Recent Church Census Shows 9,201 Plus

Permits Being Issued By City To Burn Trash

According to Jess Whatley, City Manager, the City will issue a special permit to residents to burn trash, weeds, grass, etc.

It is necessary to get the special permit because there is a city ordinance against burning trash within the city limits. When a permit is issued, the Police Dept. and Fire Dept. will be notified, which will cut down on the confusion which might arise from unauthorized burning.

The property owner taking out the permit agrees to take the necessary precautions to prevent the fire from spreading beyond the premises of the above location. There is no fee for the permit. However if you wish to burn trash, be sure you have your permit, otherwise you will be subject to all penalties applicable to unauthorized burning.

Paid Poll Tax Total Still Low

Poll tax payments and obtaining of exemption certificates continued to lag Thursday according to records in the office of Tax-Assessor-Collector Bill Carnes.

Through tabulation Thursday, only 2,521 poll taxes had been paid and 3,508 exemptions had been obtained. This brings the total so far to only 6,029, a far cry from the 24,700 qualified voters during 1962.

According to officials in the tax office, no figures are available on poll taxes and exemptions issued by civic groups.

Carnes reported he had gone to a business establishment early in the week to make the receipts and exemptions available, and was turned down by several women employees who were eligible for the exemptions.

Officials pointed out that proposed legislation to abolish the poll tax had not been enacted, so it is necessary to have either the receipt or certificate to vote in any election which may come up during the year.

Chambless and Owen Hold Rider Raiders 55 To 35 In District 4-AAA Friday Night

The Burkburnett Bulldogs handed the Rider Raiders their third straight defeat in District 4-AAA Friday night 55-35 behind the shooting of Bill Chambless.

Chambless, who collected 18 points, was also the top rebounder for Burk.

The Raiders, who were without the services of their top scorer Larry Prise, couldn't get inside to shoot and were kept out of the boards by Chambless and Gary Owens.

Rider stayed in contention for about three minutes, then Burk started controlling the ball and Chambless started hitting and ended the first quarter with a 20-7 lead.

The Bulldogs sent their second unit into action the second quarter and allowed Rider to outpoint them only one point, 12-11.

Kevin Jerrett, who with Larry Negri composed practically Rider's only scoring threat hit for six of Rider's 10 points in the third quarter. This didn't help much though, as Burk tallied 18 points.

Burk used a mixture of its first and second units and Rider switched to mostly the second unit in the fourth quarter. The hustling Raiders outpointed Burk 7-6 points.

Jerrett was high point man for Rider with nine points, followed by Negri with eight. Tommy Hughes was next with five. Jerrett fouled out in the fourth quarter.

Rider's 'B' team defeated Burk's 'B' 52-41 in the night's opener. David Wist led the 'B' team with 16 points, followed by Steve Hill with 12. Mike Musick and Paul Gilchrist paced Burk with eight and nine points respectively.

This win gave Burkburnett a 1-2 record in district and Rider a 0-3 mark. Burk, one of the pre-season favorites lost two

Burk School Enrollment Up

Enrollment of students in the Burkburnett School System continues to show a gradual increase.

Registration for this semester shows 3251 students have enrolled to date with the largest number, 709 in high school. Following in order is Junior High with 542; Southside Elementary, 408; Hardin Grade, 514; Primary, 380; Sheppard-Burk, 644 and Booker T. Washington, through the 5th grade, 54.

Most Churches Here Shared in Census

Even the Chamber of Commerce population figures were surpassed in the city-wide church census just recently completed. Estimated population has been 7613, established a year or two ago. Optimistic C of C personnel placed their figure at 9,300.

Now the church census shows 9,201 persons contacted, with 184 not-at-home calls made. The national average is 3.4 persons in each home. That would indicate around 9,600 persons within the city limits of Burk.

This was the most complete church survey ever made in Burkburnett. Percentage wise, it outranked national established figures in that a greater percent of householders were actually contacted. Fewer people refused to give the desired information than is found in most surveys.

Peacemaking General

Everybody who has belonged to an organization of any kind is more or less familiar with "Robert's Rules of Order," the little book that rules the meeting. But who was Robert, the man who wrote it? Some great lawyer, college professor or political leader?

Guess again. Henry Martyn Robert, who authored the famous "rules" was a soldier, a West Pointer from South Carolina and an engineer officer who rose to brigadier General and Chief of Engineers. He also headed the board of Engineers that planned the great seawall at Galveston.

