Proposed New Constitution Is Soundly Defeated

Texas voters went to the polls on Tuesday and soundly rejected the eight propositions, which if they had been approved, would have given Texas a new constitution.

Incomplete returns on Tuesday night indicated that all eight propositions had failed by a vote of three or four to one. It appeared that less than 25 percent of the registered voters

statewide cast ballots in the election Tuesday. Election returns Tuesday night with 50 counties reporting and four complete were as follows:

Proposition 1 (Legislative-Executive), 66,479 for; 257,249 against.

Proposition 2 (Judiciary), 70,475 for; 253,672 against.

Proposition 3 (Voting and Elections), 71,080 for; 253,790 against.

Proposition 4 (Education), 71,503 for; 254,113 against.

Proposition 5 (Finance), 65,888 for; 259,094 against.

Proposition 6 (Local Government), 71,266 for; 256, 735 against.

Proposition 7 (General Provisions), 66,792 for; 254,247 against.

Proposition 8 (Mode of Amending), 68,530 for; 251,499 against.

Talco voters opposed the constitutional provisions by a ratio of at least 10 to 1. One hundred and seven cast ballots in Talco, where the election judge was Mrs. Ivy Smith with Mrs. Vivian Westbrook at alternate. They were assisted by Mrs. W. E. Welch, Mrs. M. E. Jones and Mrs. R. G. Hood. The number of the proposition and the results of the voting in the Talco box follows:

