Soil Conservation Building Given Big Official Welcome

Friends of soil conservation and shoppers in Iowa Park for Appreciation Day joined with citizens of Iowa Park to make a large crowd when ground-breaking ceremonies were held here Wednesday afternoon to start officially the construction of a new building for the Soil Conservation Service headquarters. Heralding the event were Ted Overbey and his mobile sound system and the Iowa Park high school band which toured the business streets and led the crowd down West Park to the corner of Jackson where the building is to be erected.

Following a short concert by the band, Richard Hill, master of ceremonies introduced Mayor Fenton Dale, Chamber of Commerce President Alan W. Berry, Lavere Thompson, chairman of the building committee, and the supervisors present.

Mr. Hill also acknowledged the fine work done by the finance committee of which he and Al L. Reed are co-chairmen. The workers in this effort were Fred Parkey, E. E. Voyles, T. J. Pace, L. E. Brooks and C. E. Birk.

At this point in the procedure, Mr. Berry approached the microphone and presented to L. W. Harvell, district conservationist, a shovel with which to turn the first dirt on excavations for the building's foundation.

Annual Electric Show To Supplement Wheat Harvest Festivities

Clowns, a callopie, an oldtime brass band and a life-sized animated pigmy elephant that does everything except eat peanuts will be among the unusual entertainment features of the Texas Electric Show of '50 that will open on the grounds of Wichita Falls high school Monday evening, May 29.

The entire show will carry the circus theme, from the big top to the sideshow stands, and even a circus barker, according to W. R. Pastusek, Texas Electric Service company manager. The show is free and is being presented by the company in co-operation with electrical dealers and distributors. It will go on for five days from 6:00 to 11:00 p.m. and close Friday night, June 2.

The entire show will be on the school grounds, with electrical appliances and equipment for the home and farm displayed in a large tent. Smaller tents and canopies will house other attractions.

Among the interesting things to be seen at the Electric Show will be the largest lamp bulb in the world, big as a bushel basket. Beneath it will be the smallest lamp bulb, the size of a grain of wheat. Other displays will include a presentation of mechanized puppets to tell a modern version of the story of "Ten Little Indians," and a model power plant. Much of the electrical equipment will be in operation or be demonstrated at the show.

Varied entertainment features will be presented, including musical programs by Red Woodward and his Home Town Dandies, an old-fashioned type band with Gay Nineties costumes.

Reddy Kilowatt, more talkative than usual, will greet his little friends. Reddy will appear in his own private circus wagon.

Colored movies will be shown after dark each evening during the show. Two searchlights of 800 million candlepower each will be turned on each night and sweep the skies for a radius of 30 miles. During previous Electric Shows, these lights have been seen as far as 60 miles away.

A three-day graduation observance was celebrated by Austin college, which has continued its educational program without interruption throughout the past 100 years.

On Sunday evening Miss Yeargan accompanied the Austin college orchestra and a capella choir in the presentation of Brahms' Requiem to a capacity audience in the new gymnasium.

Miss Yeargan, who recently gave her senior recital, shares with Miss Virginia Foshee the distinction of being the first two students at Austin college to receive the BA degree with a major in music.

Miss Yeargan leaves Sunday with the capella choir for New York where the choir will sing over NBC Sunday morning, June 4, at 9:30 (Eastern Standard Time) and will present a concert at the morning worship hour in the Madison Avenue Presbyterian church of which Dr. George Buttick is pastor. The choir will give about 20 concerts on the tour, including one in Washington, and will sing before the General assembly of the Presbyterian church U. S. meeting at Masinetta Springs, Va. The tour will cover a three-week period.

Representative Sam Rayburn of Texas, speaker of the House, was honored speaker at the dedication of the new gymnasium and the Paul Coffin dormitory; and Dr. Charles J. Turck, president of Macalester college, St. Paul, Minn., was the commencement speaker.

The Sherman chamber of commerce presented W. B. Guerrant, president of Austin college, with a check for \$10,000 contributed by citizens of Sherman toward a new \$175,000 Student Union building, subscribed by the college alumni.

Tuesday morning in Wichita Falls, R. W. Bedford, director of the Austin college capella choir, had the degree of doctor of music conferred on him by Midwestern university.

Those attending the Austin college convocation from Iowa Park included Miss Frances Park, Miss Evelyn Miller, Miss Bettye Jane Birk, Calvin Hensen of Midwestern university, and Bobby Birk.

Elevator Here Ready For Wheat Harvest

L. I. Southard, manager of the Iowa Park Elevator, expects wheat harvest in this area to begin this week. His preparations are all made for handling the crop: plenty of storage space, lots of railroad cars and wheat trucks; and plenty of places to send this year's crop.

Although there has been a noticeable absence of out of state combines awaiting the harvest, Mr. Southard anticipates a better crop locally than was reaped last year.

Wheat will rank as the Number One star among a host of celebrities congregating in Wichita Falls, May 29 through June 3 to observe the opening of another harvest season.

This commodity annually spotlights North Texas and western Oklahoma as first depositors in the Nation's Breadbasket. Wichita Falls citizens have planned entertainment galore during the National Wheat Harvest Festival, the first organized recognition of wheat's importance.

Stars who are scheduled to attend the festival and participate in the events are Dennis O'Keefe, Constance Moore, Gene Autry, Jack Dempsey, Carlos Molina and his orchestra.

The Coronation Show, Friday night will be a high point of entertainment when the queen will be announced, and the royal lady crowned by O'Keefe. Princesses and escorts will be introduced during the show. Molina and his company of entertainers are to be featured at the Coronation Show and will play later at Midwestern university gym for the formal ball honoring the queen.

Square dance contest and a street dance are planned for Saturday night on roped-off streets.

A week of activities which have large audience appeal begins Monday night when the Wichita Falls Spudders play Austin. The players will get into the spirit of harvest by dressing up their playing togs with genuine harvest apparel.

Texas Electric Service company's spring show is scheduled at the Wichita Falls high school auditorium from Monday through Friday. Then Thursday night Gorgeous George will meet either Ollie Pascha or Killer Karl Krauser in a wrestling ring set up in Spudder Park. Sideline seats are to be provided along first and third base strips, and the spot behind home plate will be reserved for best audience vantage.

Harvesters from several wheat belts will be on hand to make up part of Saturday morning's parade. The area's honored citizen — the farmer bringing to Wichita Falls the first load of wheat — the queen and her court; merchants' displays and several bands will make up a major part of the parade. The visiting celebrities will lead the extravaganza.

Every town gets a chance to perform, during Friday and Saturday afternoons in a street show. A central bandstand is to be set up for a talent parade where those desiring may present a group of singers, orators, comedians, any type entertainment.

Participation in harvest festivities has been extended over a 65-county area, bordered by New Mexico; Gainesville, Stamford and western Oklahoma.
