ERECTION OF MODERN COTTON GIN STARTED TODAY

EX-PRESIDENT WILSON DIED SUNDAY AT 11:15 A. M.

Fatigued and worn by the battle with death which began before he left the White House in 1921, the war president of two terms, eight of the most momentous years in the history of the world—closed his eyes and slipped peacefully away.

The cause of death, as officially announced, was general arterio-sclerosis and hemiplegia.

The general sclerosis had been progressively hardening Mr. Wilson's arteries since he was first stricken in 1919. The hemiplegia, which refers to the paralytic condition of his left side, manifested itself principally in his left arm and leg.

A digestive disorder which developed last Monday, hastened death by a new vicious attack on the waning vitality of the former president. He took a sudden turn for the worse Thursday night and his physicians found that there after it was only a question of how long they would be able to prolong life.

The passing of the former president was announced in the following statement issued by his physician and friends:

"Mr. Wilson died at eleven fifteen Sunday morning.

"His heart's action became feebler and feebler, and the heart muscles were so fatigued, that it refused to act any longer. The end came peacefully."

"The remote cause of death lies in his ill-health which began more than four years ago, namely arterio sclerosis with hemiplegia.

"The immediate cause of death was exhaustion following a digestive disturbance which began in the early part of last week but did not reach an acute stage until the early morning hours of February 1."

Mrs. Wilson, his daughter, Margaret and Dr. Grayson only were in the death chamber at end. Dr. Grayson, restraining tears with obvious difficulty, gave the formal announcement to waiting newspaper men. Worn with the strain, his voice was barely hearable when he said that former president's last moment had been peaceful.

Step by step he lost ground and his physicians knew that the end was but a question of a short time.

As the news of his death spread throughout the city and was flashed to the world, messages of sympathy poured in a great flood tide to the widow who so long had kept him in her tender care.

One of the first to send a message of condolence was President Coolidge, who on Friday when the serious nature of the illness became known conveyed to Mrs. Wilson the hope of himself and Mrs. Coolidge that the former president would recover.

Words of Wilson that will Echo for years:

There is no such thing as a man being too proud to fight.

The world must be made safe for democracy.

We must be impartial in thought as well as action.

A steadfast concert for peace can never be maintained except by a partnership of democratic nations.

We have always said that we were the servants and friends of mankind. Peace must be planted on the trusted foundations of political liberty.

COOTS RANCH SELLS THREE HUNDRED HEREFORDS

Paddy Bohanon, foreman of the Coots Ranch, was in town last week and informed a representative of this paper that they had recently closed a deal for the sale of three hundred pure bred Hereford bulls to the Palomas Land & Cattle Co. of Sonora, Mexico. They received \$90.00 per head for the yearlings and \$110.00 per head for the two year olds or an average price of \$100.00 per head f. o. b. the railroad station. The Coots Ranch on the Palo Duro is given over almost entirely to the raising of pure bred Hereford cattle, they running from 1000 to 2000 head every year. This is one of the largest herds of pure bred Herefords in the world. If you want to see a pretty bunch of cattle, a visit to this ranch will well be worth your while.

WHAT'S THE MATTER WITH COMMERCIAL CLUB

What is the matter with our Chamber of Commerce? We can answer that question, we believe. Can not some organization be perfected in this town in which every person interested in the welfare and future development of the town and country will take an active interest? What are we doing to attract new settlers to our country? What are we doing to attract new industries to our town? Well we are doing nothing or practically nothing. Is there any organized movement on foot telling the world of the possibilities of our cheap land for the successful raising of cotton? If there is, we have not heard of it.

It looks to us as though we are just setting down on our "haunches" and waiting for them to come to us. It they accidentally heard of this section, we will do our best to try and sell them some land, provided they come in and ask us for it.

There are many things that come up that should be decided by the Chamber of Commerce. One thing that has to be decided soon is the matter of whether or not Perryton will have a fair next fall. Plans should be made right now, officers elected and work started. What are we going to do about it? Let's get busy on this proposition at once. Who has a suggestion to make?

