Rules For Womens' Club Division At Dawson County Fair

Following are the rules and regulations for the Womens' Home Demonstration Club Division, as announced by Miss Mattie Phenix, County Home Demonstration Agent, who will be in charge of this division.

Rules and Regulations

1. All articles to be exhibited must be entered not later than 9 o'clock September 20, 1935.

2. All canned products must be in jars with glass tops. The clamp type jar is not necessary.

3. All canned products must be properly labeled giving the name of the product, the name of the exhibitor, the club and county. The label to be used is the 4-H label and may be obtained from J. P. Dowell Hardware, McKinney, or from the Home Demonstration Agent.

4. All canned products or articles of clothing must be canned or made by the individual exhibiting.

5. No one will be permitted to take her exhibit until after 8 o'clock p. m. September 21, 1935.

Judging will begin at 1 o'clock on September 20, 1935.

7. Miss Emma Gunter, County Home Demonstration Agent, Mitchell County, will do the judging.

8. Ribbons will be given as to the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd places.

Premium List

The Womens' Home Demonstration Club sending in the greatest number of canned products will be awarded a cash prize of \$2.50; the club placing second, \$1.50; the club placing third, \$1.00.

The Woman's Home Demonstration Club placing first in educational exhibits will be awarded \$1.25, second place, 75c and third place 50c.

The Girls 4-H Club sending in the greatest number of canned products will be awarded \$1.25; second place 50c; and third 50c.

Winners in the following will be awarded ribbons as indicated above:

1. 1 pt. butter or lima bean
2. 1 pint Carrots.
3. 1 pint Okra
4. 1 pint English peas.
5. 1 pint Tomato Juice.

Efforts Being Made To Secure School Bus Routes Here

Efforts are being made for contracting two or three bus routes among Dawson county school districts culminating in bringing high school pupils whose grades are not taught in their home districts to Lamesa High School. The proposed routes would also furnish transportation to pupils who reside more than two and a half miles from the schools of the districts traversed to their home district schools. Definite arrangements have not yet been made but the proposed routes are to serve Klondike, Spangenberg, Five Mile, Liberty on one and districts in the Western portion or North, East and South East of Lamesa. This is the first of transportation movements into the local schools from other districts of the county. The State, under a plan to be approved by the Dawson County School board, defrays a portion of the transportation expense for pupils who reside two and a half miles from their home districts and also for those whose grades are not available in the home district to the nearest accredited school or most convenient school of such rank. More than 125 pupils are transferred to Lamesa Public Schools for the ensuing term many of whom will be greatly inconvenienced by the transportation if the plans develop.

School Children Are Asked Not To Walk In Middle of Streets

A warning is sounded to school children and the traveling public as school opens that traffic laws will be strictly enforced near the school grounds, so states Jack Phinizy, chief of the City Police.

School children are requested to stay on the side walks and NOT walk in the streets in passing to and from the school buildings. This is necessary that the danger of passing automobiles be lessened and for the safety of all concerned. The practice of walking in the streets must not start this year and the City Police will enforce all ordinances as they have to stop this if it starts. Again the chief of police says STOP means STOP and all automobiles must observe the stop signs and slow down near the school buildings.

An appeal is made to all school children and patrons to help observe the traffic rules that no serious accidents, wrecks, or unfortunate mishaps occur during the school term. According to the official government gauge locate in Lamesa 2.30 inches of rain have fallen here since Sunday night. Over an inch fell last week bringing the total for the past two weeks up to 3.30 inches.

Reports from rural communities all over the county indicate that the rainfall was general over the entire territory and reports of the daily news; papers indicate that it was general over most of the state.

This rain will be of much benefit to the late feed and cotton crops in that they were in need of moisture. However most farmers are hoping that it will clear off and remain dry for a few weeks in order that the leaf worms which have begun to infest the cotton fields in this section might be poisoned. The damp weather makes poisoning difficult as the poison washes from the stalk before it has opportunity to do good. It is to be hoped that not too much damage might be done before the farmers get the worms under control.

8:45 A. M. Monday Is Opening Hour

The Lamesa Public Schools are scheduled to open on Monday morning, September 9th, at 8:45 A. M. The announcements are made for each of the departments that the pupils and public may know where and when to report and what items of information to have available.

Pupils from this and other Texas schools are required to present book cards showing last year's book accounts properly settled. Vaccination certificates are required of those who have not heretofore been enrolled in Lamesa schools. Each child, and especially the small ones should have definite information concerning his age, birth-date, street address, parent's initials, telephone number and mailing address.

The local district maintains no kindergarten and therefore cannot accept children who are six years of age after September 1, 1935. The State Department rule is that "No child younger than six years of age shall be admitted to the public schools unless in a school which maintains a standard kindergarten." Space considerations also affect the local situation.

