City studies fire station funding

The Colorado City Council Tuesday night gave City Manager Brenda Tarter the authorization to proceed with obtaining a certificate of obligation to finance some \$60,000 the city will need to complete the fire station currently under construction.

Mrs. Tarter explained that the \$415,000 project is being funded with \$75,000 from Mitchell Coun-

ty, a \$206,000 donation from Mrs. Marion Baasham and from approximately \$65,000 in the fire department fund.

She said the remainder, \$69,000, can be financed with a certificate of obligation acquired with the help of the city's financial advisors, First Southwest Co. of Abilene. She said the certificate will be repaid on a monthly basis from the \$1 fee assessed each of the approxi-

mately 2,100 water users.

City Attorney Pete McKinney explained that a certificate of obligation is one method in which the city can obtain the needed financing without having to hold a bond election.

Mrs. Tarter said the new fire station, which is being constructed behind the school administration building, should be completed by September 1.

Earlier, the council had ap-

proved a \$34,082.57 payment to Virgil Stone, contractor, for work already completed and for other materials on hand for the new fire station.

In other updates on city projects, Mrs. Tarter asked for and received permission from the council for an additional \$3,000 in Community Development Block Grant funds to extend the underground sprinkling system for the park in the Sands area.

The council had already allocated \$6,000 for the project. She said once the sprinkler system is installed, there will be only about \$350 in grant funds left for the project which is virtually complete. The grant was used to rehabilitate the area located in the northwest part of town.

The council also authorized a change in specifications for the

McSpadden resigns post to accept class AAA job

Loraine High School head coach Richard L. (Sandy) McSpadden learned Saturday that he had been accepted as the new head coach and athletic director for Malakoff High School.

"I will officially assume my duties around April 1," said McSpadden, who is in his second year at the Bulldog helm.

"I had talked to them as far back as last January. I was notified of their decision Saturday morning."

McSpadden was to officially turn in his resignation to Loraine officials at a Tuesday night meeting. McSpadden's hiring is to be finalized at a March 18 meeting of Malakoff officials.

McSpadden came back to his hometown area of Mitchell County from a coaching job at Jacksboro and said the decision to leave Loraine was a "gut-wrenching" one.

"I will miss these kids an awful lot. I really enjoyed here. It's probably been the greatest two years in my life. I've worked with the greatest kids."

"I expect the kids to continue to perform and compete."

"The media has been so fine to us and the Loraine school board and superintendent. We have had tremendous support from

Loraine and Colorado City and I feel we built a fine relationship with the county in general."

"I can't say enough about the kindness and generosity coach Ramsey (Colorado City head coach and athletic director Tom Ramsey) has shown to us. Colorado City has helped take care of our kids. Personally I'd have to say it's the hardest decision I've ever had to make."

"It's so unusual to come back to your home community and enjoy the success we had here. We came here to home and friends and now we are leaving with regret."

"At the present time Loraine's feeling a little pinch as far as numbers. In a few years I expect them to come back as strong as ever, although it was a relief to the desire and competitiveness of the kids."

"There's so many fine things and wonderful experiences to look back on and cherish. It's the best decision for Lyn (wife) and the kids (Clay 8 and John Thomas 5)."

In McSpadden's first year as Loraine's head football coach, the 1984-85 Bulldogs posted a 6-5 record for their best mark in years and the season earned him the title of "Class A Coach of the Year." Last year the Bulldogs, with barely enough to fill a team, went 3-7 to put his career

record at 60-39-3. McSpadden got his 60th victory in a season ending 50-13 victory over Sands with only 12 players. Linebacker Ricky Bailey was named All-State—the first Bulldog so recognized since 1972. During the past basketball season, his girls team, which made a rare playoff appearance, gave him his 200th career victory and a 204-90 career mark.

