Artesians Shun Polls On Amendment Balloting

Only 69 Votes
Cast By City's
873 Voters

There are 4,873 registered voters in the city of Artesia. At 11:30 a.m. today only 69 had taken time to vote in the important amendments to the state constitution.

The situation seemed to be the same throughout the state with an official outnumbering the voters at the polling places by more than 100 to 1.

In Artesia, the city's six districts were combined for the anticipated light vote turnout at two polling places.

Central School, 43 persons cast their ballots this morning at the other polling spot, Veterans Memorial Building, only 26 had their decisions into the box.

State officials had anticipated a low turnout but the mid-morning rain had a dampening effect.

James Say Ike
Don't Run Again
Under GOP Flag

CHICAGO (AP)—The chairman of the Republican National Committee believes President Eisenhower will be a candidate for reelection but the Democratic National chairman predicts he will not.

Edward W. Hall, the GOP chairman and Democratic National chairman, expressed their views to newsmen in interviews today.

Hall said he feels certain Eisenhower will be a candidate and announced his 1956 plans "well in advance" of the Republican National Convention in San Francisco.

Organizing on the basis that Eisenhower will be the same ticket in 1956, with Ike and Nixon, the GOP is going to have the most popular candidate in history at our disposal. We've got the issues we've got the climate for victory and prosperity."

But, told of Hall's remarks, the GOP chairman was smiling in the dark.

Fund Appeal Drives In Schools May Be Limited In Action

The Artesia City Council of Parents and Teachers last night recommended that benefit fund appeals which have been conducted in city schools in the past, be continued with certain restrictions.

The meeting of the council included members of the board of education, representatives from each of the three city PTA units, teachers, and school administrators.

In making the recommendation on the sometimes controversial subject the group made these point-by-point views:

Safeway Asks Dismissal of U.S. Indictment

FORT WORTH (AP)—Counsel for Safeway Stores, Inc., filed a motion yesterday to dismiss an anti-trust indictment against the grocery chain, citing the lack of women on the panel when the federal grand jury was drawn.

The motion said failure of court officials to add women to the jury box after Texas voters amended the state constitution was a violation of the 5th Amendment to the U. S. Constitution.

The motion was one of three filed in U. S. District Court. The jury panel was drawn April 27. A vote Nov. 2, 1954, made women liable for jury duty in Texas.

Polio Makeup Shot Clinic Scheduled Here Tomorrow

More than 400 north Eddy County school children will receive their second anti-polio Salk vaccine shots this week the school office announced today.

Scheduling of the makeup shot was made after district health officer Dr. O. E. Puckett of Carlsbad announced that 405 cubic centimeters of the precious vaccine had been allocated to this end of the county.

A makeup shot clinic has been set up for tomorrow at Roselawn school, where the greatest number of city school children missed the second vaccination.

School officials said that two doctors would be on hand to administer the shots during the clinic which opens at 1 p.m.

Children from Hermosa, Central and Park schools who were eligible for the shots and who missed the second, will be taken to the clinic by bus or may go with their parents in private transportation.

Ione Turns Seaward Leaving Five Dead; Hilda Hits Tampico

Storm-jittery northeastern states heaved a huge sigh of relief today as skittish Hurricane Ione headed out to sea after a final fluster just offshore at Norfolk, Va.

Near noon the Washington Weather Bureau said the tempest was well out in the Atlantic and moving away from the coast. Ione's position was pegged at 200 miles east of Norfolk.

However, to be on the safe side, the bureau cautioned most of the New England coast to stay on the alert lest winds from the erratic Ione cause trouble.

Five Are Dead
Before heading seaward, the storm had taken at least five lives—all in North Carolina—and caused property damages of millions in the same state. Some crops were badly hit.

Heavy rains fell in Virginia, and hard winds were felt at many points along the northeastern seaboard.

Although New York City felt the effects of the storm, no deaths were reported there.

Gov. Simms will personally host the officials, flying them here from Albuquerque on the New Mexico National Guard airplane.

Two American Women Freed By Red China

HONG KONG (AP)—The first stage in the repatriation of 41 American civilians from Communist China neared completion today with the release of two American women missionaries after 4½ years' imprisonment.

