Texas Voters Will March To Primary Polls Today

Lubbock Candidates Make Final Appeals At Political Rally

WITH the largest crowd to attend a political rally held indoors in Lubbock during the present primary campaign in attendance, Lubbock county candidates last night made their final pleas for votes in today's primary in a two-hour session in the district courtroom.

The room was packed to the doors with a hundred people standing around the room or in the hall outside. The overflow went into the several offices adjoining the courtroom. Every available chair was used and a number sat on the floor to listen to the talks. People also stood in the gallery along the walls.

Twenty-eight candidates for office spoke on their campaign in the primary, while a dozen whose names were called early in the evening did not respond.

Vaughn E. Wilson, county attorney and a candidate, presided and

introduced the several speakers. Each speaker was allowed five minutes, but many of them, especially those who spoke first, did not consume more than a minute or two.

The only sensational incident of the evening was the talk of Mrs. W. M. Fetherhouse, wife of one of the candidates for county superintendent of school who spoke for her husband. She answered what she termed were attacks on her husband's candidacy and explained some of the rumors that have been bandied about concerning his work. She made a strong plea for his nomination.

The crowd was in a good humor and gave evidence of that by the generous applause accorded the speakers. Several humorous incidents occurred and the crowd voiced

Three Persons Are Killed In Plane Crash Near Hobbs

Former Convict Shot To Death At Spur

Shooting Echo To Booze Case Two Years Ago

Carl Benson Killed Instantly in Downtown Altercation Friday Night; A. C. Hull, Spur Druggist, in Custody

No Charges Filed

Eight Bullets Enter Body of Slain Man; Affray Follows Recent Return of Convict to Spur on Discharge

SPUR, July 25.—(Special to The Avalanche) A shooting which climaxed a personal enmity growing out of a liquor trial two years ago, when Carl Benson, 25-year-old former convict, was shot and killed.

The shooting occurred on a downtown street in front of A. C. Hull's drug store and was witnessed by several Spur residents. Witnesses said Benson, who two years ago was sentenced from Post to the state penitentiary on a liquor charge and Hull engaged in an argument in front of the store. Hull testified in the trial which resulted in Benson's conviction.

The altercation was ended by shooting of Benson with a pistol. He died almost instantly. Examination revealed that eight bullets had entered the slain man's body. Hull was taken into custody by county authorities and was questioned late tonight. The killing occurred about 9 o'clock. Several hours later Dickens county officers had not disclosed any details of the shooting in connection with the shooting.

An inquest was to be conducted tonight.

Benson recently was released from the state prison and shortly afterward returned to Spur.

Dark Horse in Primary Here

Mrs. C. Z. Fine Becomes Last Minute Candidate for Lubbock County School Superintendent Friday

As entries in the race for nomination in the county primaries Friday began the final drive to the post where ballots are counted, a rural dark horse joined in the contest for the county superintendent. She was Mrs. C. Z. Fine of Pecos. Mrs. Fine agreed to become a candidate early Friday following a conference with a committee composed of R. L. Hooten, Robert Crump and J. N. Townsend.

Identifying solicitation of "rural friends" as the reason for her last-minute decision to enter the race, Mrs. Fine said 22 years as a rural school teacher, 11 of which have been spent in Lubbock county, provided her with a knowledge of the problems and duties of the county superintendent of schools.

To notify voters Supporters of Mrs. Fine announced that efforts would be made to notify all voters of her candidacy.

West Texas' Big Day

It is a vote for a square deal for our country—or we vote to leave the balance of power with the down-staters, where it has always been to our disadvantage.

Clint Small, because he happens to hail from West Texas, has been most often accused by his opponents as being a "sectional" candidate.

Two Men and Woman Die as Ship Crashes

W. L. Mosier, Tulsa Pilot, Is Only Victim Identified in Fatal Accident; Biplane Falls About 400 Feet

All Badly Burned

Plane Burns Before Trio of Occupants Can Be Extricated from Wreckage; Federal Inspector to Probe Crash

(Special to The Avalanche) HOBBES, N. M., July 25.—Two men and a woman were killed when an open biplane, buried its nose in the earth. Neither passenger had been identified late tonight, although the Tulsa funeral home reported, although the man was said to be named Lyons and recently had lived in Hobbs. The woman also was believed to have been a Hobbs resident. Lyons was believed to have lived at Tulsa before coming here.

All Badly Burned Nothing was found on the bodies which would aid in identification, funeral home officials reported.

The plane which carried the trio to death in its wild dive earthward was named by Mosier, a private pilot, who came to Hobbs several days ago and had been operating a private plane.

He was nearly two hours ahead of Edna Quimby of Monroe, Ill., who made it here today in 2:31:20 hours, bringing his total elapsed time to 19:29:18.

Douglas Next Stop. The 12 flyers were to take off tomorrow for Douglas, Arizona. Lowell Bayless of Springfield, Mass., was the third to settle on the local field, his time for the hop being 2:38:29, bringing his elapsed time to 19:32:18.

Herman Hamer of Chicago, Ill., fourth to land, had third best time for the day's flying, 2:38 hours flat. However, he had no elapsed time to compute since he dropped out as an official contender when he was forced to land before reaching Houston yesterday, losing several hours.

Planes Collide. Both airplanes, colliding as one was coming down and the other going up from Valbuena field, fell on the cement ballfield court of Carranza athletic field. Their wreckage ripped off a foot of their cement wall between two adjacent courts.

An unidentified peon, who was playing handball as the plane fell, had no chance to escape, but the man with whom he was playing miraculously got from under the falling wreckage.

The dead aviators were Capt. Paul Matjica and Lieut. Humberto Enrique Salcedo, Napoleon Fernandez Rojo and Pablo Cases Lopa.

The race for the democratic nomination for governor was upmost among the state contests in the minds of most of the voters Friday night. Eleven persons had filed for that office, and seven of them, all present or former public officials, had made statewide campaigns.

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Priest Brands Henry Ford as Cause of Communism Spread

(By Associated Press) DETROIT, July 25.—A Detroit priest characterized Henry Ford as an unconscious cause of the spread of communism in testimony given today before the congressional committee investigating communistic activity in the United States.

The statement was made by Rev. Father Charles E. Coughlin, pastor of the Shrine of the Little Flower, who was called before the committee because of his series of radio addresses on communism.

Hearing Opened The congressional committee arrived in Detroit from New York today and opening its hearings in the federal building. It planned to take up communistic activities in Michigan.

Representative Hamilton Fish, Jr. of New York, chairman of the committee, asked Father Coughlin for an explanation of his statement.

Father Coughlin said Ford is "the greatest force in the movement to internationalize labor throughout the world."

"A year ago, on the eve of the automobile show in New York," the witness continued, "Mr. Ford made a statement that was printed on the front page of every daily newspaper in the United States. He said that he would never employ more than 100,000 workers at his plant in Detroit."

"No Jobs Open" "As a result of that statement more than 20,000 men, who were out of work, flocked to Detroit from Alabama, Mississippi, Tennessee, Texas and other southern states, and while the weather was at zero stood in front of the Ford plant trying to get those jobs. There were no jobs for them and the only relief they had was to have the fire hose turned on them to drive them away."

