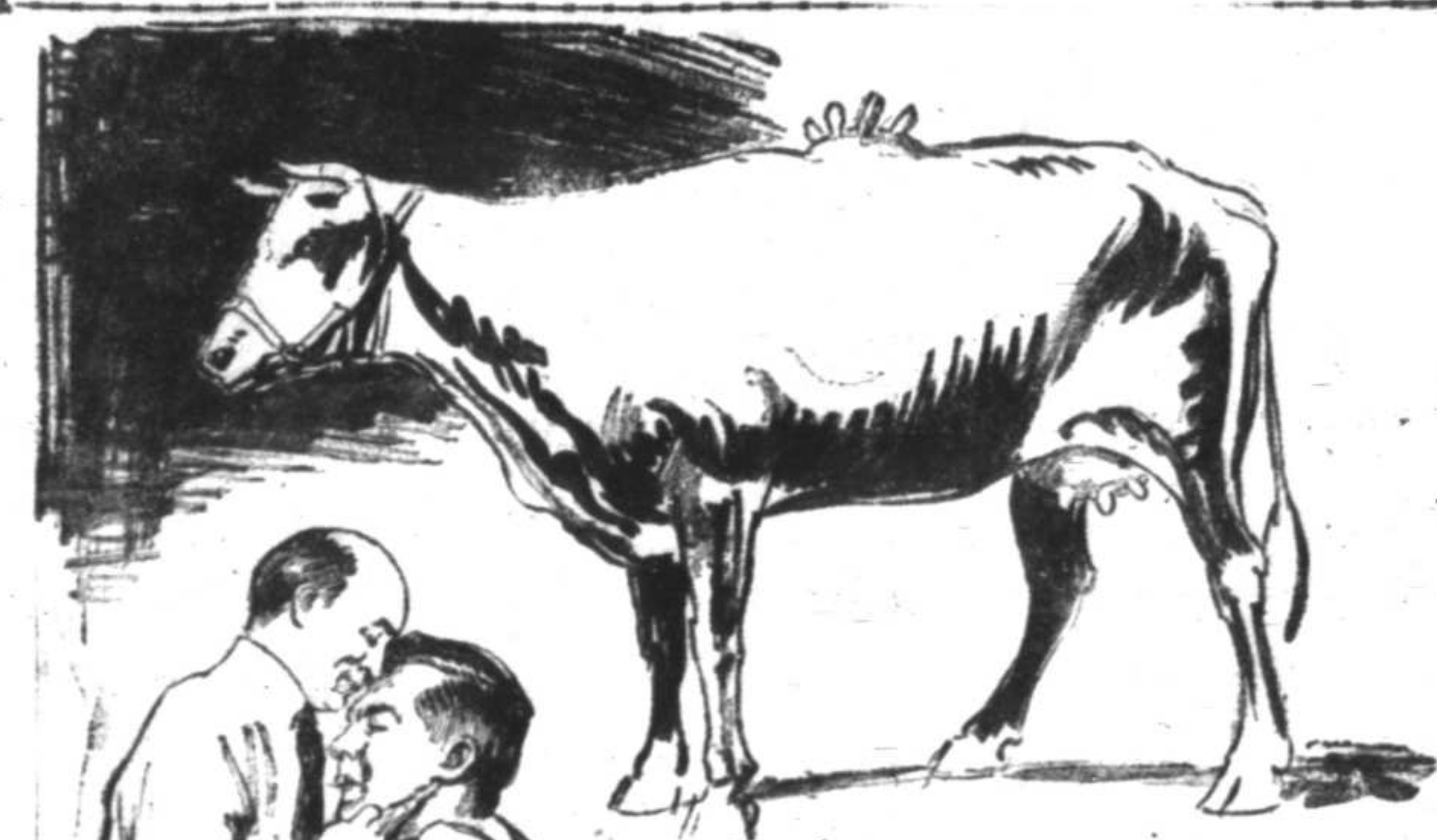
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