Chester Johnson Is Appointed VFW "Instructor"

Chester Johnson of Rockport has been appointed as one of six "instructors" for the Department of Texas, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

L. N. Kirkpartick, state commander, selected Johnson to head up the Department's



New Post Program in VFW District 6, 18, 20, 24 and 26.

The appointment is another high honor in a long list of VFW accomplishments for the Rockport veterans leader.

Johnson's duties as an instructor include the organization of new VFW posts in cooperation with district commanders in the five districts to which he has been assigned.

Johnson, a member of Stewart-Wendell Post 3904 in Rockport, has served three terms as commander of his post. He was on the All-State team of post commanders during 1960-61. He is a past commander of District 6 and currently commander of the San Patricio County Council.

A member of the VFW for 20 years, Johnson served in the U. S. Navy during 1941-45. He served on PT boats in the Pacific, was wounded in action and received a medical discharge.

Johnson, self-employed, is a general contractor in the Rockport area and developer of real estate. He also has rice farming and ranching interests.

Vocation Survey Gets Under Way

A community-wide survey to determine whether the Aransas County High School vocational program should be expanded, and if so, what courses should be added to meet the predominating needs of the community, will soon be underway in the Rockport, Fulton, Lamar area. The announcement was made by school superintendent J. D. Gray.

B. E. Lovelace of the Vocational Education Division of the Texas Education Agency is the consultant for this survey.

Joel Mixon, counselor at the Aransas County High School, will act as chairman of the local survey team with a group of local business and school representatives serving in an advisory capacity. This advisory committee is composed of T. D. Picton, James H. Sorenson, Ben Howard, Port Little, D. H. Roberts, Mrs. Daphna Mitchell, Philip D. Baldwin, Harry L. Grenek and C. R. Mitchell.

The initial planning session for the survey was held in the school administration building on Oct. 13 with all of the above named people present. At this meeting Mr. Lovelace emphasized that the primary aim of the National Vocational Education Act and all surveys like the one to be conducted here is an attempt to make the local vocational education programs meet the needs of the community.

The survey will cover seven broad occupational categories: Distributive (selling goods or services), health, home economics, office, skilled, technical and public service.

The survey interviewers will ask employers in each occupational category how many employees they have, whether male or female, in what classification they fall, and an estimate of the firm's possible future employees needs within the next three years. This latter information will be confidential except possibly in general totals indicating comparable needs for various vocational education courses.

When the survey has been completed, the results in condensed form will be made available to the Board of Education of the Aransas County Independent School District and to the Vocational Education Division of the Texas Education Agency. If it is determined and agreed that the Vocational Education program should be expanded in the local high school, certain Federal funds for the expansion will be made available under the Vocational Education Act of 1963. The State Vocational Education Department, working with local educational authorities, will determine the new course or courses to be offered.

Kick-off Breakfast For Scout Drive Held Today

A kick-off breakfast was served this morning to fund solicitors for the annual Boy Scout drive at Corky's restaurant. Major Don Meek and Dr. H. F. Elliot are co-chairmen for this campaign. John Ross is serving as coordinator.

Over 75 workers will contact subscribers. Bob Reddell, District Scout Executive, told the group present that the \$2,664.00 goal set for Aransas County represents \$13.32 per boy in scouting per year.

Dr. Elliot stated that this is a very small amount if compared with the expense our society bears to keep an average inmate in prison. Based on figures obtained from the Aransas County Auditor, this cost in our county is approximately \$960 per prisoner per year without considering utilities or the cost of the jail.

Scouting is an organization dedicated to teaching boys a way of life with special training in leadership to better fit into our expanding community. On a dollar basis this comparison alone is a good reason to support scouting.

Gov. John Connally Warns Against Voter Apathy

Governor John Connally warned this week that 147 aged residents of Aransas County will have their medical benefits jeopardized if Amendment No. 3 fails to win passage in the Nov. 2 election.

During the past year, \$27,972 was expected on behalf of these needy aged in this county. Governor Connally urged all Texans to support and vote for this crucial amendment.

Governor Connally also endorsed Amendment No. 4 which extends the two-year terms of statewide officials to four years.

"Texas is one of the few remaining states which has not enacted this far-sighted and efficient legislation," Governor Connally said.