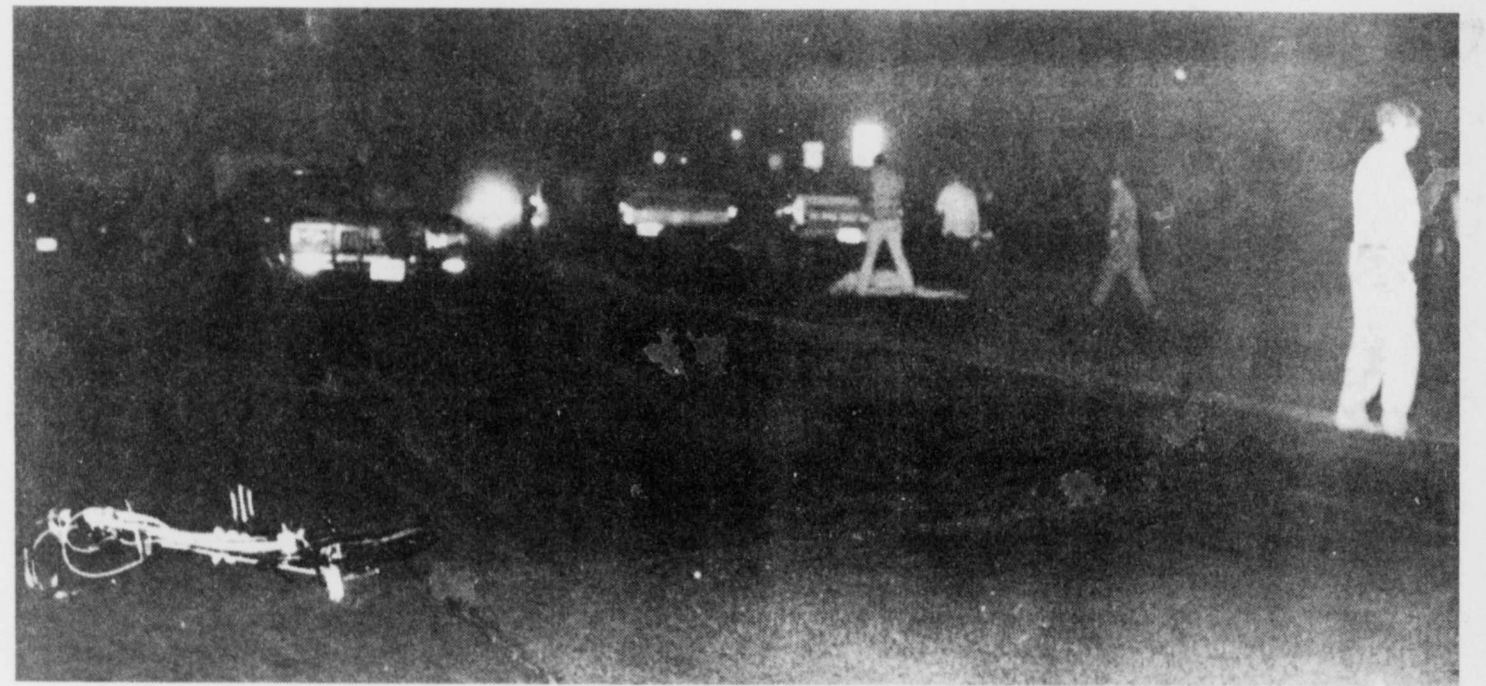

Panthers Defeat Rebels 34-15

It appears that the Rivercrest Rebels can handle almost any situation with the poise and confidence of professionals—being outnumbered, outnumbered, and outscored every week are things that the Rebels handle very well. Being intimidated by the officials was one problem that the North Lamar Panthers handled better than the Rebels, however, and as a result the Panthers defeated the Rebels 34 to 15 at North Lamar Friday night.

Twenty-four penalties were called against both teams in a game in which the officials carried the ball up and down the field more than the players. North Lamar was penalized 11 times for 115 yards and the Rebels were penalized 13 times for 120 1/4 yards.

The Rebels played very well during the opening quarters of the game before the heavy penalties started, and at the end of the first quarter led the Panthers 15 to eight. Panther fumbles were twice turned into Rebel touchdowns, and the Rebels held the same lead at halftime as they did at the end of the first quarter.

Randy Belcher was the first Rebel to recover a Panther fumble on the North Lamar 25 yard line. Gary Neill carried the ball 21 yards for the touchdown, then went around left end for the two points after.

A fumble on the first play from scrimmage by the Panthers was recovered by Rivercrest on the North Lamar 35 yard line, and the drive to the goal line was boosted by a 16 yard pass completion from quarterback Clyde Brown to Sammie Ellis on the 15 yard line. Ellis took the ball on the next play and went in for the score, then Larry Taylor, back in action after recovering from a broken hand, kicked the extra point.

Panther mistakes cost another drive early in the second quarter, when Donald Jean recovered a North Lamar fumble on the Rivercrest 30 yard line.

North Lamar penetrated to the Rebel 26 on one drive, then to the 12 on another drive

during the quarter, but the Rebel defensive efforts were successful.

The third quarter belonged to the officials, who assessed nine penalties against both teams for 125 yards during this period. Still, the Panthers began a drive on their 28 yard line, gained 30 yards on penalty against the Rebels to Rivercrest 25 yard line, then went in for the score. Their next possession, courtesy of a Rebel fumble, was also turned into a touchdown.

It appeared that the Rebels would cross the goal line again in the third quarter, when the penalties this time favored Rivercrest, and Sammie Ellis made a 28 yard scamper around the right end. The drive

ended unsuccessfully on the North Lamar 19, however.

A 52 yard punt by the Panthers early in the fourth quarter drove the Rebels to their 16 yard line, and when punter David Horn got it off from the end zone, under pressure, the ball traveled only to the Rebel 20. The Rebels held, but the ball was still deep in their territory when they took possession, and they worked carefully out to the 42 yard line before the ball went over on downs.

The Panthers made quick work of this possession and scored from the 29 yard line. The try for points after was good.

The next Rebel possession

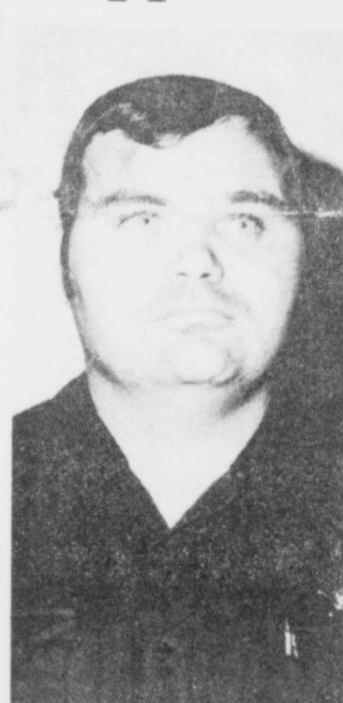

Shipp Is New Deputy

Jim Bob Shipp of Bogata was named Thursday, October 30 to replace Tom Eddins as a Red River County Deputy Sheriff, according to a statement released by Sheriff M. E.

