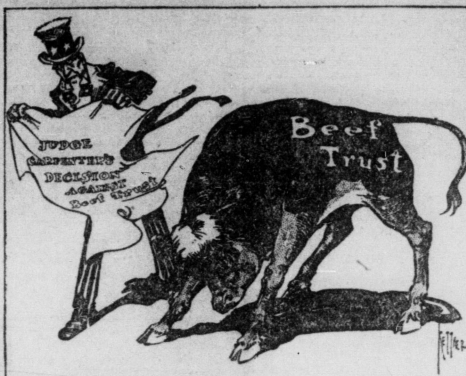

REBELS KILL 200 CHINAMEN

Rioters Shot Down or Stabbed Every Oriental They Met—Chinese Legation Makes Complaint.

Mexico City.—Official reports reaching Mexico City Tuesday by means of couriers traversing the devious trails of the plains and mountains before arriving at a telegraph station tell the story of a massacre of 206 Chinese at Torreon following the rebel occupation of that city last week. Upon receipt of the news at the Chinese legation the charge d'affaires immediately made formal representations to the Mexican government.

The details of the story of the three days' battle and sacking of the city of Torreon is replete with incidents of cruelty that clearly show that the rebel leaders did not hold their men in control, or that they deliberately turned them loose to prey upon a conquered and defenseless people. The official advices do not give the number of dead, but taking the 206 Chinese as a basis, it is certain that the number is larger.

The last day of the taking of Torreon was May 15. On that day General Lejero retired with his federal forces, and the rebels, gliding with two days' fighting, entered the city. Weakened as they were, they found themselves utterly unable to control the mob, and reports received indicate that scores of innocent residents were added to the list of victims.

No Quarter to Orientals.
Always antagonistic to the yellow race, the Mexican rebels and members of the mob engaged in a race riot. A great part of the business of Torreon is conducted by Chinese, some of whom are wealthy, and, according to reports received, the rioters shot down or stabbed without mercy every Oriental encountered.

That the Chinese charge d'affaires will be able to secure indemnity for many of the victims of the riot is doubted here, for it is a fact that since Chentung Liang Cheng visited this country five years ago and advised his countrymen to become Mexican citizens, almost all have taken out naturalization papers.

Refugees of Riots.
The story of the riot in Urapam told by a German, Juan Andressen, who has come to file complaint with the German minister, and the story told by another German, E. A. Weigand, of the Indian brutalities at Pichastaro, are dramatic. The story of rioting in Urapam began in the late afternoon of last Sunday with the circulation of a false rumor that the town was to be attacked by rebels, with the craven cowardice of the prefect municipal and the shooting of "viva Madros" by torchsticks in the plaza, the example being followed by the rougher element. These became the nucleus of a mob which soon set about looting the town left defenseless by the prefect. It ended on Monday night when a force of 225 Madros, answering an appeal of the leading citizens, who came by forced marches into Urapam and set about restoring order. There was a grim affray on Tuesday when the rebel chiefs, learning who had been the principals in the rioting and looting, lined them up against an adobe wall and summarily executed them.

Hollander's Fat Fees.
Washington.—Dr. Jacob H. Hollander of Baltimore, who negotiated the settlement of the debt of the Dominican republic, Thursday frankly admitted that he had received \$40,000 from the United States government and \$100,000 from Santo Domingo for his services. He appeared in his own behalf before the house committee on expenditures in the treasury department.

MINISTER OF WAR KILLED

A Falling Monoplane in France Sunday Killed War Minister Berteaux and Wounded Others.

Paris.—France paid a terrible toll Sunday for her magnificent endeavor to attain supremacy of the air, when a monoplane, the driver of which had lost control, plunged into a group of members of the cabinet who had gathered to witness the start of a race from Paris to Madrid, killing the minister of war and injuring the prime minister, his son and a well known sportsman.

The dead: Henri Maurice Berteaux, minister of war.

The injured: Antoine Emmanuel Ernest Monis, premier and minister of the interior; Antoine Monis, son of the premier; Henri Deutsch de la Mourthe, the aged patron of aeronautics, automobile and other sports.