But the great achievement of his life, as Tom Mahoney relates in "The Peacemaking General," an article in the January American Legion Magazine, was his successful struggle to write and publish his rules of order. These are the essence both of democracy and good manners; abide by the will of the majority; listen to the minority; consider one thing at a time; give everybody a chance to talk; keep discussion impersonal.

He recognized the need for such a book as a young officer when he had to preside at a stormy church meeting a century ago this year in New Bedford, Mass., during the Civil War. But he was so busy mapping roads in the West and building lighthouses on the Great Lakes that 13 years passed before he could get his rules together.

Turned down by all book publishers of the day, he had the first edition printed at his own expense and gave many of the copies away. But his faith was amply justified. Somebody is about to buy the 2,000,000th copy of the little book. Would-be authors to whom publishers are cool may take some comfort in this.

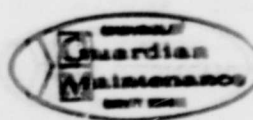

Policyholder Questions Answered
by the Institute of Life Insurance

Q. Who gets the profits in a life insurance company? I've had my policy for 20 years and never received a cent from it.

A. If you never received a cent from your policy, you probably have a non-participating policy, that is, one paying no dividends. But such a policy generally carries a lower premium than those providing dividends. You were undoubtedly given to understand at the outset that you were getting a lifetime figure on the cost of your policy, no more, no less. And in the case of these non-participating policies, any profits that may arise go to increase surplus or in the form of dividends to the stockholders of the companies issuing the policies. If your policy is a participating contract, that is, one paying you a dividend, you may not realize, because you are not taking it in cash, that the policy dividend is money coming to you. It is through this dividend that the company shares the profits annually. Properly speaking, there are no profits, as all the money available after all commitments and reserve requirements are met goes into the fund distributed to policyholders as dividends. In the case of the dividend-paying policy, the premium merely sets the maximum cost. The dividends lower it over the years.

Q. Do many women own life insurance? I've been told that I'm one of the few women without a policy, but I am not married and see no need for it.

A. Six out of every ten women own policies. And this is true among married and unmarried women alike. Nearly half of all

adult policyholders are women. This indicates that a great many women own life insurance—they own in the neighborhood of \$75,000,000,000 of it in the United States today. As for whether you need it, talk with a life insurance agent and let him comment on your situation and you may see the need that so many unmarried women do—for final expenses, for retirement planning, for certain family responsibilities, perhaps.

Train Your Dog To Scent

Many hunting dogs hunt more by sight than they do by scent.

Such a dog is a poor hunter. Bring your own pup up the right way by doing as many professional trainers do—practice at night when the dog can't use his eyes and must rely on his nose.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

Austin, Texas — Serving as Governor of Texas should be a snap for John Connally.

Any man who can wage a rigorous, twelve months campaign for governor, such as he has done, reorganize the state government, plan and participate in all the ceremonies he has been through since his election and inauguration, and assume all the allied responsibilities related thereto . . . should find the task of being governor a cinch.

It seemed like half of Texas was in Austin to see the first mass turnover in state government since Jimmy Allred took over from "Ma" Ferguson in 1935.

Man of the hour, was, of course, John Connally. Bus loads of people, both from his old hometown of Floresville and his latest hometown of Fort Worth, came to Austin for the festivities that surrounded his inauguration as governor.

Most of them were here by inauguration eve when nearly 10,000 people packed Austin's Municipal Auditorium for the Democrats' "Victory Dinner," which was the biggest seated dinner in the state's history. It was sponsored by the State Democratic Executive Committee. At 25 a plate, it netted the party \$100,000 and put it on its feet, well-heeled.

Inauguration Day led off with an interdenominational prayer breakfast and the dignity of the day carried over to the high noon swearing-in ceremony in front of the State Capitol.

Some 5,000 people clustered in the capitol lawn as Governor Connally and Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith solemnly took their oaths of office from Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert of the State Supreme Court.

Both Connally and Smith expressed a sincerity of purpose and a real desire to work with the 58th Legislature in pushing progress for the state . . . while holding down spending. Throughout Inauguration Day, Texas, two top men kept popping up in unexpected places — arriving early for ceremon-

ies and dropping in at events related to the inauguration. They shook every extended hand and signed as many autographs as time allowed.