Malakoff, an AA school moving to 12-AAA next year, is 45

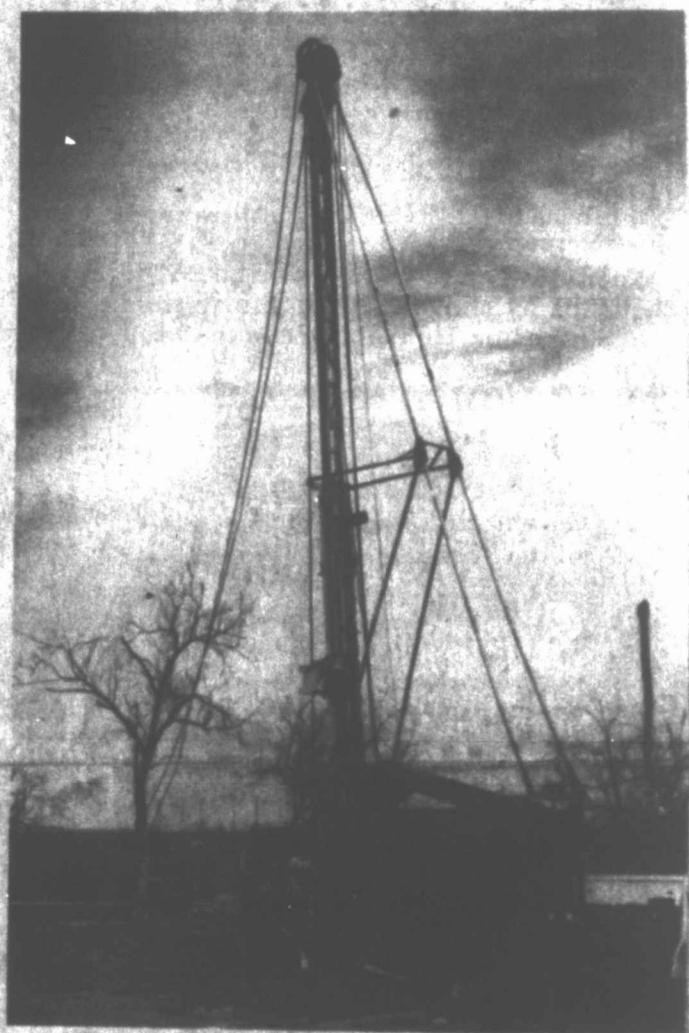

'In-school' suspension OK'd

The Colorado Independent School District Board of Trustees Monday night approved a discipline management plan which is to be implemented for the 1986-87 school year once the state has approved the plan.

Supt. Charlie Uselton explained that the policy is another new requirement of the state but that many of the parts of the policy are already in use.

"We're going to get away from expelling kids and will be required to have an alternative education program," said Uselton. He described the new program as an "in-school suspen-

sion" program which will require a certified teacher to be in charge of the program.

He said instead of students being suspended for major infractions of school rules, the students will be sent to a separate classroom where they will be required to do their classroom lessons as assigned by their regular teachers. He said the special classroom will be located at one of the campuses, probably middle school or high school.

"This program is mandated by the state and we used the state law as a guideline to come up with this plan," he explained.

He further noted that a committee composed of parents,

teachers, students, and school board members met last week and gave its approval to the plan as well.

In other business, the board approved a "waiver and district plan of the maximum class size of 22" in kindergarten and first grade. Uselton said the report must be sent to the Division of School Accreditation detailing the efforts that were made to obtain sufficient classrooms and teachers.

The report notes that Kelley Elementary has a shortage in classroom facilities in kindergarten for the fall and spring semesters and is 12 students

County studies computer purchase

Mitchell County Commissioner's Court Monday took the first step in acquiring a computer system for courthouse offices when it opened bids from five companies.

No action was taken on the bids and the commissioners asked the representatives of the various companies to return at a later time to individually make presentations to the court.

Prices for the various systems ranged from mid-\$30,000 to \$70,000. Commissioners said they will need an opportunity to

view each system individually before any decision can be made.

The companies submitting bids included CPS Business Systems of Wichita Falls, IBM of Midland, Business Records of Dallas, Burroughs Corp. of Lubbock and NCR of Abilene.

In other business, Jim Winnet of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Department told the commissioners that the cost of a trapper for the county will be raised

Sales tax rebates sent to local cities

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$18,022.96 in local sales tax to Colorado City, Loraine and Westbrook.