A large number of other persons of note had narrow escapes from injury.

The accident occurred on the aviation field at Issy les Moulinaux, where 200,000 persons had gathered to see the start of the race.

Car Occupants Unhurt.
M. Train was piloting the monoplane that wrought such havoc. With him in the car was M. Boulter, a passenger. Neither of these men was injured. The machine was wrecked.

Minister of War Berteaux was horribly mangled. The swiftly revolving propeller, cut off his left arm, which was found nearly ten feet from where he was struck, the back of his head was crushed in, his throat gashed, and the whole of his left side cut and lacerated.

Premier Monis was buried beneath the wreckage of the monoplane. He was taken out as quickly as possible and examined by military surgeons, who found he had sustained compound fractures of bones in the right leg, that his nose was broken, his face badly contused, and that there were bruises on the breast and abdomen.

M. Deutsch and M. Monis were not seriously hurt.

Among those who had narrow escapes from injury was M. Lepine, the prefect of police.

"Theory vs. Facts"

In the Houston Chronicle appears an article, "Theory vs. Facts," copied from the Southwestern Farmer, and we presume that the one who penned those illustrious lines labors under the delusion that he has quite successfully dealt with "how to take the liquor question out of politics." We are merely quoting a few paragraphs and making slight comment thereon.

He begins by saying that the liquor question is out of politics except when the statewidens drag it into politics, or when the nation-wide industrial monopolies thrust it into politics to divert public attention from their doings. Oh yes, just so long as the saloon has full sway why need they bring the question into politics? But we rise to state that the liquor question will not have to be dragged into politics. It is already in politics, and will likely continue to be there for years to come. If Texas goes dry this year, at the very first opportunity the whiskey-lovers will "drag the liquor issue in," provided the police has not been educated sufficiently in the mean time and the "rising standard of sobriety" sufficiently developed to keep the question in the back ground. And the industrial monopolies will prove to be a small factor of prohibition agitators.

Under the local option law of Texas more than two-thirds of the counties have voted out liquor saloons, what caused them to do it? If two-thirds of the counties of the state find it more satisfactory without the saloon, what of the other third? The article admits that intemperance is one of the worst habits of humankind, that use of liquor is "probably less" (yes, very probably) by prohibition rule in two-thirds of the Texas counties, and then inconsistently the writer devotes his energy against that same principle when it is applied to the entire state.

Most assuredly we all agree with the Southwestern Farmer gentlemen that some men will get their little good or bad under any law—just as some men will somehow break every law on the statute books.

The article proceeds: "But as nearly as human ingenuity can procure it, the local option law removes the liquor question from politics." Granted this to be true, if local option removes the liquor question from politics, in walk-throughs of Texas' counties, left to why will not the same principle in a greater form remove the question from the politics of every remaining counties of the state?

Five ending on: "The surest way to make the liquor question a momentary issue in politics, is to have the overwhelming all other issues in the more densely populated sections of the state, to attempt a constitutional amendment for statewide prohibition. Statewide prohibition is, in a sense, local option on a greater scale. There is, of course, an element in local option election which finds prohibition laws very repugnant. Shall the majority of the people of that county have no right to enact a prohibitory law merely because of that element? And if the majority of the people of Texas desire the saloon banished from this state shall they be denied that privilege because of the booze lovers in a

few of "the densely populated sections?" You may as well repeal laws against other evils because of the fact that there are criminals who bitterly oppose such laws.

Our friend touchingly bemoans the fact that Maine's cotton mills owned largely by outside capitalists have ground the life out of tens of thousands of little children during her past fifty years of prohibition rule. Indeed, and how many tens of thousands more lives have been ground out by the mills in wet territory, where the liquor habit has captured the father and provider in the home and left his life's companion and the little ones to a choice between drudgery and starvation? It is truly sad to think of the lives ground out by the drudgery of the cotton mills in Maine but forget you the tens of thousands of lives which are ground out because of the gin mills of Texas?

