A Thursday night session (tonight) with their bonding agent is expected to give the Littlefield city council a course of action on the major question of how and when to enlarge the city's water supply.

The bonding session will be a part of the regular council meeting Thursday night.

The council has asked a number of questions of its bonding agent that can govern to what extent a water program is asked for the city, in a bond election that very possibly may come be-

fore January 1. Foremost, probably, is whether the city can favorably issue and sell bonds in the amount of \$1,000,000--the cost of going to the sandhills 13 miles north of town for a long range water supply?

The million dollar figure would cover an estimated \$900,000 in water improvements, perhaps another \$100,000 in other needed city work.

Second, the city council has asked if revenue bonds can be issued against the water depart-

ment, in an amount large enough to cover a \$1-million new bond debt.

If not, can the bonds be issued in a combination of revenue and general taxing obligations? And which bonding arrangements will off their most advantageous interest rates?

Should the bonding report recommend a figure markedly lower than \$1-million, the council may face the job of revising its water planning towards a short-range system until such time as the city can afford the

long-range water program.

The long-range program would mean 7,360 acres it owns in the sandhills for a supply that its engineer says will have "a minimum life of 50 years".

As in most family or private business matters, the matter of financing is important to the city's water future.

The council has not indicated any firm direction on a water supply, other than the recommendation of their water engineer, Bill McMorris of Amarillo, that a system to the sand-

hills be installed immediately, if it fits the bonding picture. A citizens meeting a week ago, however, was emphatic in endorsing the long-range program to the council.

The City of Littlefield is in comparatively good debt position, for a town its size, with bonded obligations of about \$400,000 at the start of its new fiscal year October 1.

In recent years a higher figure has been feasible; one bond

issue for \$1,350 was voted down in 1956. This one included the refunding of existing city bonds, as a new issue probably would also require.

In this situation, the city might have a \$1,400,000 bond issue vote, with \$400,000 earmarked to retire present bonds. A new long-range payout schedule would be set up on the entire debt, in much the same way that private persons may jump their several debts into an over-all financing program.

TO CALL FOR BIDS SOON

Trustees Check School Plans

A few minor changes in the plans for a new high school building were approved during a regular meeting of the Littlefield School Board Monday night, and trustees set a special meeting Oct. 21 to call for bids on the project.

Trustees also approved a motion to put the Dunbar school property up for sale after failing to negotiate with the city on the property.

In other action the board approved a low bid on motor oil and accepted a high bid for three school bus chassis.

Trustees gave the school plans a thorough going over, coming up with minor alterations. One change was to eliminate a paint room in the new auto mechanics shop. Discussions and study with other schools indicated that a paint shop was not feasible unless a separate course was incorporated into the curriculum.

Some trustees were to view auditorium seats on display Tuesday at the school. Two classrooms at the rear of the auditorium will be utilized for auditorium seating when needed. Sliding doors will separate the rooms from the auditorium.

The school architect was on hand to discuss the plans with the board. He explained features of the construction planned and answered questions from the trustees.

The decision to put the Dunbar school property up for sale followed a proposition from the

city to purchase the lots or maintain as a city park. Trustees rejected the city's offer of \$200 as "much too low", and disapproved a park proposal.

The city requested a two-year guaranteed use of the property and a 18-month notice before turning it back to the school.

After a short discussion, trustees authorized school tax assessor-collector Sid Hopping to sell the lots at a fair market value, with at least 25 percent down on a contract basis and the abstract to be provided on full payment.

The board studied bids from five oil companies before accepting the low bid from Continental Oil of 63 cents a gallon for 55-gallon drums. Two trustees favored another brand at a higher price, but the low bid was awarded on a 5-2 vote.

Other bids were from: Mobil .72, Texaco \$1.17, Phillips .75, Gulf \$1.

Two bids were submitted for three school bus chassis. Sinclair Motor of Lubbock submitted the high bid of \$251 for each chassis.