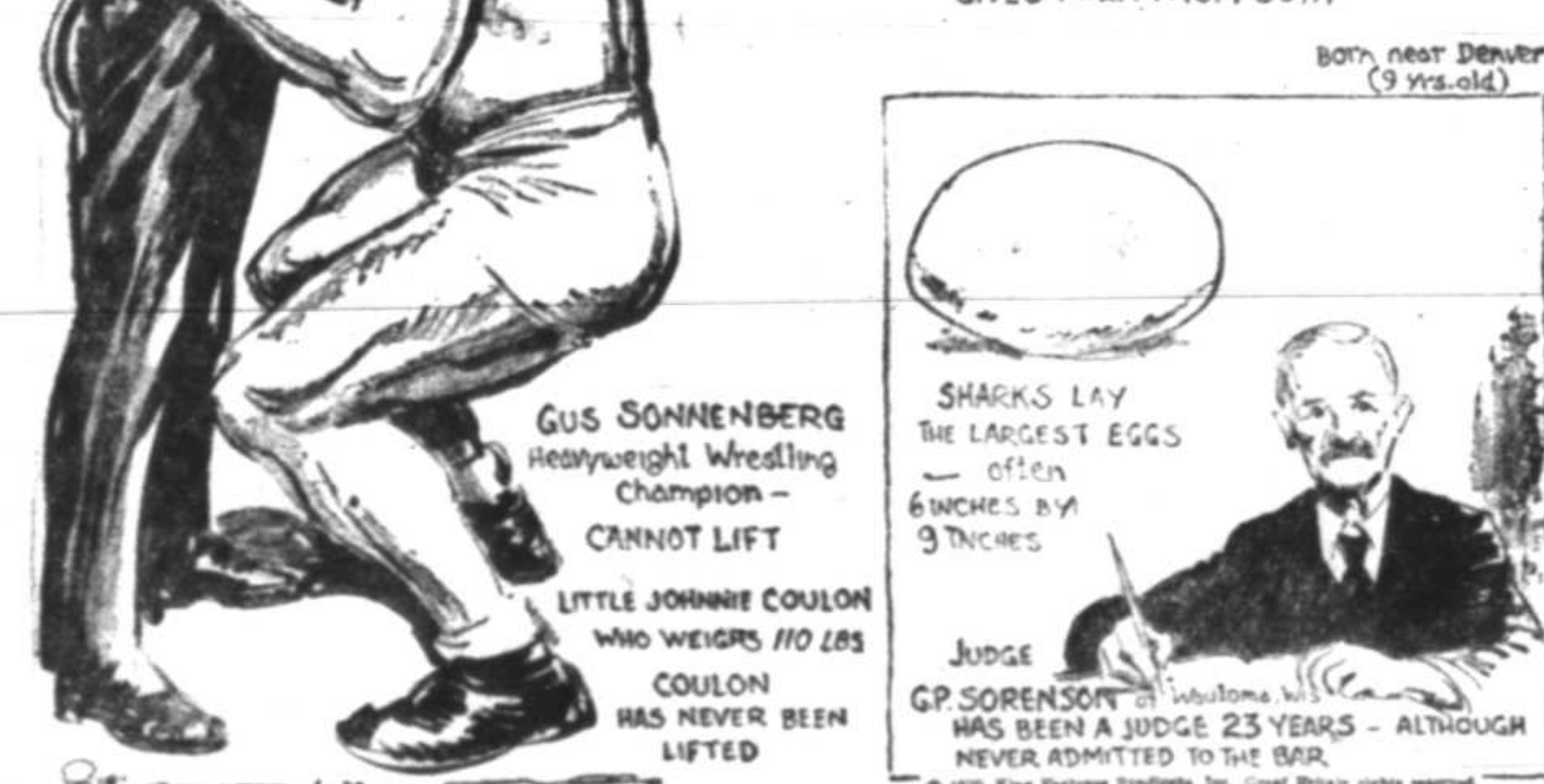