At seven in the evening they took their places, alongside their wives, in a Capitol rotunda receiving line and shook thousands more hands with unrelenting enthusiasm.

When Governor Connally presented his plan for progress to a joint meeting of Senate and House members, on the following day, he was met with applause that many legislators felt never had been equaled.

Majority of the legislators said that they felt they could support him "most of the way." All praised his "tremendous grasp of state government," and said if there were differences between the governor and the legislature, such differences could be worked out.

Many were pleased to see Connally urge the strengthening of family sanctity laws. He recommended: An end to common-law marriages; a 90-days waiting period for divorces, prohibiting remarriages until six months after a divorce; and requiring both parents to appear in court when a divorce involves children.

His views on upgrading higher education were approved almost unanimously. But there was quite a bit of disapproval of his proposal to combine the Game and Fish Commission and the State Parks Board. Opposition was based largely on the idea that the Game and Fish Commission would suffer.

Equal Rights — The perennial battle for women's equal rights will hit the limelight in the Texas Senate early in the 58th Legislative session.

Senate constitutional amendments committee set public hearing for 7-10 p. m., January 30, on a proposal to give women equal legal rights. Proposed constitutional amendment was submitted by Sens. W. T. Moore of Bryan and Bill Patman of Ganado.

Vote Age Target — Rep. V. E. "Red" Berry of San Antonio wants the minimum voting age in Texas lowered to 18 years.

Berry has filled a bill which would propose a constitutional amendment allowing the Legislature to make the change.

Present law requires voters to be 21 years of age.

Cost Cutting Bill — A bill to create a commission to study ways to cut costs of Texas' government is on file in the House of Representatives.

Rep. R. H. Cory of Victoria said his bill would create a "little Hoover commission" composed of twelve members. Three members would come from the House, three from the Senate, and six would be appointed by Governor Connally, who also has recommended formation of the commission.

Cory said his bill has been

Farm Facts

Labor costs, the U. S. Department of Agriculture points out, are the largest single component of the bill for marketing domestic farm foods to civilian consumers. They amounted to 46% of the total cost in 1961, or about \$19 billion.

Of some \$62.2 billion spent for farm foods, farmers received \$20.8 billion and the marketing bill amounted to \$41.4 billion.

Rail and truck transportation cost \$4.3 billion. Corporate profits came to \$2 billion before taxes and amounted to \$1 billion after income taxes. Other costs—including fuel, electric power, containers, advertising, depreciation, rent, etc.—were estimated at \$16.2 billion.

Costs per unit in marketing have been increasing since 1950, the USDA explains, due to wage increases, transportation charges, prices for machinery, equipment, fuel, containers, packaging materials, etc., and taxes, rents,



and other costs. Some of the rise is due to a shift in operations. Services previously performed by the farmer or left for the consumer have been shifted to the marketing system.

passed by the House on five different occasions but never passed the Senate.

Stockmen Raising Funds — Texas Livestock Auction Association is sponsoring a drive to help raise the \$1,000,000 still needed to meet the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation's \$3,000,000 goal to stamp out the screwworm.

Texas' screwworm eradication program will come to a halt in March unless the million is raised.

Governor Connally recommended that the legislature quickly determine whether the screwworm eradication program is in trouble. Result was a hurriedly called hearing, attended by about 30 legislators and as many livestock producers and animal health officials.

Eradication supporters told legislators that the program reduced screwworms by 70 to 90 per cent its very first year, but

the \$5,000,000 spent to date will be wasted unless the job is finished. It is view as a three-year program.

Three-fifths of the money spent so far has come from federal funds, and two-fifths from the livestock producers.

The \$12,000,000 program is a true-matching one: Uncle Sam will continue his payments toward the \$6,000,000 he promised, so long as the producers and the state combined are matching his payments.

So far, the state has paid nothing into the program. But the Texas Animal Health Commission has urged an immediate appropriation for \$1,400,000.

Governor Connally has stated that he would ask for such an emergency appropriation if the legislature learns that the program is in danger.

Small-Town Boost Proposed — U. S. Congressman Wright

Patman's worry that an "overwhelming percentage of the smaller towns and rural areas of East Texas are going down hill" is shared by at least two legislators.

Reps. Joe Cannon of Mexia and H. G. Wells of Tulia spread their concern over economic ills in East Texas to rural areas all over the state. And they have come up with a scheme to bolster the moral and economy of rural counties.

