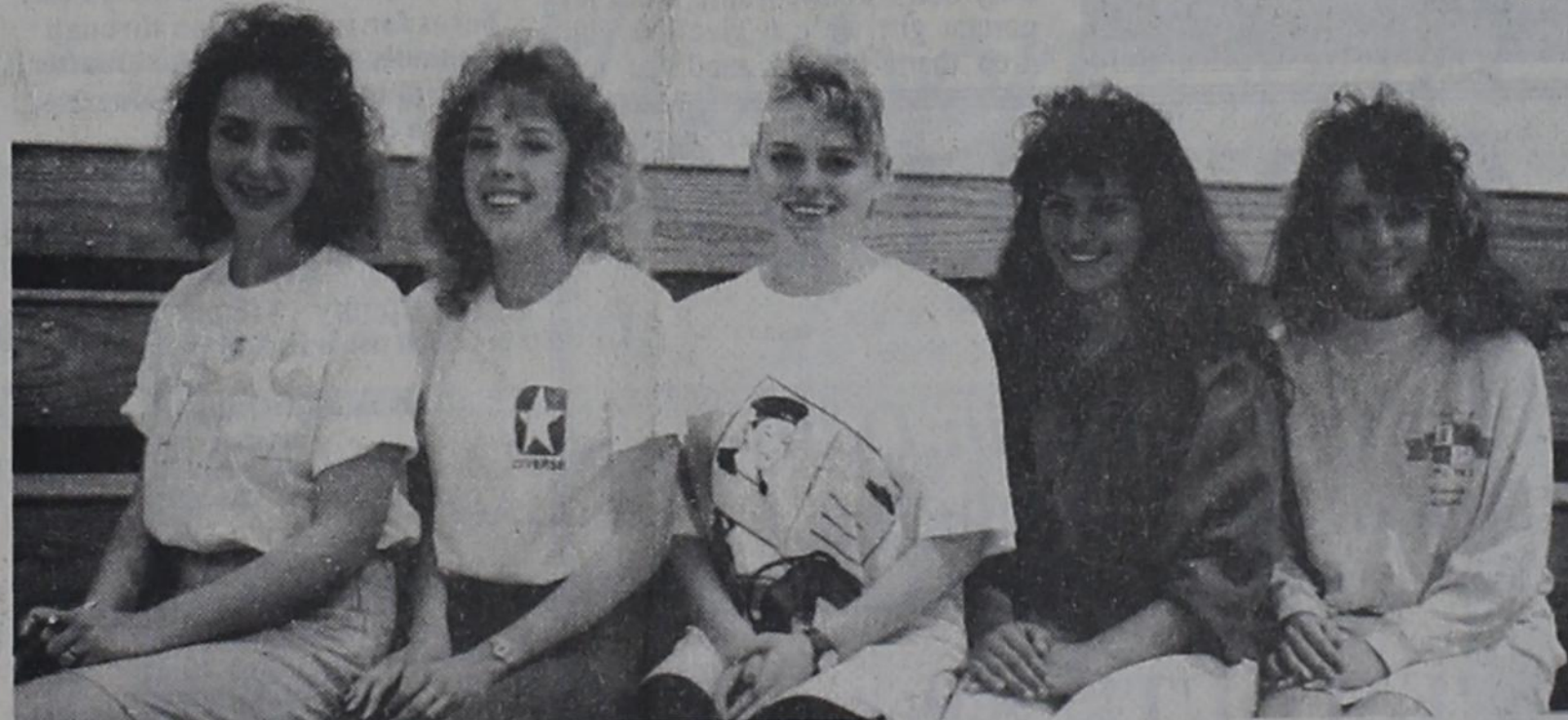

Burglar Has Busy Night, Eight Businesses Hit

Tuesday, March 28, was a busy night for a burglar who was responsible for break-ins at six Post businesses and two offices, which netted him about \$250 for a night's work, according to Garza County Sheriff Freddy Cockrell.

Wallace Lumber Company, the Energas office, Video Depot, Dr. Harry Tubbs' office, LaPosta, Windham Butane, Cash and Carry Farm and Ranch Store and Jackson's Cafe were all entered Tuesday night or early Wednesday morning, by someone using a bar to pry open back doors.