BIG BLIZZARD LAST SUNDAY NIGHT

This country was visited by the worst blizzard on last Sunday night that we have had for the past two years. The storm started about three o'clock in the afternoon and got worse about nightfall. In spite of the severity of the storm, we have heard of very few cattle losses. The snow did very little good to the farmers as practically all of it blew off the fields, drifting along the east and west fences. All east and west roads were impassable for a few days on account of the heavy drifts.

WILL PROBABLY PLANT 10,000 ACRES TO COTTON

A little over four thousand acres has already been pledged to be planted to cotton in this trade territory and we feel that we are not exaggerating at all when we say that there will be at least ten thousand acres planted this spring. This acreage should produce five thousand bales of cotton and five thousand bales at twenty cents per pound will pay the farmers Five Hundred Thousand Dollars. Is it not worth the effort? We say it is.

TAX PAYING TIME EXTENDED TO MAY 1

The time for payment of the first half of the 1923 taxes has been extended to May 1. This resolution as passed by both houses of the legislature did not become a law until last Saturday, January 26, when it was signed by Governor Trapp. The law's now effective. Last week County Treasurer Jack Curtis was under the impression that the time would expire on March 15 as a resolution to that effect had been introduced to the legislature, but as finally passed to the governor the bill or resolution extends the time to May 1.—Guymon Tribune.

PEDDY-MAYFIELD VOTES FOUND IN BAD CONDITION

Ballots in the 1922 senatorial election, being collected for a recount in the Paddy-Mayfield contest in the United States Senate, have been found to be in a "deplorable condition" and "in very few counties have all ballots been properly preserved" according to a statement here by W. F. Robertson of Dallas, chairman of the Paddy forces collecting the ballots.

Mr. Robertson said in most cases the ballots had been destroyed to release the boxes for subsequent elections or had been allowed to go to waste through neglect and improper care. Boxes in many precincts have disappeared entirely with officials unable to account for them, he said.

Improper care of the ballots under Federal Judge Wilson's injunction prohibiting the destruction or removal from the boxes would make the guilty persons liable to contempt of court. Mr. Robertson declared, but added that no legal action was contemplated, as in all cases investigated the ballots were destroyed before the injunction was issued.

Mr. Robertson said the sub-committee of the Senate committee on privileges and elections, named to hear the election contest, has been advised of the condition of the ballots.—Amarillo News.

The Mistletoe Creamery Co. of Amarillo have opened a branch station in the Powers Building, first door north of Rifenburgs store, and are now buying cream, poultry and eggs. Mr. and Mrs. G. C. The Mistletoe Company is probably the largest concern of its kind in the Panhandle and they have an enviable reputation for doing the right thing by their customers. CANYON WILL HAVE A GIN

The Randall County News says the gin is assured for Canyon, and it will not be a worn out, second hand affair such as has been unloaded on many West Texas towns, but it will be a new gin with all the modern machinery. It will be owned and operated by Canyon men who know the business and know Randall County farmers.

CONTRACT SIGNED WITH DAVIS AND FLOW FOR A FOUR STAND EIGHTY SAW PLANT

Perryton is to have a modern cotton gin and the farmers of this territory are assured of having the very best facilities for the ginning of their 1924 cotton crop. The gin is a sure thing and there is no possibility of it not being completed in time to handle this year's crop, so there is no excuse now for any farmer holding back on the planting of cotton.

At a meeting of the business men and farmers of this community on Wednesday of last week, the gin situation pro and con was discussed. Messrs. George L. Davis and M. A. Flow of Sayre, Oklahoma, were present at this meeting. These gentlemen were very desirous of entering into a contract for the building and operation of a gin here. They proposed that they would erect a gin provided the citizens would furnish a suitable site and pay the freight on the gin machinery, which was estimated at an amount between \$500.00 and \$750.00. On a motion made by Judge Geo. M. Perry, a committee, composed of Allen M. Wilbanks, Jr., W. W. McLarty and F. P. Rogers, was elected to exercise their judgement and discretion in whether or not to deal with the parties and to enter into a contract with them for the erection of a gin if the deal was deemed desirable. As Mr. Wilbanks was leaving on a business trip, he requested that M. R. Coffee act in his stead on the committee.