"The people of Maine," says the article, "kept besotted with fanaticism on one or the other side of the eternal liquor issue, have neglected all other humanitarian problems." That we seriously question. But, the people of Texas who are kept besotted with red liquor from the open saloon—have they neglected anything?

"The way to take the liquor issue out of politics," we read, "is to keep it out. Revoke it at the polls on July 22." An issue must first be put out before it can be kept out. The prohibition issue is in politics and will likely remain there until the open saloon is abolished, and then as time, perhaps. If Texas should go wet next July do not think that the prohibition issue will be entirely taken out of politics in Texas. For our Southwestern Farmer friend knows that the prohibition sentiment is rapidly growing, that the opposition against the open saloon is becoming stronger every day.

"Establish and as strictly as possible enforce county prohibition, whenever the citizens want it." Indeed, and why may not that be applied to state prohibition also?

"But don't condemn the cities of Texas and the counties in which they are situated to fifty years of constant fighting over the liquor issue by trying to thrust upon them a law which is today repugnant to a large majority of their people." No, we will not condemn them to this fight. It does not remain for us to do so. For they are already condemned to a fight, regardless of the results of the coming election.

The prohibition element and the saloon element are clashing swords, and it will continue so for some time to come. If statewide prohibition wins next July of course the opposing forces will resort to extreme measures in the endeavor to bring the rum shops back to Texas. If statewide prohibition is defeated in July the prohibition forces will most assuredly work all the harder during the next fifty years to abolish the saloon from our state.

The anti-endorsement of local option is statewide prohibition is a very firmly constructed exercise, but our friend takes refuge in it. In our own acquaintance are men who when precinct prohibition was brought forward said, "Give us county prohibition, precinct won't do." When county prohibition was introduced they were talking for statewide prohibition, saying "County prohibition is worse than none, give us a statewide election and we will rally to that." And now that the state election comes these same people argue that it is very unjust and impractical, and claim to be great local optionists. They are not local optionists, statewidens, or in favor of prohibition in any

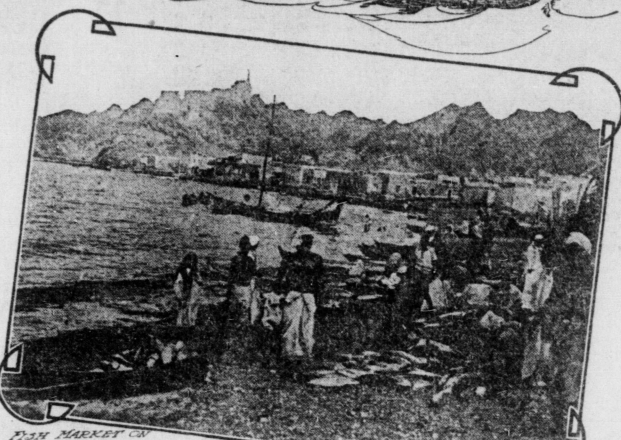
FLOODING the GUN-RUNNERS

THE HISTORY of the traffic in arms which goes on between Europe and Afghanistan via Muscat dates from the year 1881, when England, in guaranteeing the independence of the amir, agreed to supply him with rifles and ammunition from India at a reasonable price, to assist him to maintain that independence. These privileges the amir soon began to abuse by establishing a cartridge factory at Kabul and by trading in arms with the border tribes, who eventually became a menace to the towns and villages on the Indian frontier and even to Afghanistan itself.

After a while the advent of smokeless powder and modern arms rendered the Kabul factory obsolete, and the Indian government about this time stopped the supply of arms to the amir. Hence arose an extraordinary demand for modern rifles and ammunition both for the amir and for the border tribes, the selling price at Kabul of a small box rifle rose to as much as £60.

"Ha! Ha!" said the Afghan traders, rubbing their hands, "there is money to be made here; we will get rifles from Europe and the sultan of Oman, who lives at Muscat, will no doubt help us." Now in 1884 the Sultan of Oman had made a treaty with France by which he was allowed to import and export arms without interference, to enable his forces to keep out the warlike Bedouins of the interior.