The governor warned against voter apathy. He pointed out that only 178 voters in this county went to the polls last month in another Constitutional Amendment election.

Governor Connally emphasized that absentee voting had already started and would continue through Oct. 29. He asked all voters who will be away from their homes on election day to vote absentee.

A total of 10 proposed amendments to the Constitution will be on the Nov. 2 ballot.

Regional Seminar on Criminal Code Set For Oct. 28 In Corpus Christi

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr announced that the last of 14 regional seminars on the new Texas Code of Criminal Procedure will be held in Corpus Christi Oct. 28. Purpose of the seminar, to be held in cooperation with S. L. Jones, Jr., Nueces county district at-

torney, is to better acquaint law enforcement officers with the new Texas Code and with recent United States Supreme Court decisions.

The 59th Legislature, in passing Senate Bill 107, made more than 200 changes in the Code directly effecting the trial procedures of criminal cases in Texas. The changes will become effective on Jan. 1, 1966.

Carr and Jones said that all law enforcement officers, Justices-of-the-peace, prosecutors, judges of courts of criminal jurisdiction, and news media of the following counties have been invited to the Corpus Christi meeting: DeWitt, Wharton, Goliad, Victoria, Jackson, Calhoun, Matagorda, Bee, San Patricio, Refugio, Aransas, Nueces, Kleberg, Kenedy, McMullen and Live Oak.

The seminar will be held in Exposition Hall and will begin at 9:30 a.m. and conclude at 5 p.m.

Participants in the program include District Judge J. F. Onion, Jr. of San Antonio, and Assistant Attorneys General Howard M. Fender, Sam L. Kelly and Lonny F. Zwiener. Zwiener will discuss historical background and recent U. S. Supreme Court decisions. Fender will speak on arrests, searches, seizures, and confessions. Kelly will discuss post-arrests and pre-trial stages, and Judge Onion will explain new trial and appellate procedures.

"It is vital to good law enforcement that local and state authorities understand these new requirements and standards, and we hope that these meetings will be helpful in accomplishing this aim," Carr said.

The group will be welcomed by the Attorney General and by District Attorney Jones, host for the meeting.

TEXAS WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION INSURANCE RATES MAY GO DOWN

Austin — Good news is in store for Texas employers if workmen's compensation rates proposed by rate technicians of the State Board of Insurance are adopted.

Annual savings of \$4½ million are reflected in the suggested rates.

Board Chairman Wm. Hunter McLean disclosed today that its staff is recommending revised workmen's compensation rates that will result in an average reduction of 2.9 per cent. While for some of the 600 classifications will go up and others will go down, the over all effect would be an average decrease.

Staff statistical exhibits and other evidence to be presented at public hearing Oct. 21 by employers, insurers and inter-ester parties will be reviewed by the Board prior to final decision.

"The rating formula that this year produced an indicated decrease of 2.9 per cent is exactly the same formula that last year produced a 2.3 per cent increase. This can only mean," Chairman McLean said, "that the industrial safety record of our state's businesses has improved."

examine their industrial safety programs in order to make these programs efficient, accident preventing operations. By doing this, the employers of our state can bring about a further reduction in workmen's compensation insurance rates.

"It must be noted," Chairman McLean continued, "that slipshod safety practices will inevitably bring about higher workmen's compensation rates. Tomorrow's insurance rates are being made today in plants and factories throughout the state."

In commenting on the dollars and cents value of industrial safety programs, Chairman McLean pointed out that many employers are "experience rated." Under this plan a firm's loss experience is audited at the end of a policy year. Insurance costs are then increased or decreased according to the record disclosed by the audit.

Among the many firms paying less than manual rates for workmen's compensation insurance because of good accident prevention programs is a newspaper with a 16 per cent credit; a chain of retail stores with a 13 per cent credit; a steel company with a 41 per cent credit, and a chemical company with a credit of 69 per cent.