After a joint meeting with the City Council, in which it was determined that arrangements could be made, if desired, for the use of power from the Perryton Municipal Light Plant, the committee decided to enter into contract with Davis and Flow agreeing to pay them a lump sum of \$500.00 to cover freight charges and to furnish them a two-acre site free of charge.

The site has been selected and surveyed, being north of the railroad track, facing the D. C. D. Highway northeast of the Balke Machine Shop. It was purchased from T. H. Blair. The actual price of this two-acre plat was \$500.00, but in view of the fact that it was a donation by the citizens to the gin company, Mr. Blair very generously reduced the price to \$400.00. This \$400.00 and the \$500.00 for freight, making a total of \$900.00, will have to be raised by popular subscription. We should all be very liberal in our donations when the finance committee calls upon us, for we firmly believe that we have never had the opportunity to subscribe to a fund which will be of as much benefit as this cotton gin will be to Perryton and surrounding country. It was also a part of the agreement that in case the local committee could get the lumber companies to make reduced rates for the building material that any reduction secured would be deducted from the \$500.00 allowed for the payment of freight.

The contract calls for work to begin on the plant on or before the 15th day of February and construction to be continuous thereafter until the buildings for the gin are complete and the machinery placed in the building, it being agreed that the machinery should be placed in the buildings as soon as same were completed, but that the machinery could be installed at a later date, but in any event every thing must be ready for operation by the time the first cotton is ready for ginning. The contract also specifies that the gin is to be operated for the seasons of 1924 and 1925, regardless of whether or not the amount of cotton offered for ginning is large or small.

The gin to be erected is to be a four stand gin with eighty saws to each stand and is to be modern in every way, having the very latest and improved machinery. It is to be equipped with either "Hart" or "Williams & Miller" bollie cleaners. While here last week the gin men contracted for the hauling of the sand. Mr. Davis and Mr. Flow returned from Sayre on Wednesday of this week and started actual construction work today.

ECONOMICAL DATE RECIPES

Dates are not only a mighty tasty and nourishing food—they are also one of the least expensive. Here are some economical dishes which can be made with them.

Eggless Gems

1 cup flour
5 teaspoons baking powder,
1-2 teaspoon salt,
1 cup graham flour
1-3 package dates
1 and 1-2 cups milk
2 tablespoons melted butter or other fat.
This recipe makes twelve muffins. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Add graham flour and chopped dates and mix thoroughly. Add milk and butter slowly, stirring constantly. Pour into greased muffin pans and bake in moderate oven 25 to 30 minutes.

Economy Pudding

2 cups stale bread
1 egg
1-2 cup milk.
1 package dates, stoned and chopped
1 tablespoon sugar
grated nutmeg
Soak the bread in hot water for half an hour and then squeeze the water from it through a strainer. Mix with the dates. Grease a pie pan and put this mixture in it, shaping well to the pan. Beat the egg, add the milk and sugar. Pour over the bread and dates and add nutmeg. Bake until the custard has set. This pudding can be served hot or cold, and a sauce can be added if desired.

Cereal Custard

1 cup leftover cooked cereal
1-4 package dates
1 cup milk
1 tablespoon corn syrup
1 egg
pinch of salt
Beat the egg and mix it with the milk, syrup and salt. Combine this mixture with the cereal and finally add the dates, stoned and chopped. Bake until the top browns.

Sugarless Pudding

2 cups milk
1-2 cups corn or maple syrup
1-6 package dates
3 tablespoons cornstarch
1-2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
Mix the cornstarch with a quarter cup of milk and then heat the remaining milk in a double boiler. Add the cornstarch, syrup, salt and dates, stoned and chopped. Cook twenty minutes in a double boiler. Add the vanilla and pour into dish to cool. This pudding serves five persons.

Dates and Hominy

1-2 package dates
milk or cream
pound of steamed hominy
Remove from one layer of a package of dates and let dates simmer in water for five minutes. Drain off the water and arrange the dates around a pound of cooked hominy. Serve with milk or cream.