Under their plan, counties with less than 45,000 population would receive a two per cent refund of the sales tax collected by them. This money would go to county judges, who in turn would distribute it to city councils to be used to advertise for new industries and offer incentives to industry.

Wells estimated that 200 counties would be eligible to receive a sales tax rebate, and that \$1,000,000 would be distributed the first year.

Main object, Wells said, would be to save counties which recently had some prosperous small towns but which have suffered from being bypassed by highways or from an exodus of citizens who have moved to metropolitan areas.

Impact of Supreme Court — Waggoner Carr made his first appearance before the State Supreme Court as attorney general when the high court heard

the case of the state versus the City of Impact. Impact is a satellite of "dry" Abilene which proposes to operate "wet."

Carr made a brief argument for the state, but turned the major presentation over to Tom Eyles of Abilene, and former State Senator Clint C. Small, who have worked on the case for about three years.

March Draft 404 — Texas' March quota for draftees is 404 men.

"This more than double the calls of recent months," says State Selective Service Director Col. Morris S. Schwartz.

February quota was 173 and the January call was 163 men.

Oath Taken — Crawford C. Martin of Hillsboro has been sworn in as Texas Secretary of State.

Ceremonies were held in the Texas Senate where he served

for 14 years.

He took the oath as the first constitutional state official appointed by Governor Connally.

Oath was administered by Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert of the Supreme Court.

Several hundred persons were present, including legislators, appellate judges and friends, with a delegation of more than 100 on hand from his home city and county.

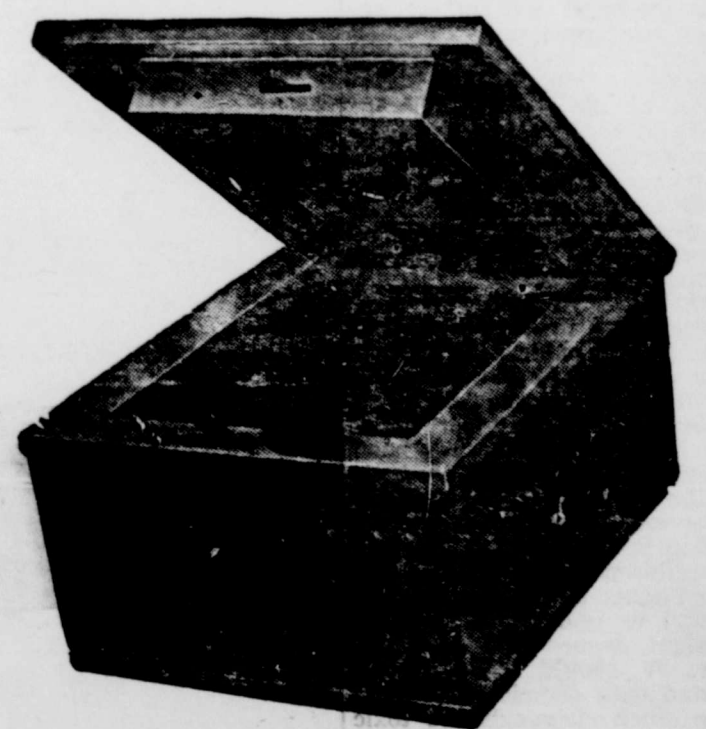

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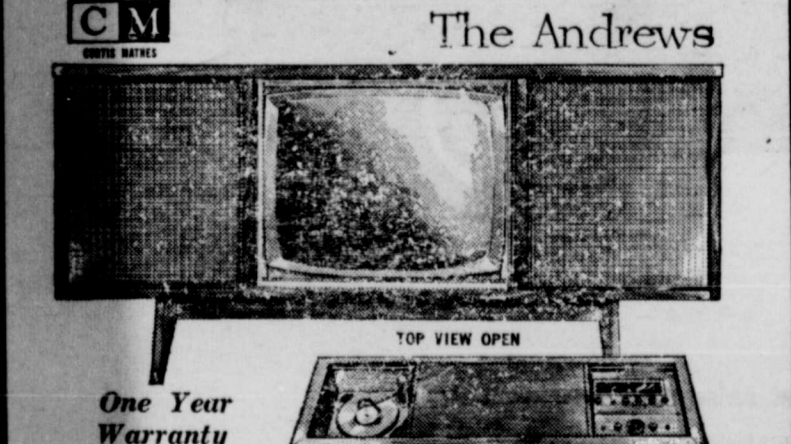

Size will be governed by need and the amount of money you can spend. Your business center might vary from a complete room addition to a built-in desk and shelves in a storage wall partition.