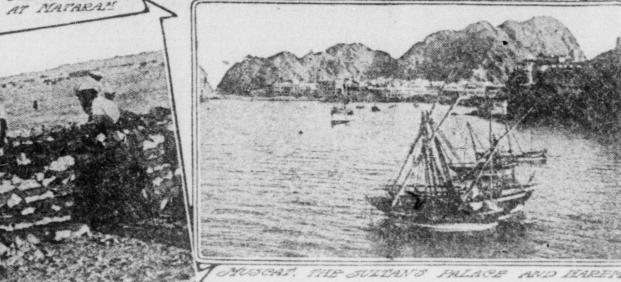
The usefulness of this treaty from a business point of view was pointed out to the sultan by the traders and he delightfully fell in with their



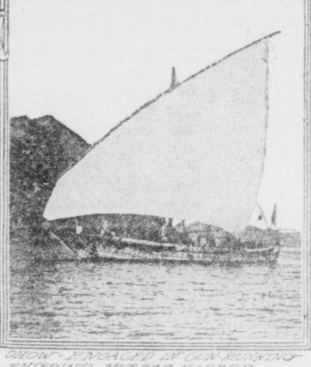
THE MARKET ON THE BEACH AT MATARAH

scheme. Rifles by the thousand began to arrive at Muscat from Europe and the Sultan, by imposing a six per cent duty on all imports and exports of arms, etc., saw his income increasing by leaps and bounds. The traders sent their agents to Muscat and arranged for the arms to be conveyed in dhows across the Gulf of Oman to Persia, while parties of Afghans came down to the Mekran coast, collected camels and transported the arms northward to their own country.

This treaty of 1884 is thus the secret of the whole of the trouble. Efforts were made at the 1908-9 International Arms Traffic convention held at Brussels to induce the French government to annul the treaty, but in vain. The result is that the British East Indies squadron had to be strengthened and a rigorous blockade of the Gulf of Oman established, involving great expense to both British and Indian governments. Could this fifty-year-old treaty be annulled, the British warships would prevent arms being landed at Muscat and the whole gun-running business would collapse.

Steamers of many nationalities land arms at Muscat, where they are stored until the gun-running "season" begins. This lasts from December to April, the heat at other times being oppressive. Caravans can only travel when food and water is obtainable for the camels.

Some of the arms are conveyed to Matarah, a port about three miles from Muscat. At these two ports dhows are laden with arms under cover of night and leave whenever opportunity offers. By keeping within three miles of the Arabian coast a dhow is free from capture, but outside that limit the nakoda (captain) cannot say a word if his rifles are confiscated and his vessel sunk by a British man-of-war. So far is another depot for arms, and is supplied from Muscat. Three courses are open to dhows:

1. To make a bold dash from Muscat to Persia. This is dangerous, involving a long passage, and of which must necessarily be in daylight.
2. To hug the coast to the westward and with a favorable breeze to negotiate the thirty miles or so across on a dark night.
3. To creep along the coast to the south, using Karjat as a jumping-off place. A dhow would then steer for Karachi, and at the approach of night would alter course and make straight for the vicinity of Gwadar.

muscat make the best of it until their ship comes round again to reventual them. The three-mile rule does not obtain on the Persian side and a dhow may be destroyed on the beach if she has carried arms and the arms may be followed up by a landing party if necessary. Few dhows succeed in getting across with arms, and the number which attempt the passage is growing continually less. Still the blockade must not be relaxed.

The wireless station at Jask is of great interest, having been recently erected by the Indian government inside a concession obtained from Persia. It is the "bete noire" of the Afghans, as it betrays all their doings, and they have threatened it with destruction. It is guarded by a detachment of Indian troops and surrounded by wire entanglements and earthworks. There is a

cable from Muscat to Jask and a land wire from the latter to Chahar.

Life on board ship is monotonous, broken only by the occasional boarding of a dhow and the disappointment of finding a cargo no more harmful than dates! Mails fortunately are regular, as they arrive weekly from Bombay, and the mail steamers are constantly bringing stores and fruit for the fleet. Fruit is liberally served as a possible preventive of beriberi. Leave to the ships' companies is rare whilst in the gulf, but occasional parties are landed. Should the fish be shy one may walk inland with a gun and bring down a bird or two.

