When I married the radio still went along everywhere we did. It played many a long hour at the pasture during hay baling season. It went along on vacation with us.

John Denver's odes to mountains and nature poured out of it, and Linda Ronstadt grieved over lost lovers.

Somewhere along the way we purchased a new stereo system, and later cassette tapes and high class sound systems in vehicles.

So that little radio was relegated to part time work. It snapped on my belt as I worked in the yard or when we did chores such as painting. The cover was spattered with paint, and the plastic was beginning to turn a peculiar color.

But still, when we moved to the country, the radio brought in weather reports and news upstairs to guests or when Thomas worked on the books.

Yesterday he told me it had given up the ghost.

The switch doesn't work anymore.

But it has an honored place in that closet section reserved for "things there is no reason to keep, but that I can't bear to part with".

Times have changed. Music has changed, technology has changed.

But my affection for that little transistor radio continues.

And I hope it's transistors rest in peace, somewhere in up radio heaven!

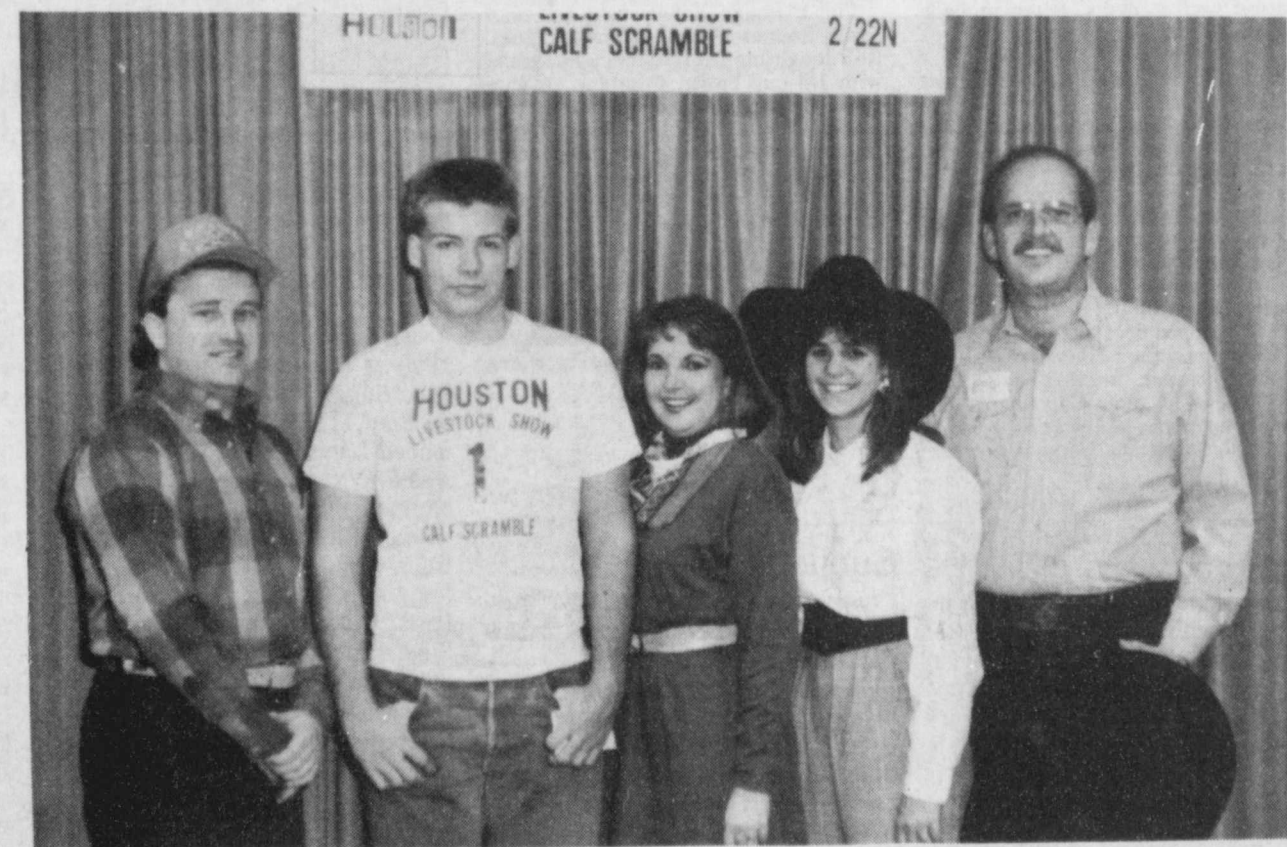

Baker, Dockray Win In Houston Scramble

Benny Baker of Deport and Tobye Dockray of Paris, FFA students from Prairiland High School, were two of 28 determined contestants who were challenged to halter and maneuver one of only 14 unruly calves across the 2.75 acre Houston Astrodome into the winner's square on February 22.