The women were Miss Sarah Perkins, 63, a native of Tennessee, and Miss Dorothy Middleton, 34, of Cicero, Ill. Miss Perkins is a Presbyterian, Miss Middleton a Lutheran who worked at a leper colony.

Of the 10 Americans the Communists announced would be freed from jail or house arrest, only Dilmus T. Kanady, a cotton dealer from Houston, Texas, remained to come across.

The Reds also have said that 12 other Americans previously denied exit permits were free to leave China and that machinery had been set up to provide the "expatriation" of the remainder.

All-White Jury To Try Pair in Negro Slaying

SUMNER, Miss. (AP)—The state of Mississippi sets out today to prove that two white men killed a 14-year-old Chicago Negro boy who allegedly made offensive remarks and whistled at a white woman.

The evidence appeared to be heavily circumstantial—so much so the state doesn't plan to ask the death penalty.

Only two more jurors must be picked before the prosecution unveils its case against silent Roy Bryant, 34, and his balding half-brother, 36-year-old J. W. Milam, who talks readily but seldom smiles.

State and defense attorneys, operating in the shirt-sleeve heat of a crowded courtroom, agreed yesterday on 10 jurors for the all-male, all-white jury.

River Now Quiet At Scene Of Devastation

EDITOR'S NOTE — A month ago devastating floods struck the East, killing and injuring hundreds and making thousands homeless. Three communities—Winsted, Conn.; Woonsocket, R. I.; and Stroudsburg, Pa.—were among the hardest hit. What happened since and what the stricken are doing in their heroic efforts to come back is told in a series of three stories by Associated Press reporters who returned to the scenes of desolation and horror. This is the story of Winsted.

WINSTED, Conn., Sept. 20 (AP)—The river flows quietly today, its muddy water reaching only a depth of 12 or 18 inches, a width of maybe 20 feet.

Catching the sunlight, the river looks all innocence now. All around it, bulldozers and derricks and men with shovels are digging out in funeral gloom, but the river pretends no connection, seems to ask, "Who, me?"

This is the same Mad River which lived up to its name a month ago, rushed over its banks to a depth of

30 feet and in one terrible night cut the heart out of Winsted. It killed seven people, left 1,500 homeless, destroyed 172 of the 200 shops along Main Street, washed out or immobilized 36 factories, carried off whole houses, buildings, cars and trees.

Only the river now maintains a fraudulent serenity. The rest of Winsted swings between rising hope and deepening gloom, between lingering shock and a slowly growing awareness of the disaster's enormity.

But no one is alone. No one is starving. No one is without a roof. No one is without clothes. People are fighting back. People are helping each other in many inspiring ways.

Physically, down Winsted still looks as if it was blitzed. Main Street, where the river gouged out a channel 10 feet deep, has been refilled but not yet re-paved. Water, light, telephone services have been restored but half the town is still without gas. Two of the 13 bridges lost have been replaced by Army Bailey bridges.

Where they still stand on Main Street, buildings look like corpses waiting to be buried, like bodies with empty eye sockets. Some are shredded in half, vertically

or horizontally, with pipes, wires, pieces of twisted metal hanging down like ruptured veins.

In one store a ceiling still sits on a crushed new car. In another, a twisted, empty luncheonette, there's this sign: "Special Today—For Sale—Junk Cheap."

Outside of town, trucks keep rolling to the city dump with the remains of refrigerators, furniture, roofs, cars. In what used to be a playground, there are pieces of fence; and other debris high in the trees. Out on a meadow, the high school football team practices in jeans. Their field and uniforms were lost.

On higher ground, in the residential area, merchants are trying to come back to life. You see crudely printed signs on elm trees announcing the temporary headquarters of a hardware store or barber shop or clothing. You find them in homes, in garages, in barns and fraternal organizations which throw open their club rooms to the flooded-out merchants.

In the Elks auditorium, against a backdrop of stained glass windows and signs proclaiming "Brotherly Love, Fidelity, Justice and Charity," you find the temporary

More Vegetables, More Ways



There's no excuse for vegetable monotony at the family table. The wide variety of vegetables, fresh, frozen and canned, plus the myriad of free recipes for preparing them, make happy eating as easy as the proverbial pie.

