The economic facts of life are catching up with the American consumer, and he isn't liking it. The economic fact of life that is causing all the hollering is the rising cost of food on the American table. In our opinion we are finally getting the farm segment of our economy somewhere close to the level enjoyed by most of the major elements in our economic fabric.

The price of farm products is rising and rightly so. For all too long the United States farmer has been on the short end of the economic ladder. We as a nation have been able, through the device of keeping cheap food available, to pay far too much for unnecessary luxuries. Now we are not against luxuries, we sort of like to luxuriate a bit ourselves, but we think that a proper priority would be for us to pay a fair price for our necessities and then use any surplus for the really unneeded items.

Earl Butz, a controversial but outspoken gent, hit us just right when he said that the housewife could expect to buy 79¢ steak when the farmer could again buy \$1,000 automobiles. The curse of our present inflation stems directly from the decades of unearned wage increases given to the majority of manufacturing employees. With them, wages have gone up and productivity has gone down.

With the American farmer, productivity has gone up and real wages have gone down. The laws of natural economics do not work this way: our politicians have caused this economic turnaround over the past 40 years. It is high time the laws of supply and demand be allowed to return agriculture to its rightful place in the economic picture of the United States.

We, for one family, are willing to pay higher food prices to allow unfettered economic laws to operate in the agricultural betterment of our country.

Watergate has tended to swamp the news from Washington. The average reader of newspapers has been hard put to come across any concrete news regarding the other actions of Congress. Be not fooled, Congress has been up to its usual trick of spending tax (yours and mine) money like mad. We give you this graphic example of a national legislature gone spending crazy.

As the 1974 fiscal year began July 1, the Chamber of Commerce of the United States reset its Federal Spending Clock to run at an accelerated pace. The reason is that Federal spending this fiscal year is estimated to increase by approximately \$736,000,000.00 up to \$269,000,000,000.00.

Rapidly changing digital figures across the top of the clock indicate how much the Federal Government has spent since the beginning of the fiscal year. Each day the clock registers expenditures of approximately \$736,000,000.00.

Here's what the reset clock now shows:

\$10,000.00, nearly the average annual income of a typical American family, spent every 1.17 seconds, displayed by a sweeping dial.

\$100,000.00, spent every 11.7 seconds, by a light flashing on.

\$1,000,000.00, spent every one minute and 57 seconds, by a beep sound.

Should the clock run slower or faster? After all, it's the peoples' money that is being spent. One thing we feel sure about is, as long as the carnival atmosphere of the Watergate hearings continues, fiscal actions of Congress will be swept under the news rug and our National Spending Clock will continue at an ever faster pace.

Classes At Texico Schools Slated To Start August 20

Monday, Aug. 20, marks the first day of classes of the 1973-74 school year for students of the Texico School District. Classes are scheduled to begin at 9 a.m. with busses running scheduled routes at regular

times. All classes will be conducted Monday with each class period being shortened to enable students to be dismissed from school at 2 p.m.

First meeting of the students Monday will be an assembly

followed by the first regularly scheduled classes of the year.

Elementary students will be registered for the school year Monday to complete '73-'74 registration for the school system. Senior students were

"Any child in the Farwell School District who will be five years old by Sept. 1, 1973, is eligible to attend Kindergarten

in the Farwell Schools system on a voluntary basis," according to Vernon Scott, Farwell Elementary School principal. Scott emphasizes that kindergarten attendance is not compulsory for five-year-olds under the new state program but points out that any child who has reached the age of six by Sept. 1 is required by state law to be registered to attend school as a first grade student. He also said this is the first year Farwell Schools have conducted a Kindergarten program in the school system.

Formal pre-registration of prospective kindergarten students was conducted during May. "Parents who have not registered their children should do so as soon as possible, in order for us to organize our program for the forthcoming year," said Scott. Registration is being conducted at Farwell Elementary School. Birth certificates and complete immunization records are required when children are registered.

Kindergarten classes are scheduled to begin Aug. 27.

Children registered under the program will attend classes on a half-day basis unless they qualify as being educationally deprived, in which instance they will attend classes a full day. According to Scott, a testing program to determine educational ability was slated to begin the latter part of this week.

Instructor for the Kindergarten program is Mrs. Kathy Weems with Susie Moore serving as an aide.

