Permanent Neutrality Laws Sought

Exports Would Be Limited To Quotas Shipped In Normal Times

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (UP)—The United States policy was indicated today as designed to restrict exports of war supplies to belligerents to the quotas or averages of exports of such materials in normal times.

This country is definitely off the list as a large supplier of war materials to nations waging war, it was stated in emphatic language in state department circles.

It is now the policy and it was indicated it will continue to be the policy of this government to attempt to confine exports of war supplies to a "normal" basis.

More Latitude For President

For this purpose, it was indicated, the administration probably will ask the next session of congress for permanent neutrality legislation giving the president much more latitude and discretion in his efforts to keep the United States out of those wars.

This government feels it is not incumbent upon it from any viewpoint, it was explained, to supply necessary war materials to belligerent countries and to protect any war, especially in the light of this government's interest in peace and its obligations under the Kellogg pact.

The Roosevelt administration feels that profits made out of trade in abnormal quantities of war supplies is "blood money" and it is determined to do all in its power to discourage that trade.

The method used and the type of pressure exerted to discourage the trade may differ, but the main policy will be continued along its present course, it was said.

Financial Pressure

In connection with the financial pressure exerted during the past few days on American shipping lines to discourage use of ships on which the government holds mortgages for carrying war supplies to

Hearing Set By Klapproth For Saturday

Move To Force Appointment Of Commission Renewed By City

Once more the city's mandamus petition against County Judge J. S. Garlington was thrown into the courts when the suit was refiled Tuesday afternoon in the 70th district court.

Judge Charles L. Klapproth set Saturday 10 a. m. as the date and time of hearing.

To Fight Case

The petition was originally filed in the 11th district court of civil appeals in Eastland and was subsequently dismissed when the appellate court held it did not possess jurisdiction over the matter. The district court, said an opinion by Associate Justice Clyde Grisom, was the proper court.

Judge Garlington, who announced on the eve of the hearing in the higher court that he would not contest the suit, said emphatically Wednesday that he would fight the suit when it comes up for a hearing Saturday morning.

He said he had not engaged counsel but added that this might be done before Saturday.

Conferred With Judge

City Attorney Thomas J. Coffey said that the petition was filed Tuesday afternoon after two conferences with Judge Garlington in the hope of securing appointment of three jury-of-view commissioners without necessity of further court action.

Coffey and Garlington talked the matter over Monday afternoon and again Tuesday morning. When no action had been taken Tuesday afternoon the petition was filed with District Clerk Hugh D. Dabery.

The suit is the result of Judge Garlington's refusal to appoint three special commissioners to appraise the city's PWA property.

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Holiday Observance To Start With Union Services Tonight

Observance of Thanksgiving as a national holiday will be started in Big Spring this evening, when union Thanksgiving services, sponsored by the local pastors' association, and in which all churches of the city are joining, will be held at the municipal auditorium. The services will start at 7:30 o'clock.

Tomorrow, business in Big Spring will be at a stand-still, as stores, banks, offices and schools are closed for observance of the holiday. The day will be an occasion for family reunions and feasting for many, in keeping with the Thanksgiving tradition. Many others will take advantage of the holiday to witness the all-important district 3 football game at Sweetwater, where the Steers and Mustangs clash.

It will be an extended holiday for schools. Last classes of the week were held Wednesday, and students will not return to work until Monday. The extra day is given to permit teachers to attend the convention of their state association at San Antonio.

The public is invited to attend the service.

At least three churches will hold Thanksgiving services tomorrow. Christian Science services will be held at 11 a. m. at the Settles hotel. At 9:30 a. m. Holy Communion will be observed at the St. Mary's Episcopal church; and special services will be held at the St. Paul's Lutheran church at 7:30 p. m.

The football game at Sweetwater will be the principal holiday attraction for many Big Spring residents. A special train will be operated to the Nolan county city, and hundreds are expected to make the trip by automobile. The special train will leave here at 11:45 a. m., and the game will start at 2:30.

TICKET SALE IS CONTINUED

Train Fares, Game Ducats Available At Hotel

Tickets for the district grid game in Sweetwater tomorrow afternoon, and for the Big Spring special train to the Nolan county city will remain on sale in the Hotel Settles lobby for several hours Thursday morning. It was announced by high school officials today.

The service will be maintained to enable purchases to avoid the last-minute crush at the Texas & Pacific station at train departure time tomorrow, and at the Sweetwater field at game time.

Sales Pick Up

Tickets were going at a more rapid pace Wednesday, authorities reported, especially at the school, where students are planning a big delegation to back the Steers in their important tilt. Ducats, for the game set at 75 cents for adults and 25 cents for students, while the round trip train fare is \$1.

Several hundred are expected to be aboard the special when it pulls out Thursday morning at 11:45. It is scheduled to arrive in Sweetwater at 1:15 p. m. The game starts at 2:30. The train will leave Sweetwater at 6 p. m., arriving back in Big Spring at 7:30.