In exchange for their efforts, Benny and Tobye received an \$800 calf purchase certificate, which will be used to purchase a registered dairy or beef heifer.

The sponsor for Baker's certificate were Mr. and Mrs. Mars. Tobye's sponsor was Jack Spence & Associates, Inc.

Working along with Benny and Tobye on their project will be Buddy Freeman, agricultural science

teacher, who will supervise all work with the animal.

Baker and Dockray will be required to maintain monthly progress reports, monetary records and a scrapbook detailing the project. Their efforts will culminate in 1992 when the heifer will be returned to the Houston Show for a special showing competition with other 1991 scramble winners.

The scramble is held during each of the 18 performances of the rodeo, which includes professional rodeo action, top notch entertainers, chuckwagon races and indoor fireworks. In addition, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is a charity organization with all of the proceeds benefiting the youth of Texas in the form of scholarships and research grants.

grass truck has served as a back-up unit for the Department.

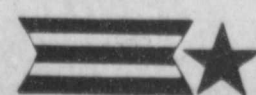
Members voted last year to retain the truck and replace the tank that is leaking.

Country Cooking is coming from the kitchen of Loveta McMurray of Cunningham. Although she is 90 years old, she is still very active and on the go. She was born in Atoka, Oklahoma in 1900. Her family moved around the country a great deal until she was 18 and then moved to Cunningham. She married Grover McMurray on March 17, 1922. They made Bonham and then Waco their home until his death, and she then moved to San Antonio where she spent 11 years. In 1982 she returned to Cunningham and has made this her home since then. She loves Cunningham and this is her home. She is a member of the Abundant Life Church in Pattonville. Though she never had any children, she helped raise seven of her nieces and nephews.

Loveta attends church three times a week and does not want to miss if she can possibly catch a ride. She says she's not old, she has just been here for a long time! Staying on the go makes her feel young at heart.

Loveta loves to cook. She loves to give prepared foods and gifts to people. The two cakes shown were to be given to Larry James and Kenneth Gifford, just because they help her get around a lot. She loves to have friends in to eat with her, and enjoys dinners and suppers at her church. The Cheese Cornbread recipe she is sharing is one that is requested for

every dinner at church. Loveta puts more red pepper in it than the recipe calls for, because everyone tells her to make it hot. Loveta has made this recipe for over 20 years and does not remember where she got it.

Crochet is another hobby of Loveta's. She is always making an afghan, pillow, basket or etc. to give to friends and family. Arthritis slows her down some, but she can still make an afghan in 3 to 4 weeks. She does not usually go by a pattern, just picks it up and gets with it. She has made seven crocheted bedspreads and doesn't have one for herself. She has also made five crocheted tablecloths and doesn't own one for herself, either. She likes to crochet collars for women, just name it and she makes it. Recently, she crocheted the ringbearer's pillow for my daughter's wedding.

Cheese Cornbread

1 small can cream style corn
1/3 cup oil
2 eggs
1 1/4 cup meal
1 cup sweet milk
1/2 cup salt and soda
1/2 pound grated cheese
1 tsp. red pepper
Mix all ingredients and bake in oven until brown.

Banana Bread

Mix together the following:
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1 tab. vanilla
1/2 cup crisco
2 cups flour
1 tsp. soda
pinch salt
4 very ripe mashed bananas
Put in loaf pan and cook about 1 hour and 15 minutes on low heat.

Wisconsin Cheese Soup

1/4 cup margarine
1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons flour
2 1/2 cups chicken broth (can be made with chicken flavored broth)
2 cups milk
1/4 teaspoon white pepper
2 tablespoons chopped pimento
1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons dry white wine
1/2 teaspoon worcestershire sauce
1/2 teaspoon tabasco sauce
8 oz. shredded cheese
Melt margarine; add flour, stirring constantly. Cook one minute, stirring constantly. Add broth and milk gradually. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until thickened. Stir in pepper, add pimento, wine, worcestershire sauce and tabasco. Heat to boiling, stirring often. Remove from heat and stir in cheese until it melts. Serve immediately.

Party Cheese Balls

2-8 oz. pkgs. Philadelphia Brand Cream Cheese
2 cups (8 oz.) shredded Cracker Barrel natural cheddar cheese
1 tsp. chopped pimento
1 tsp. chopped green pepper
1 Tbsp. finely chopped onion
2 tsp. worcestershire sauce
1 tsp. lemon juice
dash of cayenne
dash of salt
finely chopped pecans
Combine softened cream cheese and cheddar cheese, mixing until well blended. Add remaining ingredients except nuts; mix well and chill. Shape into ball, roll in nuts. Serve with crackers.

