Robert E. Bailey, Deport Native Is Killed In Wreck

Robert Edward Bailey, 31, of Gruver, formerly of Deport, died Friday night from injuries received when his car collided with an oil field truck 17 miles southwest of Gruver. It was reported the accident occurred during a blinding rainstorm, about 8:30 p. m.

Bailey, alone at the time of the collision, was reported to have been returning to his Gruver home from Amarillo and was dead on arrival at the Hansford County Hospital at Spearman.

Surviving are his wife, Kathy and three children, Barry of Gruver, Tina and Stan Bailey of Port Neches by a previous marriage, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Marshall Bailey of Deport, two brothers, Boyd Bailey of Dumas and Pat Bailey in the Air Force, stationed at Fontana, Calif., and his grandfather, C. C. Newsome of Deport.

A funeral service was held in the First Methodist Church in Gruver at 2:30 p. m. Monday, conducted by Rev. R. L. Kirk Jr., and the body was brought to Grant Funeral Home in Deport, with a graveside service set for 6 p. m. Tuesday in Highland Cemetery at Deport. Rev. James Barnes, Baptist minister, officiated at the Deport rites.

Pallbearers were Gus Nobles, George Grant, Kenneth Burks, Jim Westbrook, Gordon Isbell and Gaylon McGill.

Son of Marshall B. and Linnie (Newsome) Bailey, he was born Feb. 13, 1933 at Deport, and graduated from Deport High school in 1951. He attended PJC one year then joined the U. S. Army and served in Korea. Following his discharge in 1955, he returned to PJC and later transferred to West Texas State University at Canyon. He married Kathy Chancellor of Amarillo on Dec. 13, 1959.

Bailey was publisher of the Gruver Independent, and had published weekly newspapers in the Texas Panhandle for several years. He began the Gruver paper in 1962 and prior to that time owned newspapers in Channing and Vega.

Bailey began his newspaper career while a student in Deport High School, working before and after school and on Saturdays in The Deport Times office. For six years he was on the sports staff of the Amarillo Globe-News and for a time had a pregame radio show at Amarillo.

He and his brother, Boyd, had established a new seven-county paper, The North Plains Farmer, and the first issue was slated for publication last week.

Drill Oil Test Well Near Fulbright

J. A. Maberry, Byers, connected the pump Sunday to establish oil production on the Sammy Williams No. 1 oil test. Gibson Drilling Co. of Wichita Falls sank the hole to approximately 2300 ft. for a reported discovery of oil.

Location for the test is three miles east of Fulbright, 330 from southwest and 234 from east lines of James Graham survey, A-362. Drilling permit called for a 2,500 ft. Paluxy test.

Hunting-Fishing New Licenses Sept. 1

The new hunting and fishing licenses required for the state fiscal year beginning Sept. 1, are on sale, it was announced by J. Weldon Watson, executive director for the Parks and Wildlife Department.

All persons 17 years and under and 65 and over are exempt from the regular hunting and fishing licenses but they need to get a regular exempt license if they hunt deer or turkey. Hunting licenses cost \$31.15 and fishing licenses cost \$2.15.

The only new provision in the licenses is that persons obtaining exempt licenses for hunting deer or turkey on their own land where they actually reside must present an affidavit along with their application. "In other words," said Watson, "just the mere verbal statement that they will hunt on their own land of residence is no longer adequate."

Watson cautioned sportsmen that their old licenses are not valid after August 31 "under any circumstances."

Let Contract For Blossom P. O.

Modernization of the post office quarters in Blossom was further advanced with the announcement by Postmaster Gen. John A. Gronouski that a contract has been awarded to Blossom Lodge No. 303 AF&AM to remodel and lease the building to the Post Office Department for five years with an option to renew the lease for an additional five years.

Mr. Gronouski explained that the post office building will be air conditioned and will remain under private ownership, with the owner paying local real estate taxes—the Department's capital investment is limited substantially to postal equipment.

PJC Registration Set Sept. 8th-9th For Fall Term

Paris Junior College will open its doors for the 41st year in September. Registration is set for Tuesday and Wednesday, Sept. 8-9.

Sept. 8 is the date for students who have already attended Paris Junior College or some other college. Students who will be freshmen will register on Sept. 9. All classes will begin on Thursday, Sept. 10.

Registrar Burton Mason states that each person should have his social security card with him when he comes to register. Boys should have their selective service number with them when they register, along with their social security number.

Scholastic credits at JPC are accepted in any college or university in the United States. The college is a member in good standing of the Texas Education Agency, the Texas Association of Colleges and Universities, and the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the highest affiliation possible for a junior college.

A new Student Union Building has been constructed on the PJC campus. Enlargement and improvements have been added to various other departments of the college.

Austin. — All available money and manpower of the Texas Water Commission is being dedicated to a long-range state water master plan.

Gov. John Connally authorized the agency to transfer money already appropriated by the Legislature for other purposes. Existing state plans, in Connally's opinion, "fall short of satisfying the water needs for all of Texas."

In 1961, the Commission produced a plan for meeting Texas water needs to the year 1980.

Both the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation and the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, are coming up with their own long-range plans covering parts of Texas. They propose diversion of water from surplus areas like the Sabine to water-shy areas like the Nueces.

Connally said the federal government is considering a water pollution control bill which would supplant state authority in the field.