A total of \$54.5 million was sent to the 1,034 Texas cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

Colorado City's check was for \$18,022.96, down from the \$18,125.07 received for the same period last year. The 1986 payments to date total \$70,990.61, up 10.46 percent from the 1985 payments to date of \$64,238.85.

Loraine's check totaled

\$506.40, bringing the 1986 payments to date to \$2,075.05, up 83.87 percent from the 1985 payments to date of \$1,128.53. Loraine did not receive a check for the comparable period last year.

Westbrook received \$845.22 this period, down from the \$1,106.51 received for the same period last year. The 1986 payments to date total \$4,293.06, up 21.62 percent from the 1985 payments to date of \$3,533.96.

water to be used for an underground sprinkler system for the park. He said the drillers told him that they expect to reach the water soon.

In other business, the council approved an application for a taxi service for the city as requested by David Mitchem and William Jewett of Big Spring who own and operate Big Spring Taxi Service. The cab company will have offices at the Whiteway Motel with Virgil Ruth being one of the drivers. The rates will include a base rate of \$1.50 plus \$1.10 a mile. Extra passengers will be charged \$1 each and there will be a 10 percent discount to senior citizens. He said the company will offer 24-hour service with two cabs operating during the day and one cab at night to begin with. The city will approve each driver before licenses are issued, explained Mrs. Tarter.

A number of organizations had representatives on hand to request funds from the motel-hotel tax. During a public hearing, Mrs. Tarter said the city expects to receive about \$12,000 from the tax this year. The organizations requesting funds included Colorado City Sesquicentennial Committee, \$500 for souvenirs; Colorado City Bass Club, \$500 to assist with annual bass tournament; Colorado City Playhouse, \$2,000 to help with refurbishing the exterior of the theater; Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department, \$6,000 to assist

with the July 4 fireworks and to assist with a fire association convention to be hosted here this fall; Girls Softball Association and Little League, \$2,000 to help build restroom facilities at the playing fields; Park and Recreation Board, \$5,000 to continue to upgrade and improve the parks; and Mitchell County Boy's Club, \$250 to buy trophies for an upcoming boxing tournament to be hosted here.

Mayor Elmer Martin appointed council members Dee Hearn, Jesse Munoz and Robert Hoback to study the requests and make a recommendation at a later council meeting.

In other business, the council: -approved a zone change as requested by Roy Sloan who wants to build a convenience store at the corner of Concho and LaBelle Streets;

-named City National Bank as the city depository for the next two years (City National was the lone bidder);

-awarded a bid to Tom Goss II for \$501 for lots 7-12, Block 10, Original Town pending title opinion (Producers Co-Op Gln was the other bidder for the city-owned lots with a bid of \$50), and;

-approved a budget transfer of \$35,000 to a interest bearing account (the money is earmarked for a computer system for city hall but the fiscal year will end before bids can be sought on a system).

The items include adoption of a school calendar for 1986-87; building insurance; and an executive session to consider contract renewals for supervisors, directors and principals, evaluation of teachers and other personnel and salary discussion.

The board did go into executive session to consider the school district's participation in the Texas School Asbestos Litigation Suit. No action was taken following the session.

April's regular board meeting was changed to Thursday, April 10 in order to be able to canvass the April 5th election returns. The Secretary of State requires that the canvassing be done between April 7-11. The regular meeting would have been April 14.

Ground covers discussed by club

"Ground Covers" was the topic for discussion by Betsy Aycock and "Yellow in the Ground Cover" by Margaret Trulock when the Garden Club met Wednesday in the C. C. Thompson Room.

"Ground cover is a problem solver, and the area becomes easier to keep in every way," Mrs. Aycock stated. "The spot needing attention may be a small hill, bare stepping stones that look ugly, or under shade tree bareness. You could have other problem areas."

"There are covers for every area which may be maintained at low maintenance. There are right covers for right places. One has to deal with space fill in as needed."

"If one wants a decorative walk, choose lovely annuals or

perennials and plant them next to a wall; then the ground cover has delightful edges.

"Some places may be filled in with bark."