Party Mix

1/2 cup margarine
1/4 tsp. garlic powder
1/4 tsp salt
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce (tabasco to taste)
2 cups Chex corn
2 cups Chex wheat
2 cups Chex rice
1 cup Chex honey cereal
1 cup Cheerios
1 cup party pretzels
1 cup salted mixed nuts
In 3 qt. deep casserole, melt butter, add worcestershire sauce and tabasco. Salt and garlic powder. Stir to combine. Mix remaining ingredients and stir into butter mixture. Cook uncovered 1 1/2 to 2 hours or until cereal is crisp and well coated. Stir every 15 minutes while cooking. Cool and store in containers.

Sour Cream Cinnamon Rolls

1 package dry yeast
1/4 cup warm water, 105 to 115
1-8 oz. carton sour cream
1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted
1/4 cup sugar
2 eggs
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
4 cups all purpose flour, divided
1/4 cup butter or margarine, softened
1/2 cup sugar
1 to 1 1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
1 cup sifted powdered sugar
1 1/2 tablespoons milk
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
Dissolve yeast in warm water in large mixing bowl; let stand 5 minutes. Stir in sour cream and next 5 ingredients. Add 1 1/2 cups flour, and beat at medium speed on electric mixer until smooth. Stir in remaining flour; cover and refrigerate 8 hours.

Punch dough down; turn out onto lightly floured surface, and knead 2 times. Roll dough into 18x15" rectangle. Spread with 1/4 cup butter. Combine 1/2 cup sugar and cinnamon; sprinkle over rectangle. Carefully roll up dough jellyroll fashion, starting at long side; pinch seam to seal (do not seal ends). Cut roll into 1" slices; place slices, cut side down, in two greased 9" square pans.
Cover and let rise in a warm place, free from drafts, about 1 hour (rolls will not double in bulk). Bake at 375 for 18 to 20 minutes or until golden. Combine powdered sugar, milk and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, stirring well. Drizzle over warm rolls. Yield: 1 1/2 dozen.

Eugene L. Norwood, 61, of Cunningham, vice-president of the Paris Junior College Board of Regents, died Thursday, February 28 at St. Joseph's Hospital in Paris.

Mr. Norwood had served on the Board of Regents for over 22 years. In 1969, he was appointed to fill an unexpired term and was elected to the board in 1972. He became vice-president in 1986.

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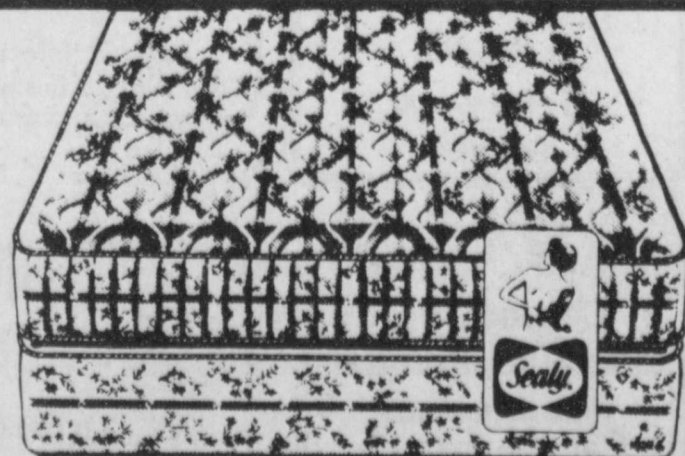

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TAX TIPS

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Mark Bower CPA S CORPORATION - ADVANTAGES AND QUALIFICATIONS

An S corporation election should be considered by every closely-held corporate business. The election itself is not difficult to make, and it is generally a taxable event. If the requirements are met, the S status may be used permanently or temporarily, as conditions dictate.

The main benefit of the election is that the corporation does not generally pay federal income tax on its net income. Rather, the income flows through to its shareholders who report their share of income on their personal income tax returns.

In general, a corporation will qualify to elect S corporation status if the corporation is a domestic corporation, has only one class of stock, and has no more than 35 shareholders. Additionally, the shareholders can only be individuals, estates and certain trusts. Individual shareholders must be citizens or residents of the U.S.

If limited liability or other business reasons dictate the corporate form of business, an S election may prove beneficial in the following circumstances:

1. If the business is expected to incur large losses and/or credits which may be better utilized by the shareholders than the corporation. (This is an important consideration in the start-up years of a business when losses are common.)
2. If the corporation has little reason to accumulate cash, but increased salaries to its shareholders would exceed reasonable compensation for services by the shareholders.
3. If the business is anticipating a large inflow of cash which it intends to distribute.
4. If the corporation tax rates are higher than individual tax rates.

The S election may be terminated at any time. However, there is a five-year waiting period before the election may be made again.