Italy Issues New Warning

Developments On Sanctions, Oil Embargo Cause Unrest

(By The Associated Press)

The Italo-Ethiopian conflict Wednesday engendered new European unrest as Italian sources said powerful resistance was expected if the league of nations presses for an extension of sanctions; and as the British cabinet met to consider the proposed oil and coal embargo, believed to be one of the gravest decisions yet involved in the African conflict.

Italy announced that its northern army had advanced slightly, occupying two villages southeast of the front lines at Makale.

Ethiopia, however, claimed victories on both fronts, insisting that Italians in the north had retreated to Adigrat.

The United States was understood to be considering a quota system to govern the export of war materials. The league general staff of experts meanwhile assembled to determine whether the sanctions are being enforced.

From Rome, reliable sources said that the government largely had canceled the furloughs recently extended to 100,000 men; and that new troop movements, which were unexplained, had been ordered.

Angelo Jail Gets Federal Approval

SAN ANGELO, Nov. 27.—Roy Casey, inspector for the U. S. bureau of prisons, told Sheriff Van Court here that he would recommend the local jail be reinstated among the approved list for holding federal prisoners.

Casey made the report that resulted in the elimination of the jail from the list after an inspection several months ago. Recent improvements met with Casey's approval today.

Local federal prisoners have been held in the Abilene jail during the last few months.

C-C Directors To Meet Friday

Chamber of commerce directors will hold their regular semi-monthly meeting Friday at 3:30 p. m. from the chamber offices in the Settles hotel.

It is expected that some important matters will come before the directors at that time. Among things to be discussed will be plans for the annual membership campaign and the annual chamber banquet.

Dean Law Is Held To Be No Longer Valid

Another Tribunal Decrees Against Wet Precincts In Dry Counties

AUSTIN, Nov. 27. (AP)—The court of criminal appeals today freed 26 persons convicted of violating the old prohibition law, while the supreme court held, in a decision handed down today, that a wet precinct is not permitted in a county which voted dry by local option.

Indictments Invalid

The appeals court held that the new state act, providing misdemeanor penalties for violation of the package sale law with local option, in effect had repealed the Dean law.

Repeal of the old prohibition act was held to be an invalidation of pending indictments.

The supreme court determined the precinct policy in two cases involving construction of the local option clause in the 1933 constitutional amendment which legalized the sale of 32 beer.

Other Rulings

The supreme court also denied a rehearing on its decision rendering unconstitutional the act proposing discounts for prompt payment of ad valorem taxes. It also denied a rehearing on its decision upholding the railroad commission's rule regulating the spacing of oil wells.

The court recently had held that the tax discount law was invalid.

The criminal appeals court ruling in invalidating pending indictments under the old liquor laws was expected to mean that hundreds of bills throughout Texas will be dropped from the court dockets.

Brazil Revolt Being Quelled

Govt. Forces Recapture Natal; Army Rebels Surrender

RIO DE JANEIRO, Nov. 27. (UP)—Loyal federal forces today forced the surrender of a rebellious group of enlisted men at the aviation school at Villa Militar, a suburb of Rio de Janeiro, and then fixed bayonets for a charge against the revolting Third Infantry regiment.

The rebellion spread to troops here shortly after the government announced it had recaptured Natal. A group of sergeants and privates attacked the aviation school, but surrendered in the face of an overwhelming attack by the federal forces after sergeants had assumed command of the troops. Bombing planes roared over the school and dropped bombs, and the rebels capitulated.

The Third Infantry group revolted at Praia Vermelha, the government forces bombarded the barracks and the infantry advanced with bayonets fixed.

Government officials, claiming the upper hand in Pernambuco, believed they soon would regain control of Rio Grande do Norte.

But they threw a ring of troops about the banks and communication centers even in Rio de Janeiro and announced the arrest of many alleged plotters in Bahia, south of the battle zone.

Insurgents driven from Socorro, one of three important towns held since Sunday by the leftist rebels, fled northwest of Recife (Pernambuco) and prepared for a stand, the governor of Pernambuco reported. Socorro fell after 22 hours of fighting.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27. (AP)—Examiner John P. Bramhall today recommended to the federal communications commission that it grant the application of the Big Spring Herald Broadcasting company for a new 100-watt radio station.

He also recommended that the application of Vernon Taylor Anderson, manager of the ABC Broadcasting company of Big Spring, be denied.

The recommendation is subject to the commission's approval.

Hearings on both applications were conducted by Bramhall in August.

In view of this, the local committee said the contributions will be accepted here during the next two weeks, but that no formal effort will be made to secure additional funds. Latest contributions to the local fund were as follows: Mary Louise Wood, \$2; J. L. Wood, Jr., \$1; Emory Duff, 50 cents; L. S. McDowell, \$1; Mrs. L. S. McDowell, \$1; and Lorin McDowell, 50 cents.

The national commission has decided to make handicapped children the main beneficiaries of the memorial fund. It has been announced. Handicapped children always were a concern of the late national figure, and it was decided the aid of such youngsters would be the best way to perpetuate the memory of Rogers. Laval Cabinet Believed Safe From Overthrow

PARIS, Nov. 27. (AP)—Premier Laval strengthened hopes of saving his cabinet from overthrow, informed sources said, by pinning the government to a "golden franc."