Date Betty

1 tablespoon butter
1-2 package dates
6 tart apples
bread crumbs
milk or cream
Grease a pudding dish and put in it alternate layers of bread crumbs, apples and dates, which have been stoned and halved. Have enough layers nearly to fill the dish, with crumbs as the first and last layers. Moisten the mixture with a little hot water, dot with bits of butter and bake. Serve with either milk, cream, or a pudding sauce.

CLEANING GRAIN AND SEEDS PAYS THRICE

Weeds next to bugs and weather give the farmer more hazards in his business than anything else. Elimination of weeds by sowing only clean seed is one of the cheapest and easiest ways to plug this leak of time and labor. With live stock feeding, the use of cleaning and fanning mills of various types also permits the economical use of the foreign grains and seeds while eliminating dirt and noxious pests. Frequently farmers get their grain graded low because of mixtures that can be corrected quickly by the fanning mill. Also, the item of freight on wheat, barley, oats and rye must include the dirt and low-grade grain that rides to market. The cleaning of this at home and its feeding to lambs and hogs is the difference between profit and loss with many of the best farmers.

INCOME TAX IN NUTSHELL

* **WHO?** Single persons who had net income of \$1,000 or more or gross income of \$5,000 or more, and married couples who had net income of \$2,000 or more or gross income of \$5,000 or more must file returns.
* **WHEN?** The filing period is from January 1 to March 15, 1924.
* **WHERE?** Collector of internal revenue for the district in which the person lives or has his principal place of business.
* **HOW?** Instructions on Form 1040A and Form 1040; also the law and regulations.
* **WHAT?** Four per cent normal tax on the first \$4,000 of net income in excess of the personal exemption and credits for dependents. Eight per cent normal tax on balance of net income. Surtax from 1 per cent to 50 per cent on net incomes over \$5,000 for the year 1923.

TIPS FOR TAXPAYERS

No. 7
Losses arising from fires, storms, shipwreck, or "other casualty"—for example, a flood or frost—whether or not connected with the taxpayer's business, may be deducted from gross income in his 1923 income-tax return. If his home or automobile is destroyed by fire, the loss is deductible for the year in which it occurred.

Loss of property by theft or burglary is an allowable deduction and need not be incurred in trade or business. A loss for embezzlement is also deductible.

All losses are deductible only to the extent by which they are not compensated for by insurance or otherwise.

Deductions for bad debts and contributions, which are allowable under the revenue act, form a considerable item in the income-tax returns of many taxpayers. Bad debts can be deducted only for the year in which they are ascertained to be worthless and charged off the books of the taxpayer. The return must show evidence of the manner in which the worthlessness of the debt discovered and that ordinary and legal means for collection have been or would be unavailing. Unpaid loans made to needy relatives or friends with little or no expectation that they would be repaid are not deductible but are regarded as gifts.

BEE BEING PUT ON BUSINESS BASIS

The busy bee of tradition and poetry is at last being put on business basis, according to implement dealers all through the great farming sections where the clover hays are being put into the crop system and where the hard roads offer such attractive automobile markets. More and more farmers with clover and alfalfa hays are taking on a few stands of bees and finding they pay a nice sideline from their hay crops, especially where the cloverhuller is used to thresh the seed. In that case the full bloom of the crop is allowed to develop and the crop ripens enough to give the best seed. Wider cuts of mowing machines, side delivery rakes and hay loaders all are tending to speed up the hay crop and harvest it as wanted by the farmer, whether for seed or for hay.

WHY NOT "OUR" GOVERNMENT

Walter W. Head, President of the American Bankers Association, in an address before Chicago and Cook County Bankers Association said:

We speak reverentially of "Our Country." What do we mean? Are we thinking of the service which we owe to our country, of the love which we bear for it, or are we thinking only of the protection which our country can afford us, only of the benefit which we may derive from it? Are we thinking of what we may do for our country, or of what our country may do for us?

Much as we find reason to deplore high taxes, to lament the interference of government in business, to condemn radicalism, our duty to ourselves and our country requires positive as well as negative action, dynamic direction rather than static obstruction. We must be constructive.

