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audit report and also had an informal discussion on policies with school attorney Paul Lyle. The board also reviewed the performance report on the post school year.

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Daisy Dipprey said that she would miss seeing the people who came in year after year. Daisy and Pete will still be busy with quilt making and handcrafts.

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The Foundation has previously donated \$300,000.00 to Lockney General Hospital. \$150,000.00 was donated in October, 1978, \$50,000.00 was donated in April, 1981, and \$100,000.00 was donated in September, 1983. The \$150,000.00 donation was used for the purpose of constructing the new Cogdell Clinic which was completed in December of 1980. The \$50,000.00 donation was used for the construction of a new room of diagnostic radiology equipment and a new surgical table for the Operating Room, these being completed in November and December of 1982. The hospital has been making payments on an IBM System 36 data processing system with the interest earned from the September, 1983 donation.

Throughout the history of Lockney General Hospital it has been almost impossible for the organization to fund the needed equipment replacements, new equipment and facility improvements needed. These needs have been met down through the years by the generous gifts from the Cogdell Foundation. There are several factors related to the success of Lockney General Hospital, such as the excellent physicians that are affiliated with the hospital. One of the largest factors associated with the growth and success of the hospital has been the support given by the Cogdell Foundation.

Mr. Keltz stated that the Board is very optimistic in their long term planning. "We can foresee a future need for replacing portions of the current physical structure. We are concerned that our hospital facilities might not meet the compliance criteria of regulatory agencies in the future. There is no reason why the Cogdell Clinic and Lockney General Hospital should not remain a strong viable source for serving the health care needs of the surrounding area as it always has. However, in order to meet these needs, some renovations to our current hospital structure will eventually have to be made."

Within the last fiscal year 23,515 patients received treatment through the Cogdell Clinic and the demand for services is growing each year. The Board has placed the recruitment of another physician as top priority in order to meet the ever increasing demand for patient care.

The Board of Directors, the Medical Staff, the Staff and Management of the hospital wish to openly and formally express their appreciation to the Advisory Board Members of the Martha Ann Cogdell Hospital Trust. The Advisory Board Members are: Mr. and Mrs. D. M. Cogdell, Jr., Lockney, Texas; Mr. and Mrs. William Cogdell, Tulla, Texas; and Mrs. E.A. Birdwell, Silveston, Texas.

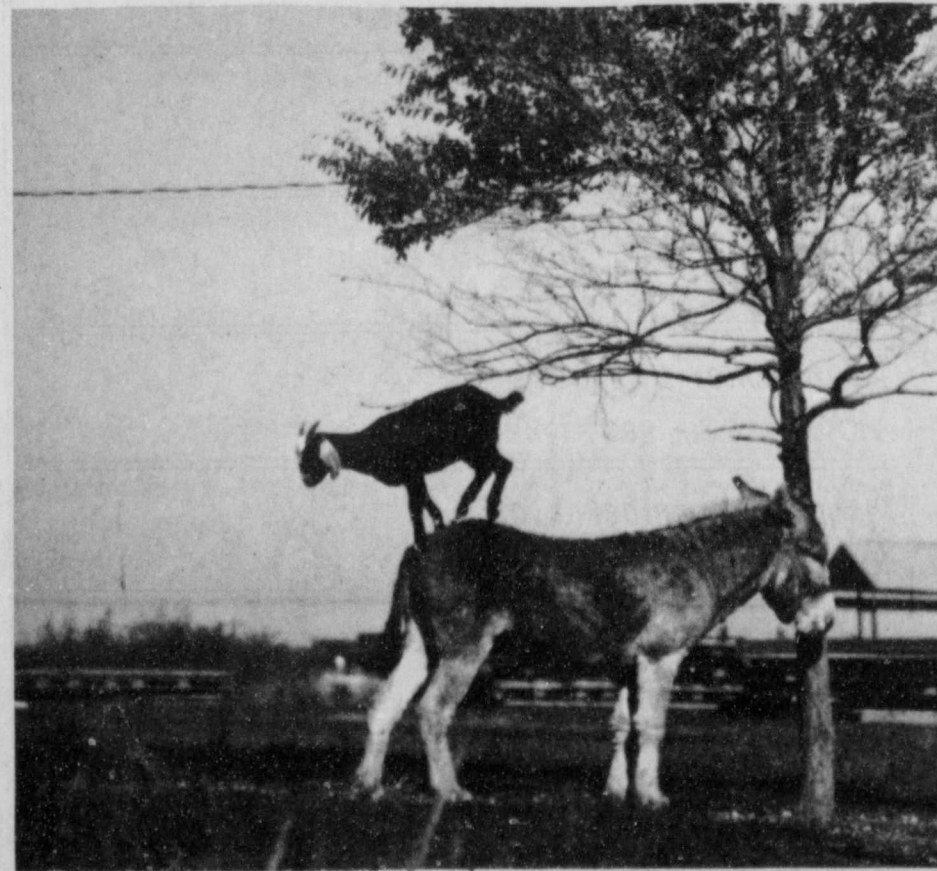
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When asked why she chose to open a shop in Lockney Wood said, "Lockney seems like a busy little town and everyone I have met is very friendly and kind to me."