From now through autumn, fresh vegetables are at their best, in super market cases or at roadside stands. Several varieties of squash make delicious (and inexpensive) main dishes. (Golden-meat acorn squash, bright green zucchini or delicate yellow crookneck summer squash take to tasty ground meat fillings like poultry to celery stuffing.) The recipe below specifies acorn squash, but zucchini or crookneck varieties may be substituted. The latter probably will take less baking time, depending on size and maturity. They should be baked only until just done, not soft or mushy. *Flavor Hint* when preparing squash as a vegetable:

Use Ac'cent along with salt in the cooking water or at serving time. Mash squash with lemon juice, butter or margarine and a touch of cinnamon and sugar, for new flavor interest.

Foil-Baked Acorn Squash
3 medium acorn squash
2 tablespoons melted butter
Salt and pepper
1/2 teaspoon Ac'cent
1 cup finely-cut cooked chicken or pork
2 tablespoons melted butter
1/2 cup chopped celery
Cut squash in half; remove seeds; slice off tip ends. Brush squash inside with melted butter; sprinkle with salt, pepper and Ac'cent. Combine remaining ingredients; blend well. Fill squash with mixture; round up top. Cut 4-inch rounds of aluminum foil; brush one side with oil. Place oiled side over filled squash. Cup and shape foil over squash to act as cover. Place in baking dish. Bake in hot oven (400°F.) 40 to 60 minutes depending on size of squash. Makes 6 servings.

Methodist Institute Here Tonight Will Feature Talk By Dedicated Missionary Teacher to Japan



A former Missouri school teacher, who has been more than 20 years to educational and evangelic work in Japan will be guest speaker for the Missionary Institute at the First Methodist Church here in Artesia at 7:30 tonight. Delegates from 11 Methodist churches in the area are expected to attend. The institute is open to the public.

Since 1947, Miss Mary Searcy has been on faculty of the Keimee Girls School, a secondary institution maintained by the Woman's Division of the industrial city of Kobe, Japan. BROOKLYN, N.Y. — Already assured of his job for another year, Manager Walt Alston of the Brooklyn Dodgers today began thinking of his pitching rotation for the World Series.

The thoughts turned out to be disturbing.

Five members of his hurling corps are ailing or below par. Don Newcombe, the big fellow, is just getting over a virus; Carl Erskine still isn't "100 per cent" according to the manager. Karl Spooner is laid low with a virus; Billy Lees has an aching arm; and Johnny Podres has a rib injury.

"I'm going to pitch Newcombe in one of tonight's games against Philadelphia," said Alston, "and see how he has come around. But we do have a problem. We're coming out of our hitting slump all right, but I don't know as I'll even try to scout the Yanks. I think I'd rather stay with my own pitching."

Podres and Spooner may not be able to pitch in the series, but Alston hopes Erskine and Lees come around.

"I thought Erskine did pretty well in his last start although he went only six innings," observed Alston. "The important thing is that his arm is all right."

Alston indicated he wouldn't pitch Lees any more until the series unless he goes an inning or two against the Pirates because "layoffs don't seem to bother him."

As for his retention as manager, Alston said he was happy that President Walter O'Malley had confidence in him. First, O'Malley hinted that Alston would be back at a victory dinner for the Dodgers and their wives Sunday night.

Then he confirmed it last night when he said:

"I know this isn't December when he usually announces his manager but Alston has little worry—in fact, no worry—over his job next year. I like the way he has handled everything."

Alston won't sign a contract until after the World Series.

Barring Hurricane, Yankees Will Have Pennant By Friday

Unless Hurricane Lane sends them sprawling, the New York Yankees figure they'll have the American League pennant in hand Friday at Boston.

Yet, it's possible the champion may not be decided until after Sunday's regular-season windup—which would provide an appropriately screwy finish for the screwiest race since Casey Stengel was a pup.

Any sort of things can happen between now and Sunday, but basically, here's the situation:

1. Any combination of New York victories and Cleveland defeats totaling five gives the Yankees and Manager Stengel their sixth pennant in seven years.

2. The Indians, with the world on a string just a week ago, must sweep their five remaining games and hope the Yanks lose three of their remaining seven to gain at most a tie for the title.

New York could clinch it as early as tomorrow night. To do it, the Yankees would have to sweep their three games at Washington while Cleveland drops a two-game set at Chicago. Even the confident Yanks don't think it will be over that quick, however. They see themselves hauling in the pennant in either the afternoon or night portion of their twin bill with the Red Sox Friday.

