## County Leads Area In Bonds

Mitchell County was one of the area's top counties for United States Savings Bond sales during 1966.

Local sales went over the top 126 per cent of the county's goal, according to Wayne Shaw, sales chairman.

Mitchell's sales for the 12-month period ending Dec. 31 amounted to \$163,190 with \$36,212 in December. Assigned goal was \$136,000.

Only one other town in District 4 was ahead of Mitchell in percentage of goal. Martin County with only a goal of \$20,000 led Mitchell with 188 per cent and a total of \$37,558.

Mitchell led all other counties in District 4 — including Andrews, Borden, Dawson, Gains, Howard and Scurry. Infact, only Mitchell Martin and Howard, with 119 per cent of its goal, went over the top during 1966.

Among 53 counties in the five districts of Area 1 Colorado City was in the top seven in percentage of bond sales. Only counties ahead of Mitchell were Martin, Castro, Dallam, Donley, Gray and Ochiltree.

Across the entire state, Mitchell was in the top 41

# New Owners Take Over

Bormaster Brothers of Houston Saturday announced purchase of Max Berman Department Store.

The new owners, with more than 30 years of retailing experience, said they will continue operation of the store in the same location with same employees, same policies and top brands.

They already have assumed ownership and operation of the business and a lease of the Max Berman building.

"WE WILL BE successors to Max Berman Department Store," the brothers told The Record, "and will appreciate the continued patronage of Max Berman customers.

"Naturally, we are continuing with the same personnel and will continue with charge account and layaway service which this store has always offered its customers.

"Now merchandise will be arriving daily," they continued, "and we invite the community to visit our store as we continue this business that has been prominent in Colorado City for more than 30 years."

THE NEW OWNERS are Ted Bormaster and Jerome Bormaster, who started in the retail business in Joplin Mo., 30 years ago and have operated stores throughout the Southwest.

Long-time Max Berman employees will continue to head departments. These include A. C. Craig, shoes; Clarence Newby, men's wear; Mrs. Herb Gunn, women's wear; Mrs. J. W. Hill, business office.

For Max Berman the sale ends 47 years of retailing in Colorado City.

"MRS. BERMAN and I plan to continue to reside here," he said, "but we plan to visit and travel.

"We'll sort of take it easy like Philip," he smiled, referring to a younger brother who retired from the grocery business here several years ago.

of his family to move here. He became associated with Landau & Levy in 1920, remaining with that store through 1930. Then, in 1931 he bought out the store formerly owned by F. M. Burns and moved to present location of Max Berman Department Store, corner of E. Second and Elm.

In 1939, Berman completely rebuilt his store and followed in 1951 with an expansion — buying the Maud Farmer building on the east side of his store, then rebuilding and incorporating it into the present large structure.

MAX BERMAN was the first of the Bormasters to move here and enter business.

"I came out when the town was about 1,800 population with unpaved streets," he recounted Saturday, "and I've watched it grow to what it is today."

H. I. Berman, first of the three brothers to retire and now living in California, followed Max to Colorado City and developed a variety

store business that in the late 1950's became B.N. Franklin Store under ownership of Charles Freeman.

Later, the Bormasters turned over a location to Philip, who opened a food store at present location of Downtown Cafe, 143 E. Second, and, then later, built the store that now is Village Food.

"STREETS WERE unpaved when I came here," Max Berman recalled, "and we were stacking in sewers."

Everybody used to burn their trash at evening time out in front of our stores. Then we got two dignified to do it after paving and burned our trash in the back."

Colorado City was a meeting of the town, so to speak, for Mr. and Mrs. Berman. For Mr. Berman came to Colorado City from Seymour in South Texas, and Mrs. Berman journeyed to Colorado City from Chicago for a visit. And they met here, married in 1922.

Berman said one of the major reasons for the sale of his business to the Bormasters was because the new owners plan to operate Max Berman Department with the same personnel and type of merchandise that has been important to the store's reputation in the past

At close of 1966 the company had 3,857,992 phones in Texas and an increase of 232,000 more is expected this year.

## Easter Seal Appeal Near

George Womack is Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults chairman for Mitchell County.

The Easter Seal Society in Texas helps support 23 treatment facilities, where children and adults are treated without regard for their ability to pay, said Womack.

A record 16,031 crippled children and adults were helped during 1966 by the society, Womack pointed out. Of the total 11,045 were children and 4,986 adults also received treatment and rehabilitation services financed mainly by contributions made to the Easter Seal Appeal, he added.

**CUSTOMER'S BILL OF RIGHTS**

**New Postal Policy Aims For Pleased 'Customer'**

Postmaster Arlene M. Morris today called attention of Colorado City mailers to the new "Postal Customer's Bill of Rights" to help meet President Johnson's government-wide goal of improving the quality of federal services to the public.

Directed at post office window services, Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien has ordered the Customer's Bill of Rights implemented by two immediate steps at Colorado City.

1. Posters will be displayed in the post office lobby and service counters containing 10 points which specify the kind of treatment customers have a right to expect.

