U. S. Taste for Ice Cream Keeps 1,000,000 Cows Busy



Favorite American dessert is a boon to the dairy farmer during hot summer months when his cows are producing most.

ONE of the American farmer's biggest blessings is ice cream—and that goes for his pocket-book as well as his palate.

The American taste for ice cream, sherbets, mousses, frappes takes 1/16th of the total output of the country's dairy farms—just about as much as is used to produce cheeses and more than goes into condensed and evaporated milk.

Well over 1,000,000 cows give their all the year round to satisfy the longing for ice cream—whether it be in the form of nickel cones or fashionable peach bombe.

Gone are the days when ice cream was something to be made on the back porch for the Fourth of July. It's now big business.

AMERICANS eat upward of 1,500,000,000 quarts annually. To produce that amount, the United States has more than 100,000 plants. They use 192,000,000 pounds of sugar, 136,000,000 pounds of butterfat, 137,000,000 pounds of milk solids other than fats, and 4,000,000 pounds of food gelatin.

From the farmer's viewpoint, the most valuable aspect of the whole business is that it produces most when his cows are giving the most milk—during the hot summer months. Three-fourths of the nation's ice cream is made from April to September.

It isn't only, the dairy farmer who benefits from the American taste for ice cream. Although predominant preference is still

for vanilla and chocolate flavors—vanilla alone accounts for more than half the U. S. consumption—there is considerable demand for fruit brands.

Favorite flavor next to vanilla and chocolate is strawberry, and the industry uses about 10,000,000 quarts of strawberries a year. Other fruits demanded in lesser quantities include raspberries, peaches, cherries, nectarines, loganberries, oranges, lemons, apricots, bananas, and pineapples.

ICE CREAM manufacture is not confined to any one region, because of the difficulties of transportation. Urbanized states are the largest consumers. Five states which eat the most ice cream are Pennsylvania, New York, Ohio, California, and Michigan.

The U. S. L. the biggest per capita consumer of ice cream, but that doesn't mean it's indigenous to these shores. As early as the 14th century Marco Polo found the Chinese using a recipe very similar to those now employed in the U. S.

Ice cream making as an industry started about the time of the Revolution. It was first advertised in U. S. newspapers in 1777. Dolly Madison did much to popularize it as a dessert by serving ice cream at a swanky White House dinner.

Since then it has pretty well popularized itself. U. S. per capita consumption has increased eight times since 1900.

Culberson For R. R. Commission

ALVARADO, Aug. 7 (Special)—"I can get along with the governor and any other honest man," Railroad Commission candidate Olin Culberson told a Johnson County audience at the Old Settlers' Reunion here Wednesday.

Culberson, introduced by Dr. J. T. Campbell, chairman of the reunion, pledged his efforts toward a more harmonious and cooperative railroad commission when elected.

"By making every effort to support all constructive and progressive programs offered for the best interests of Texans and Texas, I believe a split railroad commission can be made a thing of the past," Culberson declared.

The candidate returned to scenes of his boyhood here where his parents had taught in the Johnson County School before establishing the Culberson School at Hillsboro.

"The vast majority of Texas voters will endorse my platform for honest, capable and fair administration of railroad commission affairs because they will not tolerate either having public office bought nor held through political favoritism," Culberson said. "The primary campaign proved once and for all that even unlimited money and political trickery of the smoothest sort can not stampede enough of the voters into electing an unqualified candidate."

Culberson expressed gratitude to Johnson County Citizens for the plurality given him and pointed out the impressive majorities given him in Hill and Jackson Counties where he has lived most of his life.

"It will be my policy on the railroad commission to work for harmony and cooperation not only on the commission itself but with other departments of government in order that the most efficient service may be had in these times of preparedness and industrial uncertainty," Culberson added.

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Man to Blame for Warring World

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Aug. 11

Text: Psalm 19

THE world man inhabits is a wonderful place. His imagination and interest have always been challenged by the starry heavens, and his richest poetical literature has come from the emotional response to beauties of the earth.