"Getting all those men here in that manner was not done on purpose, was it?" Chairman Fish asked.

"No. It was done through ignorance," Father Coughlin replied.

Just as the peace ship was sent to Europe through ignorance," Father Coughlin added that Ford's money is helping the soviet government in Russia and referred to the \$13,000,000 contract signed with Soviet representatives.

Howard County Man Suicides

Robert McAlpine Shoots Self After Wounding Hobbs Girl Mistaken for Wife; Other Victim Is Near Death

(By Associated Press) HOBBES, N. M., July 25.—Robert H. McAlpine, electrical contractor of Big Spring, Texas, was dead, and Miss Lorena Clark, telephone operator, was wounded probably fatally today as a result of a shooting here.

McAlpine came here from Big Spring seeking a reconciliation with his wife and last night went to the Clark home where she had been staying. Miss Clark and her parents recently moved here from Big Spring.

In a room which he believed to be occupied by his wife, McAlpine saw a figure standing before a dresser and fired. The figure dropped to the floor, and McAlpine then walked from the house and killed himself with a shot through the head.

Miss Clark was shot through the body below the ribs, and physicians said her condition was very serious.

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Union Club Woman Clothes And Feeds Family of Three on Two Half-Acres

Only two half-acres, one of which was irrigated, yielded vegetables which enabled Mrs. E. A. Slater, member of the Union home demonstration club, to clothe and feed a family of nine for three months, add \$63.53 to the family treasury and can garden products valued at \$44.50.

With an irrigated half-acre fenced and another half-acre in a field and irrigated, Mrs. Slater began her garden activities March 7 by planting potatoes at a cost of \$4.50. Returns from the crop totaled \$19.89 at 4 cents a pound, potatoes consumed by the Slater family—during three months—25 pounds given to the club and 400 pounds retained for future use.

Planting 55 cents worth of English peas, March 17, the farm woman sold \$6.50 worth at 10 cents a pound, filled 20 cans, gave 10 pounds to neighbors and has used the peas as a part of the family diet since May 15.

Beets Still In Garden. Forty-four quarts of beets, planted March 22, were canned, a large quantity was consumed in the home and \$3.85 received by marketing. Mrs. Slater still has two rows of beets the length of her garden.

Beans were planted April 17. Ninety-pounds were used for the table 7 cans preserved and sales totaled \$9.59.

From squash, Mrs. Slater received \$7, from black-eyed peas \$17, and other garden products, including rhubarb, carrots and tomatoes, were sold.

The largest variety of vegetables in any of 32 gardens visited during July by Miss Louise Baird, county home demonstration agent, is in that of Miss Margaret Jones of Carlisle. Her garden contains 25 kinds. Three pecks of potatoes were planted by Mrs. L. A. Ormsdang of Foster, who reported she harvested 12 bushels, the average diameter being between two and three inches.

Survey States Sterling Will Lead in State

Dallas News Poll Estimates that "Ma" Ferguson Will Be Third in First Primary Election Today

(Special to The Avalanche)
DALLAS, July 24.—Clint C. Small, Wellington, West Texas state senator and Ross S. Sterling, Houston, chairman of the state highway commission, probably will fight it out at the second or run-off primary, the Dallas Morning News estimated in a survey in which the newspaper gave a summary of its investigations.

Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, former governor, the paper predicts, will run third, basing its estimates on telegraphic reports from 200 out of the state's 254 counties.

Small's Support Cited
Unprecedented population increase in West Texas in the past decade with a corresponding increase in voting strength, will swing the leading place pendulum in the direction of Senator Small, who comes from that part of the state.

With an estimated increase of over 32 per cent for West Texas as compared to 24 per cent for the entire state, the balance of power will be swung largely by that section, political writers now believe.

Senator Small will lead in 50 counties, Chairman Sterling in 54 and Mrs. Ferguson in 43 counties. The balance will be divided among the remaining eight candidates. Mayfield conceded ten counties, Young nine and Miller four. Tom Love will carry Parker.

The West Texas senator also is showing up strong in other sections of the state. He will rank second in many counties and for this reason is touted as one of the probable two for the runoff.

The Dallas News has been actively supporting Mr. Sterling, publisher of the Houston Post-Dispatch. It has been one of the leading big city dailies advocating the selection of the former head of the Humble Oil company. This is the first time that The News has conceded to Senator Small a high place in the first primary.