McGuire through Gavin Watson, County Judge.

Shipp received his certification as a law enforcement officer in October through the Paris Police Academy, and has been working on the police force in Clarksville for almost a year. He served two years in the military police in the Marine Corps.

Shipp is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Shipp of Mount Pleasant and a graduate of Mount Pleasant High School. He is 26 years old. He and his wife, Lee, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elic Adams of Bogata, have one child, Lori, who is two years old.

School Policy For Use Of Buildings Adopted

The Talco-Bogata School District in regular meeting Tuesday night adopted a comprehensive policy for the

use of school buildings and facilities by groups, individuals and organizations. Standard fees for the use of certain facilities are included in the policy, which in effect eases the restrictions which have previously been placed on the use of school buildings.

Trustee Mrs. Neill Rozell argued that no fee should be charged residents of the district who are already paying for the buildings through school taxes, but it was the general feeling of the board that the overall merits of the policy outweighed minor problems, and the fees were maintained. The policy exempts churches, civic groups, clubs and some other groups from any but janitorial fees, if needed.

The board bought general liability insurance from Gerald Capps, owner of Bryson Insurance in Bogata, which covers some of the loopholes in a policy bought previously covering liability of school board members. The additional coverage was sought as a result of a suit filed claiming bodily injury against the Clarksville School Board in which the legal liability of the board did not provide coverage for bodily injury.

Trustee E. E. Brooks asked that insurance company engineers be brought in to evaluate the buildings of the district for replacement costs and fire hazards.

The board voted to buy new athletic equipment and uniforms for high school and junior high basketball teams.

Waylon Erwin with Pritchard and Abbott Evaluation Services appeared before the board to ask for an increased fee for the company's services to the district. The company evaluates property for tax rendering

purposes, and presently is paid \$5,250 a year.

Erwin asked for and the board approved a fee of \$6,000 for 1976 and a fee of \$6,750 for 1977. Erwin said that Talco crude is presently bringing from \$4.60 to \$4.70 a barrel for old oil and \$10.00 a barrel for new oil, or oil from wells drilled since 1972. Any well producing less than 10 barrels a day brings \$10.00 a barrel Erwin said.

In other business the board adopted a plan for the selection of members to the National Honor Society at Rivercrest based on character and academic standing. The plan was prepared by Mike Vinyard, Rivercrest principal.

The next regular meeting of the board will be at 7:00 p.m., December 2.

Bogata Post Office Featured

The Bogata Post Office was featured in a newsletter published recently by the U. S. Postal Service. The article recognized the Bogata Post Office as one of the oldest in the Dallas Sectional Center. An older community once known as Maple Springs and then Rosalie is located nearby. It is believed to be the earliest Anglo-American settlement in North Texas.

The first post office was called Maple Springs, and it was in the home of W. G. Miller, and was established May 21, 1851. The name was changed to Bogata February 7, 1881. Increased settlement in the area caused the establishment of a new post office a short distance north of the present post office. James E. Horner was the first

postmaster after the change.

With the building of the Paris and Mount Pleasant Railroad between 1881 and 1913, the Bogata settlement was shifted to the area adjacent to the railroad. Bogata is an old area, but the buildings in town do not reflect this since the townsite was moved to its present location.

The Bogata Post Office has been located in several buildings. The present location formerly housed a mercantile store. This building was built about forty-one years ago and the Post Office became the occupant about twenty years ago. Although the building is not as old as some of the other post offices in Texas, it is one of the oldest postal services.