"Six most popular covers are grasses, quick growing ones from the nurseries; woody plants; the domesticated weed; miniature shrubs and the low growing perennials, trailing ones, and last, vines or other running plants. Be sure to get covering adaptable to your own need. Cost is low to maintain, and the grounds will make a striking impression."

"Where water is limited, think ground cover," Mrs. Aycock concluded.

Mrs. Trulock caught the imagination of the Garden Club members as she reviewed the shades of yellow from vivid to

barely yellow. "Yellow sends streaks of gold like sunshine across the yard. It enliven the gardener and the beholder," she said. "A garden is multi dimensional; as the sun moves, the dimension changes."

"Yellow is a penetrating color that attracts attention. Think of the gold daffodils that celebrate the demise of winter and the beginning of spring."

Plants are available at Colorado City nurseries to plant bulbs or seeds for spring yellow flowering.

In the business session, president Trulock reminded the group of work days to paint favors for the District Convention in Snyder, April 3-4, and of the State Convention in Galveston, April 15-17.

District VIII meeting will fea-

ture El Paso's Joyce Ewald as speaker. She is one of Texas' most distinguished arrangers. She will be doing contemporary and modern arrangements. The title will be "Designs for Texas Arrangers, 150 Years Young."

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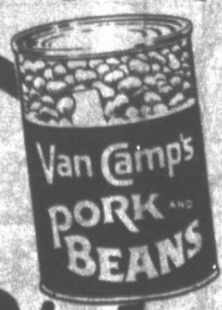

Friday night they attended the first general session, a mixer and a dance. The night was spent in private houses.

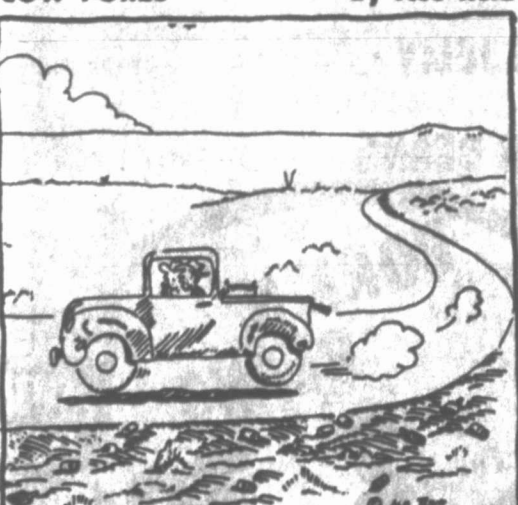

Drilling Activity

First production figures have been posted for a pair of new producers in the W. L. Foster leases of Mitchell County's East Howard Iatan Field. D. L. Ray Inc. is the operator.

The wells are designated as the No. 16 and No. 27 Foster W. L.-Estate, located seven miles southwest of Westbrook and one mile southwest of Iatan, respectively.

The No. 16 showed ability to pump 11 barrels of 26-gravity oil daily, while the No. 27 potential at 32 BOPD.

Discovered in 1926, the field last year produced over 3,500,000 barrels of oil.

The wells were drilled to 3,410 and 3,500-ft. bottoms, respectively. Production intervals in the Clear Fork Formation range from 2,977 to 3,350 feet into the hole.

Operating out of Snyder, Wayne Dodson Consultants is preparing to drill the No. 1 O. B. Trulock in Mitchell County's Dockrey (Clear Fork) Field. The operation will be in an 80-acre unit in the T&P Survey A-1433, about three miles southwest of Westbrook. It carries permit for 3,600-ft. maximum hole.

Lawless Energy Inc. has filed initial potential for the No. 8 Crabtree, a new producer in the Coleman Ranch Field, Mitchell County, 6.8 miles southwest of Cuthbert.

The well showed ability to pump 33 barrels of 19-gravity oil per day on an open choke, along with 57 barrels of salt water.

Lawless took the well to total depth of 3,304 feet and perforated the Lower Clear Fork Formation for production at 3,001 to 3,175 feet into the wellbore.

The No. 10 T. L. McKenney "A" has been brought on line in the East Howard Iatan Field by D. L. Ray Inc. Location is about one mile southwest of Iatan.

