Red Cross Roll Call Now Under Way



The Dawson County Chapter of the American Red Cross started its annual Roll Call Drive today (Thursday) under the directorship of J. D. Dyer, who took over the job after the first named chairman could not function. Numerous workers are canvassing the business section now and will continue activity until after Thanksgiving. Lamesa and Dawson county have a quota of 400 memberships at \$1.00 each and every one who can possibly do so is urged to become a member or renew their membership. Mr. Dyer states that the Chapter Treasury is almost entirely empty at the present time and that with the Government planning to withdraw largely from relief work it is more urgent than ever before that a substantial fund be raised this year.

One half the funds from memberships and all of the larger contributions are retained in the local Chapter for local use. Large amounts were expended in cases of sickness during the past year, particularly in combating the outbreak of typhoid fever. The funds are handled just as conservatively as possible, and Mr. Dyer points out that all local work is entirely voluntary and urges every one to respond as readily as possible to solicitors. They have left their homes or places of business for this duty to humanity and would probably be just as busy as you are were they at their regular places. And let everyone remember that this is Dawson County's Chapter and that its activities extend over the entire county. Practically as much of the chapter's funds have been expended outside the Lamesa City limits as inside it. All rural citizens are urged to take an active part in the work and support the Dawson County Chapter.

Methodist Church Gets New Pastor

Gov. Allred Signs Old Age Pension Bill

Texas now has an old age pension law but lacks the funds to place it in operation. Governor James Allred signed a bill Tuesday of this week authorizing maximum payments of \$15 monthly to certain restrictions and looking to a special session of the legislature in January to provide revenues. The Governor has appointed a three member pension board to organize the system although the law will not become effective until February 13, 1936.

The law provides payments must start before July 1, 1936, but may be made sooner if funds are available.

7th District Wins Honors in State Meet

At the recent meeting of the Texas Federation of Womens Clubs held in Austin, November 11th to 15th, Seventh District was awarded more places of merit than any other district. Seventh District led in the number of new clubs federated this year with a total of 36, also in number of new county federations. The district again had the best all-around art report, this being the second year to have won this honor. Contracts Let On Highway 15 Wednes.

Contracts were let by the State Highway Department at Austin Wednesday for the grading and drainage work on Highway 15 west from Lamesa to the Gaines County line. The 15 miles of highway was let in two contracts both going to Hannah and Hall of Waco.

One contract was for 8.5 miles of grading and drainage structures on Highway 15 from the Gaines county line east, and was for the sum of \$44,929. The other contract was for 6.5 miles of grading and drainage structures on Highway 15 from 8.5 miles east of Gaines county line to Highway No. 9 in Lamesa. This was let for the sum of \$44,198.

It is hoped that the work on this highway will begin within the next few weeks.

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HAVE WE NEGLECTED VITAMIN A IN FEEDING OUR POULTRY?

The following article by Frank J. Holt is reprinted from a recent issue of Everybody's Poultry Magazine at the request of Barron's Electric Hatchery of Lamesa.

The vitamin that heads the alphabet is receiving new attention in poultry feeding. Formerly regarded as being present in ample amounts in a few common feeds and therefore unworthy of serious consideration on the part of the feeder, vitamin A has been found to be extremely important for high producing flocks with the result that it recently has become a subject of wide interest among poultrymen and feed authorities.

Theoretically there are at least five vitamins which are equally important to poultry feeding. But their importance to the poultryman is determined by whether or not they are likely to be present in adequate amounts in the ration. For this reason every one is acquainted with vitamin D, the sunshine vitamin, as it is almost entirely lacking in grains and roughages.

Vitamin A, on the other hand, is much more widely distributed and is found in yellow corn, alfalfa, and green feeds. Because of the large amounts of these feeds used in rations, it has generally been felt that our flocks received sufficient vitamin A.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has been responsible, in a large measure, for showing that chickens require larger amounts of vitamin A than was formerly thought necessary and that the average ration would be improved if it contained more of this vitamin. In work with pullets and laying hens, the Texas workers obtained the highest egg production, lowest mortality and highest quality eggs, from a nutritional standpoint, in the pens receiving the largest amount of vitamin A. Their work shows that the pullet stores vitamin A in her body but, as the laying period continues, this reserve is consumed, resulting in loss of weight and a reduction in the vitamin A content of eggs. Even a ration consisting of 70 per cent yellow corn failed to supply enough of this substance. It was also found that the addition of 8 per cent machine cured alfalfa leaf meal to this ration would still fail to supply sufficient vitamin A for high producing hens.