As business men we go before Congress—with justification—opposing this bill or favoring that; as business men, we decry the acts of "politicians" who are elected to office or who procure the election of others to office. Yet, as citizens of our country, do we fulfill the obligations incumbent upon us? Do we exercise our right to vote—and when we do, do we always place intelligent, efficiency and patriotism in government ahead of every other consideration?

We cannot delegate our responsibility in government to some one else. The mainspring of a watch operates through a series of wheels and cogs to move the hands on the dial. City councils, legislatures, congress, executive officials carry on the government—but the main-spring of government is the individual citizen. The main-spring may transmit its impulse through elected or appointed officials, but the mechanism will not operate if the main-spring is removed. There is no substitute for individual interest in government and individual responsibility for government.

THE FIFTH GREAT INDUSTRY

According to figures compiled by
Charles Francis, eminent American
master printer, printing and paper
allied now ranks as the fifth great in-
dustry of the United States. The au-
tomobile industry stands close to
printing as to value of its annual pro-
ducts, and Mr. Francis remarks that
it is expanding so rapidly it is likely
to pass the printing industry before
the next census.

Who knows, however, but that in
the near future the printing, paper
and publishing industries, combined,
may take the third place? The pub-
lishing business in particular is grow-
ing wonderfully in the larger towns
and cities throughout the country.

As an indication of the present
prosperity of the newspaper and ma-
gazine publishing business, in one
large Eastern city has been erected
during the last two years at least half
a dozen big buildings which are being
devoted exclusively to publishing
work. In the same city have also been
recently erected a number of large
printers' buildings, while several
other printers buildings are now un-
der construction. The new mechanical
equipment installed in these buildings
with that which is to be put in, actu-
ally means a total investment of sev-
eral millions of dollars.

Doubtless the same optimistic re-
ports can be given about the progress
of the printing and publishing indus-
tries in other cities. A surprising num-
ber of handsome, new buildings for
printers have been completed within
the last few years. Truly this is the
"Building Age," and the printing
trades are well represented in the
thousands of new plants which dot
the "land of milk and honey" on every
side.

The 1919 census shows that more
than 510,000 wage earners were then
employed in the paper and printing
industries. Their annual wages a-
mounted to \$564,000,000. The total
capital invested was \$2,423,000,000
and the total value of the products
was \$3,012,000,000.

In 1914 the average annual wage
was \$775, while in 1919 it had risen
to \$1,105.58 an increase of nearly 50
per cent. During this period the pro-
duct rose from \$1,233,000,000 to \$3,-
012,000,000, an increase of about 143

TEN COMMANDMENTS
ABOUT CREAM

about handling cream are suggested

1. Keep the cows clean.
2. Keep the milk clean.
3. Separate a cream testing 30 or
40 per cent.
4. As soon as separated cool the
cream till it becomes as cold as well
water.
5. Do not mix cool and warm cream
—cool first, then mix.
6. Do not keep cream where vege-
tables or meats are stored.
7. Keep cream in cold water, pre-
ferably in a cream-cooling tank.
8. Deliver cream at least three times
a week in summer and twice a
week in winter—oftener if possible.
9. Install a cream-cooling tank.
10. Remember that good, clean, cold
cream will make good butter, and
good butter is worth more money.—
The Progressive Farmer.

A. & M. WILL TRY TO SEND FARM BOYS BACK AS TEACHERS

The A. & M. College of Texas will attempt to send the farm boys back to the rural schools as teachers and thus supply the country school with their first teacher supply fundamentally trained for a perception and appreciation of the problems of country life as encountered in the schoolroom and in the local community environment. COURT UPHOLDS PATENT SALE

U. S. Suit Against Chemical Foundation Dismissed by Judge Morris.

CONSPIRACY CHARGE FAILS

Conduct of Chemical Foundation Praised in Use of Former German Patents for Benefit of American People.

Wilmington, Del.—In a sixty-two page decision which swept away every one of the Government's major contentions as being without basis in fact or law, Federal Judge Hugh M. Morris dismissed its suit to set aside the sale of seized chemical and dye patents by the Allen Property Custodian to the Chemical Foundation, Inc.