Transportation for all students of Farwell schools will be provided whether they attend classes on a half-day or full day basis. Lunches will also be provided for all students.

According to Scott, the Headstart Program of the Farwell schools will be conducted within the Kindergarten program this year. Headstart is a federally-financed program and children qualifying for the program will attend classes for a full school day. Eligibility for Headstart is determined by income of the student's family and family size.

Also this year Farwell Schools have instituted a new program known as Language and Learning Disabilities (LLD). LLD is a program conducted in conjunction with Special Education classes for grades one through eight. LLD students will "filter from their classrooms to LLD and back to the classrooms as needed to advance their education." Scott stated that the four Farwell County schools are sharing the LLD program.

Teachers who will be working with LLD students are Mrs. Lillian Green and Mrs. Nell Craig, and Mrs. Rubie Craft will serve as an aide. Miss Harriet Nichols is Special Education director for Farwell Schools. Special Education Counselor Charles Turner will be working with LLD and Special Education instructors and administrators of the four county schools to coordinate education programs. Howard Carlyle, a former Farwell resident, has returned to Farwell to serve as school co-op counselor for Farwell, Bovina and Lazbuddie schools.

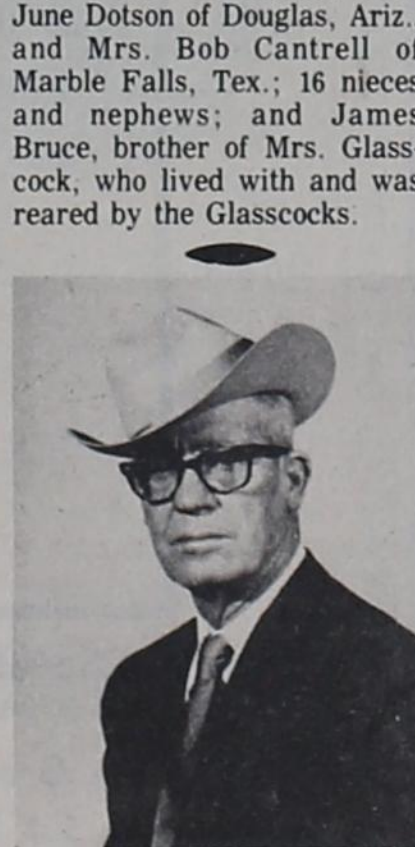
Mr. Glasscock died early Sunday morning, Aug. 12, at Clovis Memorial Hospital where he had been a patient since Aug. 8 following a stroke.

Aug. 21 at 9 a.m. presentation of Plan "A" Special Education will be the topic of a General Faculty Meeting. Work sessions with principals have been scheduled at 10 a.m. and Farwell and Bovina Special Education teachers will work with Miss Harriet Nichols, director of Special Education, and Charles Turner, County Special Education counselor, at the same hour. At 1 p.m. Hobart McDonald of the PESO Education Service Center in Amarillo will present "Career Education" at a General Faculty Meeting.

Work sessions are scheduled for 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. on Aug. 22.

Freshmen registration will begin at 9 a.m. Thursday, Aug. 23, with sophomores registering at 1:30 that afternoon.