Trustees also confirmed the continued use of Cornell and Co. of Amarillo as school auditors. The company has been retained for a number of years. A financial statement and minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

Ware Named As Director

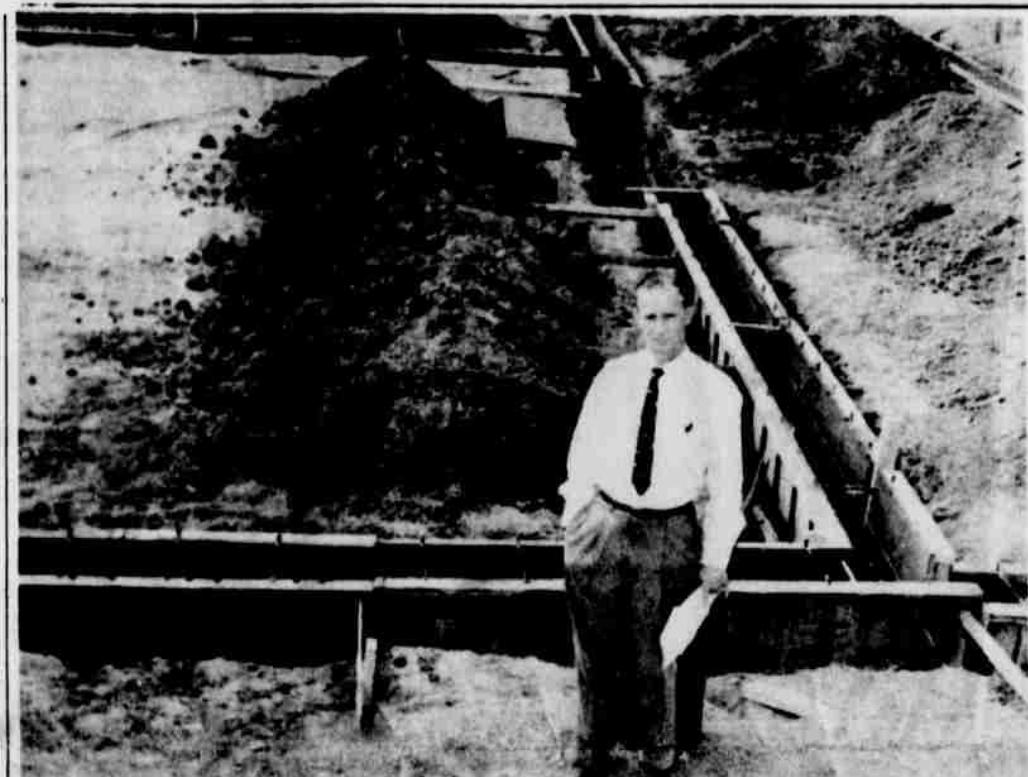
Kenneth Ware, Littlefield, has been named to the board of directors for Littlefield Federal Savings and Loan Association, announces Floyd Coffman, association president.

WHITHARRAL SCHOOL ADDITIONS \$110,000 Project Launched

Marks of construction dominance the Whitharral school campus today, with a \$110,000 construction program underway that will add a new school cafeteria, vocational agriculture building and enlarge the school dressing room facilities.

All parts of the program are underway, under a \$110,000 contract let recently to Hammock Brothers of Lubbock. Completion date for all is scheduled for around February 1, about in time for the second semester of the

current school term.

The cafeteria is being built between the present high school and elementary school and is 46 feet wide by 76 feet long. Kitchen facilities are located along one side, and a stage and dressing room area is at the rear of the multi-purpose building.

This section will be of cinder block faced with buff brick to match the present school buildings. Extensions to the high school gymnasium dressing rooms are also being faced with

the buff brick.

The agriculture building is not attached to the present school, but is a short distance away. It will be of concrete block, 32 feet wide by 90 feet long, with a large part of this room earmarked for shop instruction space.

Vocational agriculture classrooms will be in one end of the new building.

Bonds for the school additions were voted last spring. The Whitharral school has about 250 enrollment this term.

mittee of the Museum's Women's Council. The first one, on a smaller scale, was presented in 1962.

"Art To Own '63" is one of the largest exhibitions of its kind ever shown in this area. It contains approximately a million dollars worth of paintings and graphic art. These art works have been gathered from various American and European sources by Mr. W. R. Fine of Dallas.