2. Instructions from Mr. O'Brien call for careful observance of all points in the "Postal Customer's Bill of Rights." The instructions also provide directions for the most efficient management of window services.

The posters tell customers

they are entitled to:

1. A neat, clean counter on which to transact business.
2. Service by a well-groomed, neat window employee.
3. A friendly greeting that expresses a desire to assist.
4. Knowledgeable, well-informed, interested window personnel to help with postal needs.
5. Prompt, alert and efficient service.
6. Competent and correct information on inquiries.
7. An attitude that reflects helpfulness, patience and congeniality.
8. The courtesy and tact that would be expected from a friend.
9. Polite referral to another window or individual, when necessary, to give the appropriate service.
10. A feeling, upon leaving, that the post office is glad to serve and help at all times.

Instructions for fulfilling "Bill of Rights" have been

distributed to all window personnel by the Postmaster.

The effort is for every federal employee to give added attention to providing the people with the very best service possible.

"Since your daily duties bring you in direct and continuing contact with our customers," Postmaster O'Brien wrote the local Post Office, "I would like to tell you what I consider the type of service the people have a right to expect when dealing with the largest business operation in the world."

In addition to improving relations with customers, Postmaster Morris said, the "Customer's Bill of Rights" can expedite handling of transactions at the windows and make the service more efficient.

He urged Colorado City

residents to assist in this effort, by stating their needs clearly, and having money and any necessary filled-out forms ready for transactions. The Postmaster explained that demands on window personnel, who must deal with a wide variety of mail, mail forms and various services, are usually heavy, and postal customers can assist them in meeting the new service goals by being as brief and business-like as possible.

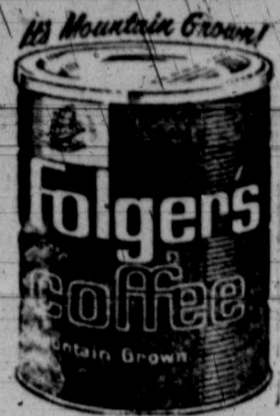

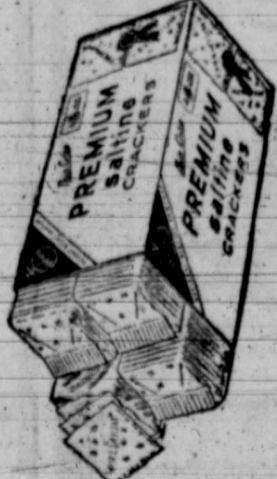

All of the activity is in two fields in the county's western area. Westbroök (Clear Fork) Field and Iatan-East Howard Field.

Completed with an initial pumping potential of 108 barrels of 28.2 gravity oil, 22-barrels of water was Mobil Oil Corporation No. 8 W. W. Watson.

The Iatan-East Howard oiler, located 330 feet from north and 1,320 feet from west lines, Section 20, Block 29, T&P Survey, has production from open hole between 2,583 and 3,274 feet. It was plugged back to 3,321 feet from total depth of 3,345 feet.

Pay area was fractured with 60,000 gallons and acidized with 4,000 gallons.

New producer in Westbroök Field is Apex Operating Company No. 1 L.E.A. Smart, with initial poten-

tial of 72 barrels of 22 gravity oil and 32 barrels of water.

The well is located 330 feet from north and 1,650 feet from east lines, Section 16, Block 28, T-F-N, T&P Survey.

Perforations are between 2,575 and 3,112 feet with 5 1/2-inch casing set to 3,119 feet; total depth, 3,500 feet. Pay area was fractured with 55,000 gallons of fluid.

Spotted as a new drilling location in Iatan-East Howard Field is C. W. Guthrie of Big Spring No. 4 Maurice Watson, which will drill to 3,500 feet at location eight miles southwest of Westbroök.

Site is 2,310 feet from north and 2,310 feet from east lines, Section 21, Block 29, T-F-S, T&P Survey.

Near Mitchell County line in northeast Sterling County, 14 miles northeast of Sterling City, Sun Oil Company will drill No. 2 J. F. Ellwood to depth of 5,300 feet.

It will be 3,000 feet south west of the No. 1 Ellwood, discovery well for Rose Creek (Wolfcamp) Field, at a site 1,980 feet from north and east lines of Section 10, Block 12, H&C Survey.

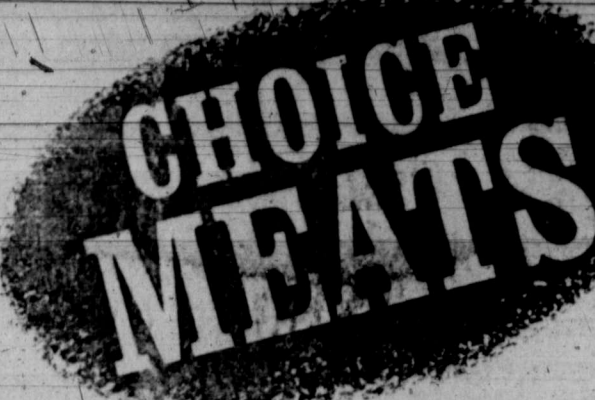
