## Election Is Tuesday

Voting in Tuesday's general election will be held in the community room of Farmers State Bank in Hart from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Election Judge for Precinct Six is Glyn Reed of Hart.

On the county level, races for County Judge and County Attorney will be decided. Candidates for judge are Weldon Bradley and M.L. Simpson, both Democrats. Sam Kello is conducting a write-in campaign as a Republican.

In the county attorney race, Hart native Keith Lemons is conducting a write-in campaign

against Dimmitt resident Jimmy Davis.

In State wide races, Democrat John Hill faces Republican Bill Clements for the governorship while Democrat Bill Hobby faces Republican Gaylor Marshall for Lieutenant Governor. For attorney general Democrat Mark White faces Republican Jim Baker. And in a race for railroad commissioner, Democrat John Poerner faces Republican James Lacy.

On the Federal Level, Democrat Kent Hance, formerly of Dimmitt, faces Republican George Bush.

## Band Readies To March

Hart High School Band will participate Tuesday in a University Interscholastic League Band Marching Contest in Lubbock.

The competition will be held at Jones Field at Texas Tech. Hart is scheduled to perform at noon.

Band instructor, Dennis Syring, a four year veteran teacher, expects the band to improve its ratings over last year from a "3" to a "2".

Ratings range from a "1", which is the highest, to "5", which is the lowest.

Syring noted that twirlers Betsy Berry, sophomore, Laura Miller, junior, Dana Cobb, sophomore, and Dora Bonsal, freshman, will also compete in a twirling contest.

Syring said the band will play three tunes including the theme from the movie 'Rocky', 'Have You Ever Been Mellow', and the strategic air command concert march during the precision maneuvers.

He said the drills are "not extremely difficult" but that the band would form a series of symbols on the field including an extending arrow which will move into an "X" pattern.

From the "X" the band will move into a large moving rectangle pattern and end in a diamond shaped formation.

Hart will compete against 19 other "Class A" schools.

Syring, 29, taught at Nazareth last year. A West Texas State University graduate, his specialty is Baratone.

## Cotton Harvest Slow To Start

Cotton harvest got off to a slow start in Hart last week with two gins producing their first bale.

Hart Producers Coop Gin produced its first bale Friday while Hart of the Plains Gin produced its first Saturday. Hart Gin Co. owner Roland Shepard said he expected to gin his first bale Wednesday.

Five Point Gin, between Hart and Dimmitt, produced its first bale Oct. 21. All the cotton ginned so far was defoliated about 10 days before stripping began.

Managers at all four gins said the harvest was moving at a slow pace because of the warm weather.

L.J. Rice, manager of the Coop gin, noted the continued warm weather would probably increase the yield by allowing the smaller bolls to mature. He noted that last year the first good freeze was in early October and that the first bale was ginned about Oct. 20.

Yield on the first Coop bale which was cotton owned by Owen Hankins, was about a bale per acre. Hankins pulled from about 15 acres for a yield of 15 bales.

All the cotton people are talking about worm damage. Harvey Davis, part owner of the Hart of the Plains Gin, said the worm damage in his cotton was not as severe as he had first anticipated. However, he said it was the first time in 30 year that four different kinds of worms had been found in the cotton.

As of press time, the Hart Beat was unable to find out exactly what kind of worms were present. Various farmers called them boll worms and others also mentioned army worms.

Speculation on the origin of the worms was common. Several people suggested the worms had moved from the corn into the cotton.

Hankins said the worm damage in his cotton was not too serious but that he was

stripping another farmer's field Wednesday with as much as 40 percent worm damage in some spots.

The only grade information available came from the Five Point Gin. Pat Shield, bookkeeper, said one report received on the early cotton showed it with a grade of low middling light spot. She said the cotton was a little green and that the grade was expected to improve.

The staple was good running from one inch to 1 1/32 inch in length and that the micronaire (mike) was in the proper range.

As of Tuesday about 170 bales had been ginned in the four gins. The 1977 crop yielded about 12,000 bales from the same gins.

All gin managers said the pace of the harvest would not pick up until about 10 days after the first hard freeze.

## Walls Named Publisher

A 26-year-old North Texan has become the new publisher and editor of the Hart Beat, according to owner Sue Cannon of Olton.

Jack Walls, a native of Texhoma, Okla., and a former reporter for both the Amarillo Daily News and the Wichita Falls Record News, took over his duties Monday.

Tentative plan now is to open an office in Hart. Walls said Wednesday the goal is continue giving Hart the kind of newspaper which will be informative and supportive of the community.

