Livestock Feeding School Scheduled For August 20 - 21

Leading Agriculturists Are On Program For Second Annual Gathering

According to D. A. Adams, county agent, Lamb county's second feeder short course will be held at the school house, Amherst, on August 20 - 21, to go into details of last year's feeding operations in the county. Also, the present outlook relative to feeding of beef cattle and hogs will be discussed in detail.

On the tentative program the following men will speak: A. L. Smith, beef cattle specialist of the Extension Service; Johnnie Jones, chief in charge of Experimental Feeding, Texas Experimental Station; J. C. Burns, secretary and manager Texas Livestock Marketing Association; and R. E. Dickson, supt., of Spur Experimental Station; A. C. McGee, agricultural economist, Texas Experimental Station; Sterling C. Evans, district agent of Extension Service. In addition to these seven feeders of last year, P. E. Boesen, also, has consented to give his experience in the feeding of beef cattle, as a market for grain sorghums.

Mr. Adams urges that all farmers of the county and their families attend this feeder's short course.

FROM THE SOUTH PLAINS TO SHORES OF GEORGIAN BAY.

We have fished out the old green eyeshade from beneath a pile of newspapers, have cleansed it of some of its dust, have swatted several inquisitive flies who came down too darn close to look at our coat of tan, and having done these things we feel that the time is at hand in which to expound on our journey far north and east beyond the confines of our beloved Texas.

Having journeyed well into Canada, some folks hereabouts had high hopes that the editor of the Lamb County Leader would be in a position on his return to relieve the drought situation. But all we can do is offer our regrets, assure one and all, including the sheriff's department, that an oasis has not been created in Littlefield, and explain that the American custom officers are perfect gentlemen, but do not look with favor on the careless importation of beverages. Further, we would like to explain that we didn't try to get funny with the customs;

we were too anxious to get home.

We travelled John Santa Fe between Littlefield and Chicago, and Canadian National from Chicago to Toronto, Canada. John is a very reasonable, sensible gentleman to get along with; if it is warm, just open your collar wide and be comfortable. But there's one thing you mustn't do, and that is try to slide into a Harvey House dining room minus a coat. Being from Texas, we didn't think that it would be akin to treason to park our feet under a table without the formality of first smothering our sweltering shoulders and arms beneath a coat. But folks, we had no sooner got a spoon into the soup before we got hopped out about the absence of a coat. After that we just wore a coat and tried to make every body think that we had never eaten any other way.

Visited Rotary Headquarters

We broke the journey north at Chicago, where we spent one day. Chicago is a wonderful city, as big cities go, but we were disappointed;

the mayor wasn't down at the old Dearborn depot to meet us. We wandered down into the loop to look the town over. Again we were disappointed; nobody remembered us from previous visits, and we didn't see any gangsters. After awhile we went over to the headquarters of Rotary International, where we were very courteously received, and conducted on an interesting tour of the large offices. Our visit to Rotary International headquarters was one of the most interesting features of our trip.

We toured through the most interesting sections of Chicago on a sightseeing bus. Part of the journey was through the black belt, where negroes live in large brick homes, and where is located at least one black and tan cafe. In this class of cafe it is not an uncommon sight to see a negro and a white girl dancing together.

One of the interesting sights in Chicago, is the Merchandise Mart, a building costing about \$25,000,000,

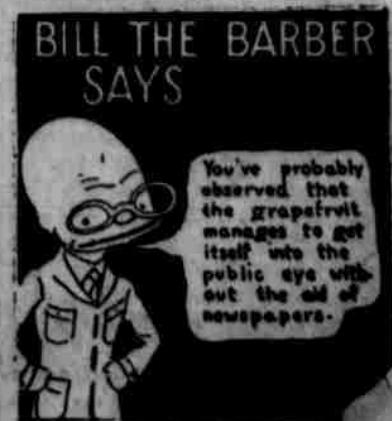
and built over the tracks of one of the railways. It is supported on gigantic piers, but offers no evidence of this fact to the casual observer. It is so long, so wide and so high that we didn't go inside, figuring that if it broke in the middle we wouldn't be in a presentable condition to park our feet (minus our coat, or otherwise) under the mother-in-law's table in Toronto.

Visited Old Home Town

Back in the old home town, we visited our brother and his family, and the boys and girls we went to school with. But they are not boys and girls now; they are married and their children are the boys and girls. Time brings changes. On one occasion we actually almost had to be introduced to an old girl friend. She's married now and has several youngsters.

One of the features of the visit to the home town was a fishing trip on Lake Erie. There were 10 of us in a large launch. The fish liked some of us exceedingly well, with

"SELL" TEXAS TO TOURISTS

Within the next few months tens of thousands of tourists from other states will traverse our state. The great through highways will be alive with them, and all of the smaller routes will draw their share.