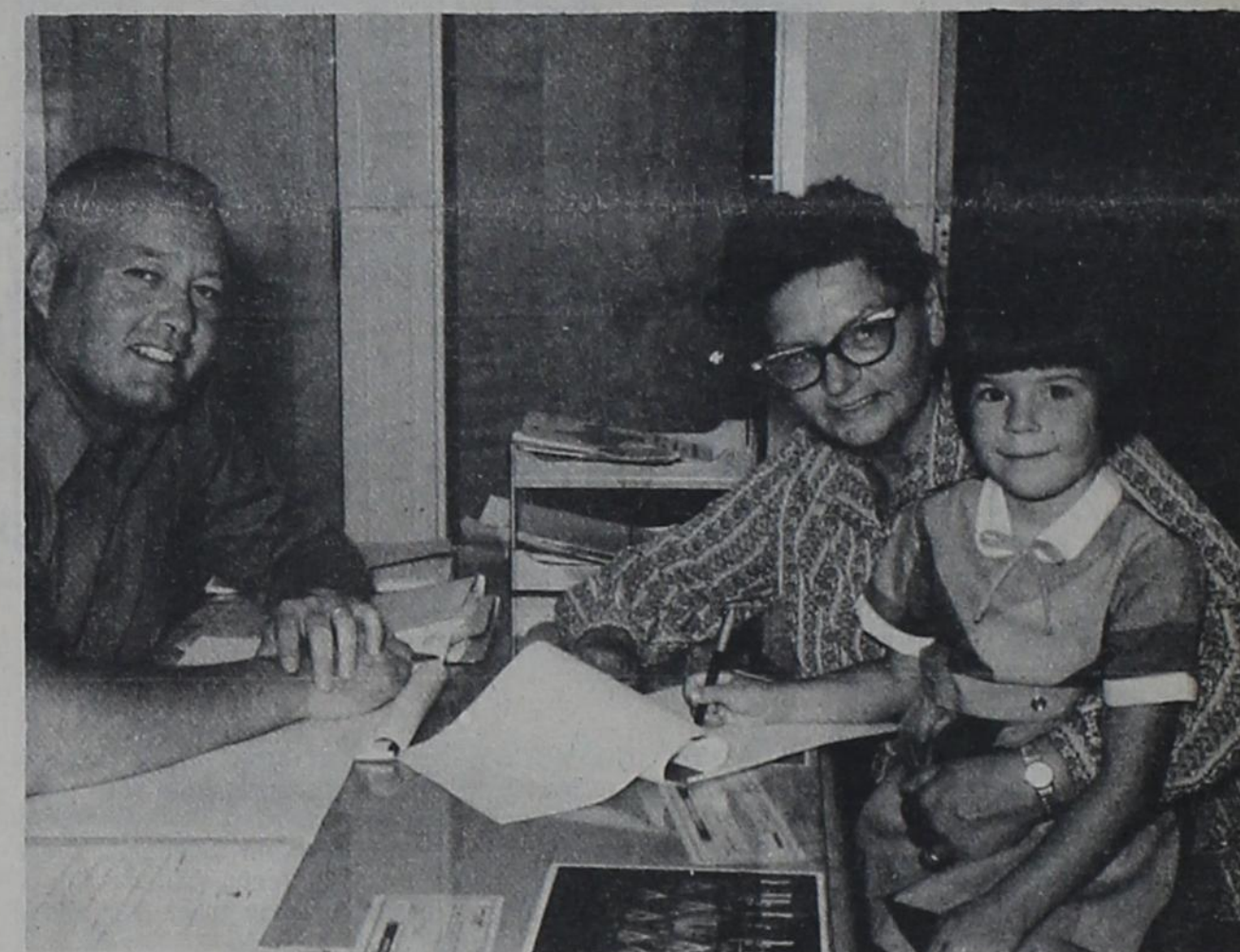

Take Trip To London - -

Getzes Tour Scotland While Visiting Family

Mr. and Mrs. John Getz of Farwell spent the last of May and the first two weeks of June visiting in Glasgow, Scotland, with their son and his family, Dr. and Mrs. Michael Getz and Bryan. Dr. Getz is working at Royal Beatson Institute for

Cancer Research in Glasgow. His wife, Judy, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Sharp of Texico.

The group did sightseeing in Glasgow where they visited Glasgow Cathedral, the University of Glasgow and Glasgow Art Gallery and Museum. According to the Getzes, Glasgow, with a population of 1,019,000 is the largest city in Scotland. It is situated at an altitude of only 80 feet above sea level.

They saw the Clyde River Channel, which was dredged so that ocean-going vessels could bring prosperous trade to port. "Shipbuilding and heavy industry are major sources of income," Mrs. Getz said. Both the "Queen Mary" and "Queen Elizabeth" were built at John Brown's yards on the Clyde, she added.

Mrs. Getz described the Cathedral as a magnificent structure in pure Gothic style and said it was begun in the 12th century. She was impressed by the extensive collection of paintings of objects of scientific and historic interest.

"The University occupies a commanding site on Gilmore Hill. The Library contains many rare volumes," she said.

