A POOLE CATTLE RANCH SOLD

One of the best cattle ranches in this section changed hands last week when Allen M. Wilbanks, Jr. of this city negotiated the deal whereby J. A. Poole sold his fine place to W. I. Whitsell.

The Poole Ranch consists of seven sections and is an ideal cattle and farming proposition. There is over two thousand acres of fine farming land lying out on the open country. The remainder of the place is in the Canadian breaks and abounds in good running water and wells fed from springs. The rough land is an ideal pasture affording plenty of grazing and the natural wind breaks makes it fine for cattle in winter. The ranch house on this place is a modern concrete structure, equipped with electric lights and other up to date conveniences.

J. A. Poole, the former owner of this place is one of the pioneer cattlemen of this country and he will continue to operate this ranch, he having leased same from Mr. Whitsell. Mr. Poole's many friends will be glad to know that he is not figuring on leaving this country.

HOSPITAL WILL BE TAKEN OVER BY CATHOLICS

The Sisters of Charity will take over the active management of the Morrow Hospital about February 15 at which time the name will be changed to the Mercy Hospital. Spent 2 days at State Agri. College at Lincoln, Neb. who were holding a short course in stock judging, we devoted our time (2 days) to hog judging.

I bought 3 head, one a yearling sow Jumbo Giantus that we expect to develop into a 900 lb. sow. A gilt by the Rainbow, bred to Clotette, the World's Grand Champion 1921 also a gilt by C-2 Ranger. The largest boar the world has ever seen of any breed. Come and see us any time and let us show you our herd.

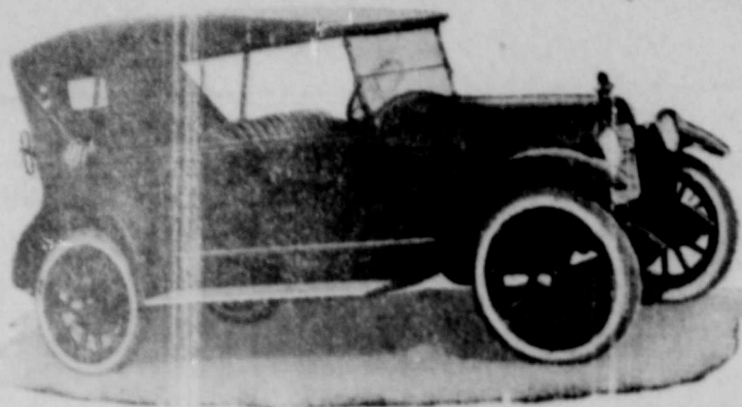

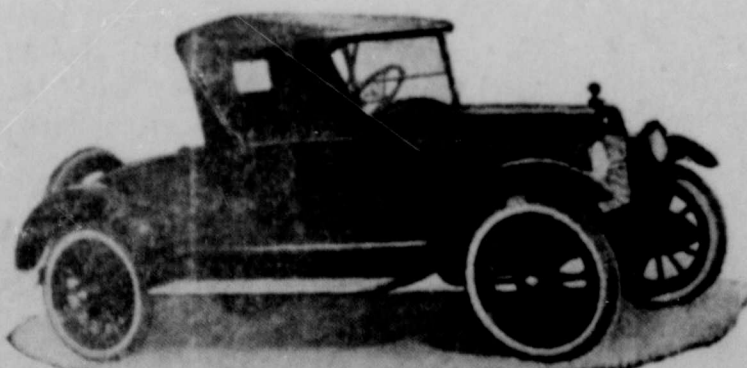

HOPE OF PANHANDLE IS DEVELOPMENT OF HOG AND HEN INDUSTRIES

L. S. Palmer in writing to the Record from Amarillo last Friday says that the report that he is leaving Canadian to locate in Amarillo is a mistake. He still has an interest in the Canadian Hog Company, and his son is looking after his interests while he is away. Canadian will always be his home, and he will continue to cry salse here, altho he is temporarily away looking after business at Amarillo and doing some auctioneering on the pure bred sales circuit. Mr. Palmer is still boosting for hogs and poultry. He says:

