Cotton Meeting Is Set

A program to aid farmers in the use of defoliant and desiccant and latest information on methods and machinery in cotton harvesting is scheduled Thursday at 7:30 p.m. in the Medallion Room at Lone Wolf Co-op.

The program is sponsored by the County Extension Service under direction of County Agent Buddy C. Logsdon.

Two outstanding speakers familiar to farmers in the county are to present the program.

The two are: Fred Elliott, cotton specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service at College Station, who will speak on the latest information on harvest aid chemicals.

Beverly Reeves, cotton ginning and mechanization specialist, who is to present latest information on harvesting information and equipment.

Logsdon urged all cotton producers and farmers to attend the Thursday night session on the use of defoliant and desiccant to prepare cotton for machine harvesting.

Dr. Irvin is a native of Zanesville, Ohio who is a former educator teaching at Oberlin, Allegheny College and at Ohio State and Michigan State Universities.

During that period he began his speaking career and for the past ten years has been a full time lecturer and consultant in sales training and promotional activities.

He was a staff speaker for General Motors for 13 years and his wide and varied experience in addressing all types

of meetings and groups. Quarter Century Club members, seven of whom are retired, will be guests of honor at a special table in front of the speaker's platform.

Each will wear the traditional gold and maroon ribbon signifying membership in the club.

Employees and guests from Colorado City, Snyder and Sweetwater will be on hand for the dinner that is one of six held in each division of Texas Electric annually.

Carson Gets Prison Term

Probation of Kenneth X. Carson, 24, was revoked Friday in 32nd District Court at Colorado City and he was sentenced to five years in the state penitentiary at Huntsville.

Carson was convicted of failure to stop and render aid in the 1962 death of a 13-year-old Colorado City boy who was struck and killed while riding a bicycle.

On Sept. 7 Carson was convicted of driving while intoxicated in Nolan County Court at Sweetwater and action was begun to seek revocation of his probation.

District Attorney Weldon Kirk of Sweetwater represented the state Friday. Court-appointed attorney for Carson was Perry Barber of Colorado City.

Monahans Hits Wolves By 16-0

Colorado City's Wolves dropped their third tilt of the season on to a hard driving group of Monahans Lobos 16-0 Friday night in Monahans.

Monahans pushed in for 13 points during the second quarter and added a fourth period field goal while holding the Wolf Pack scoreless.

Deepest penetration of the game for the Wolves was to the Lobo's 22-yard line.

The Wolves managed only 75 yards rushing while the Lobos rolled up over 300.

Passing was again a bright spot for the local "11" despite a poor completion percentage. All told the Wolves hit three out of 12 for 88 yards. Donnie Higginbotham and Artie Butler were prime targets for the Wolf aeriels.

Committee Sends Over 100 Letters

Colorado City Chamber of Commerce has sent letters to all downtown employees and employers urging them to seek parking space outside the areas in front of businesses.

The letter to downtown personnel came in the wake of Monday night's action by the City Council to ban the use of parking meters on a 90-day trial basis beginning Oct. 1.

Merchants Committee of the Chamber was the driving force behind the effort to get the City to dispense with the use of meters on a trial basis.

The committee felt that the parking meters were a detriment to the operations of downtown businesses.

Leaving prime parking spots open for customers gives added convenience to shoppers and potential buyers.

Over 100 of the letters were distributed late in the week by the Chamber of Commerce staff under direction of the merchants committee.

Key to success of the non-use of meters is whether or not employees and employers add the effort by finding off-street parking that is not in front of business places.

The letter urged downtown workers not to park in a spot where a meter had been in order to accelerate business and make customer shopping more convenient.

Beginning Oct. 1, all parking spaces will be free and parking tickets will not be issued.

Work to remove the heads from all parking meters will be completed by city employees before the Oct. 1 beginning of the 90-day trial program.

The city will face a loss in revenue from discontinuance of the meters.

The meters have, however, been a declining source of revenue to the city in recent years according to city records.