Financial issues superceded the question of dissolution of the nationalistic league, on which leftist forces intended to attack the government at the opening of parliament tomorrow.

The cabinet was regarded as being safe in stand against devaluation of the franc.

Japs Occupy China Cities

Tokyo Military Leaders To Fight Nanking's Plans Toward State

(By The Associated Press)

Thousands of Japanese soldiers Wednesday entered the important cities of North China as their leaders announced the seizure of a railway-junction east of Peking.

Trains brought 3,000 Japanese troops and war equipment to Tientsin, and the Japanese garrison at Peking was more than doubled, simultaneous with the Japanese military's disapproval of Nanking's plans for settling the North China crisis.

A high Chinese official said his government had determined to meet with force any move to impose the autonomy program of the territory south of the borders of Hopei and Chahar provinces.

Yin Ju-Keng, administrative commissioner of the north china demilitarized zone, already has proclaimed an autonomous state in 25 counties in east Hopei and Chahar provinces.

The nation's militarists, meeting in Nanking, have adopted a plan to defend Shantung and Honan provinces against encroachment from the southern Hopei border, the government informant stated.

This border has been adopted as the first line of defense against an autonomy movement from the north—political or military—he asserted.

The central government is seeking to hold the support of the Shantung governor, Han Fu-Chu, by entrusting him with the defense of the northern Honan and Shantung frontiers and promising him money and supplies if needed, to stem invasion.

QUARTERBACK BRUNER MAY BE OUT OF GAME WITH A BAD LEG INJURY

SWEETWATER, Nov. 27.—Playing their second hard game within the week, the Sweetwater Mustangs will be in none too good physical condition here Thursday afternoon with the powerful Big Spring Steers.

The lightweights came through the grueling game with the San Angelo Bobcats Friday afternoon battered and bruised. However, Cecil Bruner, quarterback, who, with his brother, Lawrence, constitutes about 80 per cent of the Sweetwater attack, has not fully recovered from a leg injury he received in the Bobcat game. Cecil has been doing light work in preparation for the Steer game, but he may not be able to start.

Mustang coaches have been working frantically since the Bobcat game in an effort to strengthen the right side of their line. As most observers noted, the Cats made most of their gains through that spot.

Coach Ed Hennig will likely start his regular against the Steers Thursday afternoon, with the exception of C. Bruner.

The backfield, will in his absence, be made up of L. Bruner at full, Holbert at quarter, McElroy and Browning at halves.

The work of Captain A. J. Roy at an end position last Friday was more or less pleasing to the Mustang mentors and Roy will likely be at one of the flanks, along with J. B. Worley. The two tackle posts will be filled by Tom Hendrick and Riley Simmons. The guards will likely be Co-captains Cullen Taylor and Bud Allridge. Leo Ensign will, no doubt, be at the pivot post.

The only statement the Mustangs or coaches are making about the Turkey Day clash is: "We'll give them plenty of resistance." Those who saw the Mustang-Bobcat game will not deny that the Hennigmen battled every step of the way through the four quarters of the Angelo game and were still fighting when the final gun sounded.

FORT WORTH, Nov. 27.—How to stop Bobby Wilson? That is the question facing the Horned Frogs as they go about their practice sessions this week.

They have successfully answered the question of how to stop Jack Robbins of Arkansas; how to stop Homer Pitner of A. & M.; how to stop Lloyd Russell of Baylor; how to stop Hubert Jurecka of Texas; how to stop Bill Wallace of Rice.

The Frogs believe they can stop Bobby Wilson. Or, at least, if they can't stop him, that they can chalk up markers faster than Wilson and Company.

Of course, the Frogs may be wrong. That is the reason why more than 30,000 persons will throng to Fort Worth next Saturday to see the Christians and the Methodists fight it out for the Southwest Conference flag—and maybe a chance at the mythical national title.

The Frogs came out of the Rice game with only a few bruises. Dutch Kline, who started at left half, was taken out of the game early in the first quarter, after he had bruised his hip. But he will be ready to go Saturday.

Capt. Darrell Lester suffered a bad cut over his eye early in the game, but played all but the last few minutes against the Owls.

"He played even better after his head had been taped up than he did before," a Houston sports writer observed.

The week's work will be devoted to polishing both defense and offense. Those who have seen the various conference teams in action report that the Mustangs have the best line of any of the seven teams. The defensive record of S. M. U. is outstanding, and the Frogs know they will have to be at their top form if they score against the Mustangs.

The game will be played on a dry field, in spite of the rain, unless rain is falling at game time. The field is covered with a water-proof canvas which will not be removed until just before the opening whistle.

U. S. Export Of Chemical Items

Shows Increase

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27. (UP)—The commerce department disclosed today a marked increase in exports of chemicals and allied products—important materials in warfare. The purchases were not announced.

