Soviet Switches Policy On Atomic Control

EASTLAND COUNTY GORMAN AREA

Following is a report on activities in the Kirk pool, Gorman for Friday, October 1:

W. B. Johnson No. 2 Sanders have set pipe and are WOC. W. B. Johnson No. 2 Cooper Grocery set surface pipe yesterday (Thursday) and are drilling today. W. B. Johnson No. 1 Cooper Grocery are drilling at 2867 and are in pay now.

Foster Brothers No. 1 Putty drilling at 2850 broke the last wheel flat in two and are closed down for a day or two for repair of the part.

E. K. and E. M. Burt No. 1 Fuqua drilling at 3200 feet.

Roy Parker No. 1 Daniels is making oil at approximately 2850. They have shut down to watch the flow and to determine if they should drill further. They are still in the pay and the gas has been so hard to control that the operation is becoming hazardous.

Man and Griffin have set pipe. They had difficulty with the pipe—it must be lapweld pipe—it just sort of split open. They do have a good showing in this well at approximately 2800 feet.

Commercial Production No. 4 J. A. Hirst are still in the third of a bangup fishing job. They do not know if the well will be successful.

Hayden and Ownby No. 1 Flatt acidized again. Thursday morning they attempted to give it 1000 gallons. At 1500 lbs. pressure they broke the resistance of the formation. Then at 500 lbs. they gave it 500 gallons. Mr. Driver told this reporter yesterday that it would be a fluid well producing plenty of oil of 42 gravity, however today, we understand they are still swabbing.

J. R. Hunter No. 1 Choate is closed in until Saturday to give the oil a chance to collect and the remainder of the shot and rubble to gather so that it can be removed and to determine just what they have out there.

J. R. Hunter No. 1 Blackwell have reperforated and are acidizing the Marble Falls pay.

Stevenson Takes Case To U. S. Supreme Court

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (UP) — Former Gov. Coke Stevenson of Texas today petitioned the U. S. Supreme court to set aside Justice Hugo Black's action in the Texas senatorial race.

Black set aside a lower court order which would have barred Rep. Lyndon B. Johnson from the Texas ballot as democratic candidate for U. S. senator.

Johnson defeated Stevenson by less than 100 votes in the Texas primary, which is tantamount to election. But Federal District Judge T. Whitfield Davidson issued an order directing that Johnson's name be left off the ballot pending an investigation of charges by Stevenson of irregularities in the primary.

Black set aside the lower court order on Wednesday on appeal of Johnson's attorneys.

"It would be a drastic break with the past, which I can't believe Congress ever intended to permit, for federal courts to go into the business of conducting what is to every intent and purpose and supervision over an election contest," Black said in his ruling.

Black granted his stay of the lower court order until the full Supreme Court can act on the matter.

Stevenson's petition today was directed to the full court. The court meets for its full term Monday. Under Texas law, the name of the democratic candidate must be certified today if he is to get on the ballot.

Thus apparently Johnson's name will go on the ballot.

Three New Wells Featured Week In Kirk Pool

Three new wells and three new locations featured the week in the Kirk pool, along the Eastland-Comanche border.

Best of the trio of producers was J. W. Baldwin's No. 2 Watson which gauged 135 barrels in three hours through 3-4 inch choke. Coast Oil Corporation's No. 4 Delia Graham gauged 66 barrels in six hours through 16-64th and Commercial Production Company's No. 3 J. A. Hirst gauged 63 barrels in 24 hours through 9-64th.

An offset to Kirk pool production has been started by Sessions & Kirk's No. 1 J. C. Wood, 330 from north and west lines of south east quarter, section 60, block 2, H. & T. C. survey. Other locations are Commercial Production Company's No. 4 J. A. Hirst and Coast Oil Corporation's No. 7 Delia Graham.