The robberies were committed by one person, Sheriff Cockrell said, because the same set of tennis shoe tracks - and only one set - were found leading to the entrances where break-ins occurred.

Only paper money was taken in the robberies. No merchandise, loose change or other items were missing - with the exception of two rolls of half-dollars taken from one of the offices.

No arrests have been made, but investigations into the burglaries are still being made by Deputy J.W. Jolly.

Post Man Killed in Collision on U.S. 380

Preston Lawrence of Post was killed Friday afternoon, March 31, in a car-motorcycle accident on the Clairemont Highway, U.S. 380, according to information received from Garza County Sheriff Freddy Cockrell.

Cockrell said Lawrence, 34, was traveling east on Highway 380, just inside the Post city limits, when his motorcycle collided with an eastbound automobile driven by Helen Ratliff, of Hamlin, who was attempting to make a U-turn.

Justice of the Peace Shelia Melton pronounced Lawrence dead

at the scene of the accident. Ratliff was taken to Garza Memorial Hospital where she was treated and released.

A traffic charge was filed against Ratliff and she was issued a ticket for "failure to yield right-of-way."

Reports indicate Lawrence was not wearing a safety helmet, but Ratliff was wearing a seat belt at the time of the accident.

Investigating officers were Sheriff Cockrell, Deputy Ron Jenkins and DPS Trooper Joe Salinas.

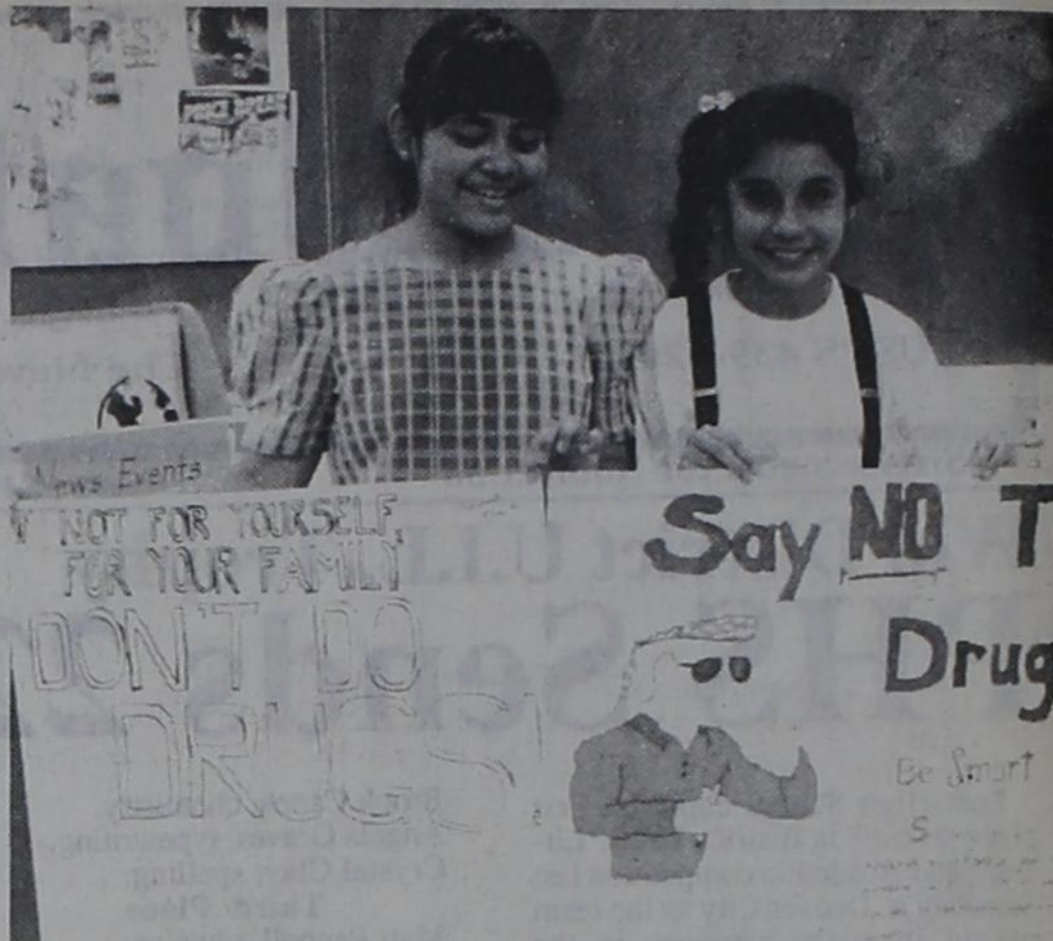
Burial was in Terrace Cemetery under the direction of Justice-Mason Funeral Home.