Mattress Hits Car

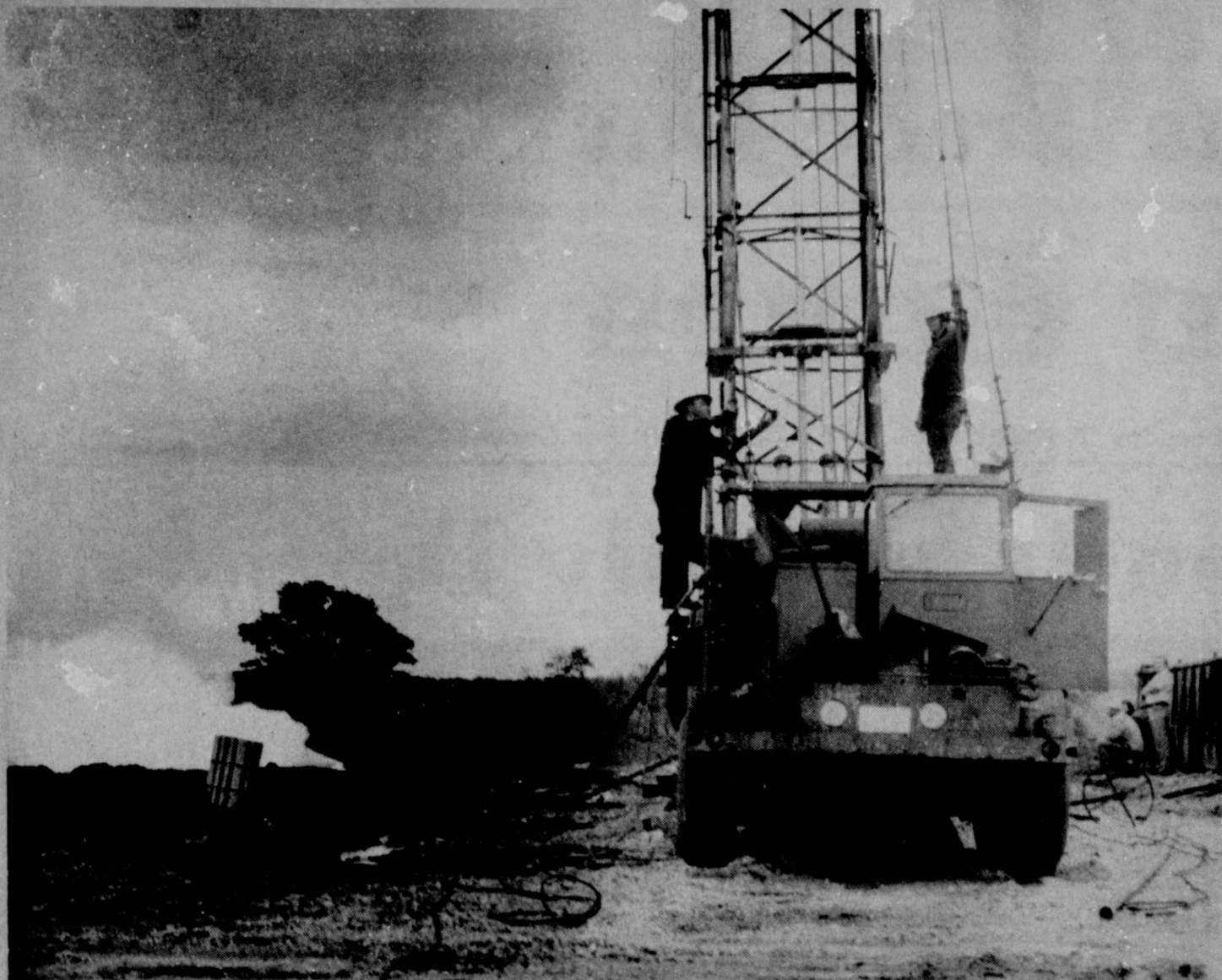

Newspapers Subscription Prices Raised

Due to an increase in second class mailing rates, the subscription prices of the Deport, Bogata and Talco newspapers have been increased effective November 6, 1975.