The well pumped 16 barrels of

oil and 71 barrels of water daily on open choke from Clear Fork perforations at 2,746 to 3,182 feet into the hole. It was bottomed at 3,550 feet and was plugged back to 3,330.

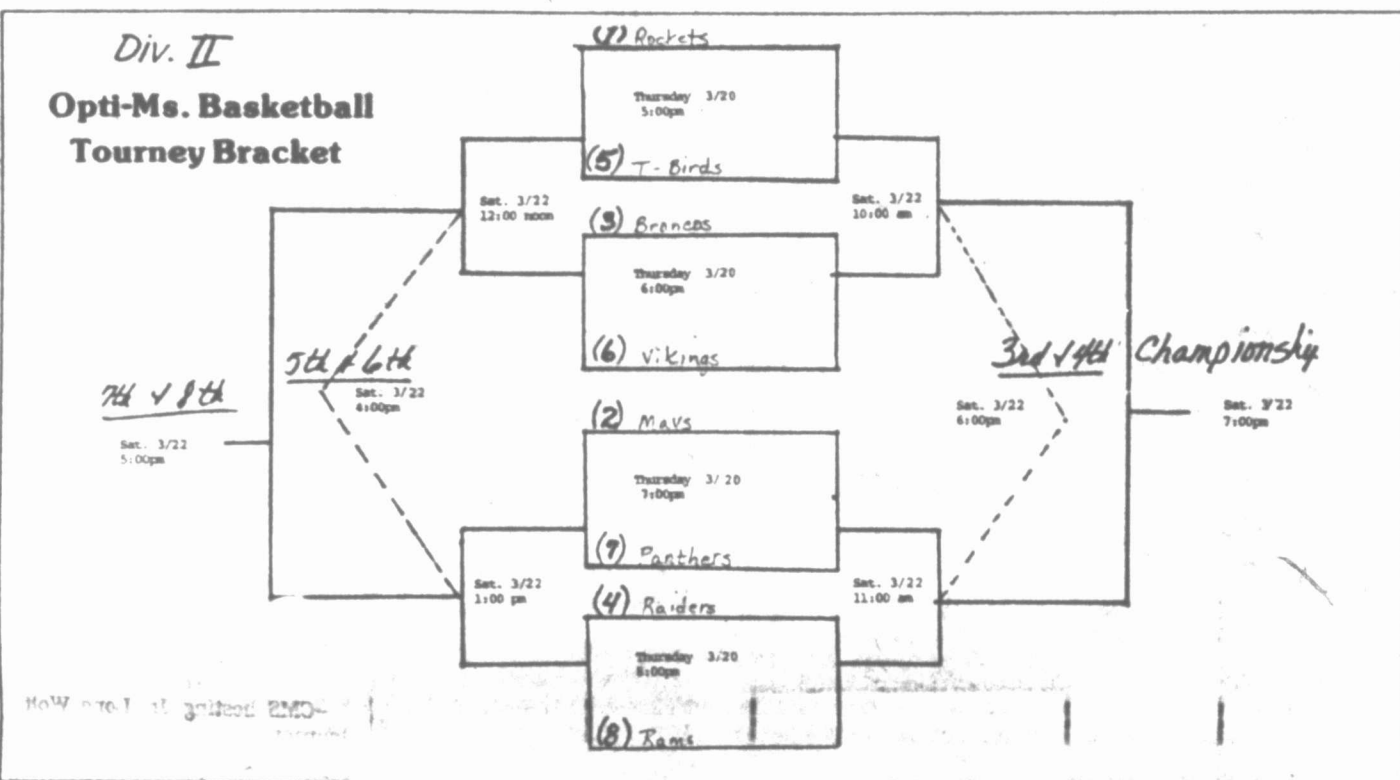
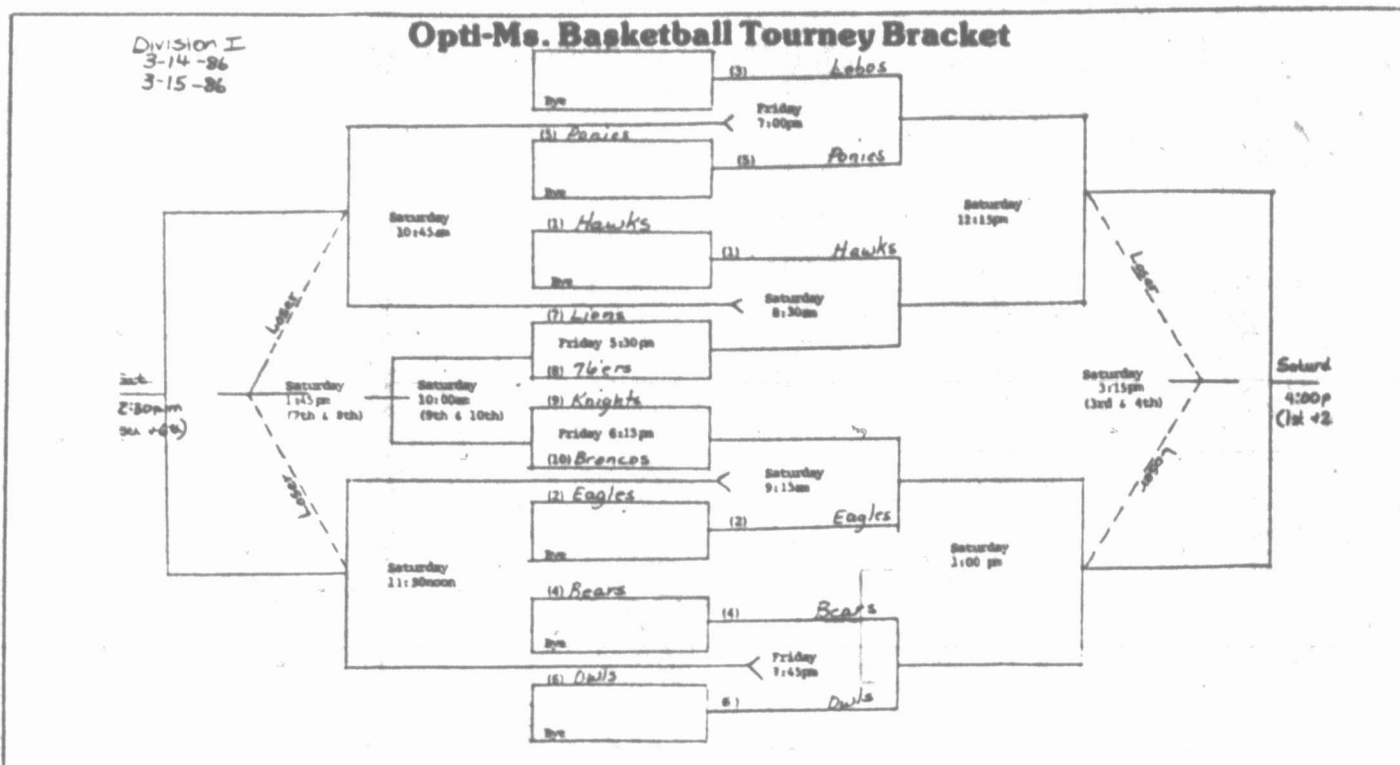
Locations have been staked for a total of 10 3,000-ft. developmental wells in the East Howard Iatan Field, Mitchell County, about nine miles west of Spade. The wells will be known as the Nos. 189-191 and 192-202 Mary Foster. They are in a 3,840-acre lease block in the T&P Survey with Mobil Producing as the operator.

