## New Quota For Rehabilitation In This County

The quota of rehabilitation clients for this county has been increased to where every farm family in distress will have an opportunity of working back to independence, according to information received by Tom J. Finley, of Lamesa, county supervisor of the Resettlement Administration, who says an enrollment of new clients will begin at once. Long-time farm plans will be worked out as rapidly as possible, but in the meanwhile, direct grants for subsistence will be made. All families accepted for either the permanent or the temporary program must be approved by the county advisory committee.

The supervisor will be hard pushed within the next few weeks to enroll the new clients, but he expects to continue working out farm plans with the object of getting all families started on a permanent program early in the new year. Making the loan is merely the beginning of the supervisor's job. He must see that the client grows his living at home and can enough food to carry him through the winter—an average of 125 quart cans of food for each member of the family. Cash crops are permitted only after enough land has been set aside for food and feed.

A considerable number of families in this territory were accepted for the program this spring, and most of them started at that time on standard farm plans. New families will be started on similar programs. They will be required to make their own arrangements for renting land, after which loans will be made by Resettlement.

The Texas Agricultural Association represented by 1600 farmers from two hundred counties, at its meeting in Dallas last week, commended the Resettlement Administration and called upon Oklahoma farmers to join them in pushing through the Bankhead-Jones farm tenant bill, which would make available an adequate sum for purchase of farms and equipment for worthy tenants, without a down payment. Until some such legislation is passed, the Resettlement Administration is confining its efforts in most cases to loans for teams, equipment and supplies. These loans draw five per cent interest and are repayable in one to five years.

## Dr. Fender to Speak at Presbyterian Church

Dr. George W. Fender, Chairman of the Home Missions Board of the Presbyterian Church, will be in Lamesa Sunday and will preach at the morning service.

Dr. Fender lives at Arlington from which point he visits all sections of Texas and Louisiana in the mission work.

### Appeal for Cooperation In Christmas Mailing

Shop and Mail early for early delivery. There will be no mail delivery on Christmas Day except Special Delivery matter. More than ever this appeal comes this year as an urgent need to satisfactory service. The heavy increase in the volume of mail during the past several months, the serious shortage of experienced and trained help in all departments of the Postal Service, with the prospects of the heaviest Christmas mailings for years, make it imperative that the Postal Department have the

fullest cooperation from the public in order that delays and disappointments be avoided. Compliance with the following suggestions will greatly aid in the handling of your mail.

All parcels must be securely packed and wrapped. Use strong PLAIN paper for outside covering. Ninety per cent of the parcels lost in the heavy Christmas season are those wrapped in thin Christmas paper. Address all mail plainly on one side only, using pen and ink when possible. Have your return shown plainly. Enclose no writing in parcels, other than the names on gifts and brief greetings, such as Merry Christmas, Season's Greetings, etc.

Be sure to have all parcels containing articles that might be broken or mashed marked FRAGILE on address side of package. Insure or register valuable mail. Use special delivery or Special Handling Services for speed. Mail Christmas cards early, even earlier than ever before. Plain cards not in covers require only 1c postage. Cards enclosed in envelopes not sealed and not bearing written messages may be sent to any point in the U. S. for 1-2 cents each. If sealed cards take the same rate as letter mail, which is 2 cents each for local mailing and 3 cents when addressed to any other office. Cards mailed under the 1-2 cent rate are neither forwardable nor returnable. PLEASE MAIL EARLY.
