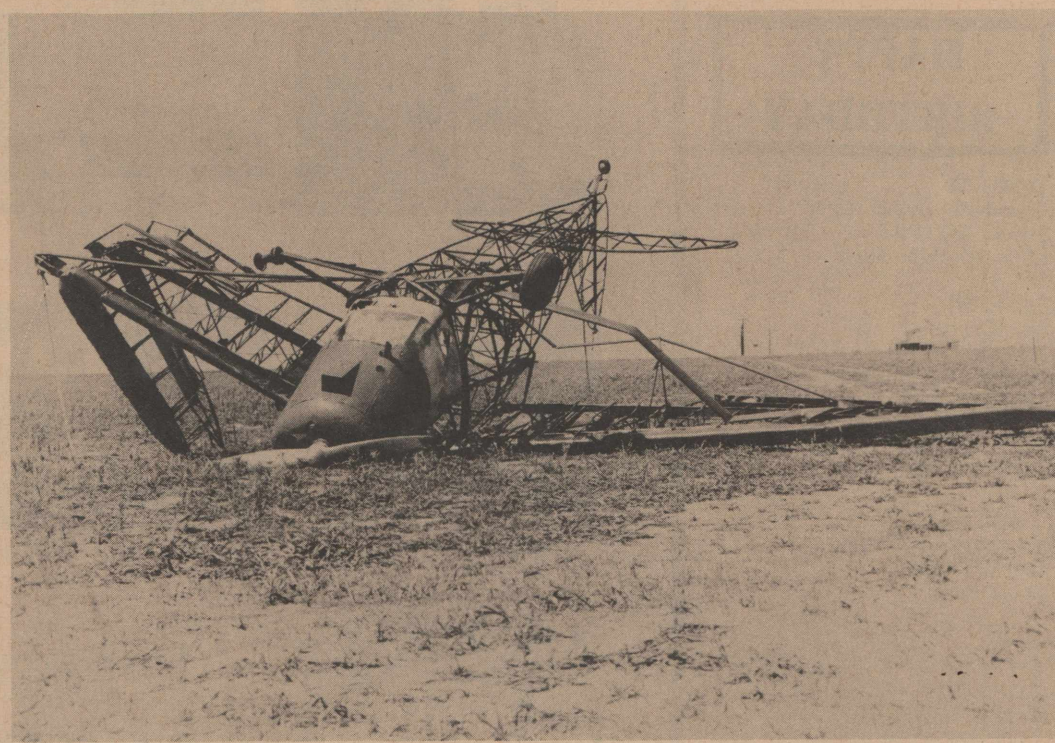
When Hall roused up Saturday morning to fly back to his Idaho Falls home, he discovered he had a wrecked plane.

He removed the radio and made plans to put the wings in J. T. Tollett's barn. Afterward Williams took Hall to Lubbock to catch a more durable aircraft.

What Hall doesn't know is that his piper cruiser has burned. It happened sometime Saturday night or Sunday morning.

Tollett said, "It's going to be quite a blow when we tell him." Williams added, "No one knows how the fire started, but the strong wind Sunday night could have caused the battery to short out."

Someone suggested lightning might have struck it. Most doubted that it was set fire. There was no insurance on the plane.

Gasoline was dripping from the overturned vehicle and its occupants were afraid it would catch fire.

Several wrecks have occurred along the back street, two at the same intersection.

Philip Bley, who saw the accident, said, "The younger woman in the car was screaming that it was going to catch fire. The ignition is still on."

## State Misses On Estimate

The city of Olton Monday was out \$500 it didn't reckon on. That figure was the difference between estimated costs of curb and gutter work on a paving project and what the charge will actually be.

The project includes five blocks along Main Street from Ninth to 14th.

Councilmen were notified early this week by the Texas Highway Department that the contract price for the work would be \$7,200.

An earlier estimate by engineers pegged the figure at \$6,700.

At the special meeting, councilmen debated only a few minutes before deciding that the city would absorb the unforeseen costs rather than property owners.

Persons owning frontage joining Main Street, had already been given a cost figure of \$1,75 a running foot.

"It would have been embarrassing," said Mayor W. E. (Bill) Thomas, "to tell them the rate had been raised."

If persons from Ninth to 14th Street along Main had been assessed the extra \$500 their footage rate would have mounted to \$1.85.

Councilman Bob Gullett made the motion that a warrant in the amount of \$500 be sent to the State Highway Department for the curb and gutter work.

Dr. Basil Johns seconded the motion and added, "It may help us more than it will hurt us. We might go back to find some of the property owners wouldn't pay there."

Several land owners along the stretch to be paved and curbed had signed Mechanic and Materialman's liens in expression of their intent to help pay costs.

The property owners have promised to pay one-third of the costs upon completion and the remainder in two annual installments.

Mayor Thomas said in the course of discussion, "these heavy rains have showed us how badly we need curb and gutters."

The decision to pay the unanticipated fee was unanimous. Also discussed in the meeting was the condition of several Olton streets.

The Highway Department has not released the date curb and gutter construction will begin.