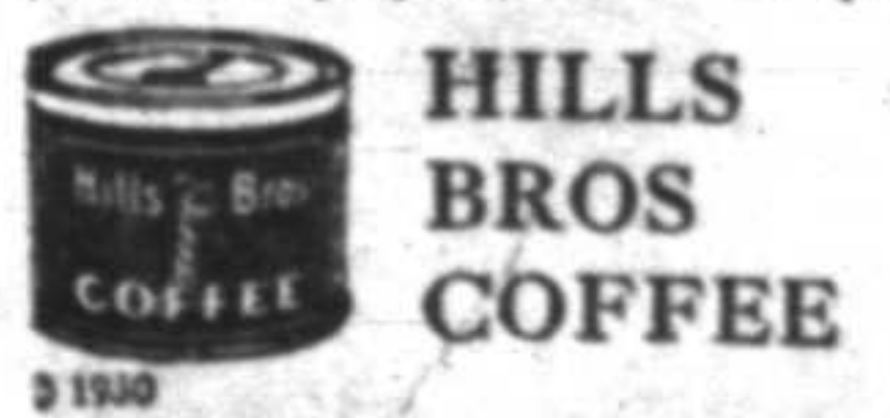

Thus far the Matadors can boast a clean slate for their 1930 basketball campaign with five victories in as many starts. This includes games with Wayland, Howard Payne and Simmons universities.

Where's old Ty Cobb and Eddie Collins? The mystery is solved. Holmes. No Cobb, no Collins in the 300 row. No wonder that layout looks cock-eyed.

For 29 years.

Yessir, no Cobb or Collins "cup there" since— Where's that record book? Ah, 1909!

We had become so used to seeing Cobb, 300 something; Collins, 300 something, that we just naturally figured they would go on forever.

Of course everybody knew that Cobb didn't play in a single American league game last year, but it's something of a shock to see the evidence in print. The old Georgia Jumping Jack maced that ball for 330, or better from 1906 to 1926—a distance of 23 years. However, the summer of 1929 saw him battling around Europe instead of the ball parks.

Eddie Collins began his 300 drive in 1909 and ended it in 1932. Eddie had a couple of bad years in 1917 and 1918 when he failed to make the grade.

Cobb's last year in the majors saw him hitting 323, just one point better than his average during his first full season with Detroit. So on paper, he was as good when he quit as when he began.

Boy Scouts' Debts Reduced To \$1000 Statement Shows

Increase Of Membership In South Plains Council Is Revealed In Report Made Public Here Monday

According to a financial statement issued by headquarters of the South Plains Area council, Boy Scouts, yesterday, a debt of \$5,500 was reduced to \$1,000 while the number of scouts were increased from 554 to 585. "We expect to have all debts paid and an executive employed by April 1," the council announced.

The statement shows that towns all over the South Plains contributed more liberally to the support of the organization in 1929 than ever before which was a paramount factor in the work that the scout officials have accomplished.

Acted On Tip
"We had a tip that the store was to be robbed and had been watching it for three nights."

"Saturday night some one tried to bore a hole in the floor and was scared away. Early this morning we were in the store and some one tried to tear the bottom panel off the back door. They got a small hole opened and then came back later with a saw. We were hiding in the dark and could see a man crawl through."

"Put 'em up" the sheriff yelled.

"The man whirled in a crouching position, evidently trying to run for protection behind a nearby counter," the sheriff said.

"Deputy Eckols and I let go with our guns. He was shooting a 20 gauge pump gun and I had a .44 revolver. The boy gave one cry 'Oh Lordy,' and died in five minutes."