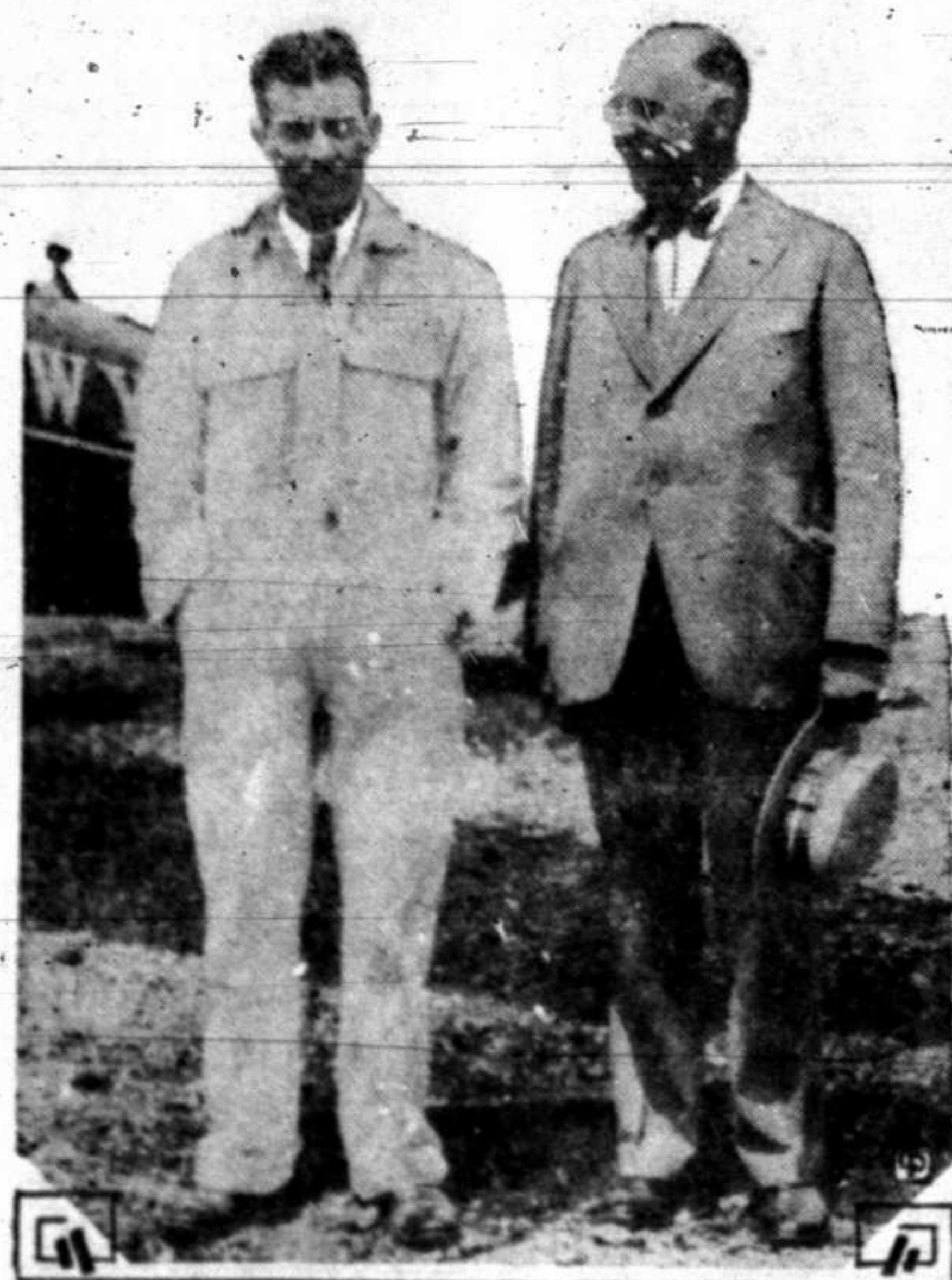

Two-thirds of Voters Likely To Vote Today

"Battle of Ballots" in This County to Be Carried on in Thirty-two Precincts; Biggest Primary Forecast

Promptly at 8 o'clock this morning the "battle of the ballots" for state and county candidates will begin in Lubbock county on 32 battlefields, in as many election precincts.

"Cease firing" order will be issued at 7 o'clock but the smoke is not expected to clear away until near the midnight hour when the last ballot will have been counted.

Expect Heavy Vote

Between 5,000 and 6,000 ballots are expected to be cast during the day. Some of the more enthusiastic say more than 6,000 votes.

Poll tax receipts numbered 7,238 for the year, with 93 exemptions, a total of 7,331 possible voters.

"I predict that two thirds of the voters of the county will be participants in the primary," J. K. West, democratic county chairman, said. "I am expecting a big vote over the county because the farmers are not doing very much farm work and they can get to the polls. This will be the biggest primary election in the history of Lubbock county."

Exemption Defined

Voters who have passed their 60th birthday and who have not received their permanent exemption may vote anyway, provided they take an oath to support the constitution of their primary, A. J. Clark, tax collector, said. "We are operating under the old law that permits voters over 60 to vote without an exemption" the collector said.

A DOLLAR COURT

The great increase in small claims, noticeable for several years, has led to the creation in Des Moines, Iowa, of a conciliation court for small claims. Before this court the litigants plead their own case without benefit of jury or lawyer. The only court record is the settlement agreement and the only court cost is a fee of \$1.

During the court's first year it heard 2,800 claims, and it is now hearing more than half of the cases formerly tried in the municipal and county courts, with their cumbersome procedure of juries and lawyers.

This, perhaps, is a start toward simplification of legal proceedings, which have now become so involved and hampered by conflicting statutes that when one plunges into law suits he has commenced a journey most tortuous in its course and with an end far, far into the future.

It is doubtful, however, if the Des Moines experiment is the remedy for court congestion. Since it makes going to court easier and cheaper, it will encourage litigation, which is the very thing the nation desires least of all. If the figures were ascertainable, it probably would be found that fewer small claims are being settled out of court in Iowa.

An ideal justice is one granting a full and fair hearing to every claim no matter how trivial. Modern justice, obviously, must fall short of that ideal, although with the dollar court it approaches it.

Texas' system of jurisprudence, as we have mentioned in these columns before, is not so wonderfully efficient as to please the more discriminating. We who live under the light of the Lone Star will do well to watch the results of Iowa's dollar court, and if it proves successful, copy it.

Any change in the court system, that would better care for the problems of the day, should be welcome in Texas.

BREAKING THE LOCK-STEP

The University of Wisconsin, with 3000 students, has dared to make a radical change in the plan of its undergraduate college.

Little is left of the old order. Students will be enrolled in classes peculiarly adapted to their abilities. For two years they will work alone, seeking to make the best of themselves. At the end of that time the student body will be divided into three parts.

Students in the third with best performance become at once "Graduates in Liberal Studies," with no degree. They will have considerable freedom, may study what they will, and perhaps receive masters' degrees at the end of the four years.

The middle third will be somewhat limited in academic scope. The lowest third cannot enter the junior class at all.

Capping this new academic structure will be facilities for those who do not want degrees to do independent work under University auspices.

"Our wish," says Professor Fish, head of the committee which formulated the new system, "is to break up, so far as is safe in one moment, the lock-step regimental march of students through four years at college."

An excellent ambition. University leaders begin to realize that one general education pattern cannot be made the standard of work for all who want higher training.

Further, they see that all students are not fit for college. Many waste time, finding it easy to "lock-step" along with their fellows.

Let each man do as he pleases—but make the standards high and demand that the work be worthy. This is sound teaching: It will free the able, yet force the misfits themselves.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

KEEPING QUORUM TOGETHER WAS SENATE'S WORRY DURING NAVAL PACT DEBATE

WASHINGTON, July 25.—Keeping a quorum together was the majority's principal worry all through the extra session's debate in the U. S. senate over the London naval treaty.

The majority started off with plenty of votes to ratify the treaty. They were sure enough of that.

To ratify a treaty takes two-thirds, but the two thirds were available from the first—as soon as they could be cast. The problem was to arrive at a show-down.

With a two-thirds majority, or more, in the treaty's favor, it may seem as if this ought to have been easy—but, under the senate rules, a lot of things look easy that are not.

Unless the senate decides otherwise, each senator is entitled, once he starts to talk, to discuss any pending measure for as long as he likes. This means that a very small group of them can stall off a vote on any given proposition almost indefinitely, by taking oratorical turns.

The house of representatives long ago put a time limit on speeches, but the house has no voice in ratifying treaties.

The senate also can adopt cloture and occasionally it does, but it is very unwilling to do so. It takes great pride in unlimited debate. In the matter of the naval treaty, for instance, many senators who were anxious from the outset, to vote for the treaty itself, nevertheless would have voted against curtailing speech-making concerning it.

The minority's initial strategy was to continue speaking until the weary majority dwindled below the required number to hold legal sessions at all.

That is to say, a mere two-thirds of the senators present in the chamber when a vote is taken do not necessarily count for parliamentary purposes, as two-thirds. There must be two-thirds of a quorum—a quorum being a sufficient number to transact business legally. In the senate's case a quorum consists of at least 49 senators.

Let the attendance persistently fall below that minimum, and the anti-treatyites' plan was to say, "Evidently our quorum is gone for the summer; let us adjourn until late fall."

And time was what the anti-treatyites most urgently desired—to enable them to drum up popular sentiment against the naval bargain. The pro-treaty leaders were equally anxious for early action.

Nevertheless, it is difficult to hold 49 senators in Washington when election campaigns are going on in their home states—campaigns upon the result of which the political futures of quite a few of them depend. Senators so situated prefer to be on the job in their respective backwaters, appealing to the voters.

Thus the extra session was a period of decided stress and strain on Capitol Hill. Senatorial nerves frayed, and things have been said that did not sound much like "senatorial courtesy."