1. Put a service counter between kitchen and dining area. Your wife will like the convenience at meal time. And you can build in a pull down desk on the dining side. The desk top, when opened, should be about 28" high.

2. Attach a chest-high sliding door cabinet to an empty wall to store records. A kneehole desk can be castered and hinged to swing out from under the cabinet when needed.

3. If you have a "furniture" desk in the living room, but inadequate storage space, build a floor-to-ceiling record unit into a near-by corner or closet. A unit 16 inches deep and wide will hold standard drawer-type metal files. Put shelves above the files for ledgers and books.

POSITIVE IDEAS HIGHLIGHT LIFE LINE ESSAYS

Despite the gravity of today's national and international problems, there seems to be a lack of positive ideas advanced as solutions. The only exception to this would appear to be those who advocate more government as the answer to everything.

It is refreshing then to note the growth of Life Line — a freedom-loving organization in the publishing, radio, and TV fields. Organized in 1958, Life Line has always stressed the positive instead of just repeating problems.

Life Line conducts frequent essay contests, designed to generate new ideas on patriotism and freedom. The sixteen best essays of two recent contests have been published in a new book, "Life Line Freedom Essays" (available for \$2.00 from Life Line, Washington 1, D. C.).

Positive Approach

Although written by non-professionals (with the obvious

drawbacks that involves), the essays are loaded with positive thoughts about what we—as a nation and as individuals—can do to restore and preserve our republic. In fact, contest rules required that a large percentage of each essay be devoted to the positive side of the subject.

Also included in the book are eleven informative articles produced by Life Line. They alone are worth the price of the book. Included are fact-filled studies of foreign aid, the State Department, and communist-controlled British Guiana. Other articles deal with basic principles in such areas as fiscal, disarmament, labor and patriotism.

What To Do

Also included are "how-to-do-it" features on organizations of telephone alerts and clubs to sponsor radio broadcasts.

To those who feel helpless in these grave times, the book points out that "the power of the individual is unlimited, and we need only to begin looking for things that can be done."

The objective of the book is summed up in its foreword: "It is the uncommon man who still thinks in terms of free enterprise, constitutional government and making his own way. The

The Key Role Of Chemistry In Today's Designs

Chemistry is playing a key role in the modern advance of technology.

Some of the newest and most efficient uses of lumber have test tube origins. Certain chemicals are fire resistant. Others assure permanent performance under conditions of severe weather exposure. Still others enhance the appearance of wood products or increase their dimensional stability.

One of the most significant advances is the modern ability to make wood a permanent, low maintenance material for all conditions of use and exposure. In this development, chemical preservatives have strongly supplemented seasoning.

For most uses, proper seasoning — a process of drying and pre-shrinking — assures permanent performance. Typical illustrations are framing, interior paneling and exterior siding. Proper seasoning has been standardized for such products in the case of Southern Pine.

For some uses, additional protection is needed, the Southern Pine Association says. Whenever lumber is used close to the ground or under conditions of constant, severe weather exposure, it should be pressure treated with chemical preservatives. Such chemicals are toxic to termites. In many instances, they are clean, odorless and provide paintable surfaces.

Some dramatic architectural innovations have resulted. For example, exterior exposure of rafters at regular intervals of the roofline. Another illustration is the use of wood decking for the walking surfaces of open patios. Still another example is the striking exterior exposures of glued laminated wood arches in the case of many schools and churches. In all instances, pressure treatment assures permanent performance.

While proper seasoning and "pre-shrinking" are the most important sources of dimensional stability in wood, certain chemicals are making major contributions in this area. Examples are "penetrating sealers" and other moisture resistant coatings for wood paneling. As the term implies, such solutions seal the wood pores against moisture absorption and thus perpetuate the dry, pre-shrunk condition induced by seasoning.