Game Postponed

The storm knocked out last night's game between the Yankees and Senators. Could be lone win wash out the whole three-game series in Washington—and if so, the Yankees may have to return to Washington after Sunday's "finish" at Boston to play the trio, which loom importantly in the pennant issue.

Stengel, hoping the Washington series comes off on schedule, is aiming for a quick clinch to give his veterans a rest before the World Series opener against Brooklyn a week from tomorrow.

Playing for a swift kill, Stengel sent Whitey Ford 17-7 and Don Larsen 8-2 against Washington in today's scheduled afternoon-night doubleheader.

The Senators, only 6-13 against New York for the season after whipping Cleveland 13-9 and starting the Tribe on a four-game losing streak, will throw Bob Porterfield (10-17) or Pete Rames (5-9) and Maury McDermott (9-9).

Cleveland Manager Al Lopez, forced to win 'em all, will decide on either Early Wynn (16-11) or Herb Score (15-10) against the White Sox's Billy Pierce (14-9) tonight.

Only Two Games

Only two games were scheduled yesterday. In the National, St. Louis overcame a 5-0 deficit to beat the Chicago Cubs 6-5 in 12 innings. Detroit, riding high after taking three straight from Cleveland, shut out Kansas City 4-0 behind rookie Bud Black's six-hit performance.

The Cubs' Ernie Banks, who recently set a record for shortstops with his 40th home run of the season, knocked off another major league record with his fifth grand-slam homer of the year.

Only 10 sluggers, including Babe Ruth, ever had been able to hit as many as four bases—loaded shots in one season before. Banks now has 44 home runs.

LUBBOCK, Tex. — Texas Tech, a big college out here in the plains country, is busy right now putting wedges into its bid for membership in the Southwest Conference.

The way things are going the Red Raiders might reach that well known stage: They can't beat us so they better join us.

The Raiders went down to Austin last week and whipped the University of Texas 20-14. Saturday they play Texas Christian here and if they can put one over on the Christians it will mean two seasons of whaling Southwest Conference teams.

Tech blasted Texas A&M 41-7 last year, that giving DeWitt Weaver three victories in eight games with conference teams in the five years he's been the Red Raider head coach.

But Weaver isn't sure he can take care of Texas Christian. His scouts saw unbridled Christian power run over Kansas 47-14 last week at Fort Worth.

"We're in for it," said Weaver as he prepared his team for the supreme effort. He was worried because of injuries to three key-men. Co-Captain Jim Sides, a rip-roaring fullback, is definitely out with a cracked wrist. The other co-captain, guard Arlen Wesley, has nine stitches in a cut leg, and Dwayne West, also a center, has a knee injury. It is doubtful if either Wesley or West will play.

But Jack Kirkpatrick, the gifted Tech quarterback, and Don Schmidt, who scored two touchdowns against Texas, one with a 78-yard run, are in good health, and Tech's squad bulges with veterans.

A sellout crowd is expected. Already 25,000 tickets have been gobbled up and that leaves only 3,000 to fill the stadium. This, Tech followers say, is an indication of what would come if the school was a member of the Southwest Conference. They'd just enlarge the stadium.

Texas Christian apparently has a much stronger team than the last one to show in Lubbock. That was 1951 when Tech whipped the Horney Frogs 33-19. TCU won its conference championship, however.

Red Raider scouts Wyatt Posey and Polk Robinson were buzzing at Fort Worth Saturday as they watched the great running of Jim Swink and the all-around power of the Horned Frogs.

When the two ground attacks collide here Saturday some bloody noses are bound to result.

Absentee Voting

UNLESS the voters of New Mexico go to the polls and ballot in the proposed constitutional amendment election and approve amendment No. 2 wholeheartedly there will be no absentee voting in our state.

Everything that has been done in the past has now been eliminated out insofar as permitting those eligible to ballot to vote when they are out of the state or away from their voting place on election day.

In order for this amendment to carry to amend the constitution it requires that it be approved by a three-fourths vote over the entire state and by no less than two-thirds in every county.

That means that the amendment can not just carry—it must carry in every county in the state by a two-thirds vote and three-fourths of the votes cast must favor this amendment.

New Mexico is one of two states in the nation that does not provide for absentee voting. It is time that we do permit those eligible to vote yet not home on election day to be able to cast their ballot. But we can only do it if we give this amendment the approval it must have.