The Denver Poultry Special came in yesterday and gave a splendid program as to what the poultry business meant to the Panhandle, district, and the people showed their appreciation by attending in large numbers. This is a great work and will surely be of untold benefit to the people at large in this community. Santa Fe to put on a "Hog Special," say from Clovis, New Mexico, to Woodward, Oklahoma? The towns all along this line are engaged somewhat in the hog business, as well as dairying and poultry raising. These three industries should go hand in hand, and I believe that proper encouragement all along the line would arouse the farmers to raise more hogs, as they are the staple product of the Panhandle at the present time, and I consider the climate here the best for raising hogs and poultry, also for the dairy industry, of any place in the Southwest.

According to bankers' reports, 80 per cent of the money received in their banks in the last three months has been from the sale of hogs, mostly, and poultry and dairy products. Whenever a farm in this locality is stocked with ten good milk cows and ten good sows, and two hundred hens with proper pastures and accommodations for these, every farmer will be on a sound basis and will be a depositor instead of a borrower.

Mr. Earl C. Elliott, in his opening address to stockmen at the Wichita Live Stock show, said: "Wichita is the product of Kansas stockmen, and long after oil and possibly wheat have gone, their way, the stockmen will be the mainstay of this city."

HEN WORTH ACRE OF LAND

A Kansas calculator figures that in these days one good hen is worth an acre of land to the farmer! Such a hen will lay twelve dozen eggs the year round. One dozen eggs are now worth two bushels of corn or were up to a few days ago, and twelve dozen are worth twenty-four bushels, which is all an acre will produce ordinarily. With 80 good hens a farmer has added 80 acres to his holdings. Of course these figures may not hold good now or six months from now and yet they may.—Clovis (N. M.) News.

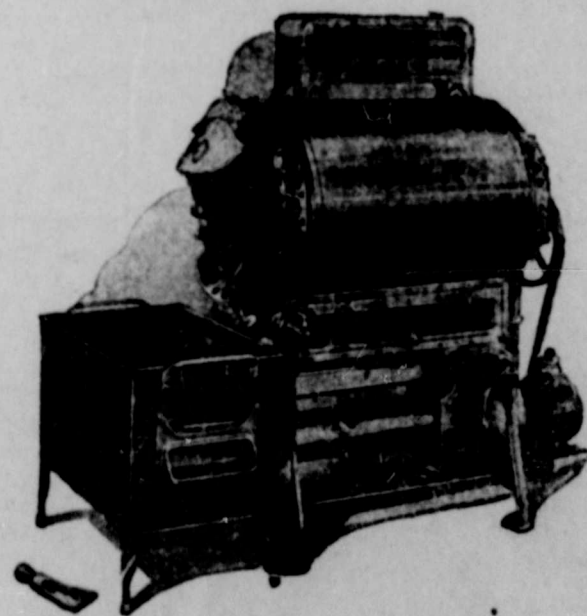

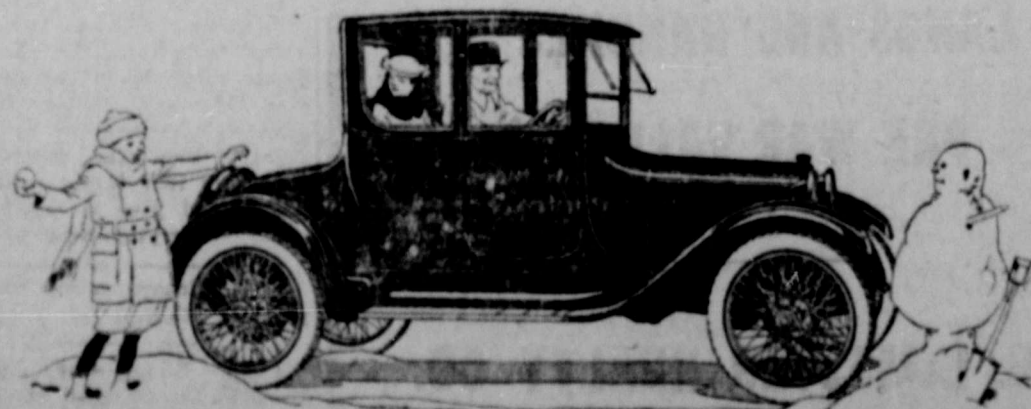

AN ORDINANCE

An ordinance, requiring all motor vehicles and motorcycles operated on the streets, highways, alleys and public grounds within the City of Perryton, Texas, to display number plates and identification on tags, and prescribing a penalty for its violation.