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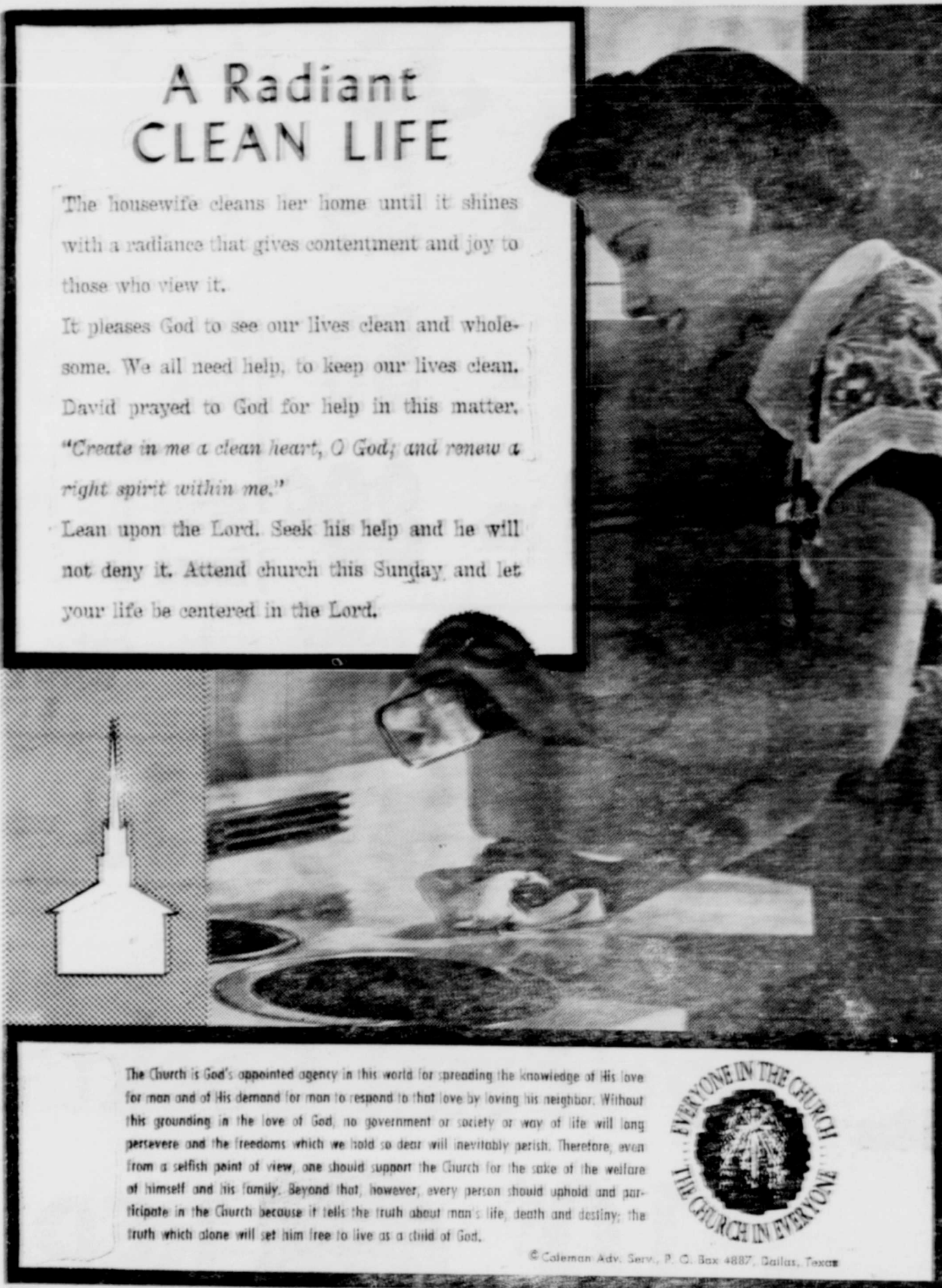

A simple way to change the character of a "cold" room—especially a large one with plain, unbroken walls—is to panel the bottom part with knotty pine.

One reader contemplating this remodeling job asks: "Is it necessary to remove the present plastered and painted wall down to the studs to put up knotty pine paneling 40 inches high?"

A—Definitely not. You can put up this "wainscoting" over the plaster easily. The only thing to remove is the shoe-mold at the bottom of the baseboard. Then run a 3-inch strip of wood around the room with the top kept level at 40 inches. The strip should be as wide as the baseboard (usually 1-inch stock). Nail this strip through the plaster to the wall studs.



Knotty pine paneling gives character to "cold" rooms.