Containing over 300 works in both contemporary and traditional styles, "Art To Own '63" present a wide variety of subject matter, including landscapes, still life and figure painting.

The exhibition will be open Nov. 8 through Nov. 21. On Thursday, Nov. 7, at 7:30 p.m., a preview of the exhibition will be open to anyone purchasing a preview ticket. Each ticket provides the purchaser with an opportunity to receive one of three awards which are to be presented at 9 o'clock on the evening of the preview. First award will be a \$250 work of art; second award will be a \$100 work and third award will be a \$50 work.

If the person receiving these awards wishes, he may apply the award won to a more expensive painting in the show. Money from the sale of the preview tickets will be applied toward

the purchase of an original drawing by Norman Rockwell, world famed American artist and illustrator. The drawing was the original idea for the famous Saturday Evening Post cover painting, entitled "Off to College" done by Mr. Rockwell in the 1930's.

Preview tickets are priced at \$3 for one or two for \$5. Those wishing to order tickets by mail may do so by writing The Museum, Texas Tech, Lubbock. Tickets will be for sale at the door on Nov. 7. Winners of awards do not have to be present at the preview.

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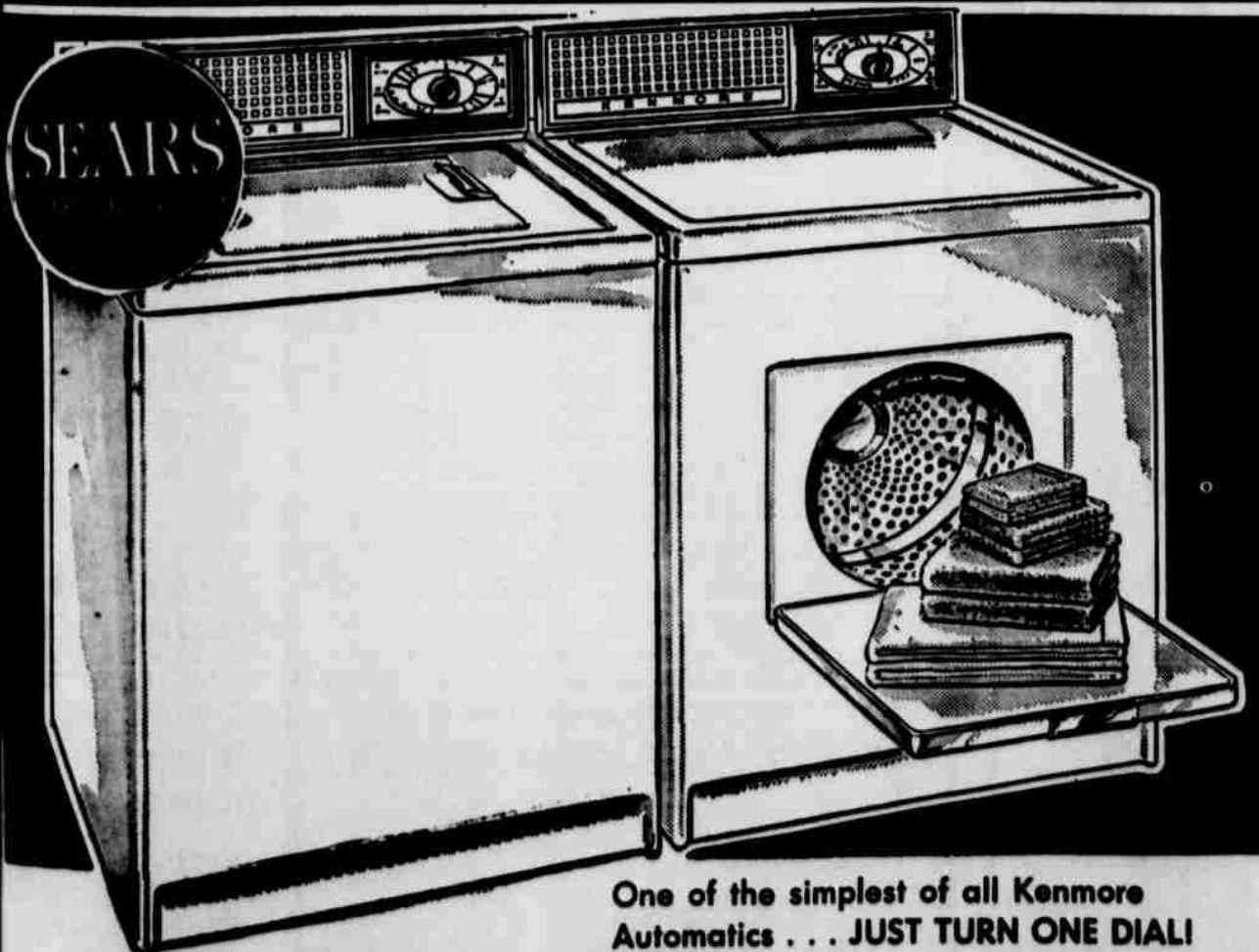