Clerk William Tyler Page of the house of representatives has watched the performance with a reminiscent smile.

Nearly all the representatives are back in their own congressional districts campaigning. The presidential call for the extra session did not catch them. This is an extra session of the senate alone. However, Clerk Page remains. He always is here between sessions, in his little office off statutory hall in the Capitol building.

Clerk Page can remember when the house of representatives had quorum fights that made the senate's latest one look like less than 30 cents.

Boy and man, William Tyler Page has been a congressional employee for nearly 50 years, and clerk of the representative's chamber for a dozen of them.

He was journal clerk of the house in Speaker Tom Reed's day, when the quorum rumpus reached its climax in the lower branch of the national legislature.

Members of the minority group in the house had a mean trick at that time. Sitting right in their seats, in plain sight of the speaker, they would refuse to answer the roll call, making the clerk's record indicate the lack of a quorum and tying up proceedings, despite the fact that Clerk Tom knew they were there to vote if he could make them say so.

It was a simple device he finally hit on to break this deadlock—nothing more complicated than instructing the clerk to count every member present who actually was present, whether or not he responded as his name was shouted.

Your Health

SEEKS MORE FACTS ON CURATIVE EFFECTS OF LIVER EXTRACTS
By Dr. Morris Fishbein, Editor Journal of the American Medical Association, and of Hygeia.The Health Magazine
One of the great discoveries of modern medicine in recent years has been the knowledge that the use of liver has a definite effect on cases of pernicious anemia. Formerly, practically all of these cases were fatal within a short period.

When it was discovered by such fundamental workers as Whipple of the medical school in Rochester, New York, and Minot, Murphy and Cohn of Harvard University Medical school, that the feeding of the liver stimulated the regeneration of blood corpuscles, cases that were going rapidly downward began to improve.

Soon it was found that the eating of raw liver or even of cooked liver was a strain on the appetite and digestive mechanism even of the person with this disease. Then extracts of liver were discovered which gave the effects when taken in very small doses. Still later, Doctors Sturgis, Sharp and Isaacs, associated with the University of Michigan, found that extracts made from the wall of the stomach of the hog had a similar good effect.

When insulin was discovered it was widely heralded by the public as a cure for diabetes. Physicians announced, however, that insulin was not curative in its effects, but that it served as a substitute for the secretion which was lacking in the human body. In other words, while it would not cure the patient, it would greatly prolong his life and relieve him of his disabilities.

Perhaps the same fact applies in the case of the use of liver and liver extracts in the treatment of pernicious anemia. As long as a patient takes his medicine as he needs it, he can maintain himself in fairly good health. If he fails, his condition begins to get worse.

Statistics for a large life insurance company have recently studied the death rates from pernicious anemia in persons from 25 to 74 years of age over the period 1921-1929. The liver diet first began to be used in 1926. There have been decided decreases in the death rates from pernicious anemia since 1926, particularly as applied to women beyond middle age. In the age period from 35 to 74 years, the death rates have decreased 43 per cent among men and 50 per cent among women for the period 1926-1929.

The statistics will continue to be studied, with a view to finding out whether the use of liver and liver extracts will result in a permanent lowering of the death rate or in the postponement of death from the disease.

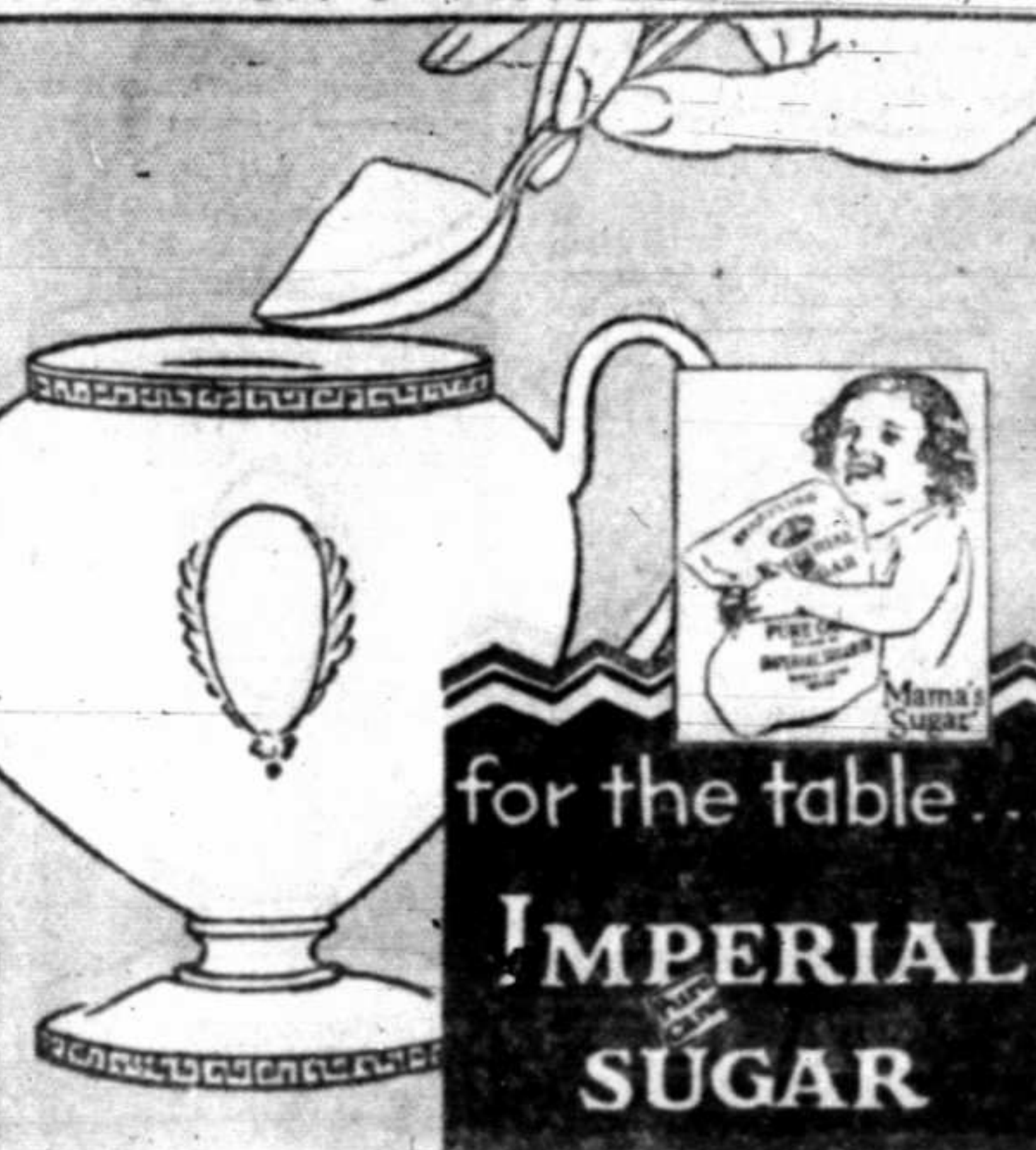

Experiment to Be Attempted Under Treaty

At Least One Plane on Every Ship in Battle Line May Be Outcome of Experiments Under Naval Limitation

WASHINGTON, July 25. (AP) — Naval limitation has led to experiments which eventually may mean at least one airplane will be carried by every ship in the battle line.