Mitchell County's Sharon Ridge Field saw more developmental action when the No. 2-B Minatra "B" was spudded three miles southeast of Cuthbert. William H. Zuhone Jr. is the operator. The well carries authority for 3,700 feet of hole and is seeking production in the Clear Fork Formation.

A completion rig has been summoned at the No. 2-6 Ellwood "C," a Mitchell County wildcat located about 25 miles southeast of Colorado City. The well is in a 314-acre lease in the SPRR Survey A-438 and carries permit for 4,500-ft. maximum drilling depth. Tuthill and Barbee Inc. is the operator.

The No. 4-17 Strain is shut-in after bottoming at an undisclosed depth in the Sharon Ridge Field 12 miles northwest of Colorado City. With total depth projected to 1,750 feet, the venture had been spudded on January 20 of this year by independent operator Phillip Russell.

A Mitchell County wildcat has been bottomed at a depth of 8,225 feet in a lease seven miles northwest of Westbrook and now awaits completion tests. It is the No. 1 Brennard, an exploration venture of Berry R. and Edwin L. Cox. Drilling was begun on December 16 of last year.

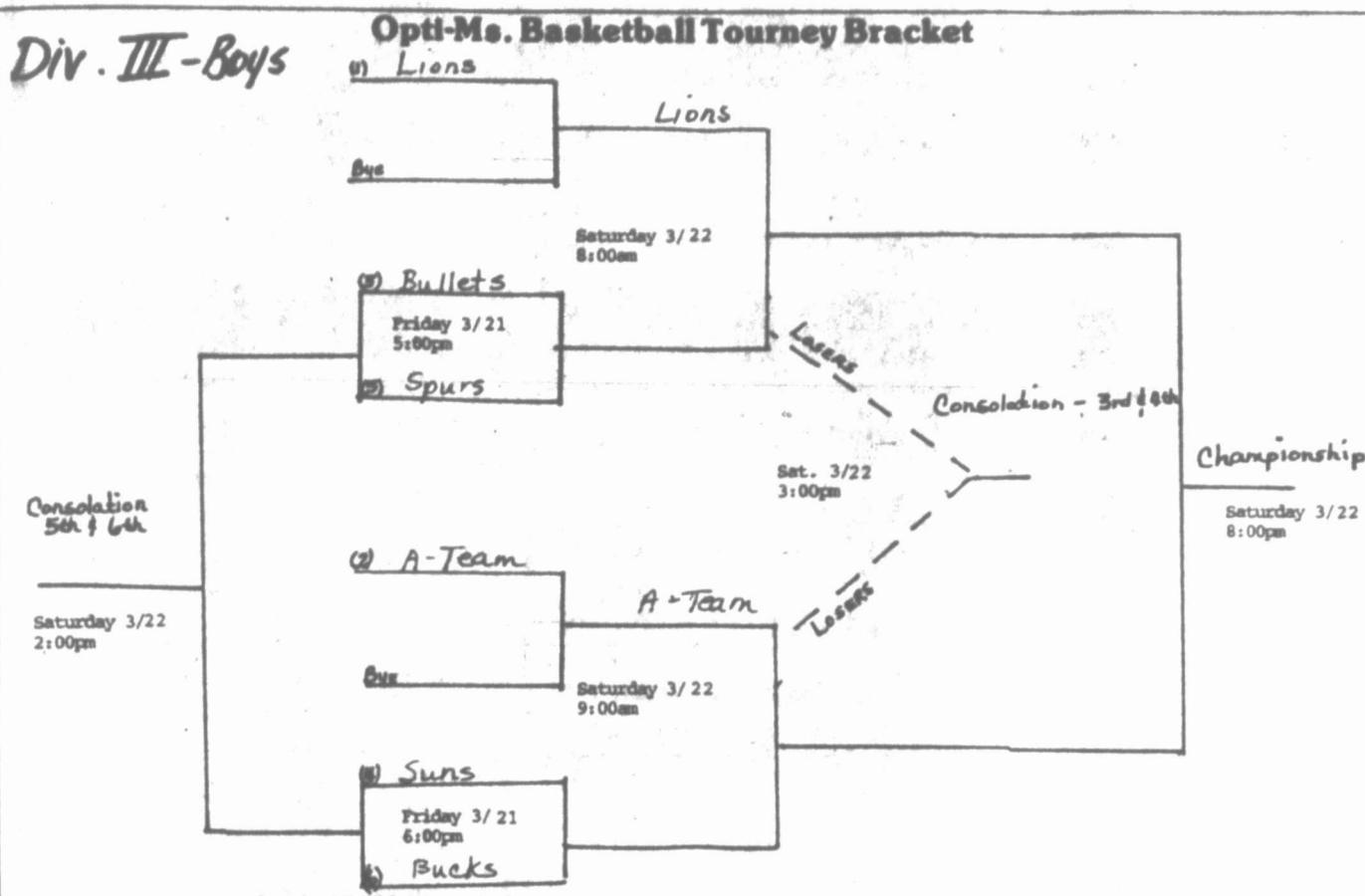

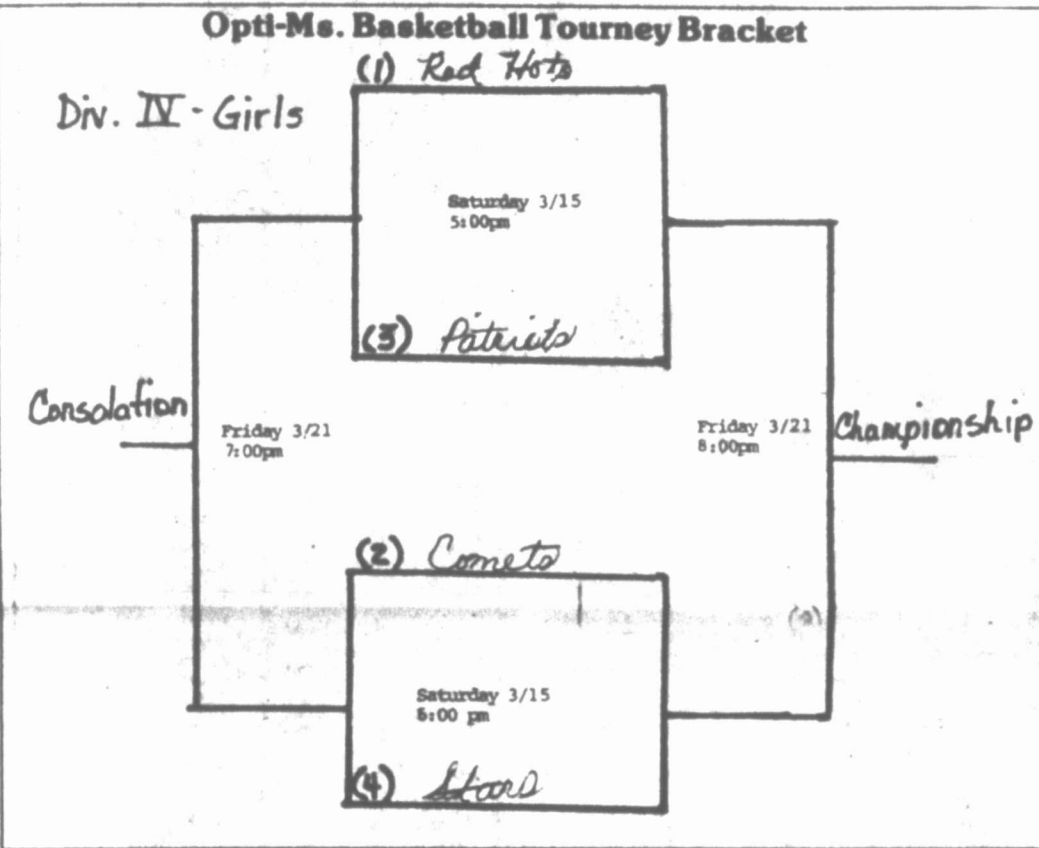

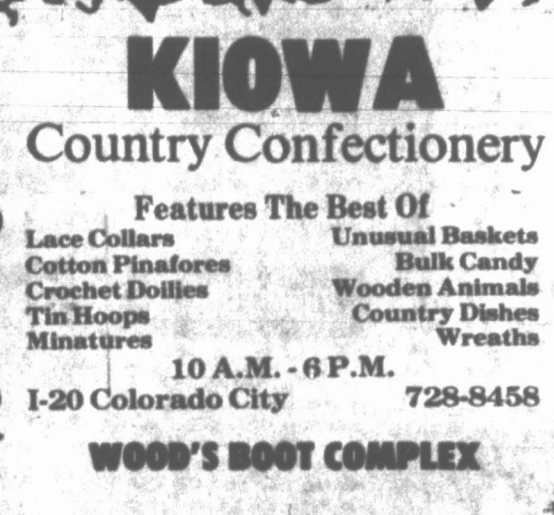