The first weekend in Scotland, the group traveled to Edinburgh, the ancient capital of Scotland, and toured the historic Edinburgh Castle. The castle overlooks the Firth of Forth, the shores of Fife and the distant Highlands. It stands on a rocky ridge, rising 270 feet above the Princes Street Gardens. Princes Street divides the new section of town from the old. On one side of this magnificent thoroughfare are sweeping lawns and on the other, many fine shops.

Edinburgh's International Festival is one of the world's outstanding cultural events. The home of John Knox, Scottish reformer and statesman, located in Edinburgh, is open to the public. Also located in Edinburgh is Holyrood Palace, the Queen of England's official quarters when she is in Scotland.

The next day the Getz families drove to Stirling and toured the famous Stirling Castle. On their return trip they had a picnic lunch on the banks of Loch Lomond.

The following weekend, the group took a tour of the Scottish Highlands, seeing Ben Nevis, the highest mountain in Great Britain at 4406 feet above sea level.

"We spent the night at Ft. Augustus, drove around Loch Ness and visited Ft. Williams. In the Highlands, we visited Inverness, St. Andrews and Perth," she said.

The group traveled around Loch Ness on their way to the Highlands. Loch Ness is a short distance inland from the sea and is the source of the River Ness. The loch is also the home of the much-publicized aquatic monster known to local investigators as Nessie.

"As with flying saucers, its existence has been a matter of considerable speculation. Modern interest was aroused in 1932, when a number of people reputedly sighted the hump-backed Nessie; the first recorded mention of an unidentified floating object was by St.

Adamnan, seventh century Abbot of Iona, who referred to an 'aquaticus bestia' in his writings," she added.

Mrs. Getz said that Inverness was the northernmost town in Great Britain and a good base for Highland touring. It is situated where the River Ness joins the sea.

St. Andrews is the home of the Royal and Ancient Golf Club, site of the famed St. Andrews Golf Course. It was once the ecclesiastical capital of the country. The town lies on the east coast, midway between the Firth of Forth and Tay.

Perth, once the residence of Scottish kings, is now an industrial town in a fertile valley, located on the Firth of Tay. "There are many lochs, hills and streams which lie inland from the city," according to Mrs. Getz.

St. John's Church, where John Knox preached his famous sermon against the Roman Catholic Church in 1559 is located in Perth. The speech so inflamed the congregation that churches throughout Scotland were stripped of their "idolatrous works", including invaluable paintings and sculpture.

Getz described Scotland as having a paternalistic type of government. He noted that the government makes a lot of decisions that are ordinarily left to free enterprise.

"I don't think this type of government has added to economic growth. The economy looks stagnant. There is little housing and 95 percent of it is done by the government," he said.

"It is an excellent place for United States citizens to visit. It is very historical and extremely scenic. It is easy to communicate with the people and get around in the country because the signs are readable," he added.

The Getzes noted the well-paved roads throughout the country and the small compact cars that traveled them. They commented that all the roads were apparently built right over the ancient trails.

Getz noted the Scots' great national spirit, as well as that of all the Great Britains. He said that Scotland is headed by a minister, who is a representative for the country at Parliament in London.

Some of the things which were sources of amazement for the Getzes during their stay were the daily shopping trips for food, the advanced transportation system within the city of Glasgow and the determination of the Glasgow citizens to take to the roads frequently to get away from the city.

Mrs. Getz explained that refrigerators known as "fridges" are small and that

the average citizens visited the marketplace each day to buy milk in pints, and other items, packaged in small containers. "Evidently many people don't have 'fridges'," she said.

Both of the Getzes were interested to see the Scottish people take to the roads in their "caravans", small camping trailers, to the country where they sat in lawn chairs, only yards from each other, reading the paper or engaged in some other pastime.

A highlight of the trip to Mrs. Getz, was having "high tea" on a cruise on Loch Lomond. She said the meal, which was dinner, included lamb and fish. A group of singers performed and Scottish dancers did the Highland fling and other dances throughout the cruise.

On their third weekend abroad, the Getzes took a side trip to London, where they were shown the sights by a private tour guide. They took a sightseeing cruise on the Thames River and returned to their hotel by underground. Their hotel was located in famed Kensington Square.

The following day, they toured London in their guide's car, visiting Westminster

Abbey, Buckingham Palace, the Tower of London and St. Paul's Cathedral. At Buckingham Palace, they watched the changing of the guard.