The navy now is undertaking, on a small scale, to determine the feasibility of equipping submarines and destroyers with airplanes. All other types of ships of the line now carry their complements of planes.

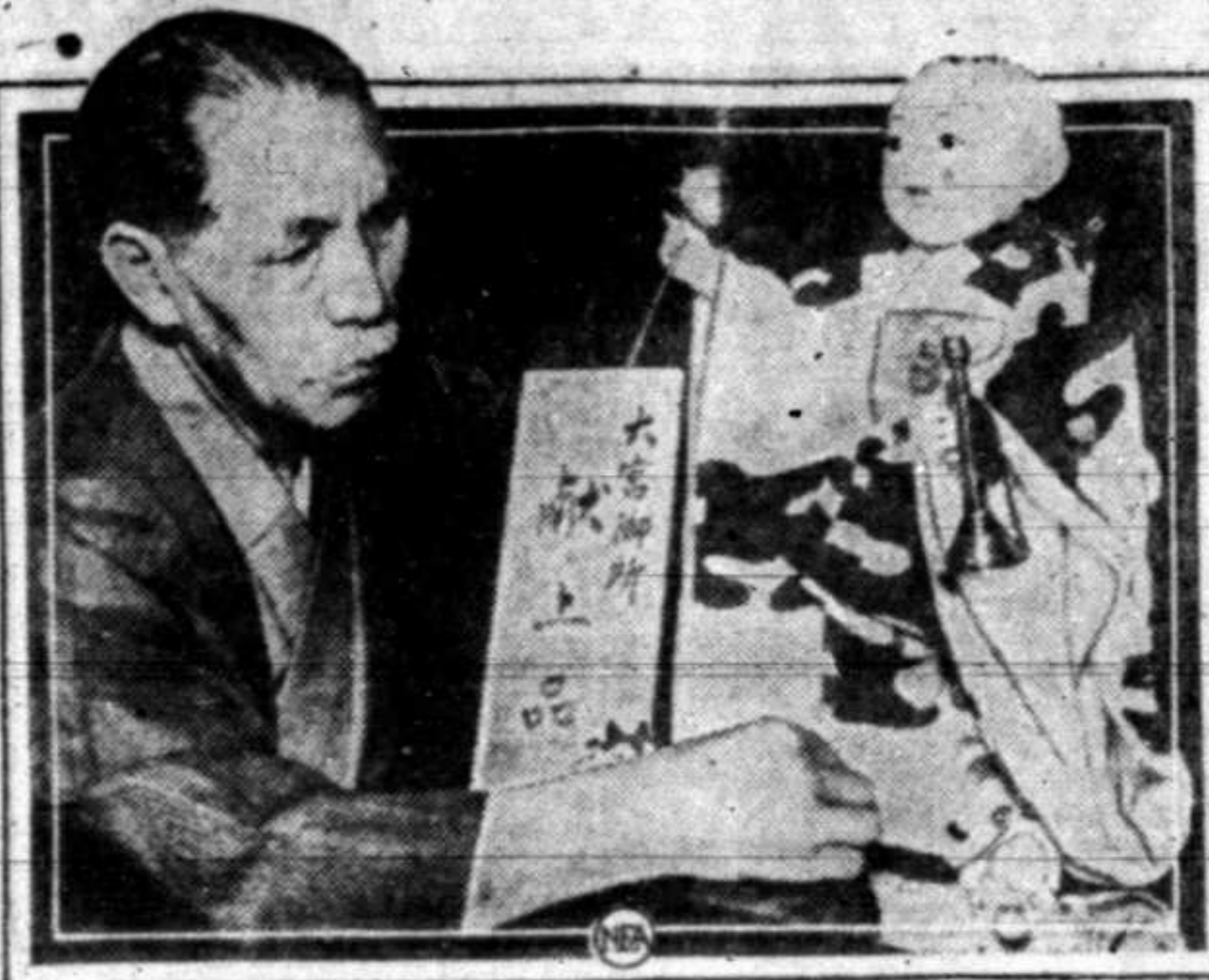
To Be Experimented.
An airplane to be folded and stored away inside a submarine is under construction. This small, fast scouting boat is to be experimented with as soon as it is completed. So far, a submarine has not been designated for the work, which would require the construction of a watertight compartment with an opening large enough to elevate the folded plane to the surface of the water, the submarine launching its airplane by sinking into the water underneath the flying boat.

Similar tests several years ago were unsatisfactory, but it is hoped the new folding plane, replacing one that was dismantled and reassembled before flight, will prove more successful. A submarine, tacticians believe, could get very near an opposing fleet in the night, launch its airplane and submerge to await the return of its scout. The plane, because of the necessary limit to its size, would not be useful for other missions than scouting and obtaining essential information.

Makes Promise.
Assistant Secretary Ingalls, in charge of naval aeronautics, also has promised to experiment with airplanes on destroyers. Heretofore vessels of this type have been too small for satisfactory aerial work since they bob about in a swell or heavy sea and are not large enough to provide a lee in which the plane can land in rough water.

The largest destroyer now in service is of 1,081 tons, but the London naval treaty allows each na-

Ace of America Defeats Basque In First Round

George Lott Drops to Cochet as France and U. S. Split Singles in Challenge Sets of Davis Cup Match

PARIS, July 25. (AP)—Big Bill Tilden, veteran of 10 Davis Cup campaigns, hung a French scalp to his belt to begin his eleventh today. He defeated Jean Borotra—a Borotra at the top of his form—in four sets 2-6, 7-5, 6-4, 7-5. Thus he justified his last-minute inclusion in the invading American forces, and did it with such decision not one of the 10,000 who watched the opening of the 1929 challenge round had the least doubt who was the better.

Cochet Takes Revenge

Two hours later little Henri Cochet had taken his revenge for Wimbledon by sending young George Lott to the showers with a straight set defeat 6-3, 6-2. The score when the evening shadows settled over Auteuil was America one, France one, and the fate of the Davis Cup for 1930 still hung in the balance. Big Bill's service, erratic and unsure in the earlier stages, began to slap across the net with its usual regularity. He took the eighth game with two placement beauties and finished off the ninth with the service ace. They ran out the set at 7-5 and was never seriously endangered again.

Except for occasional lapses Cochet dominated the play from beginning to end. Lott simply failed in stroke control. He drove out of the court time and time again, while Cochet in critical moments had a killing smash and certain placements lurking in his racquet. Except for one period in the first set Lott never was in the lead.

The French, with honors easy for the first day, apparently took a serious view of the double tomorrow and after the matches it was announced that Cochet would team with Jacques Brugnon to meet Wilmer Allison and John Van Ryn.

French Air Minister Tells Colonel W. E. Easterwood, Jr., of Next Probable Development in Aviation

PARIS, July 25. (AP) — Establishment of regular postal air lines from Europe to New York is the next probable development in aviation, Air Minister, Laurent Eynac today told Colonel W. E. Easterwood, Jr., of Texas.

