Another Graft Is Squelched By Committee

The anti-graft committee of the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce, this week stopped another advertising scheme, which was calculated to cost the merchants several dollars, Raymond Lee Johns stated today.

"The proposition consisted of an annual which outside promoters proposed to print for a rural school and sell copies to the students at 50c each and sell all the advertising to Lamesa merchants they could," Johns said. "We contacted the school officials and it was mutually agreed to stop the proposition."

"Lamesa schools have been printing their own annuals within the school, without the necessity of selling any advertising, and these were sold to the student body for 50c per copy in 1939 and 75c in 1940," Johns continued. "We have a mimeograph in the Chamber of Commerce office which we shall be glad to loan to any school in the county to use for this purpose, because we know it will save the schools and the merchants as well."

Livestock Auction Sale Will Be Held Monday And Proceeds Will Also Be Used To Buy Glasses

While several donations have already been received by the Lamesa Lions Club, to build a fund for the purchasing of glasses for underprivileged children, they are still in a highly receptive mood, a spokesman for the club stated this week.

As has been previously explained, the local club is taking part in a nationwide movement sponsored by Lions International, to equip every child in the United States with adequate glasses, regardless of his race, color or creed.

Surveys have been made over the entire country and it has been found that a large number of children whose parents are financially unable to supply them with glasses, are being penalized in their studies at school because of their inability to see. It is for these children that

glasses will be purchased under the Lions' plan. Last year the club was instrumental in securing glasses for several youngsters and they want to take care of as many as possible this year.

They plan to hold an auction sale of all livestock which has been donated to the club next Monday. The proceeds from this sale will also be used in this drive.

Whether you are a member of the club or not, you are urged to aid in this worthy undertaking with a cash donation. The size of the amount you give, of course is entirely up to you. But whether it be large or small, any member of the club will be glad to accept it in behalf of the underprivileged children of both the rural areas and the town as well.

The Elementary school enrollment has also grown from about 600 pupils to an annual enrollment of more than 1200 under Mr. Robert's direction.

Ten Thousand Expected To Attend Meet

Ten thousand messengers, representing 3,098 Texas Baptist Sunday schools, are expected at the Annual State Baptist Sunday School Convention, meeting at the First Baptist Church, Dallas, April 15-16-17. It was announced today by G. S. Hopkins, State Sunday School Secretary, Dallas.

Inspirational speakers from over the South will speak on the convention theme, "The Word of Life for a World of Strife." Among those scheduled to speak are: Dr. C. Oscar Johnson, St. Louis, Mo.; Dr. R. G. Lee, Memphis, Tenn.; Dr. John L. Hill, Dr. T. L. Holcomb, Nashville, Tenn.; Dr. R. C. Campbell, Dallas; and Andrew Allen, Harold E. Ingraham, J. N. Barnette, William P. Phillips, Herman L. King, Dr. Homer L. Grice, Miss Marie Estes, and Miss Mary Alice Bibby, all from the Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee.

Conferences are scheduled on all phases of Sunday School work with the slogan "Hold Forth the Word of Life," stressed in each group. The return of the convention to Dallas recalls its beginnings. Mr. Hopkins said. The Convention came into being by the merger of the Baptist Organized Bible Class and the Sunday School Superintendent's Convention. In the First Baptist Church, Dallas, in June 1925, organization of the Texas Baptist Sunday School Convention was completed. In April 1932 the Convention met in Dallas with an attendance of 6,862 registered messengers—the largest number ever present, to that time, at any Baptist Convention in Texas. The Convention again met in Dallas in 1937 with 7,584 messengers attending.

J. Earl Mead, educational director, Cliff Temple Baptist church, Dallas, is president of the convention. Mrs. J. H. Slaughter, Dallas, and Mrs. Manon Seawell, Ft. Worth, recording secretaries. Mr. Hopkins has been general secretary-treasurer for sixteen years.