They also viewed Parliament buildings and Big Ben, Scotland Yard and the new Scotland Yard building, government and municipal buildings, famous parks and homes. They saw Princess Margaret and Lord Snowdon's home at Kensington Palace and walked to No. 10 Downing Street and saw the Prime Minister's home.

They traveled to Fleet Street where all the newspapers are located, visited the Bank of England, Piccadilly Circus and Trafalgar Square, Hyde Park and Baker Street. The Getzes saw statues of Abraham Lincoln, George Washington, Franklin D. Roosevelt, John Kennedy, Dwight Eisenhower and many famous English and other national statesmen.

They also saw the American Embassy and the American Ambassador's residence, which was donated by Barbara Hutton. They saw the Inn where Howard Hughes is apparently occupying the top floor and the hotel where Richard Burton and Elizabeth Taylor stay in London and

many of the homes where Charles Dickens lived.

In summing up their trip, the Getzes said that Scotland is one of the most beautiful countries one can imagine. The lush emerald green of the countryside and the beautiful flowers everywhere are almost beyond description. However, they didn't care for the climate which was cold and rainy most of the time. It never gets very warm in the summer, in the 50s and 60s, but in the same respect it never gets extremely cold in the winter, usually in the low 30s or high 20s.

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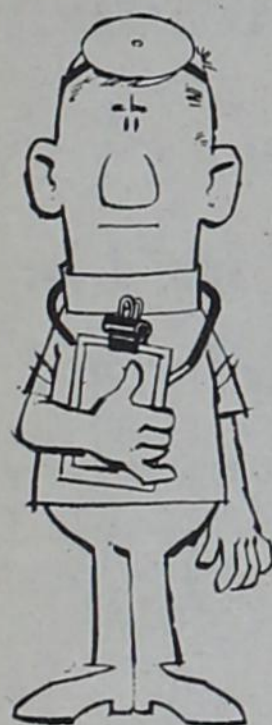

Local School Officials have adopted the following family size and income scale to assist them in determining eligibility.

Families falling within these scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for free lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The form itself is simple and easy to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family and any unusual circumstances or hardship which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility.

Under the provisions of the policy the principal of each school will review the applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local school official he may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. W. M. Roberts, superintendent of schools, whose address is Box F, Farwell, Texas, has been designated as the Hearing Official. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy.

The policy also provides that there will be no identification of or discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the office of the superintendent where it may be reviewed by any interested patron.

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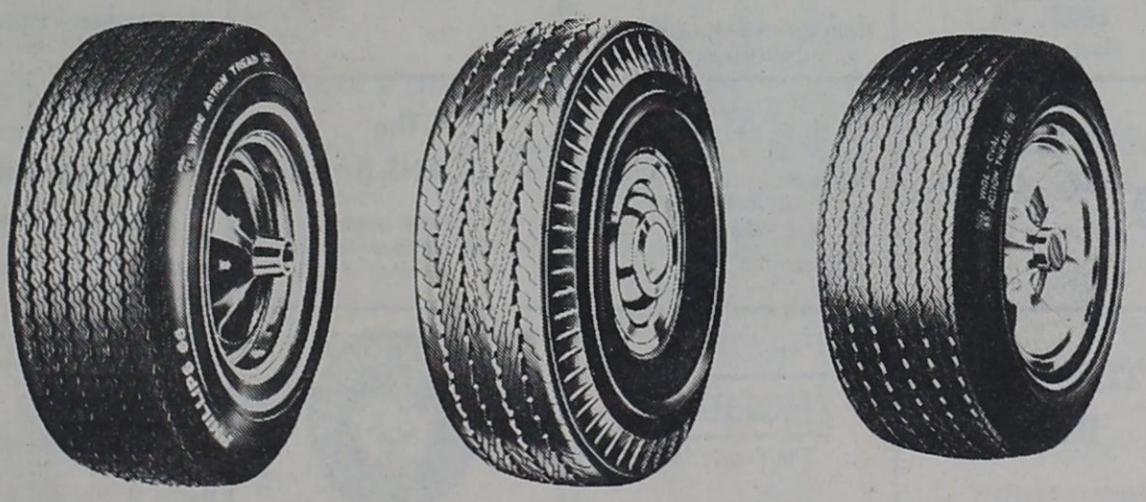

EVERLASTING LIFE

Romans 8:2, when correctly read, is a most blessed passage of Scripture. To get the sense we should place a dash between the words "Spirit" and "of." Thus it would read: "For the law of the Spirit -- of life in Christ Jesus, hath made me free from the law of sin and death."