The minister added his conviction that passenger service would be instituted soon after air mail lines have been regularly put into operation. He warmly thanked Colonel Easterwood for his offer to Deudonne, a prize of \$25,000 for flying from New York to Dallas, after crossing the ocean from France.

The prize he said would prove a big stimulus to aviation.

To Make New York "I am convinced Coste will make New York," he concluded.

Easterwood told Mr. Eynac that he, like all Americans, was anxious to see the French airplane cross the Atlantic from east to west, as he believed a feat would help to develop international aviation and incidentally bring France and the United States closer together.

"And I want Coste to land at Love Field, Dallas," he stated, emphatically.

Had Into Ring Naval Lieutenant Joseph Lebrun celebrated French air ace, who was Coste's partner in his 1927 flight to South America, has thrown his hat into the ring as a prospective flier across the north Atlantic.

He told Easterwood today he expects to see his new plane, now under construction, completed within three weeks. Whether it will be able to brave the Atlantic this year, he said, naturally would depend upon the weather.

He added he would be accompanied by a pilot and a wireless engineer.

Sunday-School Lesson

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON FOR JULY 27, 1930

General Topic: Deborah, A Leader in a National Emergency.

Scripture Lesson: Judges 4:1-10.

1. And the children of Israel again did that which was evil in the sight of Jehovah, when Ehud was dead.

2. And Jehovah sold them into the hand of Jabin, king of Canaan, that reigned in Harosheth of the Gentiles.

3. And the children of Israel cried unto Jehovah, for he had nine hundred chariots of iron, and twenty years he mightily oppressed the children of Israel.

4. Now Deborah, a prophetess, the wife of Lappidoth, she judged Israel at that time.

5. And she dwelt under the palm-tree of Deborah between Ramah and Bethel in the hill-country of Ephraim; and the children of Israel came up to her for judgment.

6. And she sent and called Barak the son of Abinoam out of Kedesh-naphtali, and said unto him, Hath not Jehovah, the God of Israel, commanded, saying, Go and draw out the men of Naphtali, and the children of Zebulun?

7. And I will draw unto thee, to the river Kishon, Sisera, the captain of the host of the king of Canaan, and his chariots, and his multitude; and I will deliver him into thy hand.

8. And Barak said unto her, If thou wilt go with me, then I will go; but if thou wilt not go with me, I will not go.

9. And she said, I will surely go with thee, notwithstanding the journey that thou takest shall not be for thine honor; for Jehovah will sell Sisera into the hand of a woman. And Deborah rose, and went with Barak to Kedesh.

10. And Barak called Zebulun and Naphtali together to Kedesh; and there were up ten thousand men at his feet: and Deborah went up with him.

Golden Text: Say to them that are of a fearful heart, Be strong, fear not.—Isa. 35:4.

Time: B. C. 1351.

Place: Deborah's home in Ephraim, north of Jerusalem; Barak's home in Kedesh, in the north of the country. The Plain of Esdraelon, southeast of Mt. Carmel.

Introduction

"What will not woman, gentle woman, dare."

When strong affection stirs her spirit?"

In our lesson we have examples of what women will dare and do when moved by patriotism and a sense of religious duty. We are living in a day when woman has come into the fields of opportunity formerly occupied by man alone, and when her influence is far greater than ever before; but at all ages in the world's history occasional women have risen up as leaders, pioneers of the good day for women and the world in which we live. One of these great pioneers was Deborah.

This noble woman lived in the time of the judges. There were twelve of these, raised up after the death of Joshua, Moses' successor, to free the Israelites from the heathen tribes which from time to time oppressed them. These judges did not rule the people in close succession, but came to the front in each case after the people's lapse into idolatry was punished by some heben incursion and a loss of national freedom. One of these judges was Ehud, who repelled a strong invasion of Moabites from the southeast, slaying their king, Eglon, cutting off the retreat of his army, and putting to death ten thousand of the Moabites, thus procuring a peace of eighty years. But the cycle of events was to be repeated many times, and the

next time the savior of the nation was to be a woman.

Israel Again in Bondage, v. 2.

"And Jehovah sold them." This term represents the absolute giving up into the hands of their enemies. It is no doubt derived from the idea of selling, have. The converse process is redemption. The expression is frequently used in the Book of Judges. "Into the hand of Jabin king of Canaan." This time the invasion came from the north of Palestine, where remained the descendants of those of the original tribes of Canaanites which Joshua had failed to subdue. "And twenty years he mightily oppressed the children of Israel." The Israelites had not even spears and shields (Judg. 5:8), and they were completely at the mercy of Sisera's onrushing, iron-bound chariots of death. "They forgot that God is able to break the chariots in pieces, and to make all their massive strength a disadvantage and a difficulty, as when the Egyptians labored heavily in the Red Sea sand and waves; that the spirit that animates an army is greater than weapons or fortifications."—James Hastings.

Deborah, v. 4.

Deborah is referred to as both prophetess and judge. The former term would mean that she was a woman inspired to declare the will of God; perhaps, also, that she was constantly stirring her people to a more vigorous life. In what sense was she one of the judges?

The judges, of the Book of Judges, were leaders, who at times ruled, as nominally, kings or dictators. Some of them, like Deborah, were merely influential people who assumed or were given a great deal of authority. While this usage of the word judge has no connection with the judiciary, Deborah evidently did render many decisions and judgments, and these were submitted to her. People from all over the land would come to her, and the pine tree near which she lived or under which she held interviews became famous. It could not have been far from the oak associated with an earlier Deborah (Gen. 35:8).

Deborah Summons Barak, v. 6.

We may well believe that Deborah exerted herself to arouse in those who came to her secluded home the spirit of patriotism and the determination to throw off the yoke of the Canaanites. When the time came to strike a desperate blow for freedom, she summoned Barak to take the lead. From his home at Kedesh-naphtali Barak could see the growing power of Jabin, and the increasing wickedness of his own people. He would naturally realize the difficulty of successful resistance to the Canaanite army. But he was a worshipper of the true God, and so he was naturally impressed by the message from Deborah, commanding him in the name of Jehovah, the God of Israel, to gather an army and march against Sisera, the captain of the Canaanites.

Deborah promptly agreed to accompany Barak, telling him, however, that he would lose the honor of the victory. "For Jehovah will sell Sisera into the hand of a woman." v. 8. This is commonly understood as a prophecy of the death of Sisera at the hand of Jael, but Josephus may be right in explaining it as a reference to Deborah herself, who

as the dominating spirit in the campaign was awarded the chief glory of the victory.

The Deliverance of Israel, vs. 15, 16.

Sisera's host was drawn up across the Plain of Esdraelon. His nine hundred war chariots, were ready for action, the horses were impatiently, the archers with arrows on bows, the soldiers with drawn swords. How fearfully Barak's ten thousand must have descended to the plain and advanced westward upon that embattled army!