Time capsule to be buried

On December 5, 1986, the Texas Historical Foundation will commemorate Texas' 150th birthday by burying a 50 year time capsule in Austin's Sesquicentennial Park located in the Capitol complex adjacent to the State Capitol building.

All Texans are invited to submit their names, at a cost of only \$1.00 year, to be included on a scroll and enclosed in the 1986 time capsule. Fifty years from now (during our 200th birthday celebration), our future generation will unearth the capsule and display its contents. By contributing your name to the capsule you will be supporting and preserving Texas culture and reminding your children and grandchildren of the unique history we as Texans share. Sesquicentennial year memorabilia representative of our unique state in 1986 will also be included in the capsule but the most important document to be enclosed will be those names and locations of over 10 million living Texans.

The time capsule will be buried under an official plaque along side the planned

Sesquicentennial Monument also to be erected in late 1986 on the State Capitol grounds. This capsule will remain untouched for 50 years.

During Texas' 200th birthday celebration the capsule will be uncovered and presented as a gift to the State. In addition, this valuable historic drama and document will be on exhibit in Austin throughout Texas' 200th birthday celebration.

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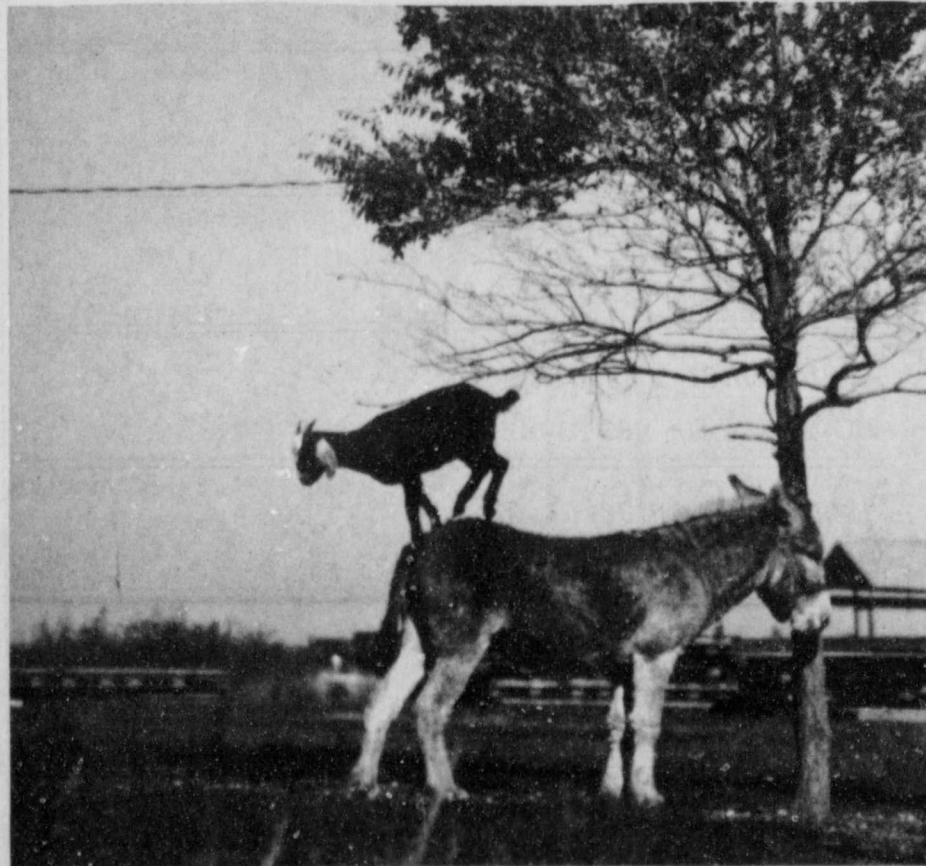

National Security Advisor Robert McFarlane disclosed recently that he believes "live Americans still languish" in Vietnam. Such disclosure raised new hopes among families of those listed as missing in action a decade after the war's end.

A 1976 report by a special congressional committee concluded that there were no POW's remaining in Vietnam, as did a panel appointed later by President Jimmy Carter.

However, the debate goes on, fueled by continued unconfirmed reports of seeing POW's and by Hollywood films such as "Missing in Action" and "Rambo." In mid-October McFarlane spoke to a private group where he commented, "There have to be live Americans over there."

Though the fate of the MIA's is one of the Vietnam War's most tragic legacies,

experts note that the number of Americans unaccounted for - 2,455 - is modest when compared with other wars. More than 78,000 Americans are still listed as MIA's from World War II and more than 8,100 for Korea.

Since October of 1982 the Pentagon has listed all but one symbolic POW as presumed dead, but it still checks all reports of sightings of POW's in Vietnam. Some 680 eyewitness accounts have failed to withstand scrutiny while 114 others remain open.