General chairman of arrangements for the Dallas convention is Harry P. Wootan, educational director, Gaston Avenue Baptist Church.

A special feature of the convention includes a Sunday School training Banquet April 16. A pre-convention session will see the presentation of "The Prodigal Son," a musical drama, by the Southwestern Seminary Chorus, Fort Worth, April 14.

Three New Planes Fight For England

LONDON — A new bomber, an improved and speedier Spitfire, and a fleet of air fighters that is the most heavily armed two-seater in any navy are among the latest additions to Britain's air-strength. The new bomber, designed to meet the need of the Royal Air Force for more long-range heavy aircraft, is the giant Short Stirling, produced by the firm which built Imperial Airways' fleet of Empire flying-boats and the Sunderlands now operating mainly over the Atlantic. The only comparable machine is the Vickers-Armstrong Wellington, which can fly 3,299 miles without refueling.

Newest and fastest fighter to go into action with the fleet air arm is the Fairey Fulmar, fitted with eight guns in the leading edge of the wing.

Full details of the improvements carried out in the Spitfires and Hurricanes are secret. It is known that addition of a quick-firing shell gun had been under consideration.

New Cotton Stamp Plan Is Further Explained In Second Of Questionnaires

Moving to help improve living standards through increased production and storage of food for home use, the supplementary cotton program provides for a payment of three dollars which the cotton farmer cooperating with the supplementary program can earn.

The three dollar payment will be paid to those producers who meet certain food production and storage requirements as listed by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration Vernon Martin, administrative officer of the AAA in Dawson County, points out in the second of three question and answer articles on the supplementary cotton program.

This additional payment is available only to cotton producers whose farms qualify for a cotton order stamp payment, the AAA official said, and is made in addition to all other payments under the farm program.

How Supplementary Program Aids Home Living

18. Q. Can the acreage not planted to cotton under this Supplementary Cotton Program be used for other crops?

A. Yes. This acreage can be used to produce food and feed crops for the home consumption, or for any other crop or land use, except that the sum of wheat, corn, (in the commercial corn area), peanuts, potatoes, commercial vegetables, rice and tobacco for the farm cannot exceed the sum of its allotments or permitted acreages for such crops under the 1941 Agricultural Conservation Program.

19. Q. What additional assistance is offered for encouraging increased food production and storage for home use, and who is eligible for this assistance?

A. Any owner, landlord, tenant, or sharecropper on a farm which qualifies for a cotton order stamp payment, may also earn a cash payment of \$3 by carrying out a designated practice designed to improve and increase food production and storage for home use.

20. Q. What practice can be carried out to earn this special \$3 cash payment?

A. (This practice may vary by areas and this question will be answered by the State AAA offices.)

21. Q. Will the \$3 payment be divided among tenants and landlords?

A. No. Each producer who carries out a food production and storage

Rules and Regulations

1. This Fat Stock Show shall be known as the Dawson County Junior Fat Stock Show.
2. This Fat Stock Show shall be open to all 4-H Club and F. F. A. boys who are regularly enrolled under the Dawson County Agent and the Vocational Agricultural Instructors of Dawson County.
3. Each 4-H Club Boy and F. F. A. Boy must make a written entry of each animal exhibited. Such entry blank must be signed by the County Agent or the Vocational Agricultural Instructor.
4. All written entries must be filed with the Secretary-Manager of the Show on or before March 15, 1941.
5. Entries shall be made on the "Entry Application Blank"—same to be furnished by the Show. Any or all entries may be rejected.
6. This Junior Fat Stock Show shall be for the purpose of exhibiting Steers, Barrows and Wether Lambs only.
7. All steers must have been calv-

ed on or after January 1, 1940.

8. All animals shown must be the bonafide property of the boy entering same. (This means that the animal must have been owned the day it was put on feed.)