Vitamin A has several important jobs in poultry feeding. First, it promotes growth and helps maintain body weight. The newly hatched chick carries a reserve of vitamin A from the egg yolk, but after a short time the growing bird has to depend upon the vitamin A in the ration. In the case of laying hens, it assists in maintaining body weight, particularly after the layers have been in high production for several months.

Another important function of vitamin A is to help build resistance to infections, particularly diseases of the respiratory passage. The common ailment, nutritional roup, is the result of insufficient vitamin A. It has been shown by medical science that vitamin A builds and repairs the epithelial tissue of the nose, mouth and throat, lessening infection when individuals are exposed to disease organisms.

Recent reports from Germany show that the application of vitamin A (in an ointment to cuts and burns greatly accelerates healing. As would be expected and as was shown by the Texas investigation, mortality is reduced in laying flocks by feeding rations high in this vitamin.

Vitamin A is important in practically all stages of poultry production. It is related to reproduction and helps increase hatchability. The amount in the ration also affects the vitamin A content of the eggs—a matter of no small importance to the consuming public.

Long before vitamins were discovered, farmers knew there was a difference between yellow corn and white corn. For one thing, better growth was obtained with yellow corn. Later it was

found that the reason for the superiority of yellow corn was the fact that it contained vitamin A. It was also found that feeds which are green in color are good sources of this vitamin. Among the richest sources of vitamin A for poultry feeding are certain fish oils, which are also valuable for vitamin D.

The amount of vitamin A in some of the common feed ingredients is shown in the following table:

*Similar to international units. The above figures, with the exception of cod liver oil, represent the average for a number of assays compiled by the Texas Experiment Station. While not indicated in the table, the vitamin A content of feeds is subject to variation, depending in the case of alfalfa on the method of curing the hay. The same holds for cod liver oil but it would contain 600 units per gram if it complied with U. S. P. requirements as to vitamin potency.

It is plain to see that if cod liver oil is used at the rate of 1 per cent of the ration, it makes a decided improvement in the vitamin A content of the feed. In fact, 20 lbs. of cod liver oil (600 units per gram) contains more vitamin A than 1,500 pounds of yellow corn.

The use of green feeds, including fresh growing grasses, alfalfa, clover and spinach, add considerable vitamin A to the ration. In many sections the feeding of these materials, as well as their vitamin A content, was seriously reduced by drought last summer. Another point for poultrymen to remember is that the light colored green feeds such as sprouted oats, lettuce and cabbage, are not so valuable as sources of vitamin A as the darker green material.

The amount of vitamin A required by chickens depends upon the number and size of eggs laid as well as the vitamin content of the egg yolk. In the Texas study it was found that at the beginning of the experiment, there were about 28 U.S.P. units of vitamin A per gram of yolk, but only 10 units per gram six and one-half months later.

The effect of the ration upon the vitamin A content of the egg has also been definitely shown at the Ohio station. Hens receiving a diet which included 30 per cent corn, supplemented with alfalfa meal produced eggs containing only one fifth as much vitamin A as when they were given cod liver oil or access to bluegrass pasture.

In general, the more eggs a hen lays, the more vitamin A she requires. When she does not receive an adequate supply in the ration, she uses the vitamin A reserves stored in the body with the result that egg production suffers and

she loses weight. This usually happens after a few months of heavy production. Under these conditions high mortality is to be expected, and heavy loss is the common result. According to this evidence, the present interest in adding more vitamin A to rations may have an important bearing upon the alarming rate of mortality common in high producing adult stock.

RULES FOR KILLING DUCKS GIVEN BY GOVT

The following information is given by the Bureau of Biological Survey to assist hunters in the killing of ducks during the season which opened Nov. 20 and closes on December 19.

The migratory bird hunting stamp, which may be purchased at post offices for \$1.00 is required to be carried on the person of any individual over 16 years of age who hunts ducks or geese.

Shooting hours each day of the open season for waterfowl begins at 7:00 a. m. and ends at 4 p. m.

The bag limits are 10 ducks for a hunter in a single day.

The Federal regulations limit the capacity of any gun used for migratory bird shooting to a total of three cartridges at one loading. For repeaters or autoloading this means one cartridge in the chamber of the barrel and two in the magazine. Magazine tubes must be plugged or cut off. Rifles may not be used to take birds, nor any shot-gun of bore larger than 10 gauge.

The baiting of waterfowl is prohibited by the Federal regulations.

Live duck and goose decoys must not be placed so as to attract wildfowl either directly or indirectly.

Migratory game birds must not be bought or sold.

Upon conviction of violation of any regulations under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act, the offender is liable to a fine of \$500, or to be sentenced to 6 months in jail, or to both fine and jail sentence.

