Jerry Moorhead, Abernathy Elementary School Principal, has this reminder for parents whose children will be starting to school for the first time this fall.

All Elementary School students are to register Friday, August 30.

First day of school will be Tuesday, Sept. 3. Buses will run that day and lunch will be served in the cafeteria.

They must be six years of age by Sept. 1, 1968.

In order to be eligible for enrollment, parents or guardian must produce a certified birth certificate as proof of age of the child. The small, "keepsake" birth certificates issued by the hospital in which the child was born cannot be accepted as official proof of age for the purpose of entering school.

Speaker for the commencement will be Dr. Stewart Allen, executive secretary of the Texas Association of Colleges and Universities.

CALL FOR COTTON

EXPLORER SCOUT DESCRIBES MEET IN COLORADO

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Fritz Struve, Abnathy Explorer Scout, in the following article, gives an interesting account of activities of the National Explorer Delegate Conference held at Ft. Collins, Colo., August 18-22. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Rudolph Struve.)

1968 Explorer Delegate Conference.

Colorado State University, Ft. Collins, Colorado.

It was a big week for over 2500 Explorer Scouts at Colorado State University, August 18-22 was the week of the 4th National Explorer Delegate Conference. Most of the delegates arrived from their hometowns in each of the 50 states and each province of Canada on Sunday morning and early Sunday afternoon.

Each day of the conference there was a different keynote speaker ranging from the Air Force to the Navy to big business. On Sunday night, Cadet First Class Waller spoke to the group on American problems. Tuesday morning it was Lyman S. Ford, the executive director of United Community Funds and Councils of America, Inc. Another top speaker of the conference was the famed Commander Keane, Commander Keane has served in both the 1st and 2nd World Wars, and was one of the pioneers of the Boy Scout organization.

Among one of the most well known speakers of the entire week was the famed track star Jesse Owens. Owens first achieved fame at the age of thirteen when he was the first junior high age student to clear 6' in the high jump and 22' in the broad jump. Owens gained 4 gold medals in the 1936 Olympics. Among Owens chores at the Conference was to hand out the Young American awards. These awards went to five young people from throughout the nation. Recipients included Greg Bramford, past President of the FFA, Midshipman Anthony J. Watson, Bill Cobb, National Teenager Driving Champion in the Boys' Division, Anne Marie Kaminski, National Teenager Driving Champion in the girls' division, and Richard Sowash, chairman of the Steering Committee of the Explorer Delegate Conference.

Some of the other activities at the conference included a college fashion show on Monday night, (no long haired boys) Tuesday night a Talent Show, and on Wednesday night a Western Style Barbecue. Among the many celebrities at the conference were the popular musical group the Windjammers, a well-known group from Florida. This group performed for us on Tuesday night after the talent show and again on Wednesday night.

The conference was not all fun and no work for the Steering Committee had set up a "Service in Action" project for the delegates. In my case that consisted of building trails in the University's natural Science Park.

We also found some national champions out of the conference group during the Sports-O-Rama on Monday afternoon. In this event, the delegates could participate in some 27 different sports ranging from Football to Archery from Trouble-Shooting to Spin Casting. Wednesday afternoon the delegates were divided up into groups to discuss problems in Explorer Posts and to work out solutions to these problems.

The South Plains Council delegation left Thursday morning at 11 a.m. for Denver from there we flew into Midland then into Lubbock. An interesting note on the flight to Denver from Lubbock, was that on the same plane with us was Benny Davis, the younger brother of Sammy Davis, Jr. The 16 Explorers and our advisor, Mr. Bill Mays from Ralls, from the South Plains Council met Mr. Davis.

The group was met at the plane by an Abnathy fellow, Mr. Henry Clay von Stuve, who took the boys to the bus station for the last leg of the trip.

Rep. Mahon Explains Farm Payment Changes

The following news release was issued this week by U. S. Rep. George Mahon, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee:

The House of Representatives last week approved a one-year extension of the present farm program. The major controversy on the bill came on an amendment to limit government payments to producers.

A report from Representative George Mahon advises that he spoke against and voted against the limitation of payments, but supported final passage of the bill in order to give the Senate-House Conference a chance to work out an acceptable bill.

The Senate, on July 20, had passed a four-year bill without limitations. Mahon said that by sending the House bill to conference with the Senate, he felt most hopeful that a one-year extension without limitations would be worked out in conference and later submitted to the House and Senate for final approval. He advised that if the farm law extension carried with it a limitation on payments, he was convinced that the bill would be blocked by the House and not enacted into law.

The farm program expires at the end of next year and it is generally felt that a one-year extension would assist farmers with their long-range planning and at the same time give the next Congress more time to work its will on improved farm legislation.

Mahon stated that he felt reasonably confident that a one-year extension without payment limitations would be approved before Congress adjourns this year.

Weed Loss Among Grain Crops Set At \$84 Million

Texas Tech farm researchers have figured that the loss caused by weeds among grain crops on the High Plains runs as high as \$84 million a year.

Here's the way they figure it: A weed-free grain sorghum field at the Tech research farm produced 4,900 pounds an acre. Adjoining fields had weeds in various amounts, and these were counted by rows.

It was found that one weed every 32 feet of row reduced the yield 150 pounds per acre.

HIGHWAY WORK IS SET IN AREA

The State Highway Department announced plans for improvement of U. S. Highway 87 and a farm highway in the area.

Sealcoating of two lanes on US 87 from Hale Center to Abernathy, 14.2 miles; base reconstruction and surfacing from 0.5 mile north of Abernathy, through Abernathy to a point 0.5 mile south of Abernathy.

A seal coat is to be placed on FM 179, from FM 1315 in Cotton Center south eight miles to FM 54.



DECLARATION OF ESTIMATED TAX

Individual taxpayers who previously filed declarations of estimated federal income tax for 1968 must now revise their estimates to reflect the new surcharge tax recently enacted into law. Ellis Campbell, Jr., IRS District Director for Northern Texas, said today. He also reminded taxpayers to file Form 1040ES, declaration of estimated tax, if their federal income tax for 1968 will exceed their withholding by \$40 or more.

Mr. Campbell said a new 1040ES worksheet is now being developed to aid taxpayers in computing the amount of revenue estimated tax. It will be mailed to taxpayers at the time they are billed for their third quarter installment due September 15. The worksheet will also be available at IRS offices around the first of September.

The new tax law imposes a 10 percent annual surcharge retroactive to April 1 on individual tax returns. This means, Mr. Campbell said, that most taxpayers who file on a calendar year basis will be required to pay a 7 1/2 percent surcharge on federal income tax covering income received during 1968.

Taxpayers who previously based their 1968 estimate on tax paid during 1967 can no longer use this method after Sept. 15, Mr. Campbell said. The law now requires individuals to use "anticipated income" as the basis for computing estimated tax.

A new Form 1040FY will be sent to fiscal year taxpayers in time to file and pay the surcharge tax by the due date. Mr. Campbell said. Form 1040FY will also be available at IRS offices the first part of August.