The 19th Psalm is one of the noblest of these responses to the immensity, glory and beauty of the universe. As the Psalm says concerning the heavens which declare the glory of God and the firmament which shows His handiwork, "There is no speech nor language; their voice is not heard."

Nevertheless, poets like himself have given voices to these wonders of nature, which speak a language of the soul that is no less real because it is not in words. The music of creation is suggested in the passage, "Their line is gone out through all the earth," for the reference seems to be to a line, or chord, that is struck in music.

THIS universe is not merely one of immensity and beauty; it is a moral universe related to the law of its Creator. How different is this song of creation and of the world in which we live from the voice of atheism that finds nothing in the universe of spiritual law and order, nothing that corresponds to man's own free spirit.

The sensitive poets and prophets of Israel manifested their faith and their courage in linking man with the Creator. They saw a universe not only upheld by physical law, but a universe in

which there is moral law, a universe in which integrity and happiness of human life are based upon precepts and commandments.

In times such as these in which we live, in which scientific progress, human ingenuity, and human action and endurance are so extensively turned to ways of violence and destruction one cannot help contrasting the world in which God has placed man with what man has done to that world and to himself.

HOW rich human life might be if, instead of greed and lust and false ambition, men had been willing to enjoy this world and to share all its good things with their fellows! The inventive genius that we have turned to war and violence would have been sufficient to provide enough food and clothing and good habitation for everyone.

If even a small part of the efficient organization that men have created for military ends had been used to organize the life of mankind for peace and for mutual helpfulness, what wonderful changes in the structure and organization of society might have been accomplished!

When we are tempted to feel that God has deserted His world, or when we say, "Why doesn't God stop the carnage?" do we consider how man has brought upon himself the horrors of today?

It is not God, but man, who is responsible for the failure of a world in the grip of war. How can we ever change all this until we get back into the spirit of the Hebrew prophets and poets? They are good guides to a new life for man and for society.