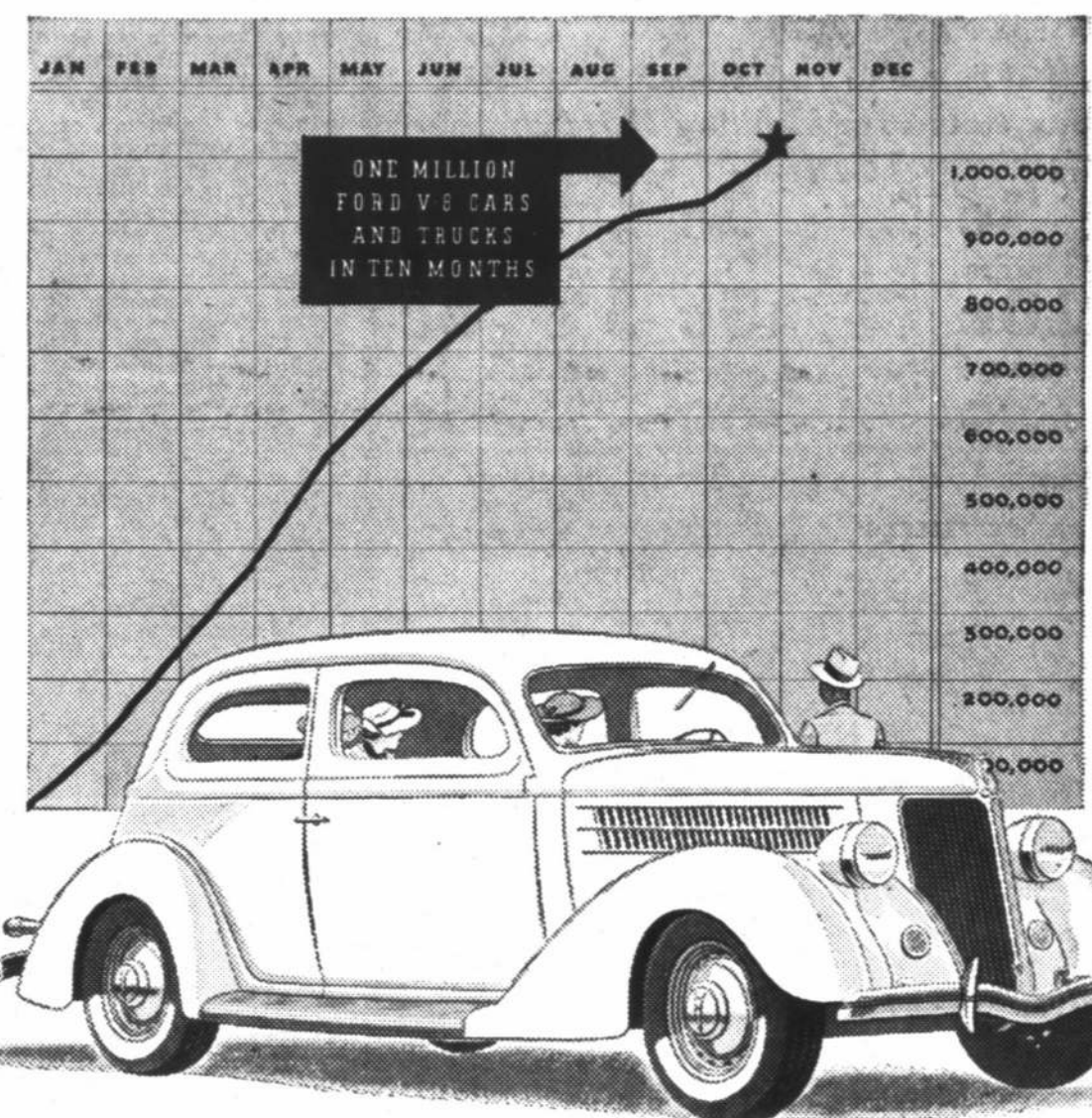

PYORRHEA IS A CHRONIC DISEASE OF THE MOUTH

Austin, November 19.—Pyorrhea is a chronic disease involving the gums and also that part of the jawbone surrounding the roots of the teeth. It also affects the membranes which fastens the tooth to the bone and helps to hold it firmly in place, stated Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer.

Being an adults malady it is seldom seen in children. It is most common after middle life. It begins at the gum margin. Early symptoms include swelling and redness. Moreover, the gums are prone to bleed when brushed. Usually there is no pain, even in the advanced cases. If the progress of this disease is not arrested, the bone and ligament become involved, pockets are formed between the teeth and gum, and pus collects.