Next, simply nail the knotty pine paneling to the top strip and the baseboard. Use tongue-and-groove lumber. Nail at an angle through the tongue and the groove of the next board will cover the nails. Replace the shoe-mold, if you wish, and add molding to cover the nailing strip and the top of the paneling. A lightweight power sander will help ease any finishing needed.

Q—"I'm just getting interested in metal work, but have trouble with the hacksaw when cutting thin metal. It gets caught up and bends when I start to saw. How can I avoid this?"

A—"You might find it easier to use a tinners' snips on thin metal. If you want to cut very thin metal with a hacksaw, however, insert the metal between two wooden blocks and mount the pieces in a vise. You'll have to saw the wood as well, but the blocks will hold the metal firm.

You may also be using too coarse a blade. Try using a finer blade with more but smaller, teeth to the inch.

IT'S THE LAW IN TEXAS

Avoid Legal Troubles in Real Estate Transactions

Thinking of buying or building a new home this year? Whether you buy a completed house or simply a lot to build on, how will you know whether you are receiving a good title to the property you purchase? The safest method is to have a title examination made—that is, a careful study of the abstract and other title evidence.

Here are a few of the common sources of trouble in real estate transaction to show why the minor expense of a title examination is justified.

Many persons sign "earnest money contracts" believing that they are mere receipts with no

serious implications. In reality they may specify, among other things, the kind of title you must accept.

A "warranty deed" from a responsible seller is comforting to have but it is a poor substitute for a careful title examination. A warranty deed does not guarantee a marketable title.

Moreover, serious title defects may not come to light until long after the seller on a warranty deed is dead, has moved to an unknown address, or is bankrupt. Even if he is available a good title is much better than a law suit.

The fact that the seller has possession of an "abstract" does not mean that he owns the property. An abstract is only a history of a title. Possession of an abstract no more indicates ownership of land than possession of the history of Texas means that you own the state.

Some purchasers of land feel

safe because the title is being examined at the time of purchase by an attorney for the mortgage lenders, or because a "mortgage" title insurance policy is being furnished. This seems logical but it is a dangerous theory. The "mortgage policy" protects only the lender, and mortgage lenders are sometimes willing to accept less than good record title as security. This is sound business for them because, among other reasons, the chances are that the mortgage will be paid off so that no expense in perfecting the title would ever need be incurred. However, it is risky business for you when you are putting your life savings into the purchase. And, even an "owner's" title insurance policy may not cover every possible defect, or the value of improvement added after purchase.

These are a few of the reasons why a title examination is

an important safeguard to you. When it is completed, the attorney gives you a written opinion stating his conclusion as to who owns the land, the defects in or charges against such ownership, and the requirements to be met if any, to make good record title.

Off-hand this may seem a simple operation. In fact it is not. It requires the interpretation of numerous deeds, mortgages, wills, court decrees and other instruments; the consideration of the order in which transactions and events affecting the title occurred; and the application of statutes and court decisions to the various situations disclosed in the abstract.

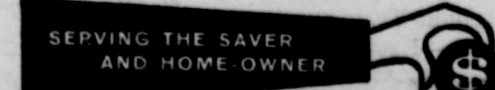

KIDNEY TRANSPLANTATION

Q. From time to time newspapers carry
stories about kidney transplantation. How
successful is this operation?

A. Since the first successful human kidney
transplant in 1954, at least 23 transplantations have
been accomplished between identical twins. We
know of one case in which a 23-year-old man
has lived for 3 1/2 years after receiving a kidney
from his accidental twin. In the present state
of surgical knowledge, only transplants between
twins have a chance. When the donor is not a
close relative, the donated kidney may function
for a while but it is ultimately "rejected" — that
is, it fails to function.

NIGHT NUMBNESS

Q. What makes one's hands and feet feel
numb on awakening?

A. This is usually due to the position in which
a person sleeps. There are positions which tem-
porarily cut off the circulation to one of the
extremities and thus cause numbness until a
good flow of blood is restored. Persons whose
blood pressure tends to be a little low may fre-
quently experience such numbness. It is nothing
to worry about.

COATED TONGUE

Q. Is a coated tongue a sign of anything?

A. No. It is simply one finding on physical
examination that is considered with various
other signs and symptoms in order to make a
diagnosis. Coated tongue, in itself, is of little
significance.
