Open Roping to Kick Off County Celebration

Briscoe County's 110th Birthday Celebration will kick off this year with an Open Roping at Wood Memorial Arena on Thursday, August 8.

The Open TCRA, UPRR Rodeo begins at 8:00 p.m. both Friday and Saturday nights, August 9 - 10 at Wood Memorial Arena.

Stock will be furnished by Gleghorn Rodeo Company of Lubbock.

Rodeo events will include Bareback Bronc Riding, Saddle Bronc Riding, Bull Riding, Calf Roping, Women's Breakaway Roping, Ladies Barrel Racing, Steer Wrestling and a Kid's Calf Scramble.

Added this year is Kid's Sheep Riding for those eight and under. Entry fee for this kid's event is \$10.00.

There will be \$200 added money per timed event and \$500 added money for rough stock.

Admission is \$7.00 for adults and \$5.00 for children 6 - 12 years old.

Dances will be held Friday and Saturday nights from 9:00 p.m. until 1:00 a.m. under the sponsorship of the Silverton Volunteer Fire Department and Briscoe County Activities Association. Music will be by "The Silver Creek".

There will be arts and crafts booths, games, food and entertainment under the shelter on the courthouse square on Saturday, August 10

Cow Pattie Bingo will be played on Saturday morning in downtown Silverton.

A Poker Run will be held on Saturday afternoon beginning at 1:00 p.m.

Handmade boots, a gun, a quilt and a \$150 gift certificate will be given away at the rodeo on Saturday night.

Retailers Stocking up for Sales Tax Holiday

Retailers across Texas are preparing for a wave of visitors this weekend as the state kicks off its fourth-annual tax holiday.

The Friday through Sunday, August 4 event is expected to draw shoppers from across West Texas and Eastern New Mexico who are looking to save \$8 in state sales tax on every \$100 they spend.

Beth Bridges, director of marketing for South Plains Mall, said the Macerich Company property is expecting 60,000 visitors on Saturday and as many as 40,000 on Sunday.

Pat Dunne, an associate professor of marketing at Texas Tech, said while other states have balked at a tax-free holiday, Texas has embraced it.

The State Comptroller of Public Accounts estimates Texans will save an estimated \$42 million during the weekend period - \$33.2 million in state sales tax and \$8.8 million in local sales taxes.

Comptroller Carol Keeton Rylander said that since the holiday's inception three years ago, Texans have saved a total of \$102.8 million.

Among some of the items that can be purchased tax-free this year are kid's clothes and school uniforms,

adult clothing, uniforms, shoes, tennis shoes, sleepwear and underclothes as long as the items are priced under \$100 each.

Some of the items that can't be purchased tax-free, include handbags, wallets, jewelry, accessories, backpacks and school supplies.

Clothing and footwear that are used primarily for athletic activities or protective wear are also not eligible. As in past years, lay-away plans can be used to take advantage of the sale-tax holiday, according to Rylander. Many retailers will be furnishing shoppers with a complete list of items that can be purchased tax-free.

Thank you to everyone who helped us go on this trip by buying doughnuts and dinners, making donations, and praying! 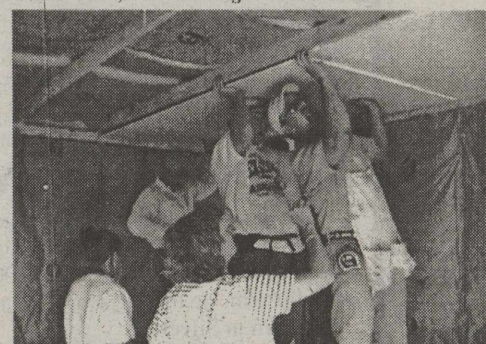