The department late last week, in announcing exports to Italy for October, disclosed that the increase in chemical and allied products exports to the fascist nation had increased only from \$138,000 in October, 1934, to \$151,955 last month. The increase to Italian Africa, however, was from \$52 to \$25,868.

However, the total of American exports to all nations was sharply up, indicating that other nations might be "stocking up."

The United States exported more chemicals and allied products during October than in any month during the past "several years" on the basis of dollar value, the department reported.

Claude E. (Tiny) Thornhill, the Indians' coach, professed ignorance as to who the eastern team might be. He confined comment to expressions of pleasure over the Cards' win from California.

ALL TIME RECORD GOES TO FROGS

FORT WORTH, Nov. 27.—Figures compiled after the T. C. U. Horned Frogs crushing victory over the Texas University Longhorns at Austin on Nov. 1 reveal that the Frogs are the all-time leaders of the Southwest Conference. Up until that game the Longhorns were the leaders of the circuit which was organized in 1914.

T. C. U. entered the conference in 1923, and over this period have won 39 games, lost 19, and tied seven for a percentage of .648. The Steers, T. C. U.'s closest rival, have an all-time percentage of .615.

Even more striking is the record of the Frogs in the past 11 years, which embraces the period that the Southwest Conference membership became what it is today. In that space of time T. C. U. has won 37 conference games, lost 14, and tied seven for a percentage of .696.

No Sudden Spurt

These figures demonstrate that the eminence of the Frogs as the result of their achievements this fall is not a sudden emergence to success, but that season after season it has been the most consistently successful of any school in the Southwest Conference.

The Frogs have been crowned champions of the group twice—in 1929 and 1932, and are bidding for attack that will match the Frogs

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MR. ROCKEFELLER'S VIEWS

John D. Rockefeller, Jr., created news of interest to many recently when he informed the Northern Baptist convention (he is a member of the Baptist church) that he was terminating his annual gifts to the unified budget of the convention.

Mr. Rockefeller took the position that his money could do more good in projects, "chiefly interdenominational or non-denominational in character, which interpret the Christian task in the light of present day needs and which are based not so much on denominational affiliation as on broad, forward-looking principles of cooperation."

The financier thus has aligned himself definitely on one side of a question that long has been discussed pro and con by church leaders and philanthropists. Mr. Rockefeller mailed a copy of his letter to the press, in order to make his position clear. Whether or not one agrees with Mr. Rockefeller, some of his conclusions are thought-provoking. We pass along excerpts from his letter:

"I believe in denominations—insofar as they make necessary provision for individual variation in religious experience. x x x What gives me pause is the tendency inherent in denominations to emphasize the form instead of the substance, the denominational peculiarity instead of the oneness of Christian purpose. I have long felt that this emphasis is a divisive force in the progress of organized Christian work and an obstacle to the development of the spirit and life of Christ among men."

"If the Church is to go forward, x x x these denominational distinctions are bound to fade in the forward movement of a great united Church open to all who seek to follow Christ and to find in Him the abundant life. x x x We should work in relegating the non-essentials to a place of secondary importance and stand for the fundamentals of a Christian unity x x x"

"I am therefore seeking to use such influence as I have in emphasizing the basic truths common to all denominations, in lowering denominational barriers and in promoting effective cooperation among Christians of whatever creed."

NEW YORK—At the premiere of "Jumbo" the other night a feminine guest fainted and had to be rushed to a hospital. "Anthony Adverse," that marathon novel about which so many gags were spun when it first appeared has a rival in the seemingly endless "Time and the River," a tome so pretentious that one Maid of Manhattan inquired thus of an editor: "I am anxious to read 'Time and the River' but after two years am only half way through 'Anthony Adverse.' If I stop now do you think it will affect my cultural development?"

Nancy Carroll used to be Nancy La Hiff before she won an amateur night's contest in that old 81st street theater and got her chances to become a star.

In my resume of butterfly girls who flamed so provocatively if momentarily during the Ziegfeld era I didn't mention Joyce Hawley, the girl in the champagne bath tub at that famous Earl Carroll party. . . . After the sensation of the Carroll trial she told friends she was going to Germany and try to get a start in pictures, just as Imogene Wilson did after the Frank Tinney trial. If she did, nothing much came of it, for she hasn't been heard of or seen on Broadway in years. . . . After that episode Carroll went to prison and then came back to write his experiences in a piece called "Stars and Bars."

Sometimes the critics get pushed around by the fists of resentful actresses whose notices have not come up to anticipations. There was that party in a Park avenue mansion the other evening into which an unwary critic dropped. Hardly had his hat been taken when a well-known actress saluted him with an insulting remark, planted herself in front of him, and undulosed upon him a verbal onslaught which went far beyond the "Smile when you say that" stage. Then, to end matters, she slapped him smartly across the cheek. . . . "May I have this dance with you?" quietly pursued the critic as if nothing had happened. This so upset the hysterical one that she fled in tears.