The opening programs in the elementary school will be in the respective rooms to which pupils will report according to the schedule published below. High school pupils and their friends will meet in the high school auditorium for faculty introductions, announcements and a short program. The schools in both buildings will hold for the full day.

The principals will be about their respective buildings on Thursday and Friday to confer with patrons and pupils who desire conferences and to adjust any irregular details which may have arisen.

Children will be expected to furnish only the necessities in the matter of school supplies and no particular brand or qualities are rigidly required. A child would do well to have writing equipment such as pencil and tablet on the first day and afterwards purchase other materials as needed.

4-H Pantry Demonstrator Plans for Fall Tomatoes

Mrs. A. P. Hamilton, 4-H pantry demonstrator in the McCarty home demonstration club has pruned her tomatoes and set the "suckers" out in the edge of a nearby lake. "I set them just in the edge of the water and they took root, and are growing fine," said Mrs. Hamilton. To adequately fill her pantry, she will need to can 175 containers of tomatoes and tomato products.

4-H Pantry Demonstrator Makes Tomato Juice

"I have made 30 pints of tomato juice," said Mrs. Joe Snellgrove, 4-H pantry demonstrator in the O. H. home demonstration club. Tomato juice is made by extracting the juice from the tomatoes by using a sepio-siv or by cutting them in small pieces and pressing them through a fine wire sieve then bringing it to a simmering stage, putting it into sterilized jars or enameled cans, sealing and processing in hot water bath for five minutes.

A family of five needs 125 containers of tomatoes and tomato products. Vitamine C which is contained in them helps to prevent scurvy. If one is not in a position to buy citrus fruits, then a larger quantity of tomatoes should be canned.

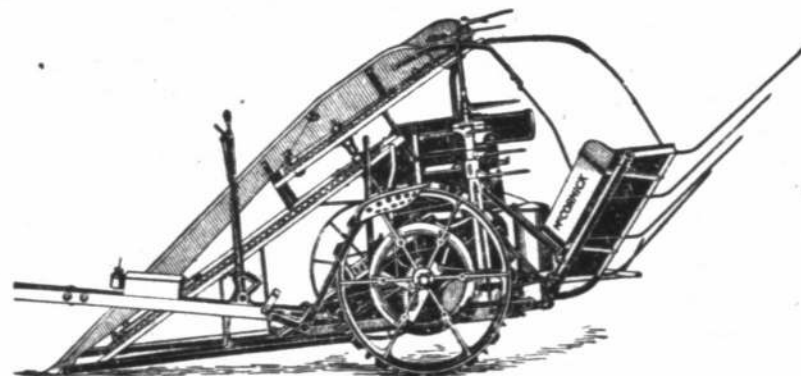

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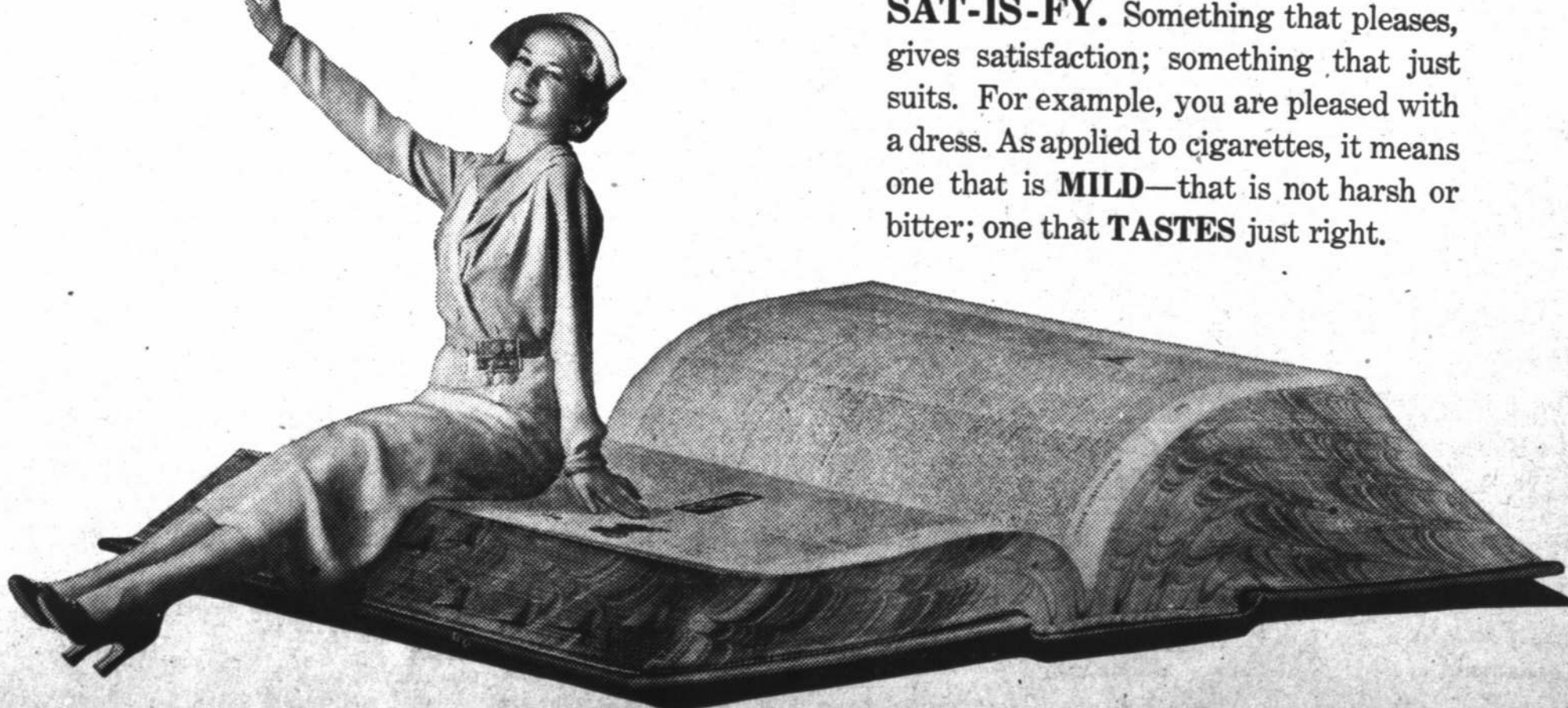