He urged the Commission to explore "all reasonable alternatives," including those contained in preliminary reports of U. S. Agencies.

The governor indicated he will authorize other state agencies to cooperate in the crash program. He also pledged his help in any way possible and to recommend to the Legislature "necessary funds to fulfill this important responsibility."

STIFF GUN LAW URGED — Pressure from prosecuting attorneys is beginning to sift through to legislative candidates who are being urged to pass a gun registration law during the 1965 session in an attempt to reduce the crime rate and help police solve crimes.

Latest of the recommendations along this line comes from Dallas District Attorney Henry Wade. Gun registration is on the list of the most-controversial issues a legislature can tackle and proposals on the subject frequently are skirted.

TEXTBOOK PROTESTS PILE UP — About 500 individual letters and 39 petitions bearing some 3,398 signatures concerning three high school biology

books have been received by Governor Connally, Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar, and the State Board of Education.

And more are arriving every day.

Most protestors claim three of the eight biology books being considered for public school adoption by the State Textbooks Committee have "an excessive amount of evolution in them."

All letters and petitions are being filed for the State Textbooks Committee to review, since Connally, Edgar and the State Board have no say on textbooks selection.

The 15-member committee has the task of picking five books each in 18 subjects from the 226 books under consideration. Public then will have an opportunity to make formal complaints about the biology texts, as well as any others which are considered "objectionable," before the committee's selection list is submitted to individual school districts.

SALES TAX RAISE SUGGESTED — A Texas State Teachers Association spokesman last week suggested the Legislature raise additional funds for education through increasing the sales tax rate or removing present exemptions.

L. P. Sturgeon, TSTA public relations director, said a half cent increase would raise \$50,000,000 a year and an across-the-boards amendment another \$61,000,000. TSTA is driving for a \$45 a month increase in teachers' pay.

If Texans paid the same amount of taxes as citizens of neighboring states, argued Sturgeon, Texas would have enough money for public school and higher education improvements.

NEW RANGER NAMED — Toliver H. Dawson of Del Rio was named a Texas Ranger by Department of Public Safety Director Homer Garrison Jr.

Dawson, who first served as a highway patrolman at Alpine, will be stationed in the Carrizo Springs area. He succeeds the late Wiley Williamson of Gonzales on the 62-man force.

HUNTING 'ON THE CUFF' — Almost one out of every three

Texans hunt "on the cuff," or without having to buy a license, according to J. Weldon Watson, executive director for the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Watson said that last year 230,000 of the 740,000 Texans licensed to hunt secured exempt licenses without cost to them. Others paid the usual \$3.15.

On the exempt list are persons age 65 and older; those under 17; and those who can show they are hunting on their own land and live on that same property.

Watson said 2,350,000 licenses for hunting, fishing and commercial fishing uses now are available from 2,800 official deputies of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

AIRPORT FUNDS — Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr advised the Texas Aeronautics Commission's director, Frank W. Raymond Jr., that the Legislature could amend the State law to authorize the State to appropriate funds to incorporate cities for construction of airports and navigational facilities without violating the constitution.

Commission is expected to seek a legislative sponsor for this type of bill.

SHORT SNORTS

Governor Connally reports that 531 Historical Markers will be erected along State highways during the next 30 months.

State General Revenue fund was \$22,500,000 on the black side of the ledger at the end of July, reports State Treasurer Jesse James.

Governor Connally proclaimed Sept. 13-19 as "Women Voters Week."

H. D. Stewart Jr. of Big Spring and Ed Tobola of Houston were appointed to the State Board of Barber examiners by Governor Connally.

Texas Highway Department reports that 9,161 persons visited the new Capitol Tourist Information Center during its first month of operation.

Texas Health Department sees possibility of local outbreaks of influenza this winter, although no major epidemic, and advises immunization.

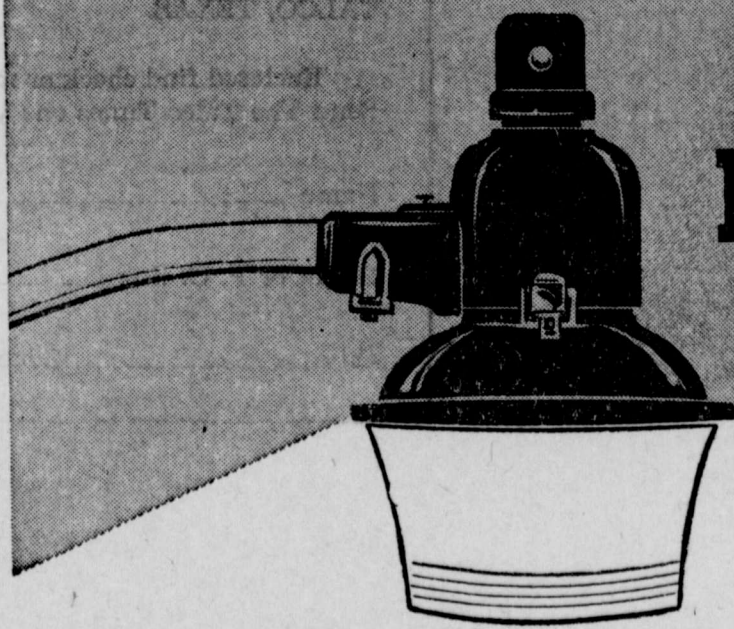