FRESH COCONUT CAKE
Use favorite yellow or white cake recipe. Bake in two layers. Drain milk from one medium size coconut. Save milk. Grate or grind meat of the coconut after removing from shell and peeling the brown from the meat.

FROSTING #1
2 egg whites
2 cups sugar
milk of coconut
enough ground coconut to make it thick

Beat egg white till stiff. Add sugar, milk of coconut and enough coconut to thicken. Spread between layers and on top layer.

FROSTING #2
2 egg whites
1/2 cup cold water
2 cups sugar
1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
Combine ingredients in top of double boiler. Cook for 7 minutes or until it stands in peaks. Spread over entire cake. The cake is better after standing a day or two.

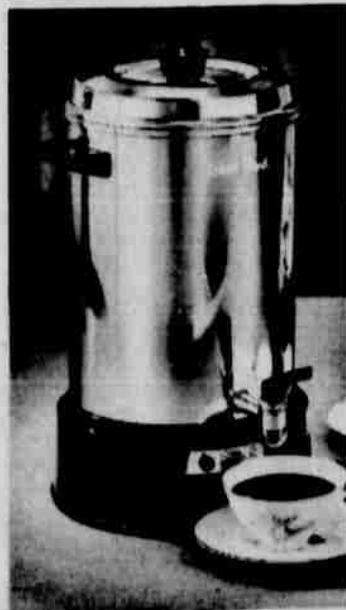

Conflicts Cloud City Controversy

The controversial city ordinance passed by Littlefield City Council last week, concerning the installation of above-ground gasoline storage tanks, has drawn conflicting statements from insurance companies.

The council, after hearing a protest on the ordinance last week, upheld its action on the grounds that an installation would raise fire insurance rates for a healthy property owner as well as all rates in the city, since a penalty would be assessed on the city's key rate.

Jerry Kirby, who represented property owner Glenn Benson in the protest, revealed a letter he received this week from a Dallas insurance company stating that no increases would be required under the circumstances. The company agent stated he had checked with a state rating official.

Nelson Naylor, who owns property near the lot in question, reported several companies had told him there would be an increase on his fire policy. One also stated that it would affect all insurance since the key rate would be penalized.

Naylor has requested verification by letter, also.

Benson had leased the lot, at 4th and Harnal to the Farnas Oil Co. A permit had been secured for a station with above-ground gas storage, then the council passed an emergency ordinance against such an installation.