The decision rebuked the Government for including in the bill of complaint a series of conspiracy charges unsupported by evidence at the trial and refuted by the defense as well as by documents filed by the Government.

In declining to compel the Foundation to restore the disputed patents, numbering some 4,700 and bought for \$271,000, from the Government, Judge Morris held there was no evidence bearing out allegation of a conspiracy by American manufacturers to effect a monopoly through the Foundation. The court ruled that there was no evidence of fraud or deceit practiced on President Wilson, Mr. Polk, Under Secretary of State, Attorney General Palmer and other high officials of that Administration.

Garvan's Course Upheld
The opinion praised Francis P. Garvan, president of the Foundation, and its trustees, as having met the most severe of tests in their conduct of the Foundation—"the test of actual trial." They were declared by the court to afford, through their high integrity and unquestioned patriotism, a thorough assurance of loyalty to their trust. "It has kept the faith," said the court of the Foundation's work.

Judge Morris found without merit the Government's contention that the criminal laws were violated in that Mr. Garvan, as Allen Property Custodian and thereby a public trustee, sold to himself as president of the Foundation the patents in question. He had acted by direction of President Wilson and his acts, supervised by the President under the latter's wide war powers granted by Congress, could not be brought to court. Congress had not delegated legislative powers to President Wilson, as maintained by the plaintiff, and the courts could not pass judgment on the wisdom or lack of wisdom of Presidential war acts.

Judge Morris recited that although Colonel Thomas R. Miller, present Custodian, who had approved two of the sales involved, verified the complaint, in his testimony he admitted that he could not enumerate any of the facts alleged to have been withheld and suppressed from him. "In view of this testimony and the obvious fact that the power to charge persons with fraud and conspiracy is a weapon with which serious irreparable injury may be done to innocent persons if such charges are lightly made, it is difficult to understand why the specific charges to which the foregoing testimony relates were made," wrote the court. "Yet the remaining like charges were equally lacking in evidential support. In fact, at the argument, the plaintiff seemed no longer to press these charges against the persons alleged to be conspirators, but it sought to have the charges sustained as against the officers of the Government who formulated and carried out in the public interest the plan of sale. . . . While I know of no case where by implication of law the duty of clearing itself from imputed fraud rests upon the defendant, yet the defendant has met even this burden."

Holds Wilson Had Full Power
While the Trading With the Enemy Act at first merely authorized custodianship of German properties in this country, it was later amended, recalled the Court, to give power of sale under such conditions as the President, in the public interest, should determine upon. In effect, this made the President, as agent of the nation, possessed of powers as broad as though he were absolute owner of the seized properties. Under the provisions of the act, the President was empowered to make any conditions of sale he considered necessary in the circumstances.

The sales in dispute were not made by the Custodian in his capacity as a common-law trustee, but under the extraordinary powers devolving upon him as the President's representative, under the additional sections of the act. "Because a trustee with only the usual powers may not ordinarily sell trust property at private sale for less than its fair monetary value, it by no means follows that the Custodian, acting under supervision and direction of the President, may not do so," held the Court. "Obviously, the primary purpose of the act was the protection of the nation, not the benefit of the enemy. The trust was for the benefit of the nation—a public, not a private trust. The statute re-

quires the President to consider the public interest. Public interest is not a synonym for money."

In this relation Judge Morris quoted from President Coolidge's message to Congress on the Muscle Shoals problem, that "while the price is an important element, there is another consideration even more compelling. . . . If this main object (low-priced nitrates for farmers in peace and the Government in war) is accomplished, the amount of money received for the property is not a primary or major consideration."

Referring to German-owned property, the court said:

"Much of this property was not innocently held or held solely for trade and commerce. Information acquired by German-owned companies had been transmitted to Berlin, and there indexed and made available to German competitors and the German Government. The files of one company were filled not with business papers, but with pan-German literature. It was a distribution centre for propaganda in this country."