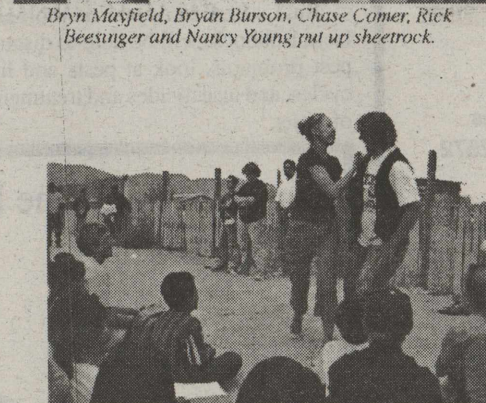

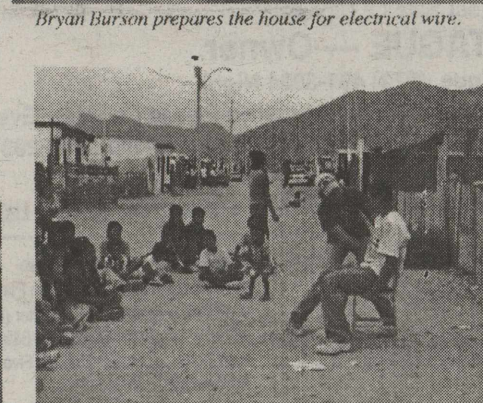

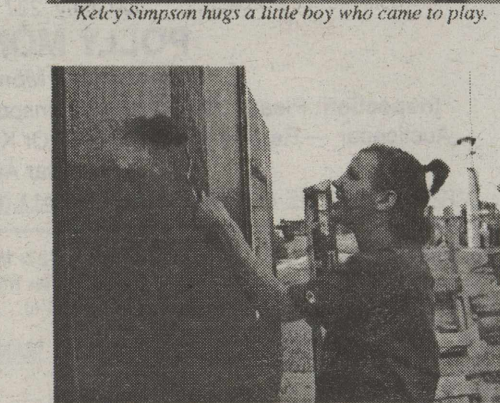

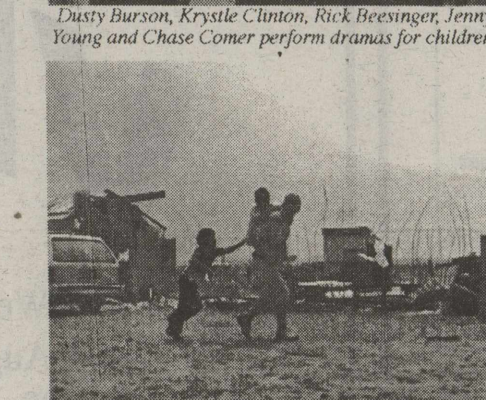

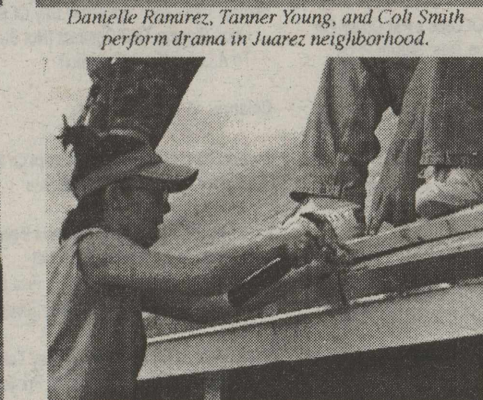

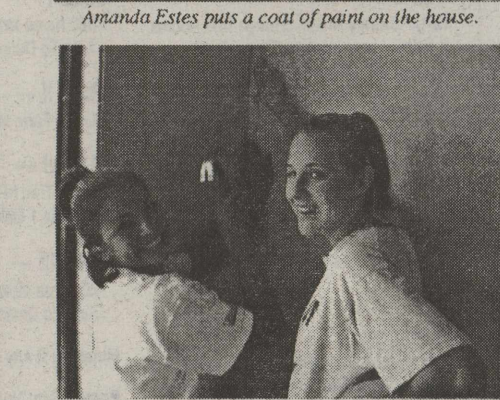

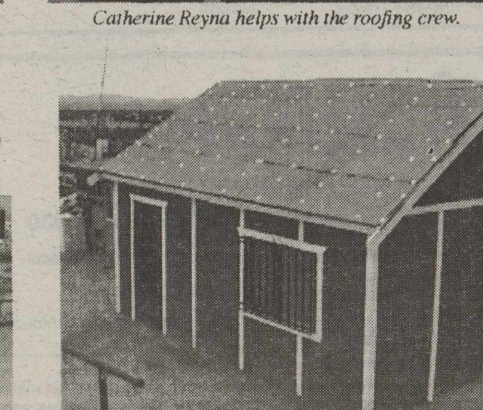

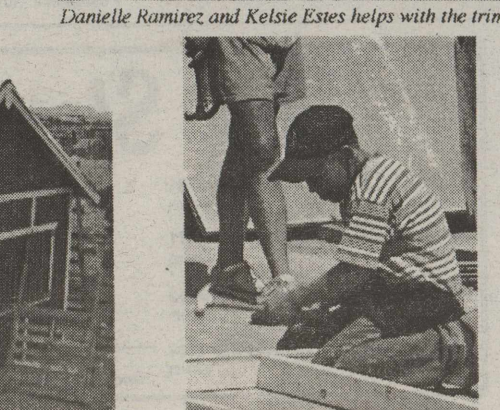