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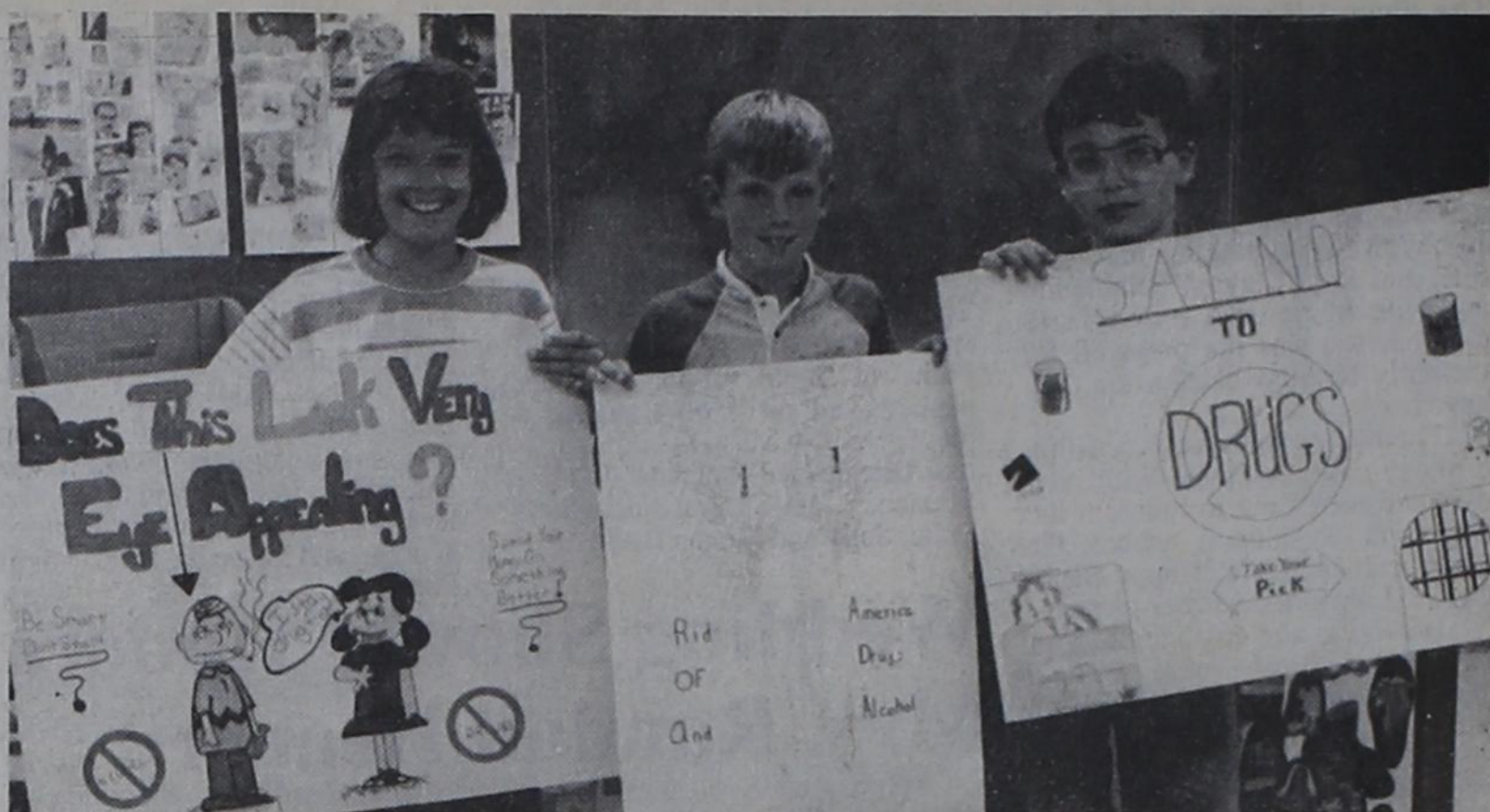