40 Sermons Close Anti-Saloon Meet
DETROIT, Jan. 20. (P)—Prohibition sermons in 40 churches in the Detroit metropolitan area brought the anti-saloon league convention here to a close yesterday. Senator Morris Sheppard, of Texas, who introduced the eighteenth amendment in congress and who now sponsors a proposal that the purchaser of liquor be held equally guilty with the seller, asserted the wets were forever defeated in congress.

Dr. F. Scott McBride, general superintendent of the league, made an appeal for funds and declared that "never more than at the present, has there been a greater need for a militant, aggressive spirit."

He said that about \$500,000 of the \$1,500,000 fund for carrying on the league's activities had been subscribed.

Senator Sheppard praised prohibition enforcement as "effective," but added that "it will be still more effective when the buyer of liquor is given the same punishment as is visited upon the seller."



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Protocol Adopting Young Plan Signed

THE HAGUE, Jan. 20. (P)—The protocol adopting the Young plan was signed this afternoon at the second Hague Reparations conference.

The document, which puts an end to ten years of contention and negotiations over the reparations problem consisted of 119 pages with 14 annexes and 20 separate agreements between the different powers.

It scales down the total reparations Germany must pay from the enormous claims presented at the peace conference, totalling \$100,000,000,000 to a little less than \$20,000,000,000 payable in 50 years.

It brings to an end the sanctions as authorized by the Treaty of Versailles in the eventuality of a default by Germany and throws the burden on deciding when Germany is in default upon the court of international justice. Only after this court has decided there is cause for action can any of Germany's creditors proceed to coercive measures.

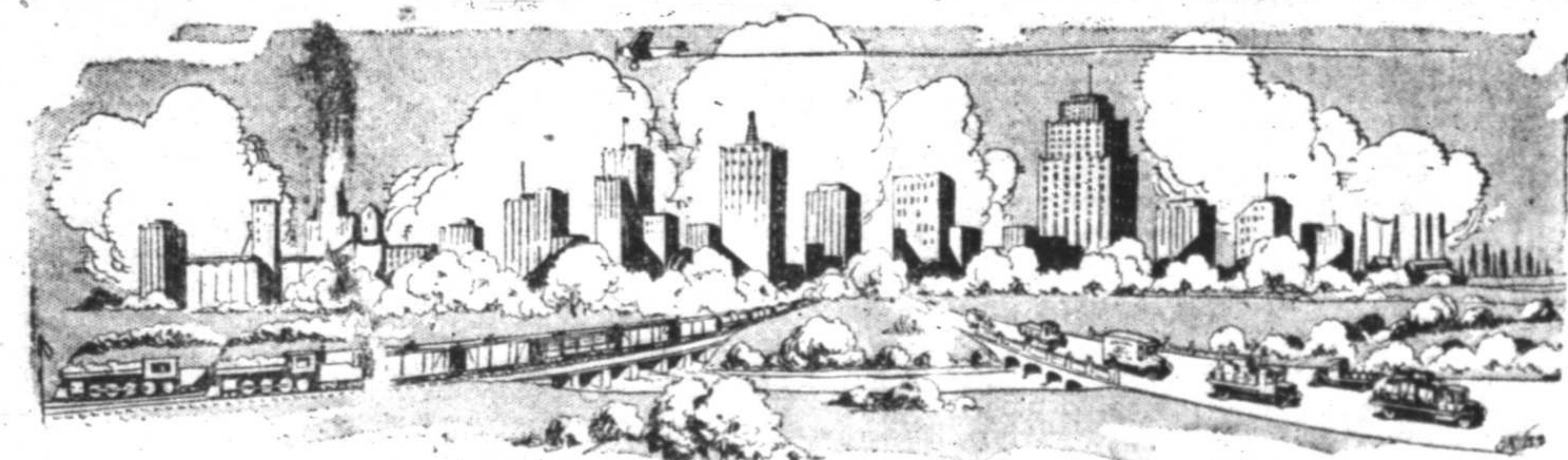
Taft at Hospital for Treatment