When a sinner places his trust in Christ as Savior he is justified before the bar of God, because Christ's death and righteousness are imputed to him. This is a judicial matter.

But at the same moment something else happens: the Spirit regenerates and gives new life (Tit. 3:5). Now this is a law, an inexorable, unchangeable law. The sinner who sincerely places his trust in Christ as Savior is given life by the Holy Spirit. It is always so; it is never otherwise. I John 5:12 says: "He that hath the Son hath life..." John 3:36 says that "He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life" and Col. 3:3 declares that the believer's life is "hid with Christ

in God." Thus the apostle could say: "The Law of the Spirit, (that of) life in Christ, hath made me free from the law of sin and death." Adam forfeited his life by sin, but the believer's new life can never be forfeited, for this life is nothing less than the life of Christ, in whom the sinner has already died and paid for his sins -- and in whom he now stands perfect and complete before God.

It is a law, a fixed unchangeable law, that sin brings forth death (Rom. 5:12; 5:23, et. al). This is called "the law of sin and death," but the believer has already died for sin in Christ and has been given a new life by the Spirit. Thus "The law of the Spirit," that of "life in Christ," has made the simplest believer free from "the law of sin and death."

Thank God for "the law of the Spirit," everlasting life through the Lord Jesus Christ, who died for our sins.

The mother of the bride chose a full length yellow chiffon dress featuring long sleeves trimmed with avocado flowers. She wore white accessories and a white orchid corsage.