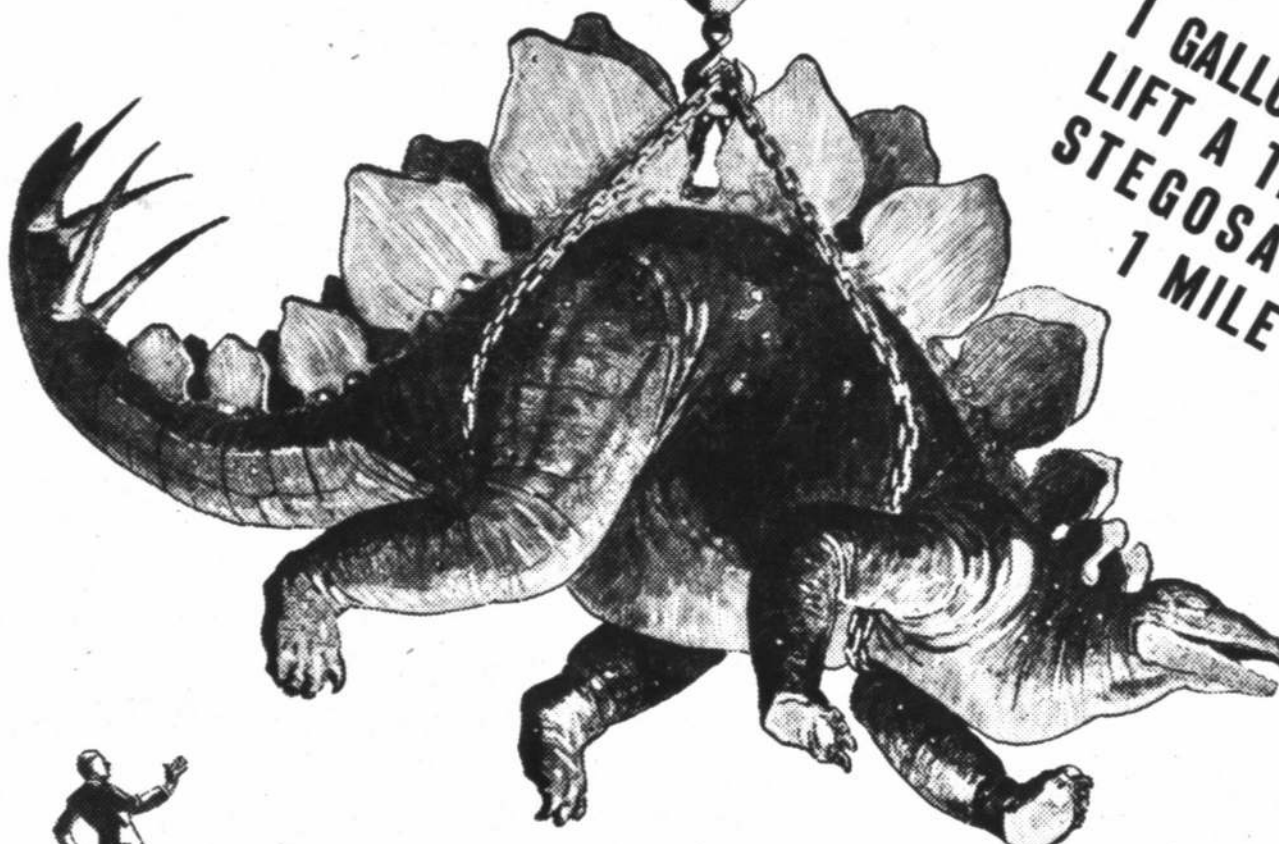

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Sept. 12 Last Day To Submit WPA Projects

At a meeting in the District Relief office in Big Spring last week, Mr. L. O. McNew, District W. P. A. Administrator announced that September 12th had been set as the dead line for submitting W. P. A. projects. Under this program school trustees may make application for yard beautification and repair projects. In order that school trustees might have more time to plan and work up projects, an application for \$10,000 for ground beautification and repair on buildings for Dawson county schools has been tentatively filed with Mr. McNew. Since the purpose of these projects is to provide employment for the unemployed, the money to be expended is to be used almost entirely for labor, very little being allowed for materials.

The project is to be planned by some competent person and the work is to be done under supervision, by persons on the relief rolls. Before submitting the project to the W. P.

A. office a map of the school grounds must be drawn and the proposed improvements, such as fill-in work, trees, flower beds, walks, etc., indicated on the map. These projects are then submitted to the county board for approval who in turn, submit them to the District Relief Office. Trustees interested in sponsoring work of this kind should set to work immediately to have plans drawn up so that projects may be submitted by September 12th or as soon thereafter as feasible.

The first step in to plan the project and to draw the map to scale indicating the location of buildings and the desired improvements. The second step is to make application and to leave it on file with the county superintendent, who submits it to the county board. That completes the action necessary on the part of the trustees in getting the application on file with the W. P. A.

The schools of this county should take advantage of this opportunity to have the necessary repairs done and to beautify school grounds. Very little has been done in this connection in the past. During the years of the depression only the necessary repairs have been made. If these improvements can be had free of cost to the districts, there is seemingly no reason why every school building in the county should not be put in first class condition and the grounds made more attractive. Let's get our projects planned immediately and submit them because the first to come are the first to be served.

Nine Out of Ten Have Teeth Trouble

Austin, September 2.—About nine
out of every ten persons in the United
States have something wrong with