It has been noted that a large percentage of tourists are potential citizens for any community through which they pass. It is human nature to be on the look-out for a chance to better itself. Therefore, many a family passing through your town in an automobile will be looking for a new home. Some will be in moderate circumstances, others will be well stationed in life with money to spend for homes and business enterprise.

Every Texas town should make known to the tourist what it has to offer new citizens in the way of homes, educational advantages, business opportunities. A large, attractive bill board should be posted at the entrance of the town. For instance: "This is Blankville. We need a canning factory, a cold storage plant, a poultry dressing plant. Local capital will co-operate with outside capital. Inquire at the Chamber of Commerce for details."

Then the Chamber of Commerce should have an active, wide-awake committee to meet the prospective citizens and investors, and show them what the town has to offer, and actually "sell" their town and their state. This plan has worked in other parts of the country and in Texas, and any city or town whose citizenship organizes to profit by their tourist trade in this manner will see beneficial results.—Texas Commercial News for June.

OUR HECTIC VACATIONS

A man does not have to have one foot in the grave to be able to recall days when vacations were simple and pleasant. The family packed up when school closed and were off to spend summer with grandmother on the farm. But in these hectic times a holiday is not to be taken so lightly. Vacationing is a serious business now. Doctors, health institutes, camp counselors, and returned vacationers stand by with voluminous advice for one about to take a rest.

The conscientious holiday maker is likely to find this flood of admonition rather confusing. He is urged to wear "light, loose and porous clothes," but to beware of draughts, electric fans and summer colds. He should sleep out of doors if possible, but beware of insect bites, poisons and infections. Recreations and games are recommended, but he is warned not to bathe immediately after rising from a heavy meal, and not to enter a cross country run if his age exceeds 75. The fad for sun tan is variously praised and decried.

An English physician suggests as a preparation for the vacation "a preliminary rest in bed for a week or two, and when this is impossible it is vitally important to go slow in the early part of the holiday in respect of the holiday activities." Barrie wrote amusingly "A Holiday in Bed," and for the person with only a week or two free from work this might solve the vacation problem. At least, the holiday abed would save consulting time tables, maps, tourist agencies, worrying about exercise, diet and health, or drawing heavily on the bank account, if any. Ft. Contestants in H. D. Clubs Relate Their Experience In Work

Until about four weeks ago I thought I was not going to be able to do a thing toward making my living room more liveable. We were renting out a furnished apartment and the lady to whom we had rented it decided to put her own furniture in and wanted me to take mine out. I had a bed, desk, bookcase and a piano in my living room when I entered the contest, but now I have moved the bed, and desk into another room and in their places put a day bed, table, straight chair and a rocker.

I did not have a rug so the linoleum from the other apartment made my floor look nice. I found that by doing the work myself I could paper my room for two dollars. Next I bought curtains. I got them at a fire sale at half price, the total cost of which was two dollars and fifty cents.

I had several of my own paintings and the most suitable of them I put on the wall, having to frame only two at a cost of one dollar each.

We had no heat so I called the plumber and when I told him I was in the living room contest, he bored a hole in the wall and fitted my room with gas, without charging a penny.

My room is not the finest; but at a small cost, we have everything we need for enjoyment and comfort, namely, seats, light, heat, books, music, cleanliness, comfort and beauty. The combination of the whole thing being—our living room.

The first thing I did when I got ready to improve my living room after I entered the contest was to remove every piece of furniture from the room.

Next I painted the ceiling and the walls with a flat wall paint, the walls a buff and the ceiling an ivory. I bought one gallon of white paint for \$2.19 and had on hand one half gallon of white paint. I put a little of the buff paint in the white for the ceiling. I made a little end table magazine rack waste basket out of some apple boxes, and some pieces of an old organ, and I varnished these

all in walnut color having bought one quart of varnish for 63c. I varnished around my rug with this. Then I revarnished my radio and phonograph with the walnut varnish. I took all my curtains down and laundered them. I bought four yards of drapery material costing me 60c and made some curtains for my French doors.

I re-arranged all my furniture and took all the useless pictures and bric-a-brac out of my room. I had one picture to rehang and bought one costing \$1. Another one given me by a friend value \$1. I had a gas lamp but it was out of order so I ordered a generator and two mantle costing 50c. I did all the work only a little help from the family on painting the ceiling and walls. Cash expenditures \$4.32.

Washing a cat or dog does not get rid of the fleas as borax and a good brushing does."

LUTHERAN CHURCH NEWS

At 8:30 last night a congregational meeting was held at the Lutheran church in which the pastor and Mr. John Bohot presented a detailed report of the proceedings of the district convention of the Lutheran church, held at Giddings, Texas last week.

The following are a few excerpts of general interest: This convention marked the 25th anniversary of the district. Twenty five years ago the Texas district separated from the southern district, which included Louisiana and Mississippi. The regional division considered this year was voted down by a small majority.

