## Budget Approved For Loraine ISD

Public hearings on the proposed school budget for Loraine Independent School District for the 1974-75 school year were held Monday in Loraine high school cafeteria.

Board members approved \$344,143 in expenditures broken down into these items:

-- Payroll costs, \$242,008.

-- Purchased and contracted services, \$31,750.

-- Supplies and Materials, \$29,850.

-- Other Operating Expenses, \$11,900.

-- Debt Service, \$15,435.

-- Capital Outlay, \$13,200.

Revenue from local sources amounts to \$102,194 from local maintenance and debt service tax, \$400 tuition from patrons, \$2,000 from enterprise funds and \$2,600 from intermediate sources, a total of \$107,194 from local sources.

Revenue from state sources amounts to \$174,064 from per Capita and foundation funds,

\$11,942 for transportation, \$2,075 for vocational, \$44,421 from the Elementary and Secondary Education Act and \$1,200 from other state revenue sources, a total of \$233,702 from state sources.

The district has an assessed valuation of \$7,171,650 from a total tax rate of \$1.50 with \$1.30 going to the maintenance fund and 20 cents going into the sinking fund for debt retirement.

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# Doctors Like Pocket Pager

Some of the Colorado City doctors who are on call duty at Root Memorial Hospital and using the new pocket pagers to alert them to an emergency situation are so pleased with the "beepers" that they have had administrator Charles Root order pagers to use in their own private practices.

The "beepers" are the same kind used by ambulance personnel for alert when an ambulance is needed.

Root explained that they are effective up to a 20-mile radius and doctors can reach the hospital when called in under fifteen minutes.

Doctors take rotation of a week's duration and carry the pagers at all times when it is their duty week. They are on call 24 hours a day for seven days a week, but since there are times when they are not needed, the paging system allows them to do things they want to do.

When alerted by the loud "beep," the doctor then calls the hospital to find out where to go for treatment of a patient.

The thing that makes doctors like the new system is

the freedom it allows them, said Root.

"Instead of having to stay near a phone as in the past, they can go home and even go fishing if they want to, when they carry the pagers," Root said.

The pocket pagers have been in use here in the city for about four or five weeks, Root said.

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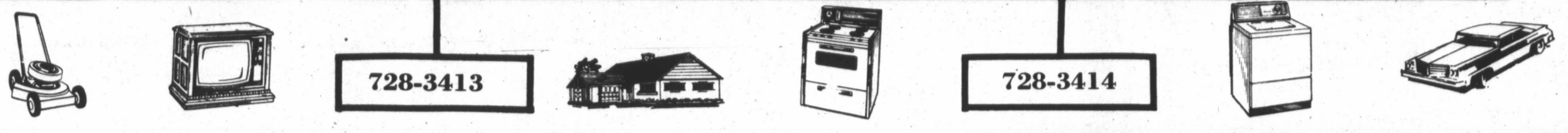