Other amendments, five of them, on which we vote Tuesday, September 20, can be approved by a bare majority of the votes cast.

But proposed Amendment No. 2 must be approved by three-fourths of those going to the polls and voting on September 20 if it is passed and in addition to this it must carry by a two-thirds vote in every county in the state.

That means if amendment No. 2 loses in just one county—it has lost. It also means that if it is approved by three-fourths vote over the state it still loses if there is one county that gives it less than a two-thirds majority vote.

We believe that amendment is one of the most important amendments to come before the voters of the state on Tuesday, September 20. And we believe that the majority of the voters favor a law which will permit an absentee ballot. But they do not realize it takes a three-fourths vote in the state and a two-thirds vote in each county.

We hope, of course, that we do realize this and we hope that we will advise other voters of this fact and that all of us will make an effort to go to the polls and cast our vote for proposed amendment No. 2. If we are ever to have an absentee ballot, now is the time to get it.

consensus showed that even they were amazed by the poor interest shown.

This was despite the bitterly-debated battle on Amendment Six which saw Corporation Commissioner Ingram B. Pickett jousting at the lists with virtually every high state official from Gov. John F. Simms on down through the district representatives.

In Lea County, at Hobbs, the Associated Press reported that "voters in great numbers were staying away from the polls."

Roswell, Carlsbad, Las Cruces and Silver City, all reported a scattering of votes.

Veterans political observers had forecast a meager 30,000-vote turnout for the constitutional amendments but even that figure appeared to be high at noon.

The proposed constitutional changes, approved by the Legislature and which the voters acted on today are:

No. 1—Legislative reapportionment.

No. 2—Absentee voting.

No. 3—Curtailement of Highway Department financial independence.

No. 4—Method of controlling four institutions.

No. 5—Similar to No. 4 and changes names of state asylum to hospital and boys reform school to boys school.

No. 6—Utility control.

Pickett, joined by Sen. Dennis Chavez (D-NM) in opposition to No. 6, has charged that the language of the bill allows the Legislature to name the manner in which corporation commissioners may be chosen: either by election or appointment.

Anderson said he believes the Legislature can "safely be trusted to see that the proper method is used." He added that means election as far as he is concerned.

headquarters of the West - End Barber Shop, Sexauer Jewelers, Smith's Men's Shop, Winsted News and United Cigars, the Modern Dress Shop and the local Buick dealer (he lost all his 18 cars in the flood but is taking orders now).

The Sears-Roebuck store now is probably the smallest in the national chain. It temporarily occupies a room about 20 by 40 on the second floor of the Improved Order of Red Hen, Kehow Tribe, No. 39.

The flood knocked about 1,400 men out of work in Winsted factories. Most of them are working again, cleaning up debris in the plants or living off unemployment checks. The destitute are fed by the Red Cross.

About 1,500 people still can't go back to their homes. They're living with friends or relatives and one house has no less than 18 residents. About 250 can never go back to their old places. For them, the city and federal government are cooperating in providing 50 housing units.

That is the broad picture of Winsted a month after. Now you narrow your focus and come down to individuals. In some cases, tragedy struck twice.

Lost Grocery

Clifford Tiffany lost his grocery in the flood. A week later he lost his son, killed in an Air Force crash in Texas. Arthur Peikel lost his hardware store. Last week he and his wife were injured in an auto accident, she seriously.

bring Peron back to face charges. The trip by gunboat to Asuncion, Paraguay, would take about five days.

A junta of generals took command of the government as a climax to the four-day revolt that overthrew Peron. They quickly announced peace talks with the rebel forces.

The generals also moved rapidly to tighten their control on Buenos Aires after rebel reports that the six-million-member General Federation of Labor—the backbone of Peron's popular support—is planning a general strike. With such a strike Argentine labor returned Peron to power in 1945 after a military clique had jailed him.

Secret Strike

The rebel radio at Bahia Blanca 325 miles southwest of Buenos Aires, said the CGT "is preparing secretly, under the inspiration of Peron, a general revolutionary strike for dawn to restore the tyrant, betraying all pledges."

The state radio soon after said there would be "no work" in the capital today, but several hours later a broadcast communique from the junta called on the workers to remain calm and resume work.