A unique mission service was held Sunday afternoon, July 12, in which candidates Diers, a recent graduate of our theological seminary in St. Louis, was ordained and commissioned as a missionary to China. The Rev. Beheken of Houston, vice-president of the general synod, delivered the address. Rev. Diers will sail with 5 other missionaries for China in October. In the work in China we have 18 missionaries, 3 deaconesses and several teachers.

A memorial service was conducted Friday morning in memory of the passing of Dr. F. Pieper, for 52 years president of our seminary in St. Louis.

As the special anniversary service Prof. H. Studtmann of Austin spoke to an audience of approximately 2,500.

Besides the paper of Prof. Pieper on "The Person of Christ," which was remarkable for its clearness, a

paper on "Christian Liberties" was given by Rev. G. Fischer.

The convention resolved to establish a Spanish course at our college in Austin, and to employ a competent instructor to teach the branch. They further decided to call a colored missionary at large to further the work among the negroes with in the State. All teachers of Christian day schools were encouraged to introduce and follow "Educational Guide," a special course of study for our schools, so that greater uniformity and progress might be attained.

The local Pastor, W. J. Luecke, was elected to represent the North Texas Special and the Panhandle conferences at the meeting of the general body of the Missouri Synod, next June, at Milwaukee, Wis.

During the meeting arrangements were made to house the Pastors of the Panhandle conference, which will meet here the latter part of August. The Ladies Aid will have charge of the meals.

INSTRUCTIONS ON

CONTRACT BRIDGE

Written Especially for The Leader

Editor's Note: After receiving several requests from Littlefield bridge players interested in learning the game of contract bridge, Mrs. Ethel Louise Cooper has consented to write a series of articles on the game for the Leader.

(Third Installment)

Hands containing less than five honor tricks cannot score game unless materially helped by partner, but a hand in which there are five honor-tricks needs very little assistance to be certain of a game at some bid. Mrs. Culbertson therefore originated forcing two-bid which if not abused is the most thrilling bid in Contract Bridge. It permits the holder of an exceedingly strong hand to open the bidding low enough to allow the responding hand to give definite information as to which help he can or cannot give with no chance of the game dying before a game contract is reached.

The minimum requirements for the forcing two-bid are five honor tricks divided among three suits and any biddable four card suit. With such strength distribution knowledge is needed more than extra honor-tricks and this can be given by responding hand just as it is given in the one-bid by raising the suit that has been bid originally; by slowing another biddable suit or by the no trump take-out. The difference is that when the forcing two-bid is made the responding hand is compelled to make a bid. If his hand is an absolute no trump he must reply with the no-trump bid and must keep on replying his way until the declarer has made a game declaration. He must specially "show preference" if two suits have been bid, always remembering that if the two suits are of equal length in his hand his preference should be for the one first named.

ed by the original bidder as it was in all probability the stronger of the two. On the other hand if the two suits are of unequal length in his hand, the responding bidder should prefer the one of greatest length, regardless of the value of the cards. If the original bidder has first bid two spades and later two hearts, responding hand with spades Q-8 and Hearts 743 at once raises the hearts to four knowing that with five honor tricks in the hand it is trump length that is needed.

An original bid of two no-trump is not a forcing bid. It shows so strong a hand however that the responding hand should raise holding as much as one honor trick.

With a part score, 40 or 60, the original two-bid is not forcing but merely a game bid.

There is another forcing bid which is equally as strong as the original two-bid. That is the jump take-out. If the original bidder has bid one of any suit showing at least two and one half tricks and the responding hand has as much as three honor tricks, he gives the jump overall thus forcing the original bidder to keep the bidding open until a game is contracted between them.

EXAMPLE—

Original bidder has bid one spade. Responding hand holds, spades J, 8, 4; Hearts, A, Q, 9, 7, 3; Diamonds, A, K, Q, 3; and clubs, 4. He at once jumps the bid from one spade to 3 hearts. Now if the original bidder has normal support for hearts he can at once bid four hearts, if he holds an extra long spade suit he can say three spades; if he has neither normal support for hearts nor added length in spades he must say three no-trumps permitting the forcing hand to decide the ultimate contract.

An opening major suit bid of three

or a minor suit bid of four is not as strong a bid as the original two-bid. They show a powerful trump suit with at least five tricks in the hand. The responding hand is free to raise or pass this bid just as he was the one bid. He can raise the bid with two supporting tricks and less than normal support in the trump.

Opening major suit four bids and minor suit five bids are shut out or pre-emptive bids. They show a powerful trump suit or great length with probably no outside strength. These bids are called over-bids, and are so planned that if the opponents double the penalty will not net them more than the game they could have scored at their own bid.