PROPOSE TWO PART RESOLUTION TO CREATE CONTROL AGENCY

PARIS, Oct. 2 (UP) — Russia, in a major change of her atomic energy policy, offered today to abandon her previous demand that all atomic weapons be scrapped and prohibited before international control machinery can be established.

The offer was voiced by Soviet Chief Delegate Andrei Vishinsky, who called for a "simultaneous" prohibition of atomic weapons and creation of an international atomic energy control organization.

Vishinsky introduced a two-part resolution before the political committee of the United Nations General Assembly which would:

1. Order the Security Council and Atomic Commission to continue negotiations on atomic energy, and
2. Prepare two draft conventions on banning atomic weapons and creating an international control agency. Both treaties would be "signed and put into force simultaneously."

Rev. E. F. Cole To Conduct Meet In Eastland

Rev. E. F. Cole, one of the outstanding Baptist preachers of Texas, is leading revival services at the First Baptist Church of Eastland which began Oct. 1 and will continue to Oct. 10. For many years Mr. Cole was pastor of the First Baptist Church at Lamesa. He resigned a few years back from the pastorate to do general evangelistic work. He has been greatly in demand in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Louisiana. As an indication of his speaking ability, he was chosen in 1944 to deliver the annual convention sermon when Texas Baptists met at San Antonio.

In addition to the fine preaching of Mr. Cole, the church has secured the services of a well-known singer of this area, C. L. Martin of Breckenridge. Mr. Martin is Director of Education and Music at the First Baptist Church, Breckenridge. He is gifted as a soloist and as a congregational leader.

The services are to be at 7:30 p. m. each evening, Oct. 1-10. Morning services will not begin until Monday, October 4, and will be held each week day at 10:00 a. m. to the end of the meeting.

"The public is invited to hear these unusual men," said Rev. L. M. Chapman, pastor of the First Baptist Church.

DEATH INTERRUPTS CELEBRATION

CISCO, Tex. Oct. 2 (UP) — A funeral took the place of a planned 52nd wedding anniversary observance here by Mr. and Mrs. Jacob E. Coleman.

Services were held at 4 p. m. yesterday for Coleman, 85, who died Thursday of a long illness. He was a retired drilling contractor.

American Delegate Warren Austin described the Russian proposal as "just another tactical maneuver of the kind we have come to know."

Western Atomic experts conceded that Vishinsky's proposal was a change in Soviet tactics on the atomic program, and recognized it as a Soviet retreat from the position that the United States must withdraw all its bombs before negotiations on an international control program.

But they said it would make no contribution to any narrowing of the East-West disagreement. Even though the offer was a break in the unchanging year Soviet demand for sea all American atomic bombs, prime condition for establishing international control, it did not appear to increase greatly the chances of an early accord on the problem.

Vishinsky's announcement of Russia's willingness to postpone the banning of atomic weapons control is reached was a major step toward agreement on international change in Soviet policy.

But it still left the east and west as far apart as ever on what constitutes "effective international control."

The United States insists the international control must be developed by stages. The U. S. is willing to turn over its atomic energy information and designs its bombs for an international authority only after the various stages have become effective and security safeguard are assured.

Vishinsky's resolution was introduced after another long tirade against attacking the American atomic energy control plan.

Western delegates immediately interpreted Vishinsky's proposal as another Soviet move designed to place the burden for breaking off atomic negotiations on the western powers.

Vishinsky's proposal was made after a tirade against French Defense Minister Paul Ramadier, who had called upon Russia to support the American atomic energy control plan.

Ramadier reminded the Russians that "everybody else" has as much fear of the atomic bomb as the Soviet Union.

"The atomic bomb is as horrible for those who use it as for those who receive it," Ramadier said.

Ramadier warned that failure to reach agreement on atomic energy control would mean the death of the United Nations.

"Either we find a solution to the problem or there will be no more United Nations," Ramadier said. "You delegates will be the first victim of its explosion — the United Nations will be the first victim of failure."