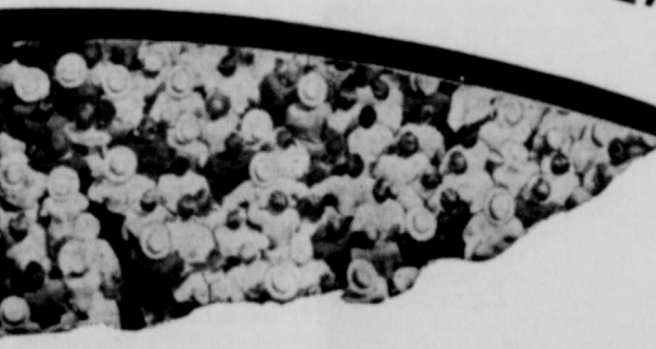

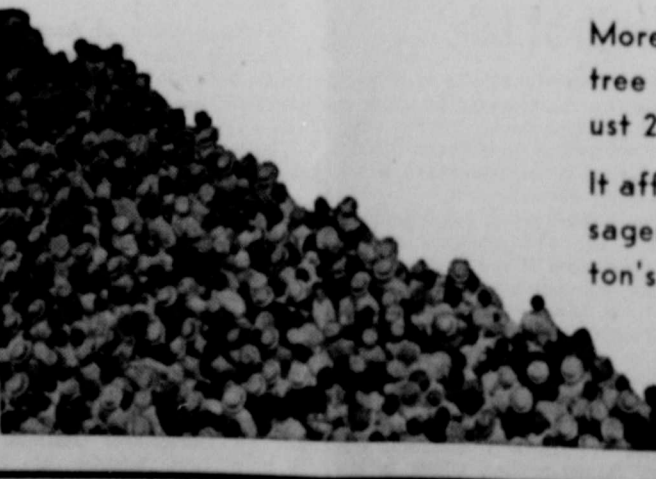

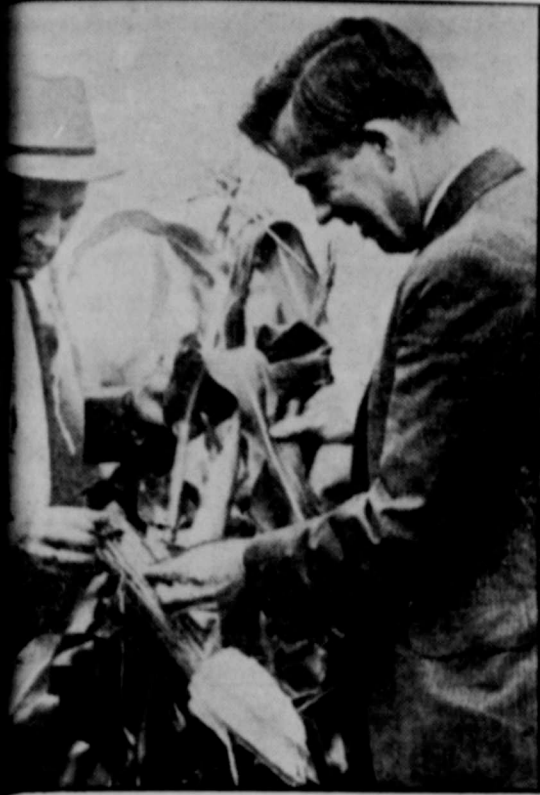

County Re-Registers Large Mortgage

Largest real estate mortgage recorded by County Clerk C. E. Hargis is being recorded in this week, requiring full services of one person for an hour to complete the copy.

The mortgage is in the amount of \$50,000.00 and is held by the First National Bank of Dallas on a large farm, which owns property in Harper county.

The recording fee amounted to \$60; a total of \$3,375 was paid in federal stamps and the mortgage tax amounted to \$660.80. The mortgaged property is scattered in over 125 counties in Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico and Kansas. Harper County Journal, Buffalo, Okla.

Texas A. & M. Furnished More World War Soldiers Than Any Other College

COLLEGE STATION, Tex.—Total defense plans for the nation will find Texas A. & M. College well prepared because military science has been one of the required subjects at the school since the institution opened its doors in 1876.

Every call for officers and men has found Texas A. & M. giving fully its share, and in the last war it led all other schools in the number of men in active service. A total of 2,200 students and graduates answered the call that time and the vast majority of them returned as commissioned officers, some ranking as high as colonel.

All students are required to take a two-year basic military science course which requires but three hours of their time each week. The advance course for juniors and seniors requires five hours weekly but pays those taking it a small allowance and makes them eligible for a reserve officer's commission upon graduation. Last June 360 such commissions were given graduates.

Texas A. & M. College has the largest all-male military school in the nation and its Reserve Officers Training Corps unit ranks second to none. In addition to all of the regular combat units, the school also has units in the Engineers Corps, Signal Corps, Coast Artillery Corps and Chemical Warfare Service. The latter unit is one of the two in the United States and is the only such organization, including the regular army and national guard, west of the Mississippi River.

The regular combat arms of Infantry, Field Artillery and Cavalry round out the seven R. O. T. C. units at the college. Students may select the arm of the service they prefer except that only electrical engineering students may join the Signal Corps and Chemical engineering students may enroll in the Chemical Warfare Service. Veterinary medicine students are eligible to receive first lieutenant's commissions in the Medical Corps.

More than \$1,000,000 worth of government equipment, including 155 mm guns, is stationed at the college for the training of the Texas Aggies, which explains why they make such good soldiers when called upon.

H. J. R. NO. 43

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article 8, Section 9, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto to be known as Section 9-A, providing that the Commissioners Court of Red River County, after a majority vote of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein, shall have the authority to levy a tax not to exceed Twenty-five (25) Cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for a period not exceeding fifteen (15) years for the purpose of refunding the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of the County by the issuance of bonds under the provisions of the General Laws regulating the refunding of outstanding debts of the County, providing for the necessary proclamation; and appropriating funds to defray the expenses of the proclamation, publication, and election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article 8, Section 9, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto another Section to be known as Section 9-A, which shall read as follows:

"Section 9-A. Upon the vote of a majority of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein so authorizing, the Commissioners Court of Red River County, Texas, may levy an annual tax not to exceed Twenty-five (25) Cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for a period not to exceed fifteen (15) years for the purpose of refunding all the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County and issue bonds under the provisions of the General Law regulating the issuance of bonds to refund said indebtedness.