But the Lord of hosts was in the van. "As we gather from Judges 5:20-22, a fearful storm swept down from heaven in face of the advancing army. The battle must have drawn towards Endor, where its fate was finally decided (Ps. 63:9, 10). Presently the war chariots were thrown into confusion, and instead of being a help became a source of danger. The frightened horses carried destruction into the ranks of the host. Soon all were involved in a common panic. A scene of wild confusion ensued. It was impossible to retreat, and only in one direction could flight be attempted. And now the waters of Kishon had swollen into a wild torrent which swept away the fugitives!"—Alfred Edersheim.

Death of Sisera, vs. 17-21.

Sisera himself escaped northward and came to the tent of Heber the Kenite, member of a tribe descended from Abraham, and so kin to the Israelites. The Rechabites, famous for Jeremiah's object lesson, belonged to this tribe. Heber was at peace with Jabin, his neighbor, and the weary fugitive turned to his tent without fear. He was kindly received by Heber's wife, Jael, who gave him food and furnished him with a couch where he was soon lost in profound slumber. Then Jael seized a wooden tent pin and the mallet, and drove the pin through the forehead of the sleeping general. Thus the final victory of the battle was a woman's.

The deed seems to us of today to violate all the laws of civilization; but Deborah, in her hymn of triumph, says that Jael "was blessed above all women. Deborah voiced the sentiment of the time. The stars in their courses had fought against Sisera, and it was his destiny to perish in the way that he would most have hated."—Margaret E. Sangster.

That Jael should thus have betrayed Sisera, and that Deborah should have praised her act, are characteristic of the barbarous

age in which they lived. An enemy was, in those days, no more than the wild beast that wastes a land and to share him by deceit was thought as little amiss as to prepare a pitfall for a wolf, or to spread temptation bait to lure it to its death.

Christianity was then thirteen hundred years in the future.—"Cunningham-Geddie. Indeed, when we remember the many atrocities of the world war, in which innocent women and children, non-combatants and even hospitals, we cannot well point at Jael the finger of scorn."

Influence of Women

Throughout the ages women have wielded large influence over the lives of men and thus over the destinies of nations. In the vast majority of cases their activities have been confined to their homes. What they have accomplished outside

their homes has generally been done indirectly, through their husbands and their sons. But even in ancient times not all women were thus limited in their field of activity. Deborah was one who heard the call of her people and her God to a wider service. Father, many years later, was another Hebrew woman who was called to deliver her people.

In modern times an increasing number of women have made for themselves places in the larger life of the world. The long and brilliant reign of Queen Victoria demonstrates what a gifted woman, of high ideals and genuine religious faith, can accomplish as the ruler of a great nation.

Frances Willard, the only woman whose statue has been given a place in Statuary Hall in the national capital, is another woman who left

an indelible impression on the life of the world. "She attained fame as an advocate of woman suffrage, of international and inter-racial peace, and especially of prohibition. She was the world-wide promoter of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union."