their teeth. At least eight of each ten
have caries, or dental decay. A long
list of other maladies, including the
famous "pyorrhea", is to be discov-
ered in even a casual examination
of the teeth in any community.

Why do so many people suffer the
misery of bad teeth? Dental research
in recent years has revealed that the
real trouble is the diet and other
health habits of civilized folk, and
not civilization itself. We may be
both civilized and have good teeth.

The teeth are living organs, and
must be nourished, like any other
part of the body. They are composed
principally of calcium, a mineral
found in great abundance in milk.
Hence the insistence of dental
scientists on the use of greater por-
tions of milk in the diet.

It is also important to preserve the
general bodily health, for dental de-
cay often begins during periods of
general ill health. Teeth of mothers
are also particularly liable to decay
during pregnancy, hence at this time
particular attention should be paid to
the diet, after consultation with a
physician.

Another important time for teeth
health is in infancy and early child-
hood. Children should have plenty of
milk, should receive some Vitamin D
food and should be permitted to play
in the sunlight as often as possible.
For dental decay is not a simple
disease; it has many causes, and its

treatment does not depend on the
dentists alone, but on every person
who wants to improve the health of
his teeth.

No School Lunches For Relief Clients

Austin, Aug. 31. —Sounding another reminder that the days of "relief business" in Texas are numbered the Texas Relief Commission has informed district administration offices that the school lunch program which last year aided in providing lunches for 51,000 children weekly, will not be resumed this year.

Following up repeated suggestions that citizens look to their own resources, officials have urged that parent Teacher Associations, men's and women's service clubs, church societies, and other organizations continue the school lunch program in communities where it is still needed.

"With our funds definitely limited we would not be justified in making plans for a year's program for needy school children when we probably could not carry it out," Mrs. Val M. Keating, director of Social Service, said in recommending that private, local organizations continue the lunch program.

Last year the Relief Commission sponsored projects in 94 schools, furnishing daily lunches for 9350 children a week, and jointly sponsored projects with local organizations in 721 other schools furnishing lunches for 42,091 children a week.
