Local Gridders And Cubs Tied 6-6 In Friday Game

Lamesa gridders squared off with the Brownfield Cubs, double-tough foes, in a match Friday night on McCollum Field and fought their way to a tied score of 6-6.

Brownfield's Dale Hill took the first touchdown in the opening quarter, when he slashed through the Tornado line and ran 82 yards to gain a score of six. Cub griddler Cameron Byler missed the try for extra point.

In the second period, the locals evened the score when quarterback Herschel Rhoades completed a thirteen yard pass to James Hoffman, and Hoffman ran five to score, after a 60 yard gallop by right half-back Self had placed the ball in scoring position. The locals failed to kick their goal.

In the final quarter of the game both the Tornadoes and Cubs struck near the goals, with the Tornadoes reaching Brownfield's six yard line, on one occasion and with the Cubs bogging down on Lamesa's third yard line.

The local eleven compiled 7 first downs to 10 for the visitors. The Cubs held a 77 yard advantage in the rushing plays with the Tornadoes holding a 40 yard advantage in passes.

A crowd estimated at more than 2,000 saw the game.

The Lamesa aggregation showed a marked improvement over their last game with their quick charging, and sharp, effective tackling. The backfields showed alertness in breaking up forward pass attacks.

Although there was rumor of turmoil between the Lamesa and Brownfield fans, official announcements reveal this untrue.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — For a period of three weeks I have heard of the critical grain sorghum situation in West Texas, getting my information from individual producers and County AAA offices. The price slump, and lack of storage and railroad cars for transportation have cost West Texans many thousands of dollars.

Throughout this period I have been in constant touch with the proper officials here urging and demanding prompt action to prevent the sacrificing of our grain sorghum crop.

The government loan rate on grain sorghum is \$1.69 per hundred, but to be eligible for the loan the grain must be stored in warehouses or on the farm, and adequate storage has not been available.

Briefly, the following steps have been taken to assist the producers:

(1) To afford a greater market demand for grain sorghum, the War Production Board and War Food Administration have agreed to permit the unrestricted use of grain sorghum in the manufacture of industrial alcohol for the war effort. There has not been any restriction on the use of grain sorghum by the brewers, but October 1 is the first date that the use of sorghum will be permitted for industrial alcohol. It is estimated that alcohol producers will consume about 6 million bushels of grain sorghum per month. The brewers and the mixed feed manufacturers will probably take 10 million bushels per month.

(2) In order to make better use of present storage facilities, the maturity date of the sorghum loan has been changed from June 30, 1945, to April 30, to enable warehousemen to clear their storage for wheat by next spring, thereby permitting the warehousemen to accept more grain sorghum.

(3) In an effort to provide additional storage space, some lumber and prefabricated granaries are being provided, but this is not very effective as demand is so great in relation to supply.

(4) Director Johnson of the Office of Defense Transportation has agreed to provide additional railroad cars to move the grain but declares that it is not possible to fully meet this important need on account of other demands of the war effort for cars.

These matters are of the greatest concern because West Texas is producing millions of bushels of grain sorghum. The production costs have been great, and a price of less than the loan rate of \$1.69 per hundred is intolerable. National grain sorghum production last year amounted to 103,000,000 bushels, Texas, principally West Texas, producing 74,000,000 bushels of that amount. I shall continue to urge adequate price support for grain sorghum and every possible assistance toward more adequate storage and transportation facilities.

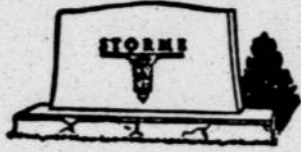

Restrictions Are Lifted On Grain

C. E. Tarter, administrative of-
ficer at the local AAA office re-
ceived a telegram from George Ma-
hon, concerning the lifting of re-
strictions after October 1 on the
use of grain sorghums in manufac-
ture of industrial alcohol.

The telegram stated: "Have appeal-
ed to WFA Commodity Credit and
ODT for assistance in connection
with grain sorghum storage, loan and
price situation. Maturity date on
loans is being moved up from June
20 to April 30 for purpose of get-
ting warehouse space which might
otherwise be reserved for wheat.
WPB apparently will agree to un-
limited use of grain sorghum in
manufacture of industrial alcohol
after October 1."

With restrictions lifted, Mahon
states that approximately 5,000,000
bushels of maize per month will
be used by distillers.

Pfc. W. D. Clark Helps Set Record In European Area

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE FIGHTER STATION, England—Private First Class William D. Clark of Lamesa is a member of an Eighth Fighter Command P-51 Mustang group which recently passed the 450-mark in victories over Nazi Planes, becoming the third American fighter group in the European Theater of Operations to make such a record.

Pfc. Clark is a driver in the transportation section of the service group and his work contributed to the group's high record of combat efficiency. As a part of the organization which enables the fighter pilots to devote all their time and energy to the pursuit and destruction of the Luftwaffe, he is helping to keep American fighter planes in combat against the enemy over every corner of occupied Europe.

The fighter group, established a record for American units in the European theater when it destroyed 44 enemy planes on the ground and seven in the air in one mission. And in four low-level attacks, the group destroyed 118 German planes on the ground, an average of more than 29 per mission.

Pfc. Clark, who formerly resided at 605 North Second Street, Lamesa, enlisted in the Army in January, 1942.

V. O. Key Tells About Garden Experiment

his gardening experience in hopes that they will benefit others. He conducted a cucumber gardening experiment, and reports a successful outcome.

Key states, "In order to keep the ants from placing their milk cows on the vines and sucking the sap out of them I put bermuda grass cuttings from my lawn around the plants, and the ants had an awful time getting through the grass. Seeing that the vines would get back out on the soil, I strung them to run up against the barn. I then found, however, that the cucumber is allergic to the atmosphere if too far from mother earth, and hence turned yellow and fell off after growing about one inch long."

However OPA found that on a national scale, limiting the acceptance of "R" coupons resulted in some discrimination between various retail outlets. It was abandoned last Friday, September 22.