Fisticuffs seem to play an increasingly larger part in the lives of entertainers and hecklers. . . . Rudy Vallee twice has punched annoyers in the nose. There was that time, too, when Vallee pursued a newspaperman to his lair because he was embittered at a story the scribe had written. But the reporter wasn't at home and Rudy waited for him on the curb until dawn.

Edith Barrett, while not related to the Wimpole street gang, has that same quality of fragile, wistful loveliness that makes Lillian Gish so unforgettable. . . . You'll remember her beautiful portrayal in "Capone's" with the distinguished (and occasionally fretful) Walter Hampden. Hampden was greatly embittered over refusal of the press to go beyond the lukewarm stage in his recent production, "Achilles Had a Heel," in which he played the part of a Negro keeper at the zoo. Finally it was withdrawn with the terse statement that "it was killed by the critics."

The DAILY WASHINGTON MERRY-GO-ROUND

By DREW PEARSON and ROBERT S. ALLEN

WASHINGTON—Six-foot-six Sir Ronald Lindsay, His Majesty's ambassador to the United States, slipped into the state department after it was almost closed the other night and climbed the back stairs because the elevators were not running.

Closeted with Cordell Hull for more than an hour, he told the inside secret of why the Japanese suddenly had halted their plans to seize North China.

The foreign office in London had called in round Ambassador Matsudaira, uncle-in-law of the emperor, told him that if the league of nations applied sanctions against Italy for conquering Ethiopia it should also apply them against Japan for stealing North China; that Britain was ready to go to bat for this policy.

Shortly afterward, Secretary Hull went down the back stairs of the state department, motored to the union station and conveyed this information to Roosevelt just before the president's train departed for Warm Springs at 9:30 p. m.

British Policy 1931-32
Four years before this, almost to the month—Sir Ronald Lindsay used to come down to the state department to confer with Secretary Henry L. Stimson.

At that time, he nodded assent while Stimson lectured him on the dangers of Japanese aggression in Manchuria. The Japanese move into Manchuria, Stimson said, was but the first step. It would be followed by the conquest of North China, then the Yangtze valley, stronghold of British trade, then South China and Hongkong.

Mr. Stimson also held lengthy and vigorous trans-Atlantic telephone conversations with his old friend Ramsay MacDonald, prime minister of the national government. MacDonald agreed with him emphatically, promised cooperation, a definite Anglo-American front.

But whenever Ambassador Cameron Parkes in Tokyo delivered one of Secretary Stimson's vigorous protests to the Japanese foreign office, the British ambassador called an hour or so later to say that Great Britain thoroughly understood the Japanese situation.

And when Secretary Stimson finally went to Geneva himself to enlist the support of Europe's premier for definite sanctions against Japan, the only semblance of support he could get was from Italy.

Economic Stimson Policy
Henry L. Stimson called back crestfallen from Geneva. He had tried to set an example for peace. He had tried to block Japan's initial move toward engulfing all China. He had tried to bolster the league of nations. And the British had stabbed him in the back.

After Roosevelt was elected, but before he assumed office—Stimson saw to it, came away elated. He had told the president his policy in the far east.

Since then international initiative has been reversed. The British have been doing the talking. The state department has been doing the listening.

The only difference is that Roosevelt, as well as he can under the neutrality laws, is backing the British up to the hilt.

Pink Of Condition
The persistence with which Herbert Hoover's intimates enthuse over his buoyant health is considered highly significant. The rhapsodies are viewed as having all the earmarks of campaign propaganda.

During the ex-president's last trip east, members of his entourage missed no opportunity to regale reporters with tales of his endurance and high spirits. Among the incidents related by Ben Allen, his publicity agent, were the following:

After an all-day automobile trip beginning at 6:30 a. m. and ending long after midnight, during which Mr. Hoover personally drove much of the time, he said to his secretary Paul Saxon:

"Well, Paul, the night is still young. We can put in a couple of hours cleaning up correspondence."

Later, while visiting at the home of a former friend, Mr. Hoover wanted to get away early the next morning but hesitated to say so for fear his host might feel he was anxious to leave. Mr. Hoover mentioned this to another guest, who told him that the host had an engagement in a town some distance away that would necessitate his leaving at 5:30 a. m.

"That's fine," said Hoover. "That fits right in with my plans. We'll drive home then."

And despite the next morning's early rising hour, Mr. Hoover remained awake until after midnight in order to talk to neighboring farmers who dropped in to greet him.

Merry-Go-Round

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State Building Permits Higher

AUSTIN, Nov. 27.—Building permits granted in Texas during October were sharply above those of the corresponding month last year, according to the University of Texas bureau of business research. Reports from 35 representative Texas cities show aggregate permits of \$4,161,790, an increase of 125.5 per cent over October last year, and 104.8 per cent over the preceding month. Cities showing increases over the two comparable periods included: Abilene, Amarillo, Austin, Beaumont, Brownsville, Brownwood, Corpus Christi, Dallas, Denison, El Paso, Fort Worth, Lubbock, Marshall, Palestine, San Antonio, Tyler, Waco, and Wichita Falls.