Upholds Confiscation of Patents

Judge Morris pointed out that when America entered the war she adhered to the international convention forbidding poison gas, "but it soon became apparent that America would be fighting on disastrously unequal terms unless she should make use of all the dread weapons being used against her by the foe. When Germany persisted in her attempts to destroy her opponents with poison gas in contravention of all international agreements, she made it manifest that America's future safety lay in America's chemical independence. The amendment to the act was passed in the darkest days of the war (allowing the sale of seized properties). It was thought Paris was about to fall and the Channel ports be taken." These were the circumstances, said the opinion, "which impelled Congress to grant the President the broad powers of almost absolute ownership. It was the intent of Congress to subordinate mere property rights to the welfare of the nation."

Of the value of the patents sold, Judge Morris held, in accordance with the testimony, that while Dr. Carl Holderman, a German, asserted the Haber patents were worth \$17,000,000 to the Germans, "the evidence is overwhelming that they were and are without substantial affirmative value to American citizens. Had these patents been sold to Americans at public rather than private sale and only the net proceeds paid to their former enemy owners these owners would have suffered an almost total loss in the value of their property."

Praises Work of Foundation

As to allegations that the sale was not to obtain a fair value, but to promote the interests of the chemical and dye industries and that the transaction was in legal effect granting a subsidy to private industry, the Court commented, "this challenge to the motives of the officers making the sale is supported, I think, neither by the facts nor the law. Mr. Polk determined the public interest would be best served by a wide use of the inventions covered by the patents. If the property was sold under terms and conditions that assured its being devoted to the public use it matters not what benefits or detriments may have flowed as incidents therefrom."

"The property is in the keeping of men who have in its management no selfish interest to serve and whose devotion to the public interest has been established," continued the opinion. "No better plan for devoting the property to public use has been suggested. The plan has stood the most severe of all tests—actual trial. The defendant has kept the faith. This it has done, not only by granting licenses in furtherance of the purposes for which it was chartered, but also at its great expense, by distribution of books and pamphlets showing the national necessity for practical development of chemical science in America. If, perchance, those heretofore engaged in the industries have derived an incidental advantage from the plan, that incidental result cannot invalidate a transaction lawfully consummated in the public interest. The same charge would lie against the validity of every tariff act. . . . The sale was in effect to America and its citizens, not to those then engaged in chemical and allied industries."

Judge Morris ruled that if the executives entrusted by Congress with power of sale acted within the scope of that power "their acts are not subject to judicial nullification or review. Invasion by the courts to determine whether the public interest required the property be sold otherwise than under the statutory conditions prescribed and to set aside the sale should the judgment of the court be different from that of the President would be a judicial nullification not only of the President's act but also of the act of Congress conferring on the President the power to determine what the public interests required. What the public interest requires depends upon the conditions existing in the nation. Courts do not understand the 'state of the Union' and as, I apprehend, are not equipped to ascertain it. . . . The statement of the reasons actuating the President does not make his act any the less an act of discretion. It is conceded the President cannot be brought into court to substantiate his reasons. The statute does not require him to disclose to the purchaser the evidence upon which his reasons were based. The statute does not limit the Executive in the assignment of reasons to such as may be supported by legal evidence or by facts available to the public."

RATS BEATEN BY STEEL CRIBS

The rat must go as a consumer of farm crops, according to manufacturers of farm equipment who are meeting the high cost of farm buildings with a building that the farmer can put up himself for cribs, granaries, garages; etc. Rats have always stayed where they could find an easy living, and the wooden floors of granaries have given them great living quarters where they could get all they wanted to eat for the taking. The new cribs and bins of steel, however, cannot be pierced by the teeth of this rodent, so that his complete elimination from a farm where all grain is binned and cribbed in steel is now possible. The present loss from rats would within a few years build enough steel cribs and bins to house every bit of grain grown in America, according to the Research Department of the National Association of Farm Equipment Manufacturers. The high cost of building, which at the present time practically prohibits the erection of farm buildings, now makes the introduction of these steel bins and granaries practical from the first cost standpoint, and thousands of farmers in the wheat and corn belts have been buying them the past season.