"At such election, the Commissioners Court shall submit for adoption the proposition of whether such outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County shall be refunded into bonds, the amount of special tax to be levied, and the number of years said tax is to be levied. The funds raised by such taxes shall not be used for purposes other than those specified in the plan submitted to the voters.

"The provisions of this Section 9-A shall apply to Red River County; and the provisions hereof shall be self-enacting without the necessity of an enabling act of the Legislature of the State of Texas, but shall become effective immediately after the official canvass of the result has been made and it is determined that this Amendment has been adopted by a majority of the voters of the State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution providing that the Commissioners Court of Red River County may, upon a vote of the qualified electors therein, levy a tax and issue bonds to refund the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election, which shall be refunded to the State of Texas by Red River County out of its General Fund or any other available fund. Provided that no election shall be held until Red River County shall first de-

S. J. R. NO. 6

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Section 26 of Article IV so as to provide that Notaries Public be appointed by the Secretary of State of the State of Texas; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary appropriation to defray necessary expenses for the submission of this amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 26 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 26. (a) The Secretary of State shall appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for each county who shall perform such duties as now are or may be prescribed by law. The qualifications of Notaries Public shall be prescribed by law.

(b) Nothing herein shall affect the terms of office of Notaries Public who have qualified for the present term prior to the taking effect of this amendment.

(c) Should the Legislature enact an enabling law hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at a special election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT NOTARIES PUBLIC BE APPOINTED BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS."

and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT NOTARIES PUBLIC BE APPOINTED BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election. 31-41-c

S. J. R. NO. 4

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas giving the Legislature authority to provide for appeal direct to the Supreme Court in cases involving injunctions granted or denied on grounds of constitutionality or unconstitutionality of any statute or on validity or invalidity of administrative orders; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary proclamation and expenses of publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 3-b, which shall read as follows:

"Section 3-b. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for an appeal direct to the Supreme Court of this State from an order of any trial court granting or denying an interlocutory or permanent injunction on the grounds of the constitutionality or unconstitutionality of any statute of this State or on the validity or invalidity of any administrative order issued by any state agency under any statute of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the general election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR APPEALS DIRECT TO THE SUPREME COURT IN INSTANCES INVOLVING THE CONSTITUTIONALITY OF CERTAIN LAWS AND ORDERS."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election, which shall be refunded to the State of Texas by Red River County out of its General Fund or any other available fund. Provided that no election shall be held until Red River County shall first de-

cle 16; providing that the provisions of Article 16, Section 30, of the Texas Constitution limiting the duration of all offices not fixed by the Constitution to two (2) years shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipalities that are placed under the terms and provisions of the Civil Service Law applicable thereto; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of such amendment; making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; prescribing the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto a new Section to Article 16 to be known as Section 30b which shall read as follows:

"Section 30b. Wherever by virtue of State or charter provisions appointive offices of any municipality are placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service and rules are set up governing appointment to and removal from such offices, the duration of all offices not fixed by the Constitution to two (2) years shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of the Civil Service Law or charter provisions applicable thereto."

Sec. 2. Such proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas at the general election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that Article 16, Section 30, of the Constitution shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipality placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service."

Those voters opposing said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that Article 16, Section 30, of the Constitution shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipality placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service."

sions of Civil Service." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast is in favor of the Amendment the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election. 31-41-c

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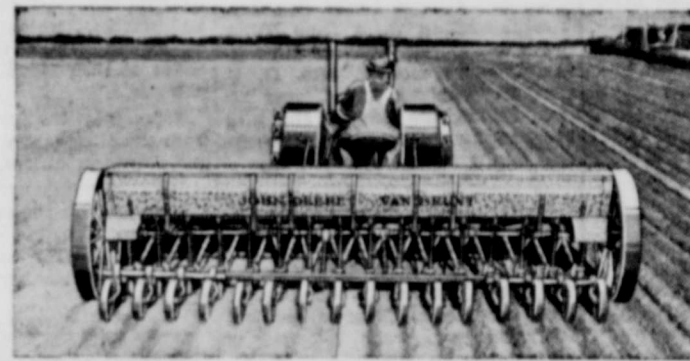