Be it ordained by the City council of the city of Perryton.

Section 1. Any person owning and operating a motor vehicle or motorcycle on the streets, alleys, and public highways of the city of Perryton, Texas, after the taking effect of this ordinance, without the number plates displayed thereon, in accordance with the requirements of the general statutes of this State relative to the registration of motor vehicles and motorcycles, or any one owning and operating a motor vehicle or motorcycle, without the distinguishing seal provided by the State Highway Department of this State for each year, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be fined in any sum not less than ten (\$10.00) dollars nor more than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars for each violation, and each such motor vehicle or motorcycle is operated upon the streets, alleys and public highways of said city in violation of this ordinance, shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 2. No person shall operate or drive a motor vehicle on the public streets, alleys and highways of the City of Perryton unless such motor vehicle shall have at all times displayed on the back thereof, number plate corresponding to the distinctive number assigned to such motor vehicle by the State Highway Department and such number plates to be in conformity with the requirements of said department.

No person shall attach to or display on such motor vehicle any number plate assigned to it under any other motor vehicle law other than by the State Department of this State, or any registration number other than that assigned for the current year, or a fictitious number plate.

Section 3. No person shall operate or drive a motor vehicle on the streets, alleys and public highways of the City of Perryton unless such vehicle shall have at all times conspicuously displayed on the front end thereof the seal for the current year assigned to the said motor vehicle by the Highway Department of this State, and no person shall attach to or display on such vehicle any seal assigned to it under any motor vehicle law, or a fictitious seal not of the current year, provided that the seal assigned a motorcycle shall be attached conspicuously to the rear thereof.

Section 4. Any person violating the provisions of Sections two (2) and three (3) of this ordinance shall, upon conviction be fined in any sum not to exceed one hundred (\$100.00) dollars; and for the second or any subsequent offense, shall be punished by fine of not less than ten (\$10.00) dollars nor more than two hundred (\$200.00) dollars.

Section 5. All fines collected under the provisions of this ordinance shall be used in the construction and maintenance of the streets, bridges and culverts of said city.

Section 6. The fact that the city of Perryton has no ordinance covering the violations of the motor vehicle law of this State, and that there are numerous and flagrant violations of said act being continuously committed within said city, create an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the rule requiring ordinances to be read on three separate times before final passage, be suspended, and the rule is hereby suspended, and it is ordained that this ordinance shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage, approval and publication as required

EADY INTEREST IN BETTER SIRE

Exactly 5,000 persons enrolled in the "Better Sires-Better Cattle" campaign at the close of the calendar year 1921, records of the United States Department of Agriculture show a continued interest in a work which has extended to all parts of the state and several island possessions. During the year the number of live cattle owned by the persons enrolled increased from about 400,000 to 500,000. The figures include both male and female stock. All of the cattle are purebred, and the females, which may be of varied breeding, are bred in all cases to purebred sires. It is noteworthy that 56 per cent of all female stock listed in the better sires campaign are purebred. The figure is 1 per cent higher than a year ago. The effect of the use of purebred sires in reducing the number of scrub animals on farms shown by the small proportion of the in herds and flocks headed by scrub males. The figure at the end of the calendar year 1920 was 5 per cent and for 1921, 1.9 per cent in such herds.—South Plainsman.

LAW SAYS COUNTY PRINTING MUST BE CONTRACTED

Is it done here? We say no. Where does the biggest part of it go? We say, outside of the county to concerns which do not pay a cent of county taxes. Is it right? We say it is not. Is it lawful? Read the law and see for yourself.