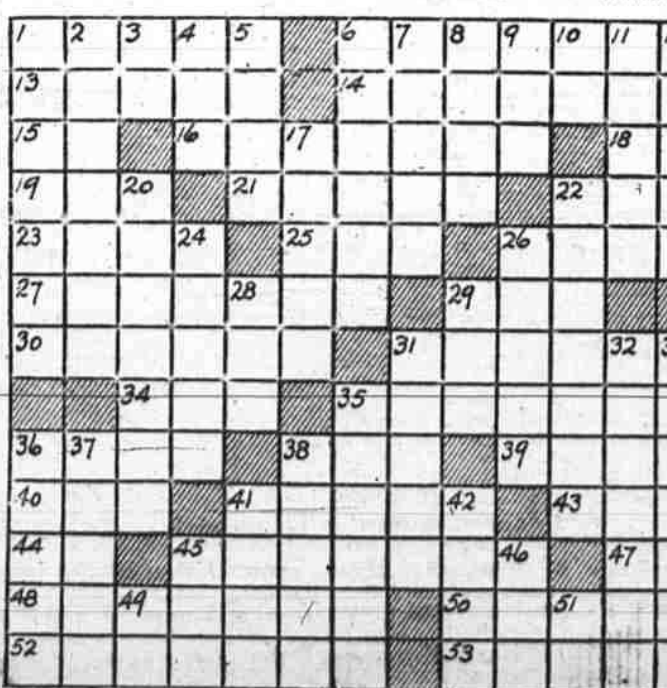

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Airline Tests Over Atlantic Likely In '36

Ireland-To-Newfoundland Route Surveyed For Regular Service

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 27. (UP)—Experimental flying across the North Atlantic, over a course being considered jointly by Canada, Britain and the United States for establishment of a regular transatlantic air service, will begin in 1936, it is forecast here.

British post office, airway and aviation officials are here to start laying plans for a regular transatlantic service with bases in Ireland and Newfoundland which will link Britain, Canada and the United States, and ensure the delivery of mail in Montreal within three days after their despatch from

London. The spectacular plan, in which both government and private enterprise will co-operate, contemplates a change as revolutionary as that involved in the change from sailing vessels to steamships.

America Assured Part
There is no danger of the United States being excluded from the picture. Pan-American Airways was allowed to participate in the first conference held in St. John's, Newfoundland, two years ago, and it will be to the fore in future parleys.

After finishing their conference here, Sir Donald Banks, director-general of the British post office, Col. F. C. Shermerhorn, director of civil aviation, and G. R. Woods-Humphrey, manager-director of Imperial Airways, will go to Washington.

The proposal, said one Canadian official, envisages British and American co-operation on a fifty-fifty basis. Preparations are so far advanced that it is expected experimental flying will begin next year. Compromises like the ship-to-shore service have dropped out of the picture. The project has virtually narrowed down to the Ireland-Newfoundland route.

Arctic Route Opposed
"For a time the Arctic route was favored, since it would have allowed a series of bases to be established in Labrador, Baffinland, Greenland, Iceland and the Faroe Islands, the distance between which would not have been greater than 500 miles. But Canada always has maintained that the severe climate, shortness of the summer season, and the inaccessibility of some of the bases made the Arctic route impracticable, and apparently others have come round to our view."

Machines capable of making a long hop from Ireland to Newfoundland required by the more southerly route already exist in the United States, and they will be available next year in Great Britain. It is possible that until they have been further perfected it might prove necessary to shift in winter from the North Atlantic to the South Atlantic route.

Canada Vital Link
"The North Atlantic once conquered, the most direct commercial air line to the Orient will be across Canada. Or the shorter route, joining Chicago, which may be taken as the center of transportation on North American continent, with Tokyo passes through Yukon and Alaska, across Bering Straits and by the northeast coast of Asia to Japan, Manchuria and Northern China."

"With the Pacific and Atlantic linked by Pan-American in the United States, and Imperial Airways in Britain, those two companies will conjointly control air passage over most of the earth. Who is to carry on our 2,000-mile trans-Canadian service has not yet been decided."

Air mail is to play an important part on the transatlantic and trans-Canadian projects. The British post office has declared for transportation of all empire first class mail by air at a flat rate of three cents a half-ounce.

FORT WORTH, Nov. 27.—Cash awards totaling \$1,200 and engraved plaques are being awarded to 24 bus drivers of the Southwestern Greyhound lines, as a reward for driving six consecutive years without an accident or an announcement by Paul W. Tibbets, president of the company.

In addition to the six-year cash awards, the company will award eight five-year diamond studded buttons and plaques, eight four-year sapphire studded buttons and plaques, seven three-year ruby studded buttons and card certificates, making a total of 76 safety awards.

The rigidity of the requirements for these awards is indicated by the fact that even a scratched fender is charged against the driver as an accident. Despite the strict requirements, the total safety button awards made to Greyhound drivers during the past five years represent in excess of 460 million miles of driving with "no-accident" records.

