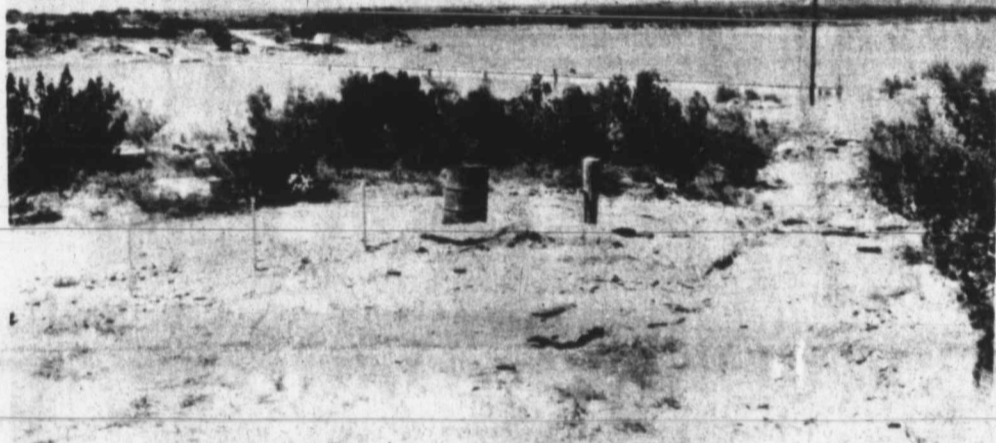

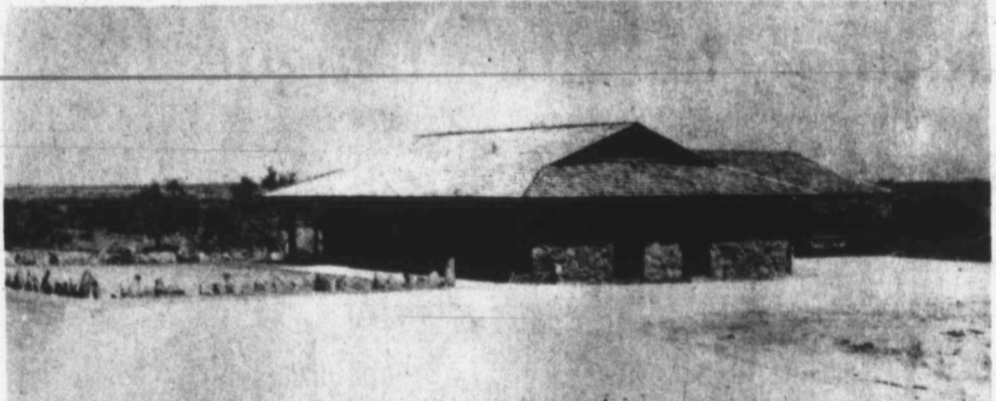

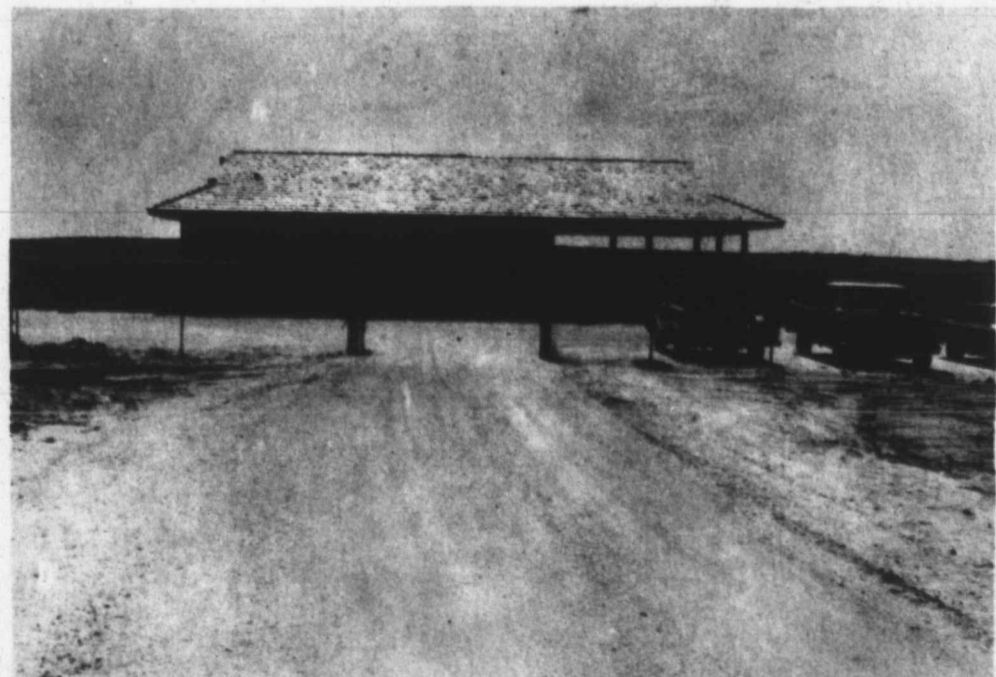

Fuel In Short Supply Empty Tanks Last Days Of June?