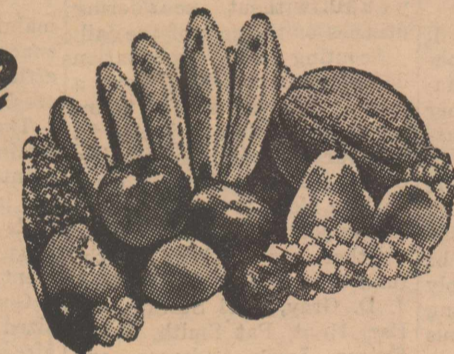

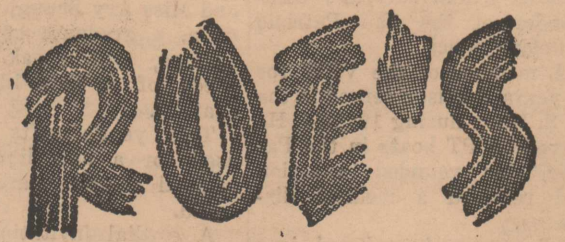

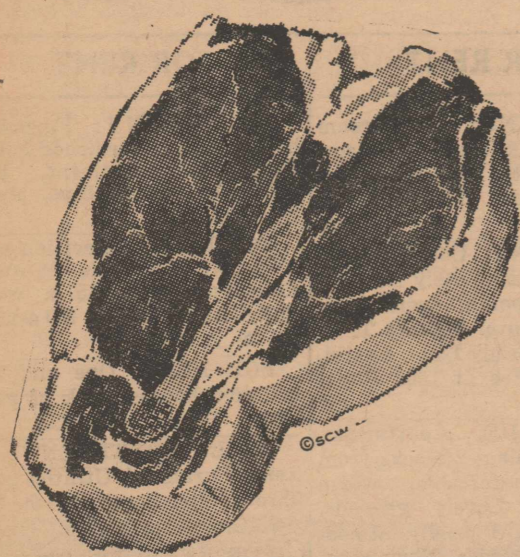

Washington—The Navy has restored a policy permitting men who are sole surviving sons to be kept out of combat, it was learned today.

The policy applies to "sole surviving sons in families depleted by incidents of the service" since 1940.

A Navy order issued Sept. 28 specified that any officer or enlisted man who chooses this course shall be released from uniform as soon as their enlistments or period of obligated service has run out.

In other words, the Navy apparently doesn't want such men if they cannot be used in combat service and will get rid of them at the earliest possible time.

Meanwhile, the Navy has put out another order which will give enlisted men who complete a tour in Viet Nam "every consideration practicable on being ordered to their next assignment."

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITAL

Nearly every deer hunter, at one time or another, has been stricken by "buck fever."

It's a temporary, uncontrollable disease which grips the hunter at a most inopportune time.

Usually it strikes just as he is drawing down on a deer and during that moment of truth when the finger begins to tighten on the trigger.

But it can strike swiftly and unexpectedly almost any time. Never is the hunter really immune from it.

For example, here's what happened to a hunter in Central Texas a couple of seasons back.

He was sitting in the high fork of a treetop when a big buck came wandering past. A well-placed, deliberate shot dropped the critter neatly.

But, as the deer fell, the hunter momentarily forgot he was in a tree. He jumped up and ran toward the animal, right out of the tree . . . into space.

When searchers found him later, he was clutching a broken leg and, not 50 feet away, lay the dead deer.

Germes of buck fever penetrate the nervous system when emotion overcomes reasoning.

And no hunter, notwithstanding his experience and age, is immune from the bugaboo. It can happen to the best of us.

Consider what happened to a veteran hunter in South Texas last year. A companion heard him shoot 11 times. Later on the veteran hunter came dragging in his kill and announced proudly. "Got 'im with one shot."

"But I heard 11 shots," his friend protested.

"You did," the hunter answered. "I shot once to attract the deer's attention, nine times to clear out the brush and once to kill him."

Curiously, persons who have a reputation of being super-duper deer hunters often are those most susceptible to buck fever. In the presence of others, they must "prove" their reputations are earned, not blown into myth by talk.

This pressure often makes them think, to try and reason out each shot, and when the hunter starts thinking he is throwing his defenses open to the fever.

At that critical moment . . . when the sight settles on the deer's vital area and the trigger finger starts applying pressure . . . it should be a sub-conscious move. It should be done without any forethought or doubt.

If there is a twinge of doubt in the hunter's mind as to his own ability, then, brother, he's really exposing his vulnerable side to that dread disease of hunting.