# Weather Raps Again At Crops

It was more of the same Sunday night as far as the weather and crops were concerned.

They were battered with hail in the south and southwest, pillaged by wind and plundered by sand.

Olton got .3 inch of rain and only occasional hail.

Archie Sorley got hailed out again. He'll plant soy beans and "build up his land".

His wife said, "we had serious crop damage by the hail and high winds, only a little of the cotton was left."

Sorley planted most of his cotton over four times before making the switch to soy beans.

Ed Burrus is also planting soy beans. "The hail," he said, "got the excess of our cotton and there wasn't much left to get."

He added, "There's a bad strip through here that catches it almost every week." Burrus lives two miles south and two west of Olton.

Elmer McGill has hit the soy bean trail. "A drowning man will grab for a stray," McGill said. The farmer also has planted pinto beans and potatoes.

He had an inch and a half of rain besides being hailed out.

McGill, who farms one place three miles south and two and a half west, said, "I've lost 360 acres of cotton on the other place."

A. J. Spain, who farms three miles west and 1/2 north, said he was planting his cotton over after the hail there Sunday night.

"It also shredded my feed, but I believe it's going to come out of it alright," added the farmer.

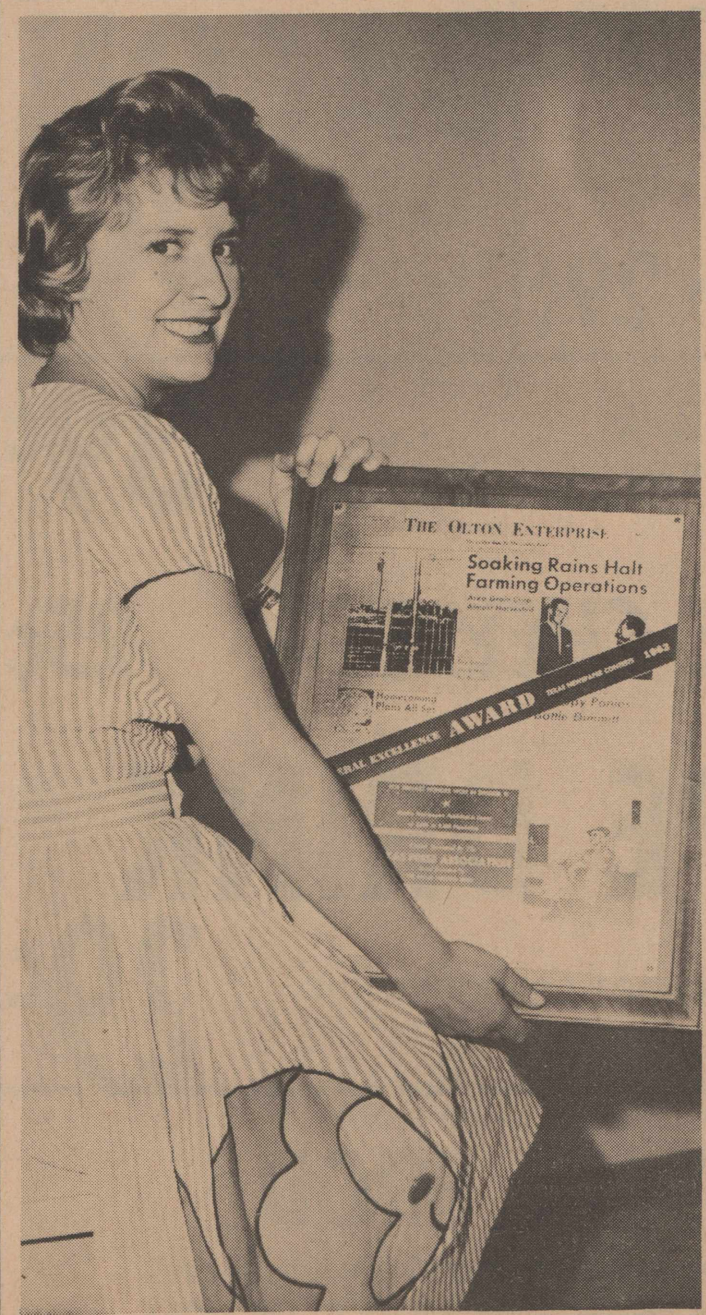
He told that R. J. Sanderson, near him, was planting his cotton over Wednesday.

Raymond Lewis had about .90 inch of rain, accompanied by hail. "I've planted 300 acres over twice now and am replanting maize," he said.

He said, "I had a lot of wind and water damage prior to the hail."

Herman Rose lost about 40 acres to the hail storm Sunday. "It could have been worse," he said.

Farmers to the north of Olton continued to have good luck. Even though their cotton is small and ragged looking, its beginning to leaf out more.

## Enterprise Gets State Recognition

The Olton Enterprise was awarded the highest honors at the 84th annual convention of the Texas Press Association Saturday in Fort Worth.

The newspaper copped the coveted "General Excellence" plaque in Division VI, weekly newspapers published in towns of 2001 to 3500 population.