Art. 2256. Stationery, etc., may contract for.—The commissioner's court of each and every county may, by an order entered of record, be authorized and empowered to contract, as hereafter prescribed, with some suitable person or persons to supply the county with all blank books, all legal blanks and all stationery of every kind and description, as may be required by law to be furnished the county officials. (Acts 1907, p. 252.)

Art. 2257. Bids to be advertised for, how.—It shall be the duty of the commissioner's court to advertise, at least once in every two years, for sealed proposals to furnish said blank books, legal blanks, all stationery and such other printing as may be required for the county for the term of such contract made by the county clerk, who shall notify, by registered letter, each newspaper published and each job printing house in the county, and at least three stationery and printing houses in the state, of the said contract is to be awarded, and of the probable amount of the supplies needed. (Id. sec. 2.)

Art. 2258. Contract to be declared null and void.—Should supplies, when furnished by the successful bidder under this chapter, not be of the quality designated in the contract and bond hereafter provided for, then, and in any such event, the commissioner's court may declare such contract null and void, and at the next regular or call session of said court again advertise for sealed proposals as in the first instance; and the commissioner's court shall have the right to again advertise for proposals as often and whenever any cause supplies are not received under the previous contract. (Id. sec. 2.)

Art. 2259. May reject any and all bids.—The commissioner's court shall have the right to reject any and all bids. (Id. sec. 3.)

Art. 2260. Preference to citizen, etc., of county, when.—All bids being equal and quality the same, every contract must be awarded to a citizen or taxpayer of the county in which the contract is let. (Id. sec. 3.)

Art. 2261. May receive separate bids.—The commissioner's court may receive separate bids for the several classes herein mentioned. (Id. sec. 3.)

Art. 2262. Stationery to be classified.—The stationery shall be divided into four classes: Class "A" shall embrace all blank books and all work requiring permanent and substantial binding. Class "B" shall embrace all legal blanks, letter heads and other printing, stationery and blank papers. Class "C" shall embrace typewriter ribbons, pens, ink, mucilage, pencils, penholders, ink stands, and wares of like kind. Class "D", poll tax receipts and all election supplies of what ever nature and description, not furnished by the state. Each and every bid shall be upon some particular class, separate and apart from any other class. To the lowest bidder on class "A" shall be awarded the contract for all work of that class; to the lowest bidder in class "B" shall be awarded the contract for supplying the articles embraced in that class; to the lowest bidder for articles in class "C" shall be awarded the contract for supplying articles in that class; and to the lowest bidder for articles in class "D" shall be awarded the contract for supplying articles in that class. (Id. sec. 3.)

Art. 2263. Bond with bid, requisites of bond.—Each bid shall be accompanied by the bond of the bidder, with two or more good and sufficient sureties, conditioned that, should the contract be awarded to him, that he will, without delay, upon being notified of such award, enter into a written contract, according to the law and with his proposal, and will give bond as may be required, for the faithful performance of said contract. (Id. sec. 4.)

Art. 2264. No commissioner or other officer to be interested in contract.—No member of the commissioner's court or

any other county officers shall be, either directly or indirectly, interested in any such contract. (Id. sec. 5.)

Art. 2265. Contracts to be made in open court, with lowest bidder; bids to be spread on minutes.—All contracts shall be made in open court, with the lowest bidder, and all bids shall be spread in full on the minutes of the court. (Id. sec. 5.)

Art. 2266. Contracts in writing, etc.; amount of bond, sureties, conditions, etc.—The successful bidder or bidders shall enter into a written contract with the court, and shall give bond in the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars, for each class or contract, said contract shall be signed by the successful bidder, with two or more good and sufficient sureties, and shall be in compliance with his bid and with the law, and shall be made payable to the county judge or his successors in office. (Id. sec. 6.)

Art. 2267. Suit or bond, venue of.—Any suit on the bond of any contractor or bidder for failure to comply with the conditions of his contract shall be brought in the court having lawful jurisdiction of the amount alleged, in the county which is a party to the contract. (Id. sec. 6.)