Ramadier said that if the United States was called on to destroy its bombs before international control was set up, "it would merely substitute monopoly in favor of 'the fraudulent'."

He warned that international control and inspection of atomic energy was made mandatory by Soviet hints that Russia has the atomic bomb.

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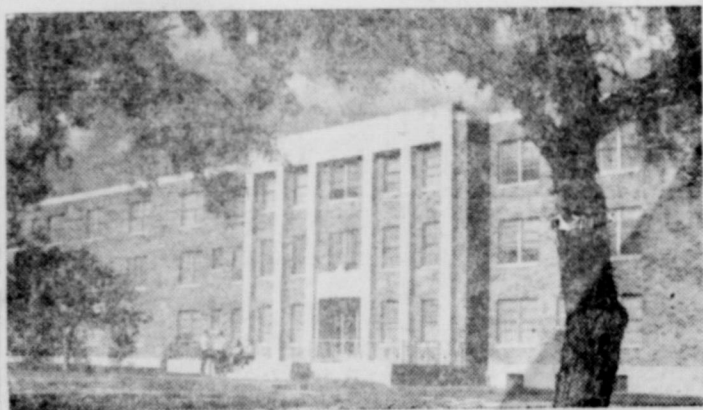
An luring queen of the white tops poses with Old Sid, matriarch of the Clyde Beatty elephant herd coming to this locality soon.

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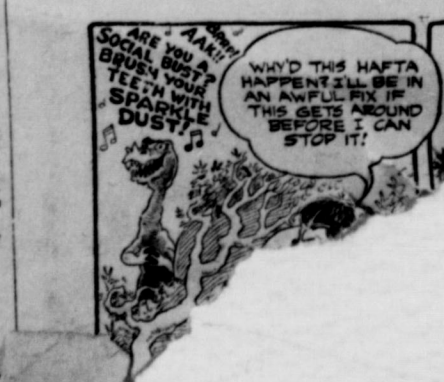

The doctor said it was a slight chill on the liver, and left some little white pills.

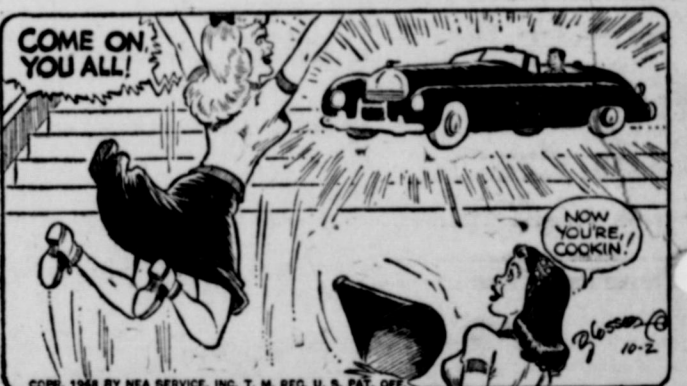

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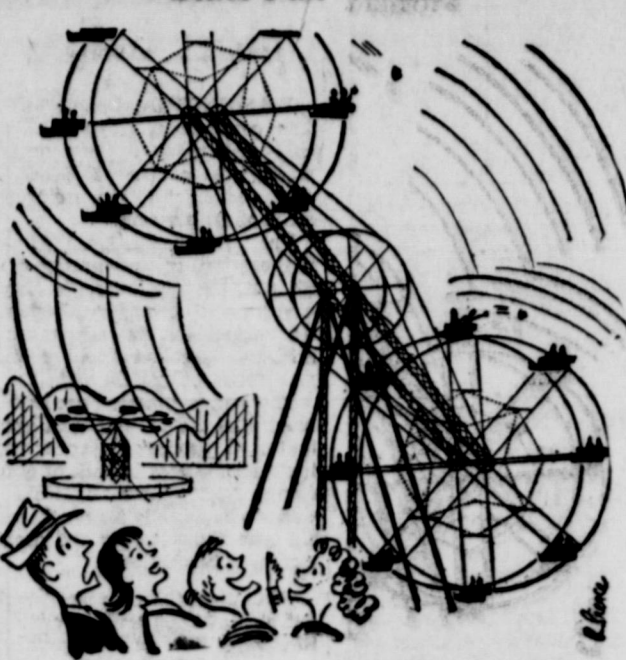
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Giant Double Wheel Ready To Startle State Fair Visitors