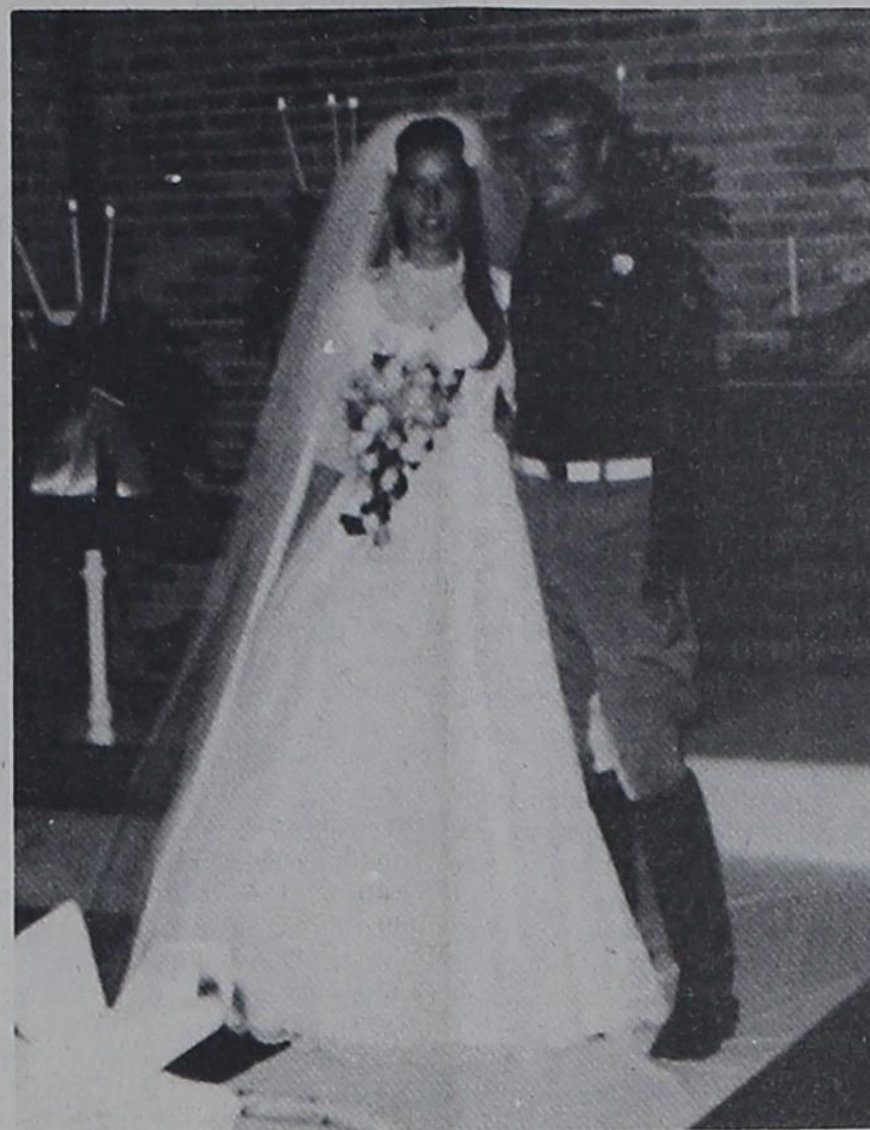

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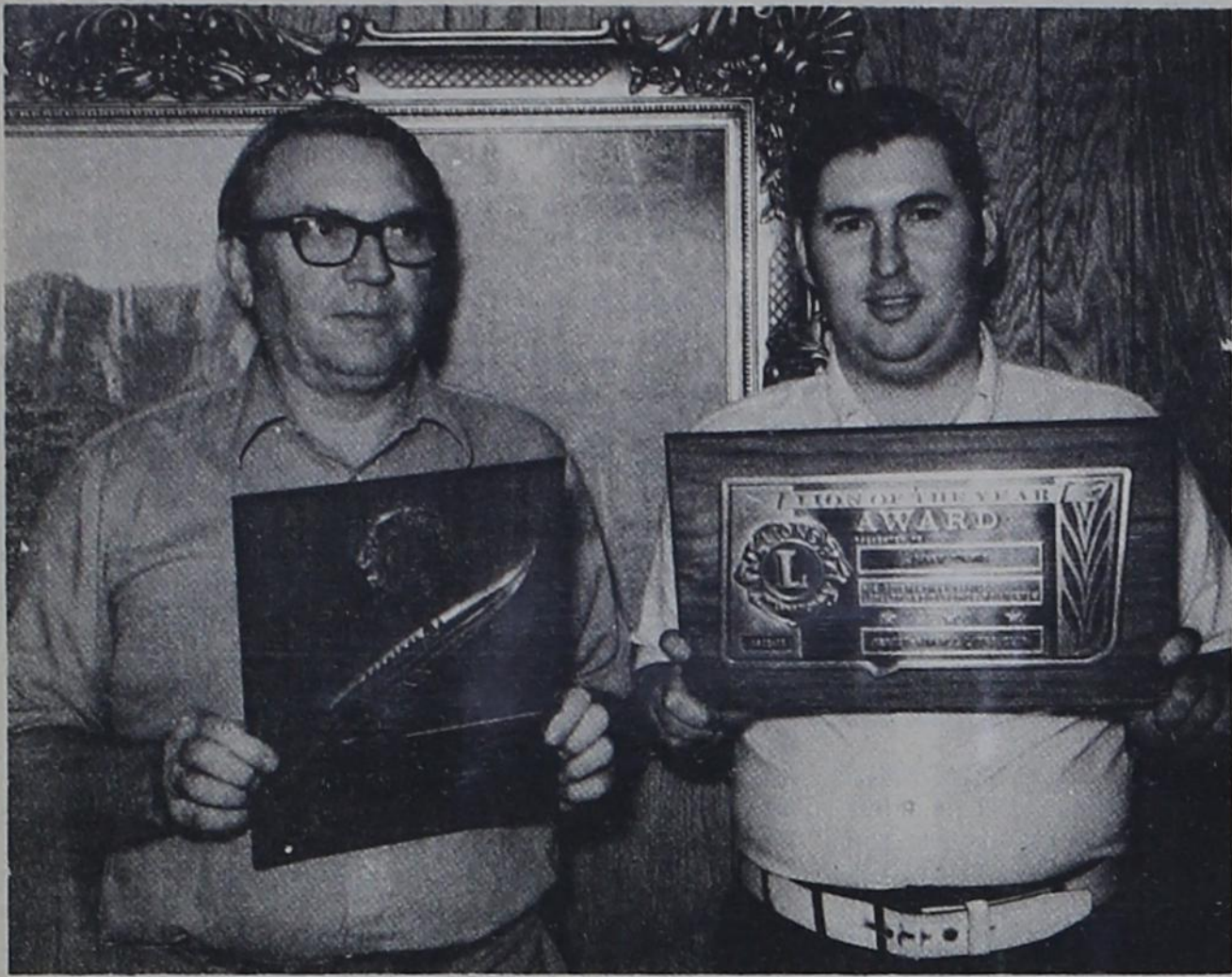