Uncleanliness, undue stress on a few teeth, malnutrition, and irritation produced by the accumulation of food, tartar, and bacteria around and between the teeth are outstanding factors in the development of pyorrhea. Badly fitted crowns and bridges, and overhanging edges of fillings, which are direct contributors to mouth uncleanliness, also lead to irritation. Incidentally, pyorrhea is not contagious.

It is a curable disease if it is not too far advanced when recognized. Treatment is not by the use of drugs but in educating the patient in the proper use and care of the teeth and the removal of the remnants of dead membrane adhering to the root surfaces, as well as any existing tartar.

Proper daily attention to mouth hygiene is the one great bulwark against pyorrhea.

ON TEXAS FARMS

The Agricultural Adjustment Administration will soon offer the farmers of the South a four-year cotton acreage adjustment contract. The details are not known now, but presumably the program is much the same as the present one with certain improvements.

Whatever the faults of the county adjustment of the last three years, few will deny that the vast improvement in Southern prosperity is due largely to the increased buying power of the cotton farmer.

The cotton income has been doubled since 1932. One bale of cotton now buys almost twice as much as one bale bought in 1932.

Census figures now being released by the States credit the adjustment programs with making possible the greatest strides toward balanced farming ever known in the South. The use of rented acres has enabled the cotton farmer to live at home on a scale hitherto unknown.

The South has led the Nation toward business recovery. Countless figures and testimony can be produced to show that the towns have richly shared in the benefits accruing to farmers in the cotton program.

With a new cotton program coming up, the cotton farmer will have to decide whether he will follow the road of cotton adjustment, or to take a chance and grow all the cotton he can.

FARM NOTES

By Joe C. Williams, County Agent

Second Rental Checks Here

Twenty-three hundred checks have been received during the past few days representing over ninety-eight thousand dollars that producers share in the benefits from the cotton reduction program. These represent a majority of those who have met the requirements and complied with the reduction contracts. There are still approximately one hundred checks out that have not come in due to some fault in the contract and compliance papers.

The second rentals this year are over a month earlier in coming than they were last year.

Reissued Tax Exemption Certificates

The reissued certificates or bale tags will be in the agent's office by the time that you read this article, according to a telegram received from the state headquarters Wednesday, in which the state chairman stated that they were being shipped from College Station on that date. This will enable producers to gin several hundred bales additional of tax free cotton.

A grower who lives near O'Donnell called at the office during the week and said: "I have bought today 64 bales of tags for use on this year's crop and I had much rather buy the certificates than have to sell them. Any time I can get eighty-five dollars for a bale and the seed I like to pay the market price of 4 cents per pound for certificates. I pooled the tags that were issued to me on the 1934 crop that I failed to make and receive four cents per pound for approximately seventy per cent of the tags and the balance will be reissued for use this year. I call that good crop insurance. I have not yet forgotten the price I had to take for my 1932 crop."

Tax Exemption Certificate Pool Open

Any producer who has surplus tags is now permitted to pool them in the National Pool, according to three letters and a telegram received from the Washington office. There is a great demand for certificates, in fact a great demand for tags than there are tags available. Producers are urged to pool their surplus certificates rather than sell them for a loss and less than the fixed price of four cents that the Secretary of Agriculture has authorized. Too the producer who sells for less and the buyer are both subject to the penalties of the U. S. Criminal Code. According to the Abilene paper, there is at present a Federal Agent checking over the sales and transfers of certificates in Taylor County. Again buyers and sellers of tags in this county are now required to make affidavits that there will be no rebate offered or accepted on sales of tags that the fixed price is four cents per pound.

One-Third of Cotton Crop Is Harvested

With more than 112,000 bales of cotton ginned up to November 1 in the South Plains counties, local cotton men estimate approximately one third of the 1935 crop had been turned out up to that time.

Ginnings, 112,406, compared with 59,458 for the same date last year, an increase of 52,948 bales or 89 per cent.

Fourteen of the 18 counties show increase in ginnings over last year. Every one of the major cotton producing counties with the exception of Terry

shows an increase.

Ten counties had turned out over 5,000 bales up to the first of November while a year ago only four had ginned that many bales. Rankings this year are: Lubbock, Lamb, Lynn, Hale, Dickens, Hockley, Scurry, Dawson, Motley, and Terry. Last year's rankings were Lamb, Scurry, Terry, Lynn and Hockley.

Counties not showing a gain over the corresponding date in 1934 were Castro, Cochran, Scurry and Terry.