Art. 2268. Affidavit that bidder is not member of a trust, etc.—Attached to every bid made in accordance with the provisions of this chapter, shall be an affidavit by the manager, secretary or other agent of the bidder, to the effect that affiant has knowledge of the relations of the bidder with the other firms in the same line of business and that the bidder is not a member of any trust, pool or combination of any kind and has not been, for the six months last past, directly or indirectly concerned in any pool or agreement or combination to control the price of supplies bid on, or to influence any person to bid or not to bid thereon. (Id. sec. 7.)

Art. 2269. Commissioners may repeal order, when.—The commissioner's court of each county may, by order of record after contracts have been in force for the time specified in such contract, repeal said order. (Id. sec. 7a)

MAKING D-C-D BEST MARKED HIGHWAY IN THE ENTIRE SOUTHWEST

J. S. and Mack Jones are in Canadian manufacturing markers for the D-C-D Highway. They are marking the highway from Boulder, Colo., to Galveston, and when they shall have finished their work this popular highway will be the best marked highway in the south. They estimate that they will be two years in completing the work, making, and placing some five thousand markers. Markers will be placed at every intersecting road, every bridge, culvert and approach.

The markers these men make in Canadian will mark the road from Perryton to Canadian, from Canadian to Durham and from Canadian to Mobeetie. The work is endorsed by D. J. Young, president of the highway, and by W. A. Palmer, manager.

The markers consist of an eight-foot post anchored in the ground, and with a direction arrow at the top. Below the arrow is the official D-C-D sign, and below that is a white board 24x36 inches, containing the distance information and an advertisement.

Messrs. Jones state that the D-C-D is in the best condition the road has ever been. There seems to be a general activity all over the system to put the road up in good condition, and with the new bridge over Red River at Shamrock, the new roadbed from Canadian to the Lipscomb County line, forty miles of grading just finished in Texas around Elkhart covered with a dandy grade, the tourists will certainly travel thru the Panhandle with a song in their hearts for the D-C-D.—Canadian Record.

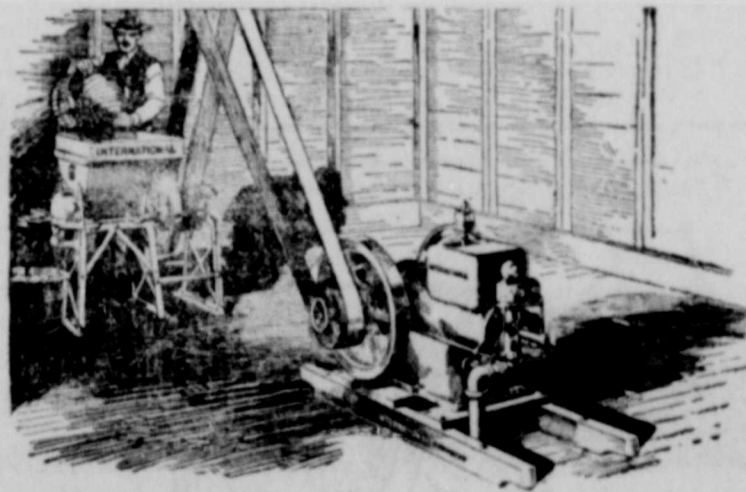

BUILDING NOTES

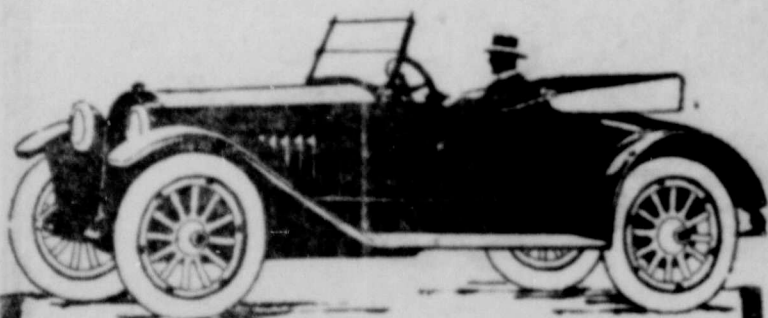
G. W. Schachle has started construction work on a new bungalow in the southwest section near the new school building.