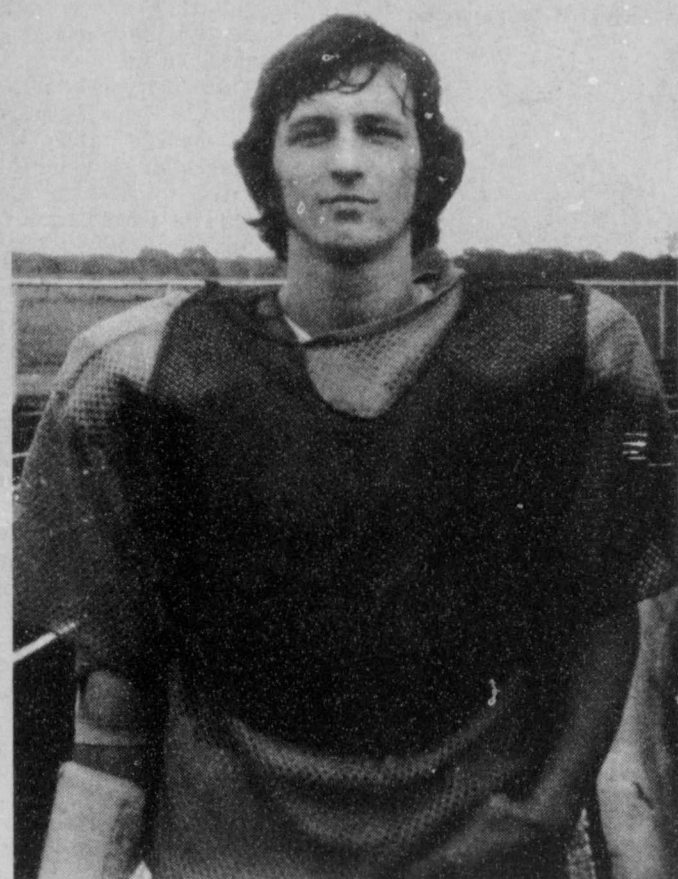

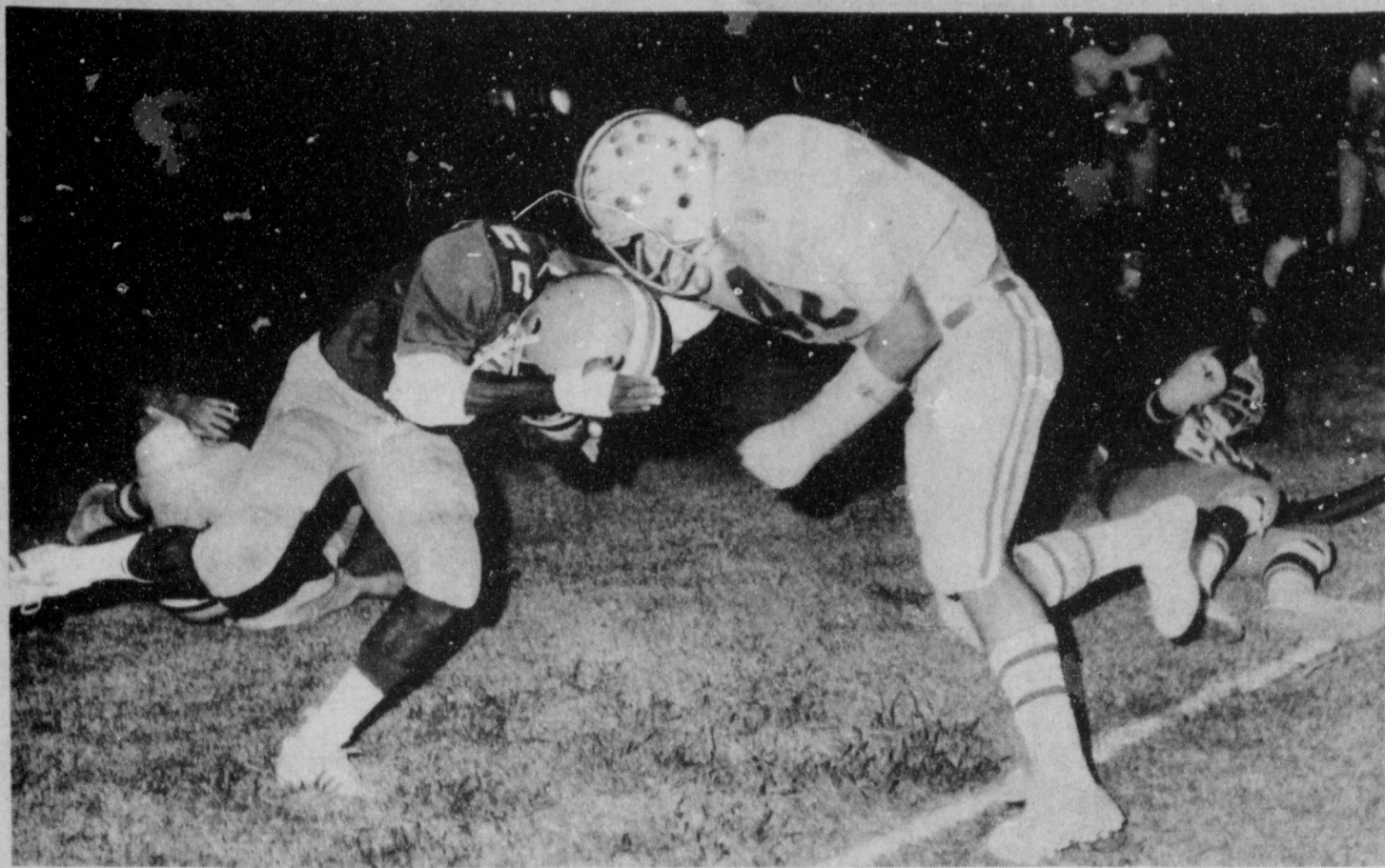

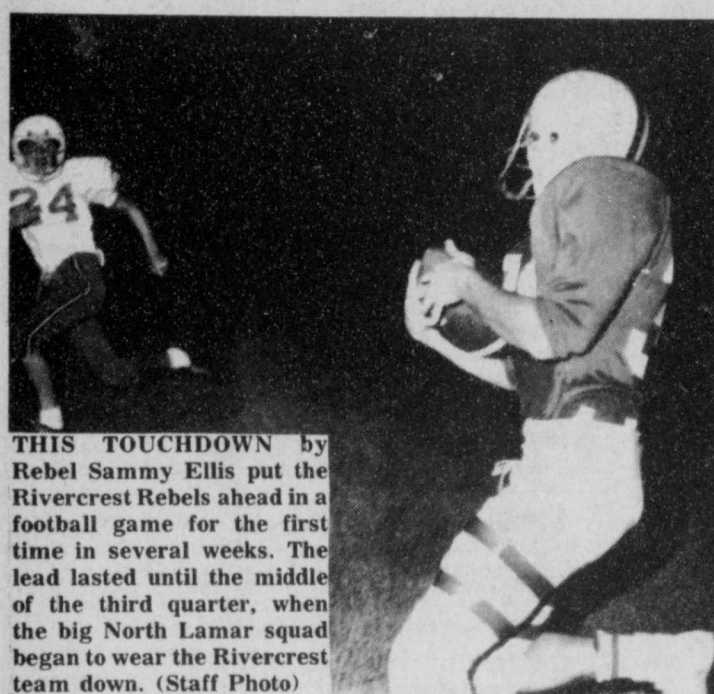


GAINER — Sammy Ellis was one of the leading

Statewide Hunting Outlook Is Good

TYLER — Hunters can stand a little good news after the poor mourning dove season.

And the good news, even qualified by "ifs and buts," is that most coming hunting seasons look good. A statewide poll of Parks and Wildlife Department biologists, technicians and game wardens for outlooks on deer, quail, turkey, waterfowl and other game species is an optimistic one.

According to these reports, East Texas has a record squirrel population, deer hunting is expected to be as good or better than last year, quail season is expected to be good although