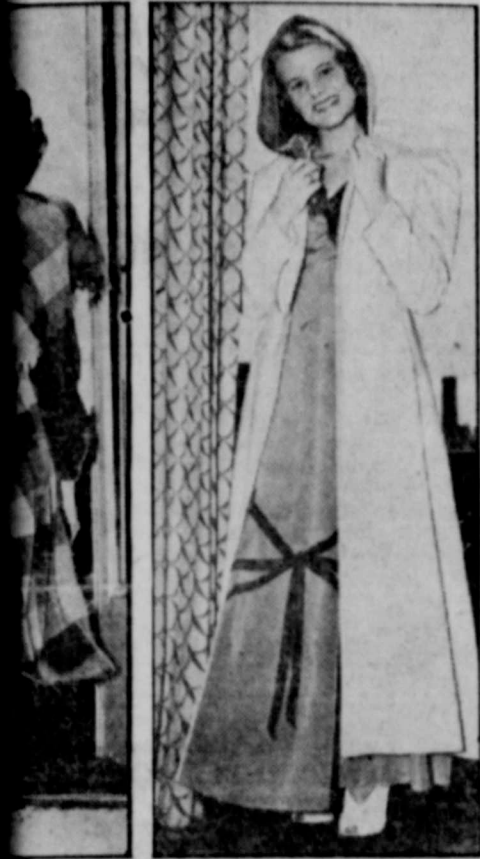

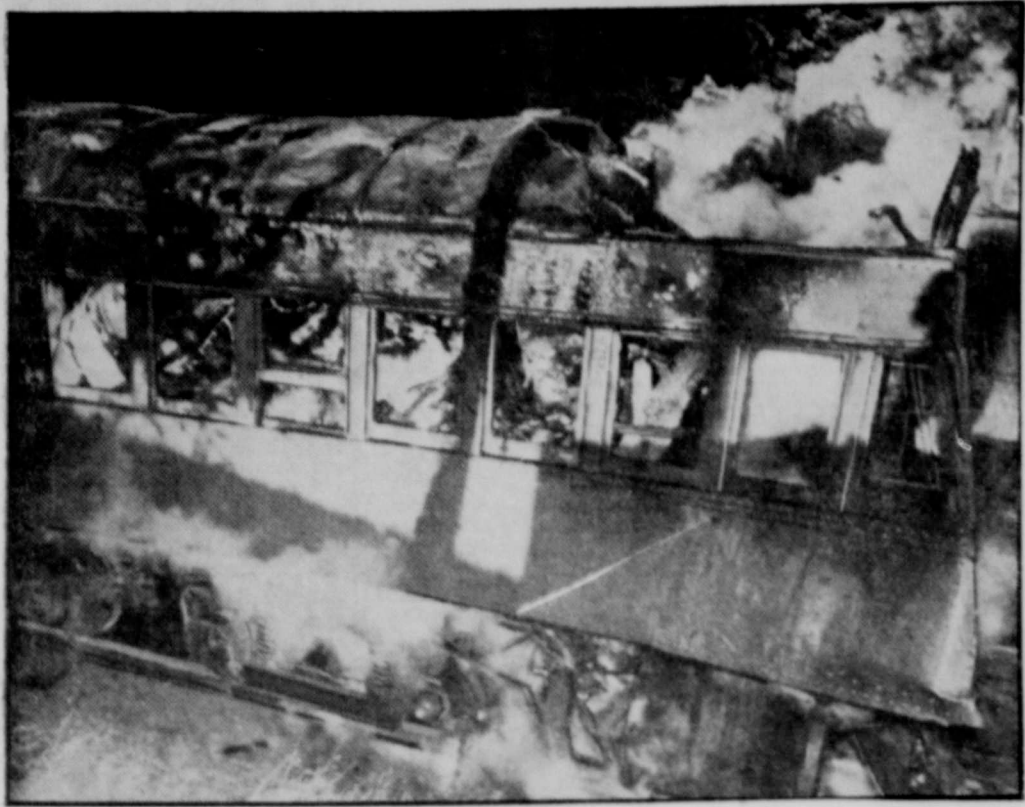

Our Defense

The Size of Our Defense Program

The President, as Commander-in-Chief of the Army and Navy, has requested approximately \$100,000,000 to build up our Army and Navy. The Congress was asked to permit increasing the strength of our Army to 1,300,000 and to provide means for obtaining equipment sufficient to outfit an additional 800,000 men who might be called to the colors.

At the present moment we have a force of 500,000 men made up of the regular Army, the National Guard, and the Organized Reserves. Under the terms of the new defense program, we will have to provide men and materials to increase our armed forces fourfold. And we have to do it in a hurry.

Now that's no simple problem. It's more than just opening the door and announcing "We would like to hire a million and a half men" and have them step right up and become soldiers. The men have to be trained. They have to become familiar with the complex instruments of modern warfare. In order to do that they have to be equipped with those instruments, and plenty of them.

A modern army needs everything from safety pins to locomotives. It needs guns and ammunition to be sure, and those guns and ammunition must be of the most modern type to be effective. To put a modern army in the field calls for clothes, food, and medical supplies. It also calls for a means of getting to the battle, and means of supply when it gets there.

Modern war is total war. We must be fully prepared.

The Job Ahead

Accomplishing this task in the face of an emergency requires coordination of our resources of men and materials, and above all coordination of our huge industrial plant that is the backbone of the nation in peace as well as in war. Many of the supplies we are going to need are turned out every day by the nation's industries. These can be procured by the Government through normal channels of industry. But many others are special equipment needed only for defense. These must be especially built for us, some in new plants. In making these special instruments, we must minimize interference with normal requirements of the nation. But we have to have them just the same.