A hunter does queer things when gripped by the fever. Morton Burnham of Marble Falls tells about the time he stationed a novice hunter against the trunk of a live oak tree and started walking around in an attempt to drive a deer within gunshot range.

He jumped an exceptionally big buck and noticed the animals was heading directly toward the spot where the hunter lay in wait. It was on a course as straight and true as if an engineer had laid it out.

Morton listened for the anticipated shot. The silence was overpowering. Surely, he thought to himself, the hunter had seen the buck. He couldn't have avoided it.

When Morton came upon the

hunter, he appeared to be in momentary shock. His eyes were wild-looking and glassy. Morton asked if he'd seen the buck. The hunter nodded his head weakly.

"Yeah, but I missed him with every shot," he gasped dejectedly.

Missed with every shot? How could he? Morton hadn't heard his shoot, even once. Then he looked down to the ground and there, sparkling in the sunlight, were five live cartridges. The hunter had jacked them out of the rifle

without ever once pulling the trigger.

In that maddening moment of excitement . . . when game is sighted . . . just about anything can happen.

But a man is even more likely to catch buck fever when he has a chance to wait and think. Perhaps he sees a buck lurking off in the bordering brush, moving around where there isn't a chance for a shot. The hunter sits impatiently, hoping the deer will eventually show himself. Meanwhile he has time to think about the cir-

cumstance, the buck, and how he'll react when and if the deer does step into view.

As his nerves screw up tightly, the fever really goes to work on him. And when that happens it would take a near miracle to send the bullet true to its mark.

Every hunter dreads that fever. Only consolation is that sometimes it strikes the best of them.

APPLY FOR SOCIAL SECURITY IF YOU ARE 65 OR OLDER THIS YEAR

All persons who are now age 65 or older must enroll for the protection of Medicare under Social Security before March 31, 1966, to be eligible for the benefits when the program begins, according to W. H. Fitzgerald, field representative of the Corpus Christi Social Security office.

Medicare coverage is available regardless of a person's work and earnings. Even if earnings are too high to permit payment of cash benefits, a worker can have this protection against hospital and medical expenses.

His statement pointed out that Hospital and Medical Insurance will become effective July 1, 1966 for those over 65 who enroll for the benefits by March 31, 1966.

"If you are 65 years old this year, you must enroll for Medical Insurance Benefits before April 1966, or forfeit at least two years of protection under these provisions of Social Security," Fitzgerald warned. "The next opportunity to enroll will be Oct. 1967 for coverage beginning July 1968."

Everyone who will be age 65 or older this year who has not yet applied for social security is urged by Fitzgerald to do so right away.

2,680 Slots Readied For Free Hunts

Austin—The Texas big game harvest in some counties opened Friday, Oct. 1, half an hour before sunrise when bow and arrow hunters went after deer, turkey and javelina. High powered rifles went into action against antelope in three areas on Saturday, Oct. 2.

P. B. Uzzell, coordinator for wildlife in the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, said the archers will have plenty of targets but the riflemen will be restricted to a fair number of antelope west of the Pecos and in the Possum Kingdom area and the Panhandle. Antelope hunters must obtain permits from landowners.

The regular big game season does not until Nov. 13 in most counties operating under regulatory responsibility of the Department and Nov. 16 counties functioning under state law.

In nine Edwards Plateau counties archers will be permitted to bag antlerless deer for the first time. Archers hunting antlerless deer must secure an antlerless permit from the landowner before beginning their hunt.

Uzzell cautioned bow and arrow hunters to contact their game wardens if in doubt about the regulations in the areas where they plan to hunt. Chamber of Commerce in most areas also maintain liaison between hunters and landowners.

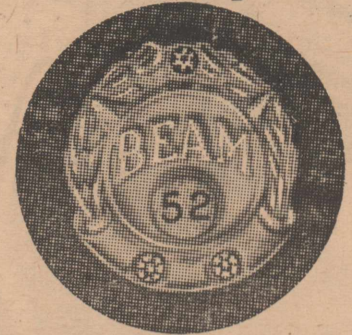
The wildlife coordinator said antelope permits in all three areas open are scarce, particularly west of the Pecos where

herds were reduced by poor habitat attributed mainly to unfavorable weather from 1962 through 1964. The limit in all three areas is one antelope, sex depending on permit designation.