No ginnings are shown by Gaines, Swisher or Yoakum. The first two are not recorded individually because the bureau of census says to go so would disclose individual ginnings. Yoakum does not have a gin. Borden, east of Dawson, likewise does not have a gin.

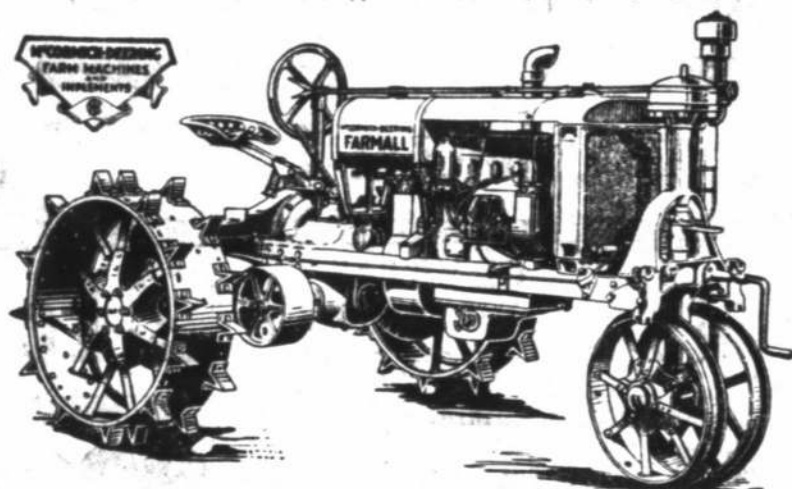

CHEVROLET SETS SALES RECORD FOR NOVEMBER

Countrywide sales by Chevrolet dealers for the first 10 days of November totaled 32,657 units, nearly double the highest total for the same period in previous years, it was announced by Chevrolet Motor Company. The total reflects the results of the early introduction of 1936 models and the change of date of the automobile show season, says the announcement.

The total of 32,657 not only exceeds the record for any corresponding period, but sets a new high mark for 10-days' sales following the introduction date of any previous new models, it was said.

"It is apparent that the early presentation of new models, and the holding of the automobile shows in November instead of January, has had an important effect on seasonal sales," commented W. E. Hoiler, vice president and general sales manager, who announced the new records. "This first-ten-day period of November included one day on which the new Chevrolets were not on sale, since they were not shown to the public till November 2, yet its sales exceed the total 30-day November sales of all but four years in the history of the company. Our largest November record was in 1926, and the sales in the first ten days of that month were 17,678 units, only slightly more than half of the new record just established."

As to the effect of November vs. January introduction, it is significant that our first-ten-days' record for the current month is more than double our sales for the first ten days following any January introduction of Chevrolets. In other words, although the public has not been in the habit of buying largely in November, this new record indicates that it was not the season that stopped them from purchasing, but rather the fact that models on sale in previous Novembers were soon to be supplanted by new models at the January automobile shows. We anticipate that the new plan of presenting cars in November, will, therefore, prove successful in attaining its chief object, which is to maintain a higher level of employment in the industry through the winter months.

"In Chevrolet, this effect is already assured for this winter, for our November and December production schedules, originally set at a figure far above previous output records for those months, have been stepped up to still greater totals based upon both early sales reports and orders taken for future deliveries all over the country."

WORK STARTED ON CORN-HOG PROGRAM

College Station, Nov. 19.—Work has been started on the contract for the new two year adjustment program for corn and hogs, following conferences in Washington of producers, state agricultural specialists, and AAA officials on fundamental details. E. N. Holmgren, administrative assistant of AAA at College Station has announced.

"Since a major adjustment problem is to prevent an excessive production of hogs in 1937, a contract of more than one year's duration is necessary," it was pointed out by Holmgren.

The main objective of the new program will be to maintain a balance between the production and consumption of corn and hogs during the next two years. To accomplish this objective it will be necessary to prevent an excessive production of corn in 1936 and 1937, allow an increase in next year's pig crop that would be at least as great as it is estimated would take place were no adjustment program in effect, and prevent an excessive increase in the 1937 pig crop.

The Adjustment Administration has recommended that corn production next year be limited to 95 million acres, or about 10 million fewer acres than would be likely without adjustment.

Proposed hog adjustments are calculated to provide for a 30 per cent increase in Federally inspected slaughter for 1936-1937 above the slaughter expected in the present marketing year which began October 1, 1935. It is believed that a permitted hog production equal to 100 per cent of the base will allow for the desired increase in hog numbers next year.

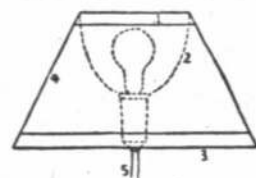