June is expected to be the worst month thus far in the fuel shortage that is now being felt worse than ever in Mitchell County.

Many dealers and service stations told the Record Saturday they probably will be out of gas and diesel before the end of the month and will not be able to receive any more until the first of July.

Several in the past few months have been borrowing on the following month's allotment but major companies have cracked down on this practice and will not let it continue.

Almost without exception, dealers and stations are allocated the amount of fuel they sold during the same month last year. Sales have been on the increase for most dealers and service stations so most will probably be out of fuel before the end of June.

Stations here have not yet limited the amount of gas they sell but limited sales are in effect in

places this year is at all times surrounding areas and when travelers get here, they have been buying all they can get, one station reported.

Particularly hard hit by the shortage has been farmers and contractors.

Many farmers have had to seek alternate suppliers for their diesel and gas needs and have had to beg and borrow in order to get enough fuel to get their crops into the ground.

However, from all indications no one in Mitchell County has had to shut down operations because of the fuel shortage and no travelers have been stranded here. This is not true in other places such as the panhandle where the wheat harvest has been severely restricted because of the lack of fuel.

Local residents seem to have altered their thinking to deal with the fuel shortage.

County Agent Bobby Lemons pointed out that the use of herb-

icides this year is at all times surrounding areas and when travelers get here, they have been buying all they can get, one station reported.

And vacationers seem to be reconsidering their travel plans in order to avoid being stranded until the first of next month

when more gas will be available.

There has been much talk about anticipated price increases but only one company, with two stations here has increased its prices and that was by only one-cent per gallon.

However, a number of major

companies are expected to raise prices when and if they can obtain permission from the government under price control regulations.

The allocation of fuels started in April and most dealers said they expect the situation to get worse as the summer continues.

Cotton Planting Almost Finished

All but about 2,000 acres of Mitchell County's 52,000 acres of cotton has been planted,

County Agent Bobby Lemons said Saturday.

That amount unplanted should be in the ground within the next few days, he noted.

There have been a number of acres that have been replanted for the third time, due to wind and hail damage.

Lemons noted that there will be a thin stand of cotton in most of the county's fields, due to a number of reasons, including bad weather such as wind and hail, woolly worms and jumbo grasshoppers.

Lemons said the best way to eradicate the jumbo grasshoppers is with a bait poison which he has a recipe for at his office.

Lemons also announced that J. Ralph Lee is the winner of a \$10 gift certificate from Wood's Boots for making the closest estimate of the 1972 cotton crop

during the annual farm tour last summer.

Lee estimated the crop at 45,131 bales and the total crop amounted to about 46,000 bales.

Lemons also reported that a screwworm case has been confirmed in Nolan County near Blackwell and he encouraged livestock producers to send in samples of suspected screwworm cases.

Vials for sending in samples are available at the county agent's office.

ASCS Executive Director Don Stewart reminded this week that to be eligible for 1973 price support payments, farmers need to certify crop acreage no later than July 2.

Library Here Gets Grant

Mitchell County Public Library in Colorado City has received a grant of \$475 from federal Library Services and Construction Act funds administered by the Texas State Library.

It is one of 188 libraries in the state with local support that qualified them for the LSCA grants.

In discussing the LSCA program, Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, director of the Texas State Library, pointed out the importance of the grants as incentive for improved local support. In 1964 Texas public libraries had funds of \$9,640,565.

In 1972 funds totalled \$24,837,191. In 1964 there were 32 counties without service. By 1972 the number had dropped to 23.

"Also important," he continued, "is the experience in cooperative activities that was gained under the Title III program." The Texas Library Systems Act of 1969 gives Texas libraries the authority to develop cooperative programs and gives the Legislature the authority to appropriate funds for certain statewide programs. Having already gained experience in cooperation, the libraries should be able to take full advantage of the State program when funds are available.

Hot summer evenings and baseball go hand in hand during the summer time in Colorado City. Lots of baseball action has already taken place this summer and there is more yet to come so I would like to take this opportunity to invite everyone interested in the sport to go to any of the baseball games that take place every day of the week except Wednesday and Friday.

There are two games a night during the week at the Jaycee Little League Park. These boys are 10 to 12 years old and they really offer lots of action. It may not be a pro league, but these boys give their all during the entire game.