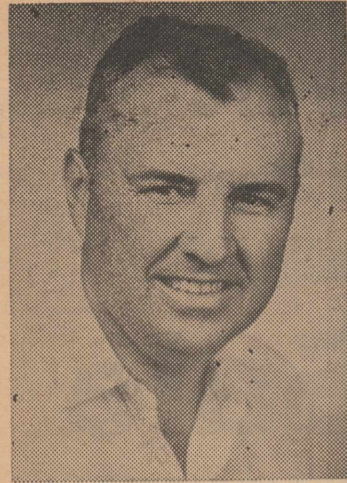

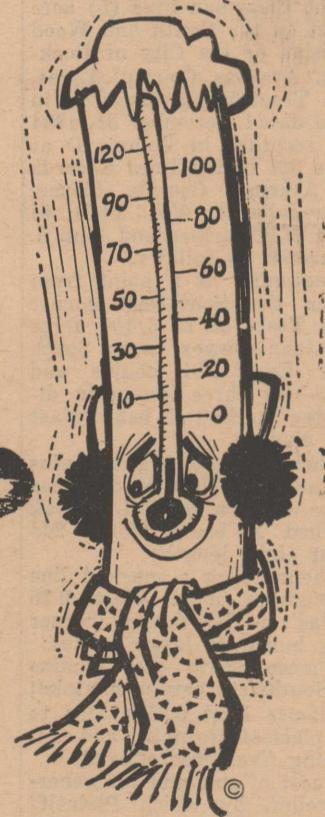

College Station — Brown patches appearing in St. Augustine grass lawns are the result of a disease caused by a fungus which becomes more active with the advent of cooler weather.

According to Wendell Horne, Extension pathologist, the disease is commonly referred to as brown patch and is characterized by the dying of patches of grass in circular patterns. The spots may range in size from a few inches to several feet in diameter with the turf collapsing at the affected spots giving a sunken appearance in comparison with the surrounding healthy turf. Brown patch is sometimes found only in a single lawn. In other cases, every lawn in a particular neighborhood will be affected.

Horne says that stolons or runners of St. Augustine grass are not usually killed but leaves turn brown and can be easily stripped from the runners. When the fungus has run its course, green sprigs reappear in the center of the affected spots. These spots sometimes become covered again by the end of the growing season.

The disease is more easily controlled if fungicides are applied either before the disease occurrence or shortly after symptoms are noticed.

With thorough application, chemical control has proved quite satisfactory. Combinations of fungicides containing PCNB, sold locally under the

trade name of Terraclor, are usually the most effective. Liquid applications give quicker control than granular formulations, according to Horne. It is a good idea to treat the entire yard even though only a small area is infected because of the unpredictability of the spread of the disease. If a lawn has a brown patch history, it is wise to apply a preventative spray, says the pathologist.

Horne concludes by saying that for most effective control, spray the material prior to symptom appearance or shortly after the damage is observed. For further information on the problem, he suggests a visit with the local agricultural agent.

**Quail Boom Brings
Tip to Hunters**

Eight South Texas counties have produced bumper crops of quail this year, according to T. D. Moore, regional wildlife supervisor for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. They are Medina, Uvalde, Frio, Zavala, Dimmit, Live Oak, Jim Wells and Aransas.

"Although all of South Texas has a better-than-average quail population at the present time," Moore said, "these eight counties have tremendous increases. Some areas have almost 300 percent more quail than last year."

All eight counties are under regulatory responsibility of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission so the season will open Nov. 13, 1965, and continue through Jan. 31, 1966.

Moore explained that loss of at least 75 percent of these birds could be expected by next spring. If they are not killed by the hunters, they will be lost to natural causes, he said, adding: "Especially after the first freezing weather, we can expect the numbers to decline rapidly due to such things as breakdown of cover, lack of food, exposure and predators."

Moore urged hunters to hunt heavily, as many trips as possible, early in the season in order to harvest as many birds as possible before they are lost.

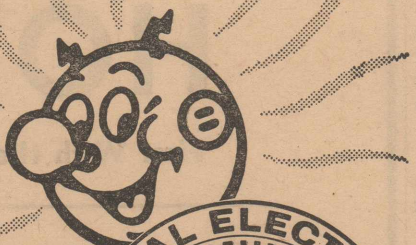