The paper will continue to be composed at the Olton Enterprise under the direction of Mrs. Cannon.

## Ball Leads Hart Contest

# Hart Falls To Kress

Hart fell to Kress 43-0 in district play Friday night thanks to another series of turnovers. Starting at quarterback was Derek Rich with Ricky Rowland at fullback and Keith Newsom and Nathan Ingram flip-flopping at tailback and slotback.

The Horns fumbled four times in the first quarter with two of those falling into enemy hands. The first of those lost fumbles was recovered on the Hart 46. Eleven plays later Eddy Johnson, looking like he was stopped, broke on a fourth and six for 15 yards and the opening TD with 4:29 left in the quarter. Henry Amador added the PAT kick.

Following the kickoff that

Ingram returned 20 yards to the 27, Hart only had the ball 2 plays before coughing it up again. With the ball at the Horn 34, the Roos needed 8 plays and the rest of the quarter to score from half a yard out on a David Rascon plunge. The Amador PAT kick was blocked by Ingram.

With Scott Jones at center, Kelly Jones and Daniel Higgins at guards, Benny McLain and Melvin Washington at tackles, and Chad Black and Pat Ritter at ends, Hart again moved the ball until the Roos Timmy Williams picked off a pass at the Kress 34. Two plays later Johnson broke for 65 yards and the second TD. Amador PAT kick failed.

Despite good effort, the

Horns were forced to punt. Amador working from the Kress 31, broke for 30 yards on an option and then completed a 34 yard pass to Jody Blackerby at the Hart 5. From there Johnson got the TD with 6:58 left in the half. Johnson's PAT run was short thanks to the defensive play of folks like Jackie Ethridge, Marlin Marble, Joe Portillo and Roy Martinez.

Hart moved to the Kress 46 on their next series before an incomplete pass in a fourth and long situation gave the Roos the ball again.

Hart's defense began to tighten as men were freely shuffled to get fresh players in the game. Seeing action most of the evening were Steven Brantley, Isaias Ponce and Phillip Hawkins in the secondary. Also in on the action were Danny Rodriguez and Luis Villegas. Finally, Kress was thrown for losses, the biggest being a 9 yard Amador loss as Marble caught him behind the line.

With just seconds left, Rich completed a pass to Ingram that went to the Kress 18. Although the clock had ended the half, a Kress Personal foul

ended the half before Rich was stopped.

The second half proved even harder on the Longhorns as Kress brought the kickoff out penalty moved to the nine and Hart was given one more play. However, an early whistle to 44 and then used on three plays before QB Williams hit tailback Thomas Young for a 26 yard TD. Again the kick failed.

Hart's next two possessions ended in punts and Kress's next one ended when Black scooped in an Amador bobble. The next Roo series was put in a hole by a 9 yard loss thanks to Kelly Jones and was unable to recover. Forced to punt on the third play of the final quarter, Kress held a commanding 31-0 lead.

The Horns were unable to move the ball and Rowland punted to the Kress 39. Amador went 34 yards on the next play, Williams got 19 and an end-around and Young used a Hart penalty and 2 runs of three yards each to score with 7:20 left. Pat Ritter then blocked the Amador PAT kick attempt.

Hart had another series end with a punt and Kress gave up the ball when on fourth and 2 tailback Larry Monkress was thrown for a 2 yard loss.

Hart, now in a desperate

situation, tried to throw but the ball was picked off by Amador at the 50 and returned all the way for the final TD of the evening. Young attempted a halfback pass but it fell short.

After another Hart fumble, Kress again threatened as they drove to the Horn 11 but Williams fumbled and Scott Jones caught it in the air at the 15 and returned it out to the Kress 25. Hart then ran three plays before time ran out with the final being a decisive 43-0 Kress victory.