To see that this operation goes ahead fast and efficiently, the President appointed the National Defense Advisory Commission on May 28, 1940. This Commission is composed of men who are particularly qualified by special knowledge of an industry, public utility, of some natural resource, or are otherwise specially qualified. The Commission's task is to translate the defense program from laws on the statute books, from a blueprint, into actual supplies needed by the men under arms. Their problem rests upon three vital questions:

What do we need?
Where is it?
How do we get it?

It perhaps is the greatest unified effort ever undertaken by the American people. It has already started.

What We Need

The outlines of the job under way are already clear. On May 16, the President asked Congress to provide \$1,182,000,000 for defense. On May 31, he again sent a message abroad, during the incredible events abroad, that the latter part of May, necessitated another \$1,277,741,170 to speed up preparation for our military and naval needs. On July 10, due to further drastic changes in the world situation, and because of the united will of the American people to defend themselves against all enemies, foreign and domestic, the President asked for further appropriation of \$4,848,171,957 for national defense.

This would provide for: Equipping an army to meet any possible combination of hostile forces.

Total equipment for a land force of 1,200,000.

Reserve stocks of tanks, guns, and artillery ammunition for an additional 800,000 men.

15,000 additional planes for the Army and 4,000 for the Navy.

Manufacturing facilities public and private to produce essential equipment required for our forces.

In order to provide that equipment, we determine what the Army and Navy need, in terms of uniforms, guns, tanks, planes, and ships. This is broken down into raw materials. Provision is made for processing these raw materials. Plants are provided to convert these materials into the weapons to put into the hands of the troops. The nation is like a gigantic production line. A breakdown at any point along the hundreds of raw materials' lines might stall the whole machine. That must not happen. As fast as the men are ready, the materials must be ready. This series will explain how this is being accomplished.

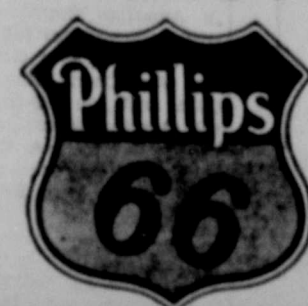