Milo Residue Termed Asset
 The residue from a crop of milo or corn is valuable in the maintenance of soil productivity and should be considered as an asset instead of a liability, declares County Agent W. R. Kimbrough.
 The approximately 6000 lbs. of residue from a 5000 lb. crop contains about 85 lbs. of total nitrogen, 25 lbs. of phosphorus (P2O5), and 125 lbs. of potassium (K2O). With good management these nutrients can contribute substantially to the requirements of the next crop.
 Perhaps of greater importance is the effect of the residue on the maintenance or improvement of the physical structure of the soil as reflected in better water intake and retention, and better tilth.
 Many farmers follow the desirable practice of shredding stalks immediately after harvest and the question of whether or not to apply nitrogen to speed up the decomposition often arises. It is evident that for maximum protection against erosion much of the residue should remain on the surface. Surface applied nitrogen on exposed residue cannot be expected to greatly speed up the caying process and a portion of the nitrogen can be lost to the atmosphere if left on the surface. Nitrogen applied to the soil at least partly decomposed by the organisms in the soil is that decomposition down as soil temperature and it proceeds faster. Soil temperature is a plant growth. Kimbrough continues by stating if the residue is likely to be a problem next years cropping operation nitrogen applied ahead of cultivation can speed up the breakdown. On the other hand it may be practical to apply all of the nitrogen for next years crop prior to the nitrogen is not left on the surface.
 The practice of applying efficient fertilizer to take next crop is growing up satisfactory if you remove to use enough to take both the residue and crop requirement.

Classing Is Underway On Cotton Crop

The cotton harvest has gotten well underway according to W. K. Palmer, U.S. Department of Agriculture, cotton division, Lubbock. Over 20,000 bales have been classed in the three Agricultural Marketing Service's classing offices through the week ending October 11.

This year's volume of classing is only about two-thirds as large as last year's, reports Palmer.

The grades have been good with approximately 70 per cent running Middling or better. The remaining 30 per cent has been Strict Low Middling, Strict Middling Light Spotted, and Middling Light Spotted.

Staple lengths have covered a range from 1 1/8 to 1 1/2 inch. The majority of the cotton has been 31/32 inch or shorter. The average staple length to date has been 30.5 thirty-seconds of an inch.

The micronaire has been excellent. Ninety-five per cent of the new crop is "making" 3.5 or better.

The new crop has not begun to move into trade channels. Middling 1 inch is being quoted at 32.50 by the Lubbock Cotton Exchange. This compares with 32.65 a year ago.

Jack Wattenbarger, a Cubmaster of Littlefield, will assist in the Pow-Wow. He will be

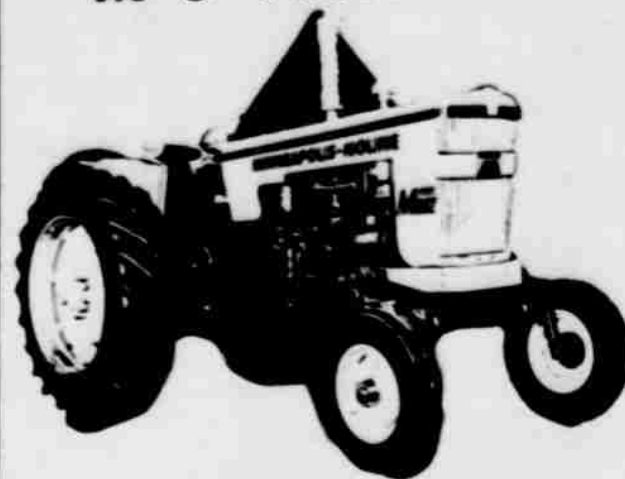
chairman of the midway, a training session supplementing the four main sessions.

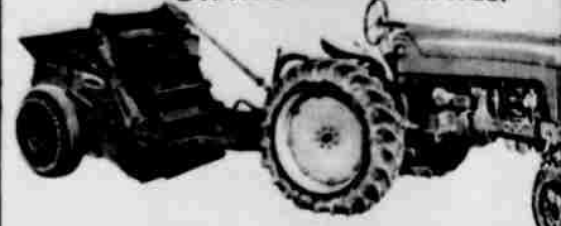

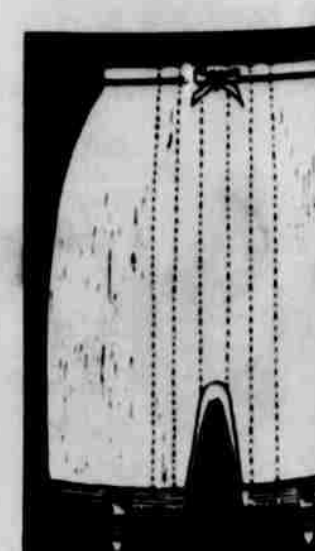