In the last fiscal year the meters yielded \$3,559.98 to city coffers. This is less than half the collections for 1960-61 when a total of \$8,236.90 was taken by the city.

First five months of the current fiscal year the money taken in has been \$1,402.80.

Other recent years revenue includes: 1961-62, \$7,657.22; 1962-63, \$6,332.62; 1963-64, \$5,271.29.

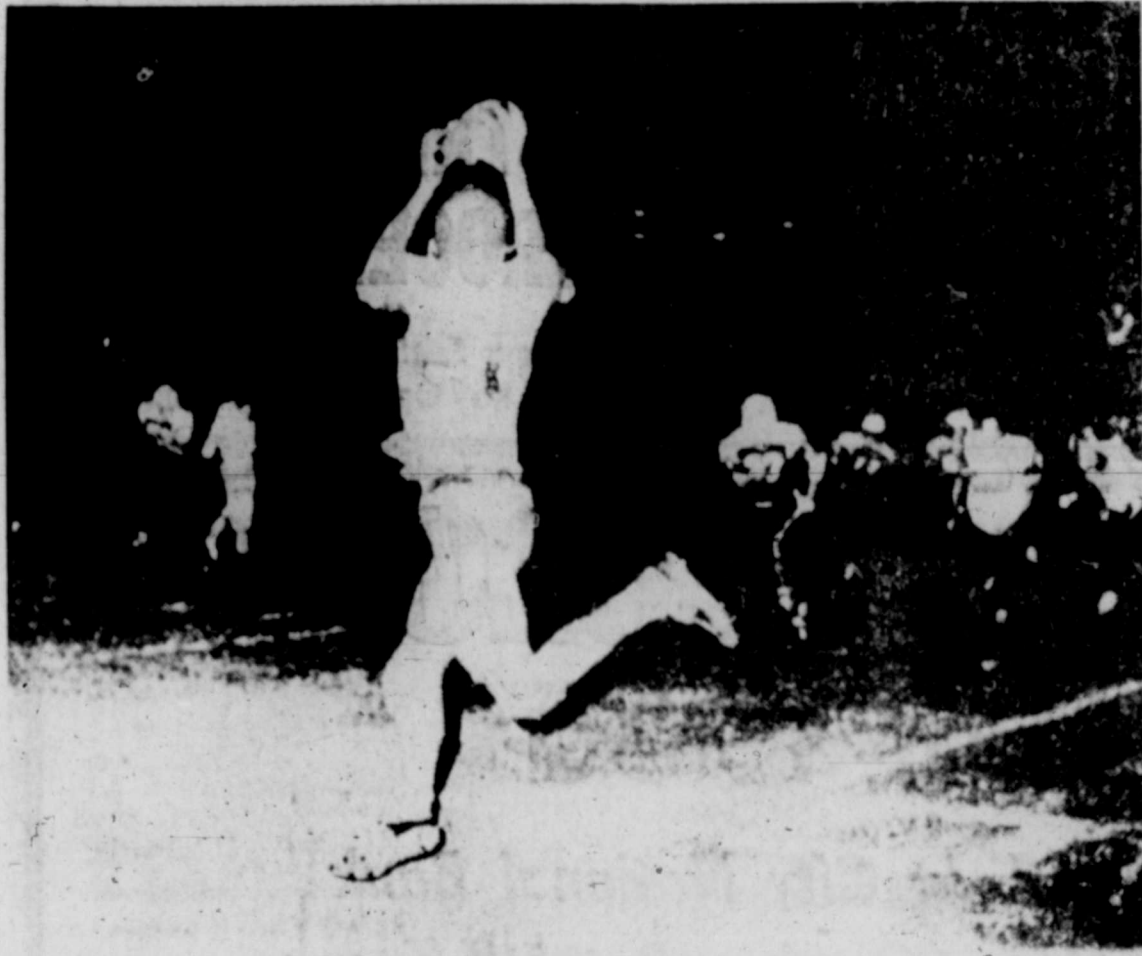