New Deal Holds Its Own In Poll Of Rural Areas

NEW YORK, Nov. 27. (UP)—A poll of rural and small-town sentiment throughout the country today indicated an almost even division of support between President Roosevelt and the republican field. The test was made by the American Press and Publishers Autocaster Service of New York.

Figured on the basis of electoral college votes, Mr. Roosevelt and the republicans were tied with 261 each, with Arizona, Delaware and Nevada not counted.

Popular votes in the straw ballot favored Mr. Roosevelt against the field by 119,287 to 104,851.

Sen. William E. Borah was recalled as the first choice of rural America for the republican nomination. Gov. Alf Landon of Kansas was a close second, Publisher Frank Knox third and Herbert Hoover fourth.

Big Employment Increase During October Reported

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27. (UP)—In another optimistic picture of the business situation, Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins reported today that October employment increased 250,000 jobs over September with a corresponding weekly payroll gain of \$8,200,000.

She attributed the rise largely to continued substantial gains in the manufacturing industries, which brought factory employment to its highest level since October, 1930, and boosted payrolls higher than at any time since March, 1931.

An increase of 75,000 employees was reported in retail trade establishments, while wholesale businesses employed 24,000 more than in September. Sharp rises also were registered in the anthracite and metalliferous mining groups.

English Join Americans In Thanksgiving

LONDON, Nov. 27. (UP)—Americans in England will gather around feasts of turkey, cranberry sauce and pumpkin pie tomorrow to give thanks—in the manner of their Pilgrim fathers—for more cheerful times in their adopted homeland.

Thanksgiving Day celebrations in Great Britain, bringing together American residents in annual reunions, will strike a note of new optimism.

Speakers, both Americans and British, will tell of improved economic conditions in this country and the United States and of the firm resolve of the two nations to avoid entanglements in any foreign wars.

Dinner And Ball Arranged
The outstanding Thanksgiving event, as in previous years, will be the dinner and ball of the American Society in the new Dorchester Hotel in London.

D. Campbell Lee, acting secretary of the society, has arranged for more than 350 members of the society and their American and British friends.

Ambassador Robert Worth Bingham will preside over a traditional turkey dinner with all the "trimmings" in his capacity as honorary chairman of the American Society. The dinner will be served at 8 o'clock, in a setting of pumpkins and other Thanksgiving decorations. A ball, beginning at 11 o'clock will continue until 3 a. m.

The principal speaker of this year's dinner will be Prof. Kenneth Murdock, dean of the faculty of arts and sciences at Harvard University, who will recall to the Americans the full significance of "The Day We Celebrate."

Britons To Attend
The toast to the guests, including a large number of British citizens, will be proposed by E. S. Daniels,

of Waco, Tex., chairman of the society.

At the end of the dinner Ambassador Bingham will propose the toast that is inevitable at all American gatherings in London—"to the king and the president of the United States." While the toast is drunk, in fine champagne, a band will play "God Save the King" and "The Star Spangled Banner."

A corps of English chefs at the Dorchester Hotel, one of London's great cosmopolitan gathering places, have been specially trained in arranging the turkey dinner, replete with sweet potatoes, corn-on-the-cob, pumpkin and mince pie and other trimmings which couldn't ordinarily be found by an American if he searched the city from one end to the other.

Many Localities Represented
The committee for the ball is composed of Justin R. Weddell, of Montclair, N. J., and New York City; Gilbert H. Carr, of Fresno, Calif.; Tarkenton, Winchester, of Baltimore, and Francis E. Powell, Jr., of New York.

Another honored guest will be U. S. Consul General Robert Frazer, honorary vice chairman of the society.

Several other smaller Thanksgiving observances will be held, including a mid-day luncheon of the American Women's club with roast turkey and pumpkin pie, and a luncheon at the American club in Piccadilly.

American students at Cambridge and Oxford universities have arranged for turkey luncheons with members of the faculty as their guests.

Employment Gains Noted

Figures In Texas Ahead Of Last Month And November, 1934

AUSTIN, Nov. 27.—Employment conditions in Texas have improved moderately during November, both in comparison with the preceding month and the corresponding month last year, according to the University of Texas bureau of business research.

Reports from about 1,500 representative Texas establishments give an aggregate of 59,980 employees, an increase of 1.2 per cent over the number of workers in the same establishments during November, last year and 1 per cent over the number during the preceding month. Total payrolls of these establishments for the week ended Nov. 16 increased 6.5 per cent over the corresponding week last year and about 1.7 per cent over the preceding month.

Cities showing increases over the state average in the number of workers compared with November, 1934, included: Abilene, Amarillo, Brownsville, Denison, Houston, Fort Arthur, Waco, and Wichita Falls. The groups of industries showing an increase were: Cement plants, cotton oil mills, electric railway car shops, foundries and machine shops, hotels, men's clothing stores, millwork, petroleum refining, quarrying, and structural iron works.

Renew Probe Of Gambling Raids

FORT WORTH, Nov. 27. (UP)—Tarrant county grand jurors yesterday reported their investigation of the raid on Top o' Hill Terrace, night spot, by rangers.