The idea still persists in many people's minds that American POW's may be dwelling somewhere in a jungle lockup. Senator Jeremiah Denton (R-Ala.) was a POW in Vietnam for almost eight years. He has declared, "The greatest motivation for me to believe there are Americans there is the Communists' insistence that they are not."

Winter wheat requires more water

The principal crop grown on the High Plains of Texas during the winter months is winter wheat. Winter wheat requires three to five inches of water in order to produce the roots, stems and leaves. Each additional inch of water normally will yield two to three bushels of wheat. Water is generally the

limiting factor in wheat production on the High Plains. Although soil moisture conditions are adequate now, wheat will need additional water before spring to produce a maximum yield.

Area wheat producers may wish to monitor their soil moisture conditions during the winter and spring in order to determine how much water to apply to maximize their yields. With the installation of moisture monitoring blocks, the producer can avoid over-irrigation, which can result in unnecessary fuel and labor expenses.

Ken Carver, assistant manager of the High Plains Water District, said that weekly readings of soil moisture levels obtained from soil moisture gypsum blocks will aid producers in understanding plant root development, moisture extraction patterns, and the rate that moisture is drawn from the plant root zone for crop use.

Carver said that the best time to install the blocks is after the crop's emergence, and with the emergence of winter wheat crops, now is a perfect time to place the blocks into the soil to properly monitor the soil's moisture conditions.

Carver said that there are several advantages to monitoring soil moisture during the winter months. During spells of warm weather in the winter, the crop uses more water. It is very important to know how much water is being used by the plants during each phase of its growth cycle. This information will help the producer determine when to replace moisture into the soil. He can also measure and determine the penetration of each precipitation event. The blocks not only will indicate to what depth the soil has been wet, but provides the producer with information to calculate how much moisture was actually stored in the soil as a result of a rainfall or snow event.

Because monitoring the soil moisture conditions is very advantageous in helping producers make irrigation management decisions, the Water District and the local Soil and Water Conservation Districts have obtained a limited supply of the soil moisture gypsum blocks and conductance meters for the convenience of area farmers. To purchase the monitoring equipment, or obtain additional information, producers should contact their County Water District office or the local Soil and Water Conservation District office.

FALL FRUIT TREE SPRAYING

Fall is often the time when fruit tree care is forgotten or neglected, but it's a critical time for controlling many peach and plum tree diseases to insure a good crop next year.

With the arrival of fall, there's often a tendency to forget our peach and plum trees that served us so well last summer.

Applying a copper fungicide now can stop or reduce three of the six diseases that attack peach and plum trees in Texas. These are peach leaf curl, bacterial leaf spot and bacterial canker.

Puckered and distorted peach tree leaves that were either bright red or light green in diseased areas last spring were due to peach leaf curl fungus. The only time to effectively control this disease is in the fall with a copper-containing fungicide such as Kocide 101 or Kocide 404.

Timing of the fall spray is critical for effective control and for avoiding tree damage. Copper is a metal and may cause severe defoliation unless applied correctly.

Spray when at least 70 percent of the leaves fall off the tree. Spraying too early will cause leaf shed or cause the spray to be ineffective later.

Bacterial leaf spot and bacterial canker can be partially controlled by fall spraying with a copper fungicide. But again it's important to spray at the right time to prevent foliage burn. Bacterial leaf spot affects both fruit and

foliage. The infection causes fruit to crack and leaves develop angular spots which drop out. Bacterial canker will kill trees slowly. Infected trees will have gum or wax forming on the trunk and main limbs. Application time will vary with the season, so check your fruit trees closely. Fall spraying is important to the health and production of fruit trees, because there's no other time when 50 percent of peach and plum tree diseases can be controlled with one spray.

Soybean prices could improve

Although worldwide oilseed stocks are still bulging, soybean prices could improve a bit in the coming months.

After a long downward trend since last spring, soybean prices appear to have bottomed out, points out Johnny Feagan, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Feagan says the following factors should help the soybean market in the next few months: the U.S. dollar is finally decreasing in value, making exports more competitive; an abundance of oilseed supplies are available at a bargain, and lower prices tend to encourage purchases for present and future use; and the demand for soybean meal has increased considerably.

Feagan expects soybean exports to increase a bit in 1986 over this year, and he also anticipates some increase in domestic usage of soybeans. Both of these situations should help reduce U.S. stocks to a degree. Also, more soybean meal should be used in animal feed in the coming year due to an improved soybean meal-to-corn price ratio, says the economist.

Soybean harvesting is currently under way in the Midwest as well as in Texas although recent rains have caused delays in the Texas plains, in East Texas and along the Upper Coast.

Only about 30 percent of the Texas crop is in, with lodging causing some losses and wet weather reducing bean quality.

Texas farmers could end up harvesting only about 300,000 acres this fall, 50,000 less than were planted, notes Feagan.