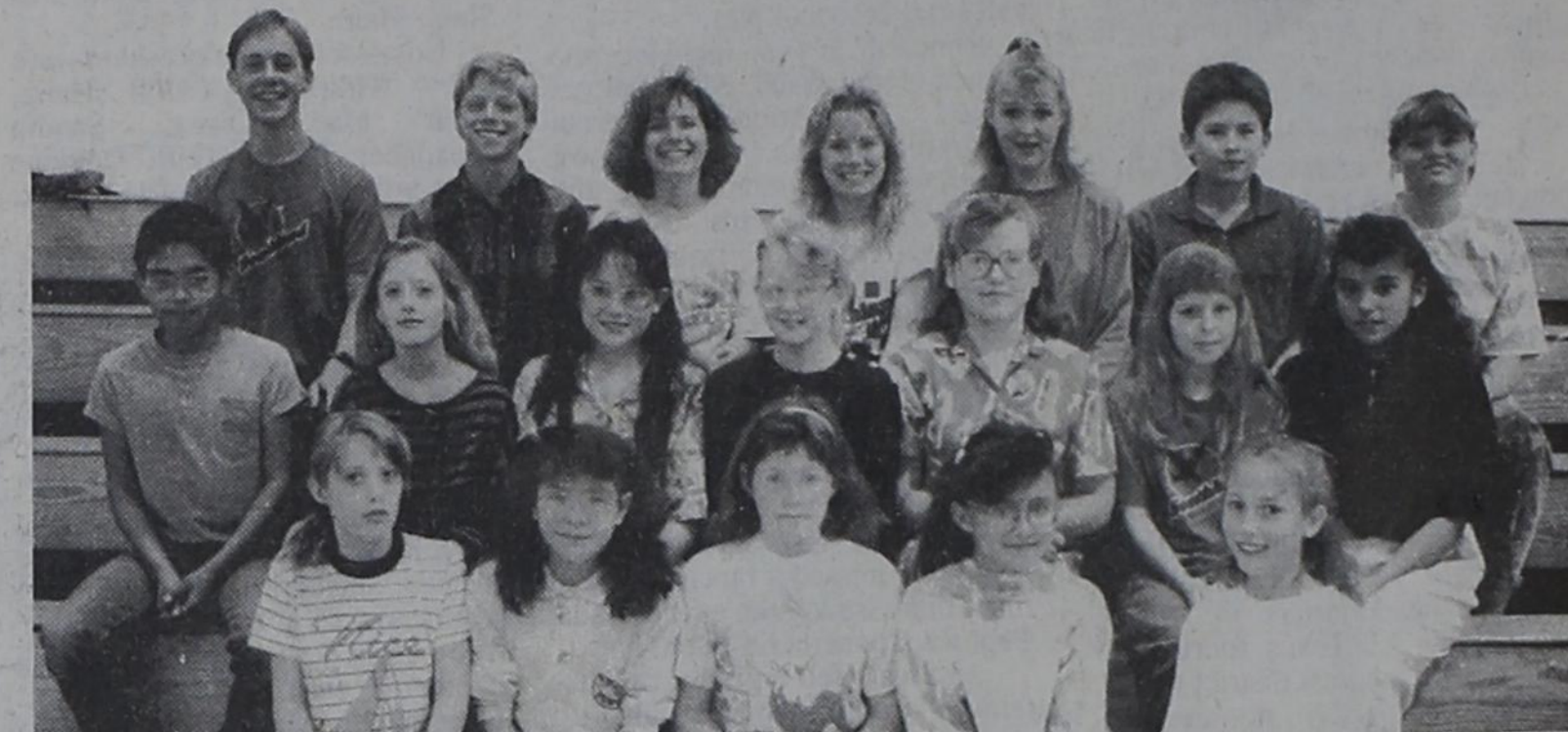