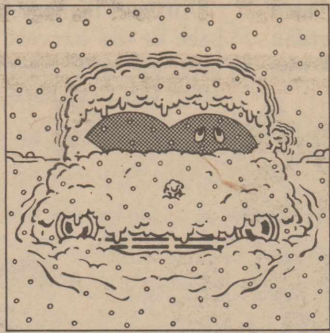

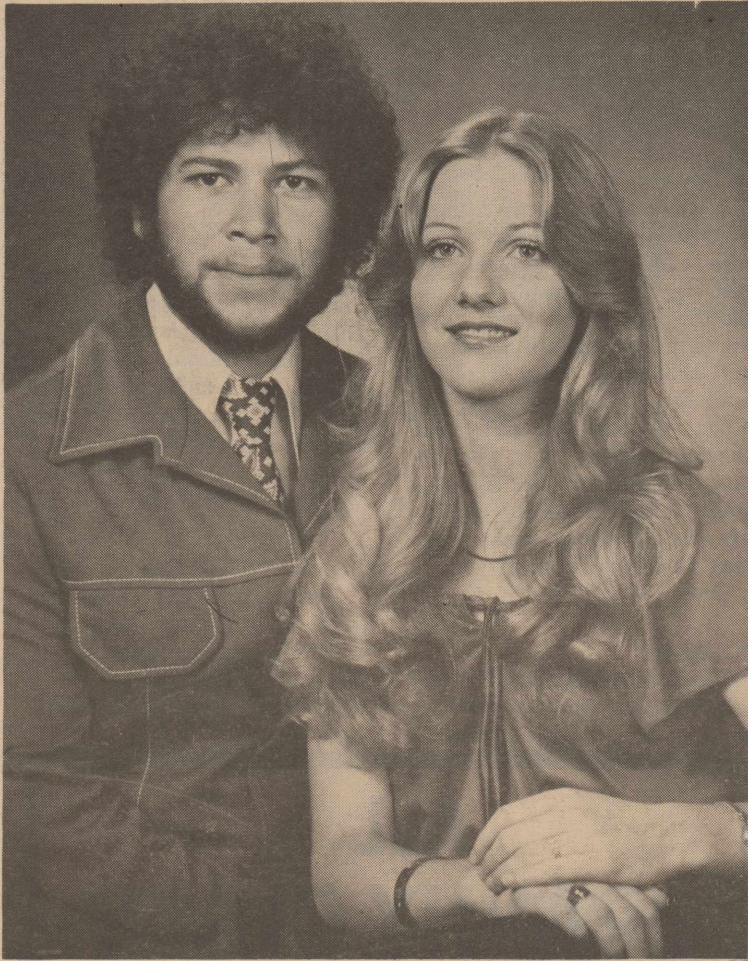

During the program, Ashley first tried to be a little mischievous as if he were trick or treating, but in the end he treated all the Senior Citizens to Halloween cookies.

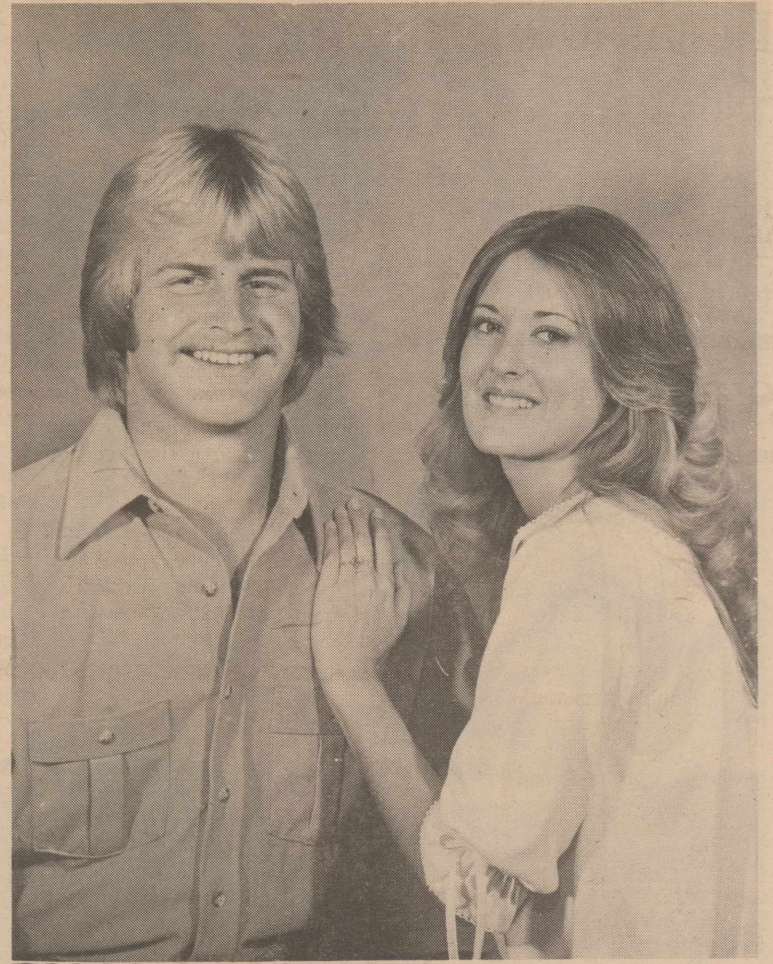

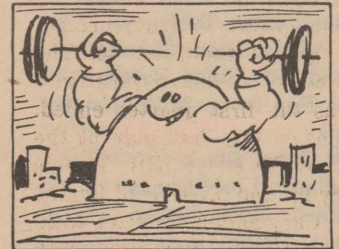
## Laurey Franks Is Elected President Of F.H.A.