Cattle producers in Parmar County are urged to attend a meeting in Amarillo on Aug. 21 regarding upcoming new regulations on brucellosis testing.

The meeting will be in the City Commission Room, 3rd floor, Municipal Bldg. at 8 p.m. A veterinarian with the Texas Animal Health Commission will be on hand to inform producers of pending changes in the present brucellosis regulations. Comments and feedback are being invited from producers, and a statewide hearing on the new regulations will be held in Austin on Sept. 18.

The new brucellosis testing program is expected to begin Oct. 1 and is designed to eliminate the cattle disease from Texas, thus allowing the state to be declared Certified Brucellosis Free.

For all cattle producers to benefit from the new testing program, it is important that they become familiar with the new regulations. Thus the upcoming meeting on Aug. 21 will provide an opportunity for producers to learn about the new plans for brucellosis testing.

The same type meeting will be held on Aug. 28 in the Agricultural Center Building in Plainview starting at 8 p.m.

Area Wreck Kills California Woman

A two-car accident which occurred Saturday afternoon at Clays Corner near Lazbuddie killed a California woman and injured seven other persons.

Dead on arrival at West Plains Hospital in Muleshoe was Mrs. Bessie Ruth Hines, 42, of Lompoc, Calif., formerly of Clovis. Mrs. Hines and the seven other persons were all occupants of a car reportedly driven by Kimberly Ann Walls, 13, of Clovis. The seven injured were rushed to the Muleshoe hospital, but only one, Mrs. Virginia Drager, 49, of Friona was admitted. She is in fair condition. The other six were treated and released.

Driver of the other car was Rafer Solis Jr. of Morton, who received only a slight injury of a cut on the chin.

According to Texas Highway Patrolman Jim Bishop, investigating officer, Miss Walls' car apparently struck the right side of the Solis vehicle when she allegedly failed to stop at the intersection of farm-to-market roads 145 and 214. The Walls' vehicle was headed west on Farm Road 145 and the Solis car was headed south on Farm Road 214.

Other passengers in the Walls vehicle were the two Hines children, Jeslyn, 15, and Brad, 13; Mrs. Elizabeth Jesko, 27, of Muleshoe; and her two children, Dustin, four, and John, three months.

The Sam Hines family was in the area to attend a family reunion. Other immediate survivors of Mrs. Hines are her husband, Sam of the home; and another son, Harrell.

Area survivors include sisters-in-law, Mrs. A. B. Bell of Texico and Mrs. Mike Gattis of Clovis; and brother-in-law, Lynn Westbrook of Clovis. Mrs. Virginia Drager of Friona, the injured woman, is also a sister-in-law.

The body of Mrs. Hines will be taken to Lompoc for services and burial.

A minor accident took place early Sunday morning when Melvin Leon Collins of Route 4, Muleshoe, driving a 1972 pickup apparently failed to negotiate a curve and went into the ditch and rolled over, according to Texas highway patrolman, Glenn Fant, who was the investigating officer.

The accident occurred two miles east of Farwell. Collins suffered a cracked collar bone in the incident.

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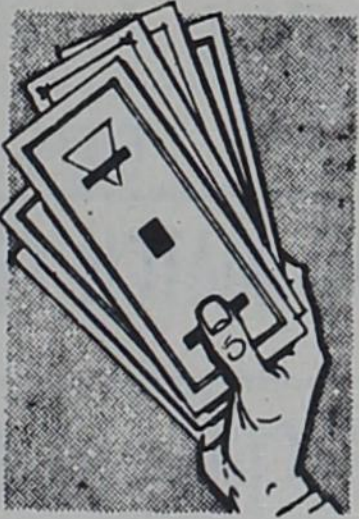
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