The "season" is now commencing and with a concentration in the gulf of all available ships it is hoped that during the next few months the traffic in arms will be brought to a standstill.

Early in October the Persian authorities at Lings appealed to the senior officer of the blockading squadron for protection information had reached the Persians that brigands were marching to attack the town. Marines and bluejackets were landed and proceeded to mount guns for the protection of the town. To make certain of their cash the customs officers brought their bags of gold on board H. M. S. Fox.

An incident with a distinctly humorous side enlivened subsequent proceedings, and something of the kind was badly needed because the enemy did not materialize. The pirate-brigand Sheikh Makkar had heard of the Persians' difficulty and hurried to their assistance. Seventy miles from Lings Makkar landed, presumably to do a little raiding on his own account. Leaving his three dhows anchored, he plunged inland. While absent H. M. S. Odin came along and seized the three dhows, which were towed to Lings. There it was discovered that Makkar had, some time ago, taken one of the dhows from some Persians, to whom it was returned. The other two dhows were well saturated with kerosene and burned off the town as a warning to any persons who contemplated following the example of the sheikh. When the flames had attained a good hold a bag of powder on one of the dhows exploded, sending up a beautiful column of white smoke.

HIS BELOVED WIVES

"Ever hear of Buckleberry?" said a man from North Carolina the other day. "Well, it is a district in Lepoul county about twenty miles from Goldsboro. Twenty years ago it used to abound in curious characters.

"Almost everybody in the neighborhood was named Sutton. At the time of which I speak about the most representative citizen of the community was Ben Sutton. Ben had one of the nicest, neatest little one story houses you ever saw, and when one day I met him on the road and was invited to partake of his hospitality at his day dinner I accepted with alacrity.

"We entered the house from the rear and almost immediately sat down at a table that literally groaned under the weight of ham and sweet potatoes, collards, corn pone, turnips and huckleberry pie. Ben's hospitality made him see that I got away with the whole of an enormous second helping.

"I strolled out upon the front porch after the meal and to my horror there stood in the yard, just in front of the house, a row of four handsome tombstones, each with a grave attached. My host had lingered inside, so I went out and inspected the stones. One bore the inscription, 'To my beloved wife, Annie.' The second was, 'To my beloved wife, Kate.' The third read, 'To my beloved wife, Maggie,' and the fourth, 'To my beloved wife, Jennie.'

"Good heavens, have I struck a Blueboard!" I exclaimed.

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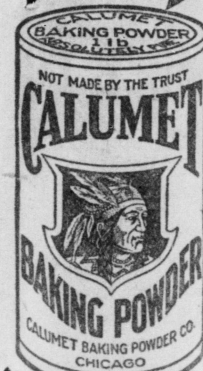

With one hand on the fellow's neck, she pressed the hot iron against his cheek and held it there for an instant, in spite of his furious resistance. When the iron was removed both men ran screaming from the house, and Mrs. Piazza collapsed. She declares that the impact of the battery was plainly visible on the victim's cheek. It is probable that he will carry the scar to his grave.

LOCKED UP IN A STEEL CAGE

For Thirty Years This Inmate Illinois Man Lived in a Garret—Is Now in Asylum.

Waukegan, Ill.—George Odette, for 30 years bereft of reason and cared for in a steel cage in the garret of his mother's home near here until the mother died recently, was snatched with ropes and taken to an asylum after the formality of a test of his sanity was gone through by an examining board which sat in the garret. While Odette shrieked at them and rattled the bars of his cage. The commitment to the asylum was made necessary by the death of Odette's mother at the age of ninety-two years.

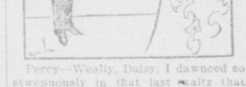

The parade costs \$200,000 per day and \$75,000,000 per annum and is paid for by the sweat of those who till the soil. Our public servants who desire to do something more than swim around undevoured in the waters of this life should watch the parade of our raw material on its journey to the foreign factory forms one of the most colossal pageantzies in the history of the human race and is the commercial tragedy of the Twentieth century. Watch it!