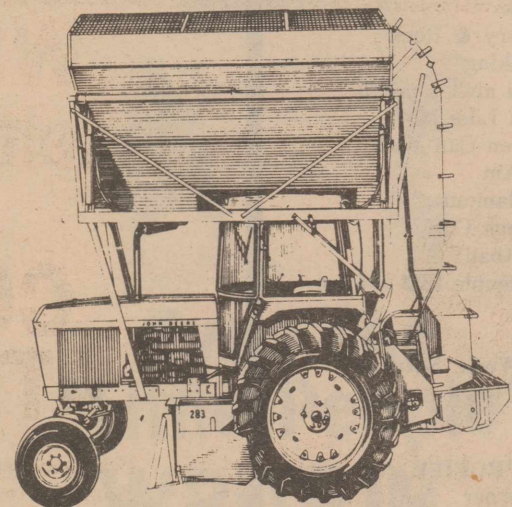

# Bovina Blasts Horns

A revitalized Hart Longhorn team took the field Friday against the Bovina Mustangs in the first district ballgame for each. Although the Horns came out on the short end of the score they looked like a different ball club and stayed in the game all the way.

With freshman Derek Rich making his first start at quarterback to free Ricky Rowland for duty at fullback, Hart had a new look as they moved to a balanced line and a power I information. Nathan Ingram ran tailback and Keith Newsom added the needed spark from wingback position. Newsom returned for the first time from a broken collar bone in the pre-season Lubbock Roosevelt scrimmage. Also returning were Pat Ritter at split end and Jackie Ethridge, although not full speed, shared time at tight end.

Taking the opening kickoff, Hart drove into Bovina territory before giving up the ball on a punt. Following an exchange of punts Bovina got the ball at the Hart 44. The Mustangs moved to the Horn's 39 as the first quarter ended. Then, on the first play of the second quarter, QB Ronnie Cary hit end Mike Read for the TD. Cary added the PAT kick.

The Horns came right back from their own 35 and using big gainers of 13 and 6 by Rich and 15 and 10 by Ingram, moved to the 1/2 yard line. From there, Newsom plunged across and then added his own kick.

It was then that the ceiling fell in. On the first play from scrimmage after the kickoff, HB Ruben Salazar broke for 71 yards and a TD that had everyone, including the fans, fooled. Cary added the PAT kick.

The next two Hart series

ended with turnovers, one a fumble and the other a pass interception. Both resulted in Bovina field goals as Cary booted a 48 yarder and a 37 yarder as time ran out at half with the Mustangs leading 27-7.

Following intermission, Cary had a pass picked off by Pat Ritter from his corner position and returned to the Hart 37. The series ended with an Ingram fumble.

There was an exchange of punts before Daniel Higgins came up with a pass interception at the 40 and returned it 12 yards to the 28. From there, Newsom ran it four straight times finally scoring from 9 yards out just as the third period ran out. The line has to be credited with opening the holes for Newsom as he received blocks from center Scott Jones, guards Kelly Jones and Higgins and tackles Benny McLain and Melvin Washington. With these men blocking, Ingram ran for and got the two point conversion.

Bovina was shut down again thanks to the defensive plays of folks like Marlin Marble, Joe

Portilo, Chad Black, Scott Jones. Freely replacing these men were Phillip Hawkins, Danny Rodriguez, Roy Martinez, Benny McLain and Guy Scoggins. 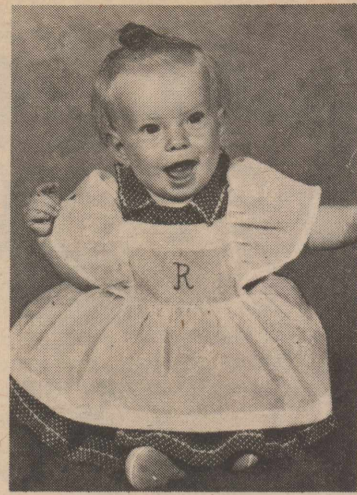