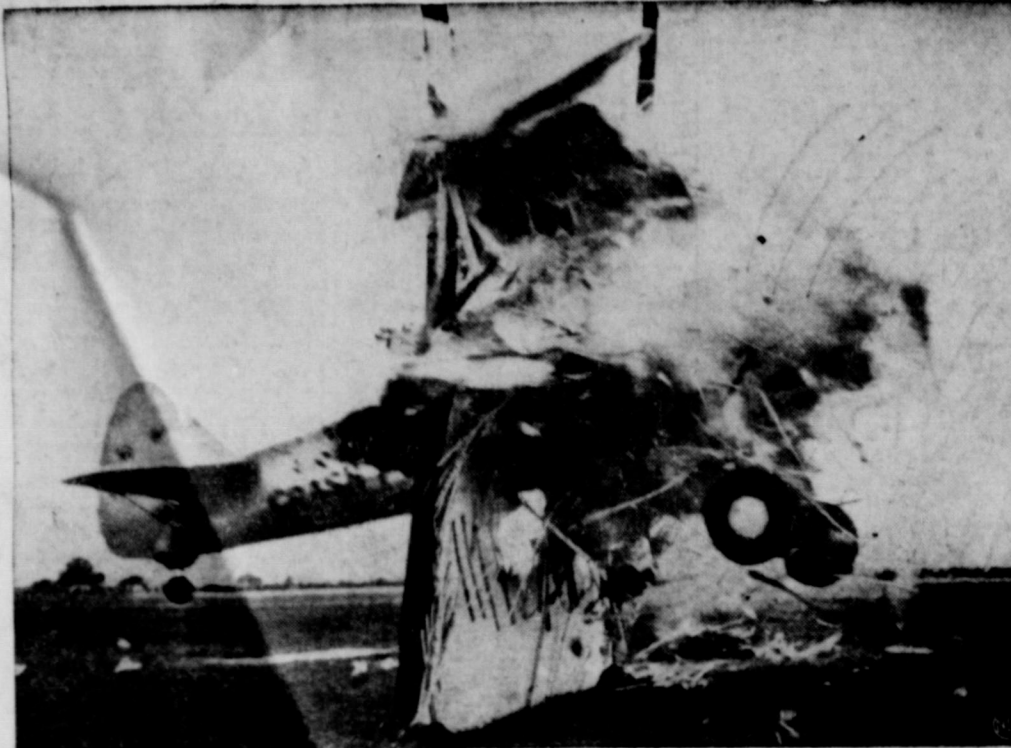

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Government To Subsidize Cold Rubber Output

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (UP)—The government stepped in with cold cash today to help produce more "cold rubber" that may increase automobile tire mileage as much as 30 per cent.

The Reconstruction Finance Corporation, in announcing a \$3,500,000 (M) program to equip government-owned synthetic rubber plants for the new process, said the so-called "cold rubber" may revolutionize the industry.

The new synthetic product is much like the present kind except that it is produced at near-freezing temperatures instead of a 125 degree heat. Tests indicate it wears substantially longer than the old type "hot" rubber and greatly increases tire mileage.

Four plants already are turning out about 21,000 tons a year, the RFC said. The new program will increase the total to 183,000 tons.

The program will affect several government-owned synthetic rubber plants which are operated by private companies. They include plants at Baton Rouge, La.; Borger, Tex.; Los Angeles; Houston, Tex.; Baytown, Tex.; Lake Charles, La.; and Port Neches, Tex.