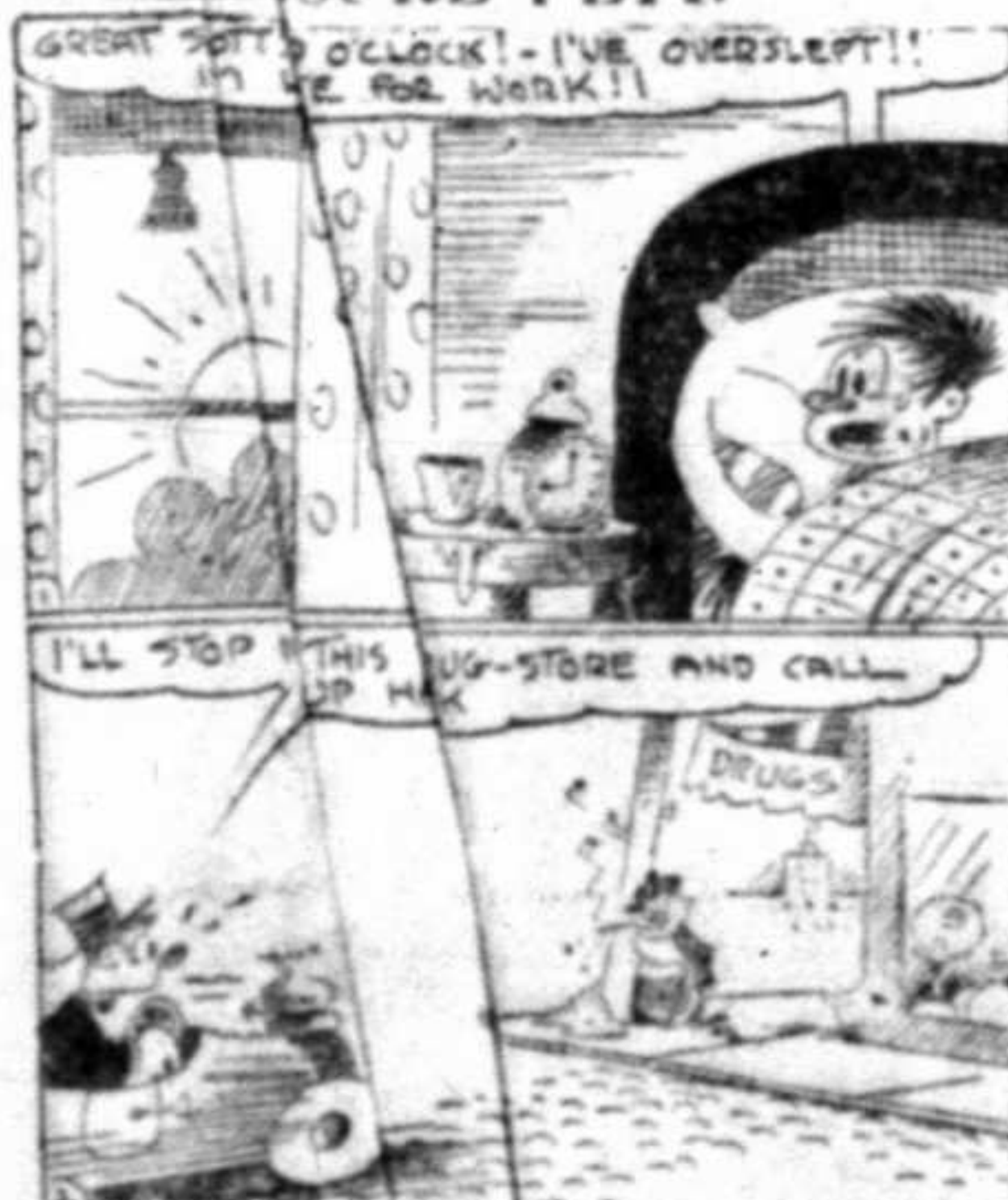

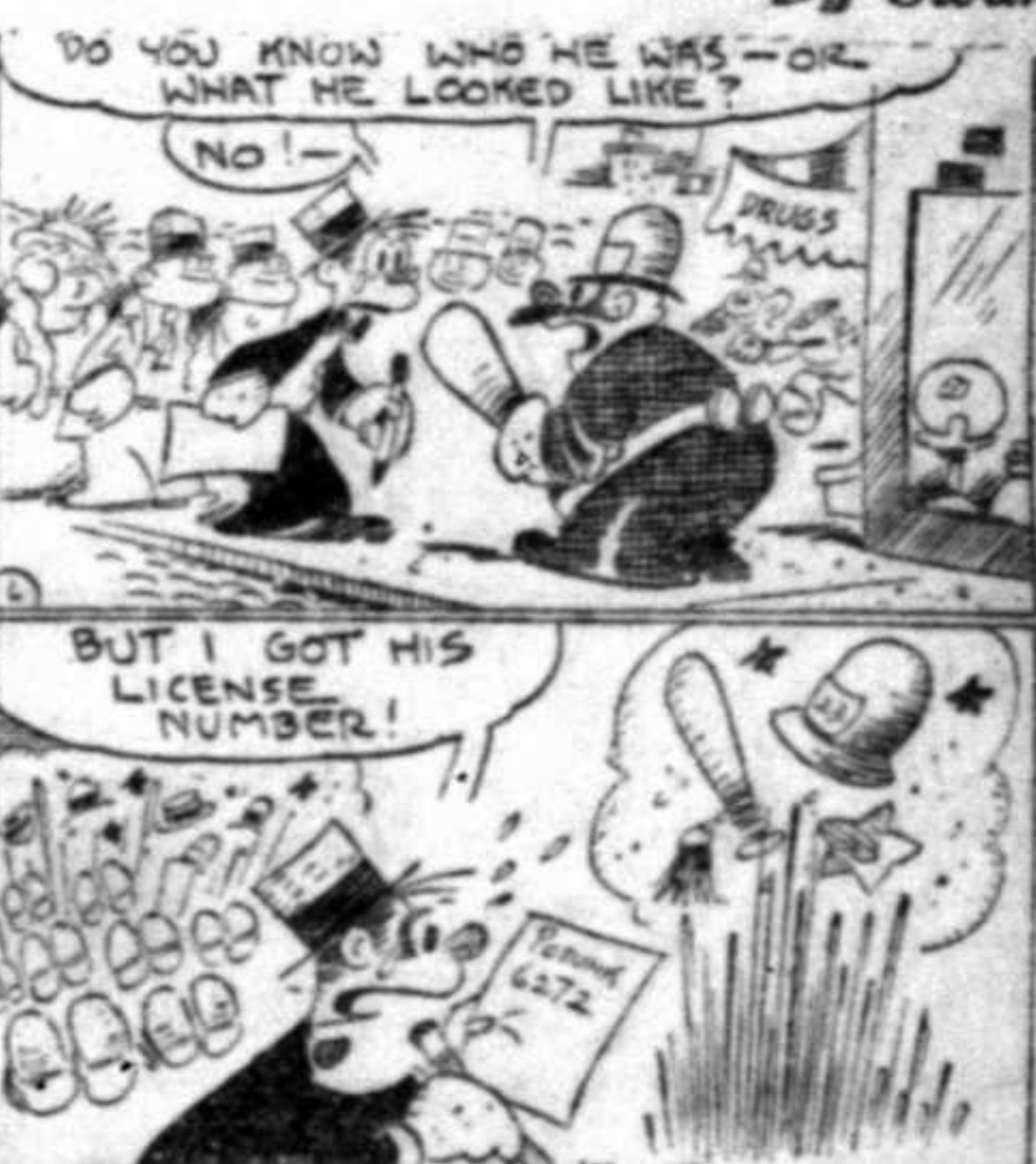

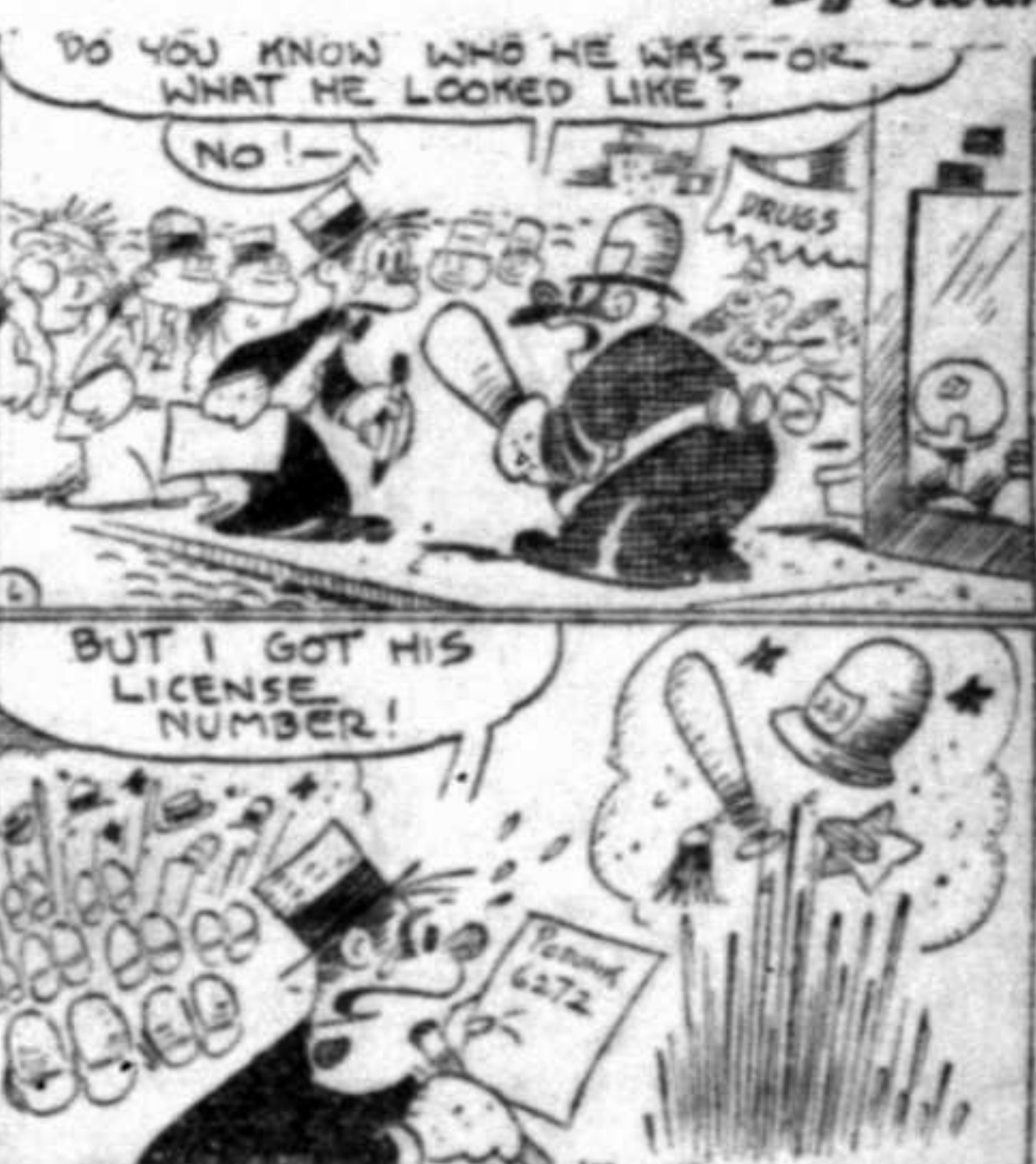