An "undercover man" brought into the spotlight last week by L. G. Phares, director of the public safety commission, will testify regarding gambling at the terrace. The jury "no-billed" Fred Brown, owner, and four others of charges of running a gambling establishment.

Ranger Captain Tom Hickman, who was dismissed as head of the ranger force in the newly-formed safety commission, also was subpoenaed by the jury.

The "undercover man" was revealed as Frank Giber, former Houston newspaperman, now with the bureau of intelligence of the department of public safety.

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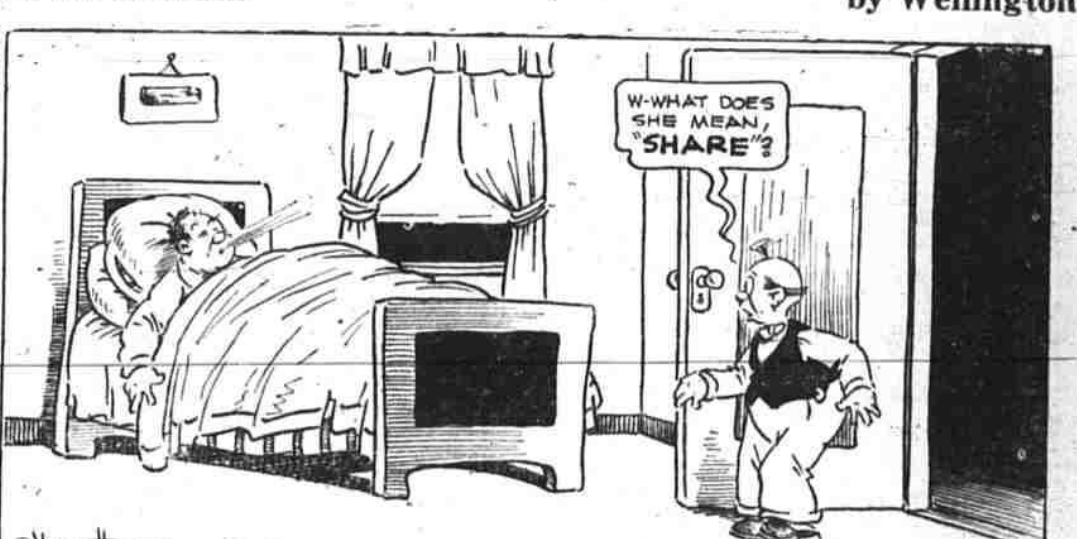

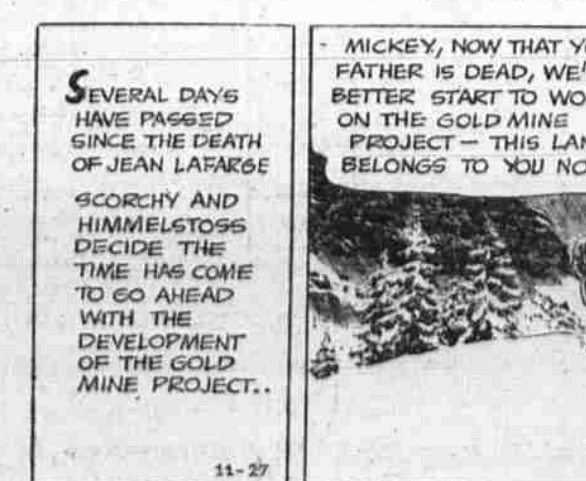

Italy, administration leaders declared they offered no apology. They felt that if in the past it was wise to put the ban on this government on war profits and on supplying belligerent nations with necessary materials, it is justified tomorrow—even if some other nation or collection of nations have a different policy of their own.

In this connection, officials were emphatic in declaring that the United States had from the first pursued its own independent course; that it had never consulted or collaborated with any other nation or group of nations such as the league of nations, and that whatever measures foreign nations or groups might choose to take for the prevention or restoration of peace would have no bearing whatever on American policy.

This policy is to keep the nation out of war and to avoid feeding the flames of war for the sake of war profits to a few individuals.

The league powers adjudged and proclaimed Italy the aggressor in this war. The United States had no part in that action. The league powers are undertaking to assist one of the belligerents—Ethiopia. The United States is applying its hands equally to both. This government is not undertaking to assist either belligerent.

Will File Suits On Unlicensed Insurance Firms

Merchants Will Meet To Plan Holiday Event

AUSTIN, Nov. 27 (UP)—Lawyers in the Texas attorney general's department prepared court attacks on hundreds of unlicensed insurance companies in the state after winning a suit testing validity of the law requiring permits.

District Judge W. F. Robertson of Austin's 12th district court yesterday decided against the Phillips-Luckey burial association of Rockdale in a test suit. More than 1,000 policyholders in burial associations are said to be affected. About 400 insurance companies in the state are unlicensed, Assistant Attorney General W. W. Heath said. Most of them are burial associations.

The court decided that the law requiring all insurance companies to secure permits from the state insurance commission was valid. More than 100 companies affected already have disbanded and reorganized to secure a license, Heath said.