Mr. and Mrs. Bill Turner, publishers of the Enterprise, were on hand to accept the award, along with three others.

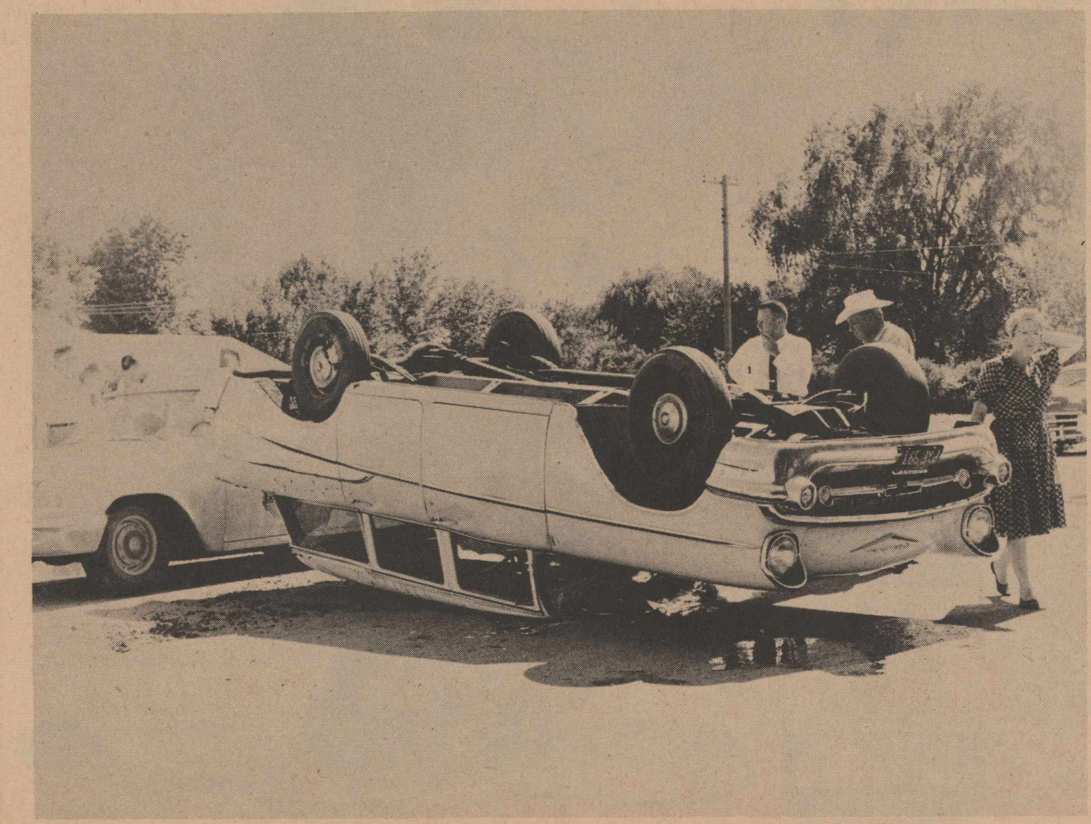
The paper also received plaques for first place in news writing and news pictures, along with a third place certificate in appearance.

The Canadian Record ranked second in the overall judging, in Division VI, with the Hamilton News-Herald placing third.

Winners in other population divisions were the Mansfield News-Mirror (under 2,000); the Lewisville Leader (3500-6,000); The Amarillo Citizen (weeklies in towns over 6,000); The Kermit, Winkler County News (semi-weekly newspapers); the Nacogdoches Daily Sentinel (daily in towns under 15,000); and the Longview News-Journal (daily in towns over 15,000).

It marked the second time for the Olton newspaper to win the top state award, after a near-miss in 1962. The Enterprise won the general excellence state award in 1958, with Troy Martin as publisher.

In 1962, the paper lacked only five points in the state judging as it placed second.

## Postal ZIP Code Is 79064 For Area

Soon Olton residents will be employing the new ZIP code, the Post Office Department's revolutionary system of improved mail dispatch and delivery.

Postmaster I. B. Holt announced this week that the process would go into effect nationally July 1.

Holt further stressed the importance of all Olton residents learning the city's ZIP Code and using it in their return address on all correspondence.

The five-digit code for this area is 79064.

Everyone in Olton and the U.S. will use designated code numbers to speed and reduce the chance of mis-sent mail.

In answering mail, Holt said, ZIP Codes taken from return addresses on incoming mail should be used.

"The ZIP Code is literally the last word in mailing addressing," Holt said. The code should follow the city and state in addresses.

Example of proper use is: Postmaster I. B. Holt, U. S. Post Office, Olton, Texas, 79064.

The new process for the first time will permit the Post Office Department to short-cut repeated address reading.

Holt said, "The address on mail must often be read as many as eight or ten times by postal employees to get it to the proper destination."

With ZIP Code, a clerk needs only to glance at the code to know immediately to what national area, state and post office a letter is designated.

Holt said that when ZIP Code is in full swing, the United States will have "the most modern system of mail distribution and delivery in existence."