Opening major four bids show seven trump tricks and about eight playing tricks. Opening minor five bids show seven trump tricks and about nine playing tricks. These hands offer no assistance for a penalty double. Any raise from partner obviously points to a slam and shows about three supporting tricks.

This installment concludes the series of lessons on Contract Bridge by Mrs. Cooper. In next week's issue of the Leader, Mrs. Cooper will have an article on bridge etiquette.

Wallace Wade of the university of Washington and Jimmy Phelan of Duke university will handle football at the school. S. D. Burton of the West Texas State Teachers college and Jimmy Kitts of the Athen High school will handle basket ball.

Three hundred coaches are expected.

The school is being sponsored by the Athletic department of the Texas Technological college with Pete Cawthon and R. T. "Dutch" Smith, coaches in charge.

Farmers Are Urged To Sell Non-Laying Hens

"Now is the time to 'trade in' those old hens on new pullets," says one of Littlefield's feed dealers. "You can get more for the culls now than later and the money they bring will provide a good growing mash for the growing pullets, a feed that will get them ready for the nest early this fall when egg prices start upward."

The dealer believes this good advice in view of market expert's predictions of better egg prices next fall. Less chicks were started this spring, market experts say, which means fewer pullets. Fall egg must come from pullets, so there will be fewer eggs.

During July and the first part of August are the days to cull unprofitable birds. "In culling the flock," he says, "it is well to bear in mind that early moulters are usually profitable eaters. Late moulters that moult fast are the high producers—the money makers."

"There are a number of points to keep in mind when culling, such as the spread from the point of the keel to the pelvic bones, whether the head is narrow and snaky in the case of the poor layer or whether there is alertness, bright eyes full red comb as in the case of the good layer," the dealer added.

Toronto Is Beautiful City

Toronto is a very beautiful and modern city of more than 900,000 population and is the capital of the province of Ontario. It is said to be more like a large American city than any other city in the Dominion of Canada. There are gigantic hotels, great department stores, lake-shore drives, in fact, it has everything that makes a great city all that is expected of a large center of population.

One of the show places of the city is the great wide driveway along the lakeshore, and extending almost the entire length of the city, east and west. At Sunnyside, near the west end of the lakeshore drive is located an amusement center which is similar to Coney Island.

One feature of Toronto which Americans notice is the fact that all places of amusement are closed on Sunday. This includes the baseball parks and the theaters. The regulation against Sunday baseball extends to the games of the small boy.

Engage in General Farming

A great many people are under the impression that Canada is largely made up of rough country. But this is not true. Western Canada is not unlike our western states, and east is east, whether it happens to be in the United States or Canada.

The farms in Eastern Canada generally contain for 50 to 300 acres, and the eastern Canadian farmer engages largely in diversified farming, growing a great variety of grains, vegetables and fruits, and raising many cattle.

The Niagara Peninsula of Ontario is one of the most famous fruit growing sections of the American continent, raising large quantities of peaches, grapes, apples, pears, plums etc. True, the northern part of Ontario has considerable rough country, where mining is one of the chief industries.

The eastern provinces of Canada are more densely populated than those of western Canada or the western states, and contain a great many cities of large population.

Wonderful Summer Playground Should you visit Ontario we recommend that you spend an extended

time at Wasaga Beach, about 100 miles north of Toronto, and located on an arm of Georgian Bay. This beach is a wonderful sandy expanse of about eight miles in length. It is possible to wade out for many hundred feet before the water is over the shoulders of a man or woman of average height. This beach is said to be similar to Daytona beach in Florida, except for the fact that it is not so highly developed. But there are many large hotels, and all the amusements of a modern beach, including golf, tennis, dancing, horseback riding, etc.

We tried riding one of those English saddles—the kind in which the rider is supposed to bob up and down, allowing enough daylight between the saddle and his or her body to let a fox terrier dog go galloping through. Of course, they haven't any fox terriers which do that. We tried an English saddle for a couple of rides, but Heaven smiled on us; we found a stock saddle and a western pony who happened to be residing at the time in a land that was foreign to him. He seemed tickled pink to find one rider that didn't try to steer him around something after the manner of driving automobiles.

We could keep on writing for a long time about various places and those things which are not of the west, for a trip north and east in Canada is very interesting in every respect.

Those who live in the southwest feel that Canada is a long ways away and many of the people of Canada feel that Texas is a far away land where cowboys make merry and ex-guish lights with the capable aid of John Colt. But fast railway and airplane transportation and the automobile are bringing the people of the two lands into closer friendship.

Yes, it's hot in Canada at this time of the year, in fact, it is easier to get a great big breath of honest-to-goodness fresh air in hot Texas than in Canada where the thermometer has been known to drop to 40 degrees below zero when the weather man has a grouch.

Sure, we like the South Plains better; we told a great many folks in Canada that they would be exercising good common sense if they moved to the Plains.