The communique singled out the CGT, saying that Hector Hugo Di Piero, the federation secretary general and one of the fallen dictator's henchmen, "had been informed the talks aimed at pacification of the country, already have been started with the rebels."

Another broadcast communique called on all government employees to continue performing their duties with "regularity, correctness and efficiency" and to maintain normal administrative activities.

Evelyn Nesbit Thaw Recalls 50-Year-Old Romance Tragedy

By HAL BOYLE
NEW YORK (UP)—"This is a most unattractive section now," said the little grandmotherly old lady, shaking her head as she peered out the car window. "Isn't it terrible?" The lady was Evelyn Nesbit Thaw. She was looking at the site of the old Madison Square Garden atop which in 1906 her husband Harry K. Thaw, shot to death her former lover, Stanford White, in New York's most celebrated murder case.

She seemed depressed at the way the neighborhood has run down since, as she terms it now, "the tragedy" took place.

Back In Clover
But after 49 years "the tragedy" has turned out to be a form of social security for Miss Nesbit. She's back in the broiled quail league again. A movie studio has paid her upward of \$50,000 for a film based on her life called "The Girl in the Red Velvet Swing."

"If you think I'm going to invest that money, you're crazy," remarked Mrs. Nesbit spiritedly. "I never invest in anything but a good meal."

Food seemed more on her mind than sentiment as Mrs. Nesbit, now a Los Angeles sculptress, and I took a ride down Memory Lane in a rented limousine. At 70 this faded beauty of a faded past looks like a greying retired schoolmarm. But few schoolmarm have her bounce — and none, I suppose, quite has her memories.

Passing her old home on Park Avenue, the first floor of which now is a dress shop, she said:

"No Thaw didn't live there with me. He resided in the bastille then — in durance vile. Boy, the breakfasts I used to have in that house — broiled quail eggs, trout, fried oysters."

Scene Changes
The swiftly changing Manhattan scene bewildered her. Most of the landmarks of her champagne youth were gone.

"Everything is so different," she kept saying. "It's so changed. Why have they torn down so many beautiful old buildings?"

Then she was back on food again. "I ate so much in the old days I still wonder why I didn't get fat," she said. "Lillian Russell was bowing out of the picture as I walked in. Styles were changing. Boy, was she upholstered! Hip, hip, watermelon!"

"No, I never met Diamond Jim Brady. Stanford White was too snobbish to speak to Brady. He thought he was a frightful character."

Mrs. Nesbit, who still insists that

White, a famous architect who designed the Washington Arch, is the only man she ever really loved, described him as "the most wonderful man I ever knew."

"He had one weakness — a love of youth. He would tremble all over when he came near me. Youth — it was his weakness. But all great men have a weakness."

As to Thaw, whose acquittal on grounds of insanity she helped to win by her testimony, she said:

"The poor thing, I guess he couldn't help what he did, although now I believe it was premeditated. Why else was he carrying a pistol? He was a highly peculiar person, and he deteriorated. It would have been better if he had never been born. Too much money spoiled him young."

Had \$40 Million
Thaw inherited an estimated 40 million dollars, reckoned a fortune in those days.

The low point of the tour came for Miss Nesbit as we drove along truck-crowded west 24th street where White's studio once stood, where once at gay parties she swung to the ceiling on a red velvet swing.

Improved Loan Program Aids Farm Buying

Public Law 273, approved by President Eisenhower last month, will improve the insured loan program which helps farmers acquire and improve family-size farms, according to John O. Kling, extension economist at New Mexico A & M College.

Under the new law, the government is the mortgagee for an insured farm ownership loan. The lender holds the note. Formerly, the lender was the mortgagee and held both the mortgage and the note.

Now, the loans will no longer be classified as real estate loans, and lenders, like banks, who have limitations on the amount of real estate paper they may hold, can participate to a greater extent.

U.S. Eats Better Than Ever, Farm Report Reveals

Most Americans are not living on the fat of the land—they are eating better than that. They are carrying record amounts of good things to eat out of food markets and restaurants, and they are paying the bill with one-fourth of their income (after paying income tax).

Middle and low-income families spend more than one-fourth of their income for food. High-income families spend less than one-fourth. The main part of most American meals is meat. Consumption of meat will average about 160 lbs. per person this year. This amount is more than we have had in any previous year of record except 1908. It is 4 per cent more than we had last year, 9 per cent more than in 1947-49, and 28 per cent more than in 1935-39.