9. All animals entered must be in the Show Barn before 11 a. m., Thursday, March 20, 1941.

10. All animals shown will be under the control and direction of the Secretary-Manager, but the Fat Stock Show, its management, officers and employees WILL NOT BE LIABLE for any loss or damage that may occur. Each exhibitor will be solely responsible for any consequential or other loss, injury or damage done to, or occasioned by, or arising from any animal or article exhibited by him. He shall indemnify the Dawson County Junior Fat Stock Show against any and all legal or other proceedings in regard thereto, as well as damage or injury to any other person or property, caused by the exhibitor or any animal exhibited by him, or arising out of, or in any way connected with such exhibition or any animal so exhibited.

11. Special rules or conditions are published in each department where necessary, and if there are any conflicts between these rules and the special rules, then the special rules will govern in all cases.

12. This Show reserves to its Executive Committee the final and absolute right to interpret all rules and regulations, and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, or connected with, or incident to, the Dawson County Junior Fat Stock Show.

13. Any exhibitor who violates any of the Rules or Special Rules will (1) forfeit all privileges and premiums, and (2) will have removed all exhibits owned by him from the Show.

14. In the Steer Calf Show, all Steers will be classed as either "Milk-Fed" or "Dry-Lot" and each classification will be divided into "Junior" and "Senior" classes by weight.

15. Each animal, as it is brought to the Show Barn, shall be accompanied by its owner, who must have in his possession a weight ticket dated the day the animal is brought to the Show. This weight ticket will determine the weight division in which the animal will show.

16. "Milkfed" steers are defined as: (1) any steer that has nursed any cow since October 1, 1940, or (2) any steer that has nursed any cow other than its mother at any time since it was calved, regardless of the date on which it was weaned.

17. Each exhibitor must keep his exhibit in perfect order, removing all litter and manure as dropped, thereby insuring a creditable show. Containers for all waste will be furnished by the Show, but it shall be the duty of the exhibitor to place all of his waste, litter and manure,

in such containers. It shall also be the duty of the exhibitor to keep the walk immediately in front of his exhibit cleaned of all waste, litter and manure.

18. There shall be a special award for exhibitors of steers, to be known as the "Herdsman Award", to be given the exhibitor that keeps his exhibit the cleanest and most attractive.

19. In case the Show should furnish such space for storing feed and traps, each exhibitor shall store his feed, feed buckets, etc., in the designated space.

20. NO EXHIBITOR WILL BE PERMITTED TO SMOKE IN THE SHOW BARN.

21. PROTESTS (or complaints): Any exhibitor desiring to file a protest or complaint with the manager must (1) file same in a typewritten letter—original and one copy—setting forth his protest or complaint, and giving the names of his witnesses, and (2) have attached thereto a Cashier's Check for \$15.00—same to be retained by the Show Management in case the protest is not allowed, and-or to be returned to the protestee in case his protest is allowed. ALL PROTESTS MUST BE FILED PRIOR TO 8 A. M. FRIDAY, MARCH 21, 1941.

22. This Show will use the "One Judge System" of making awards. The judge's placings shall be final.

23. TIME OF JUDGING. A schedule of the time of judging all classes will be posted in the Show Barn.

24. No animal will receive any award unless such animal is exhibited in the SHOW RING.

25. Ribbon awards will be as follows: Blue, first; Red, second; white, third; Pink, fourth; Yellow, fifth; Dark Green, sixth; Light Green, seventh; Tan, eighth; Brown, ninth; Gray, tenth; Royal Purple, Grand Champion, and Lavender, Reserve Champion.

26. Once the steers are led into the judging ring all persons must leave the ring except the boy showing the steer or steers. In other words no boy may receive assistance from anyone once the judge starts "working the class".

27. In case a 4-H Club Boy or an F. F. A. Boy has two or more steers in the same class he may have his county agent or vocational agricultural instructor designate another 4-H Club Boy or F. F. A. Boy to show for him. No adults will be permitted to show a boys calf.

28. All calves entered must be halter-broken, trained to lead, and be gentle so that the calf will not be a hazard to other calves or to boys exhibiting.