This year the average person will get 79 pounds of beef, 67 pounds of pork, 10 pounds of veal and 4 pounds of lamb and mutton. These four are the so-called red meats. They make up the 160-pound total.

In addition to these red meats, American families are enjoying large amounts of fish, poultry, and eggs. The average person will eat about 11 pounds of fish this year—the same amount as last year and 8 per cent more than in 1947-49. (The years 1947-49 are used as a base for many government figures. They constituted a prosperous period between the regulated economy of World War II and the Korean War.)

The supply of chicken totals about 23 pounds per person—2 per cent less than last year, but 26 per cent more than in 1947-49. We will have about 410 eggs—1 per cent less than last year, but 8 per cent more than in 1947-49.

We will also use more of most dairy products than in most previous years.

Interest Grows in State's Conservation District Unit

Growing interest is being shown in the New Mexico Association of Soil Conservation Districts, according to Jack Copeland of Nara Visa, president of the association.

The association's annual meeting at Socorro last December attracted the largest audience of farmers, ranchers, and district supervisors since the state organization was formed in 1947, and Copeland believes there will be a bigger turn out at the annual state meeting this year at Portales, Dec. 9 and 10.

Copeland said this week that the district organization is giving full support to the observance of the fourth annual Soil Conservation Month. Governor Simms has proclaimed September as Soil Conservation Month in New Mexico.

He has also urged the press, radio, public officials, agencies, schools, public institutions, farm and ranch organizations, and all other organizations, groups, and individuals to join in the observance of this month for the welfare and continued prosperity of the citizens of New Mexico. Sixty-one soil conservation districts in the state are planning local observances of Conservation Month during September.

In addition to Copeland, the officers of the association are W. P. Cater, Cerro, first vice-president, and Roy Skipworth, Dunlap, second vice-president.

Copeland, who is serving his first term as president of the state association of soil conservation districts, is devoting considerable time and energy in district work. He is an ardent conservationist and a cooperator and former supervisor of the Northeastern Soil Conservation District. He is a strong believer in conservation, as evidenced by the conservation practices carried out on his Hereford ranch at Amistad in the northern end of Union County.

The Copeland family is conservation minded. His daughter, Patricia, now a student at West Texas State College, was the first place winner in the state and regional National Grange essay contest in 1954, and placed second in the nation in the same contest. She is also very active in 4-H club work and has learned a lot about range conservation from her father.

The recent strides made by the soil conservation districts are very encouraging and gratifying, Copeland said. The drought conditions of the past few years have emphasized the need for greater conservation, and more and more farmers and ranchers are being assisted by their local soil conservation districts in carrying out conservation work on their lands. The state association and the districts are working closely with federal, state, and local organizations and groups, including newspapers, radio stations, and business concerns, in support of the local district conservation programs.

PHYSICIANS TO MEET

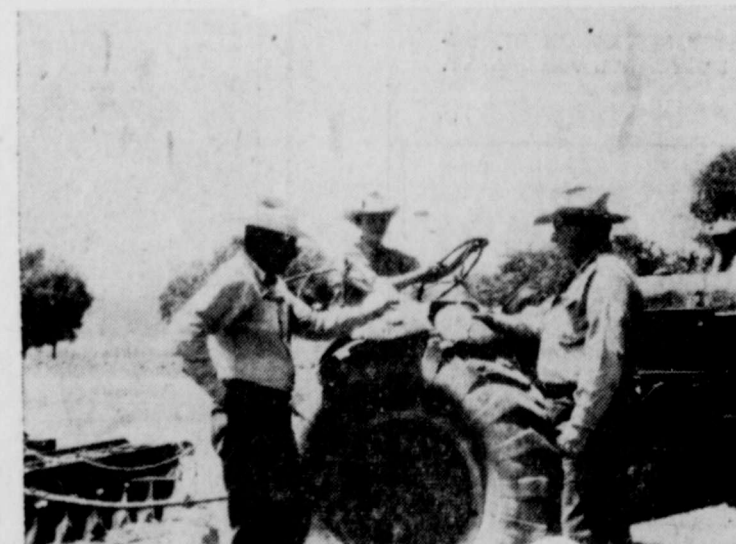