there are a lot of young birds due to a late hatch and a significant increase in the number of ducks and geese is expected this year.

The seasons and bag limits for Titus County are:

Deer, archery season is October 1 through October 15; regular season is November 15 through November 30 with a limit of 1 buck. All dogs are prohibited.

Squirrel, season is October 1 through December 31 and May 1 through May 31 with a 10 per day bag limit and possession limit of 20.

Striped Bass Book Released By Denison Writer

Many fishermen look to the Santee-Cooper Reservoir in South Carolina as the first freshwater home of the striped bass. Actually, the striped story began in 1879 in the Navesink River of New Jersey.

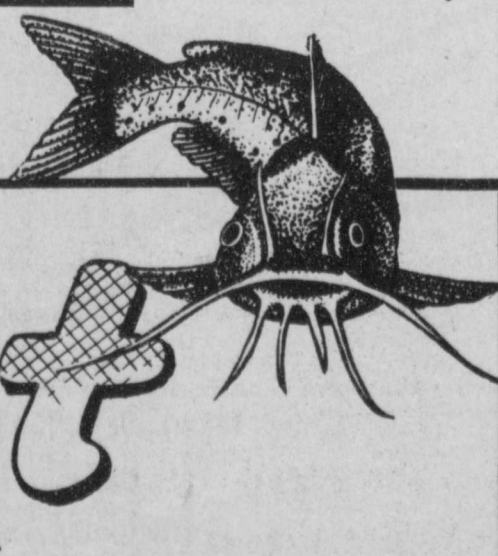

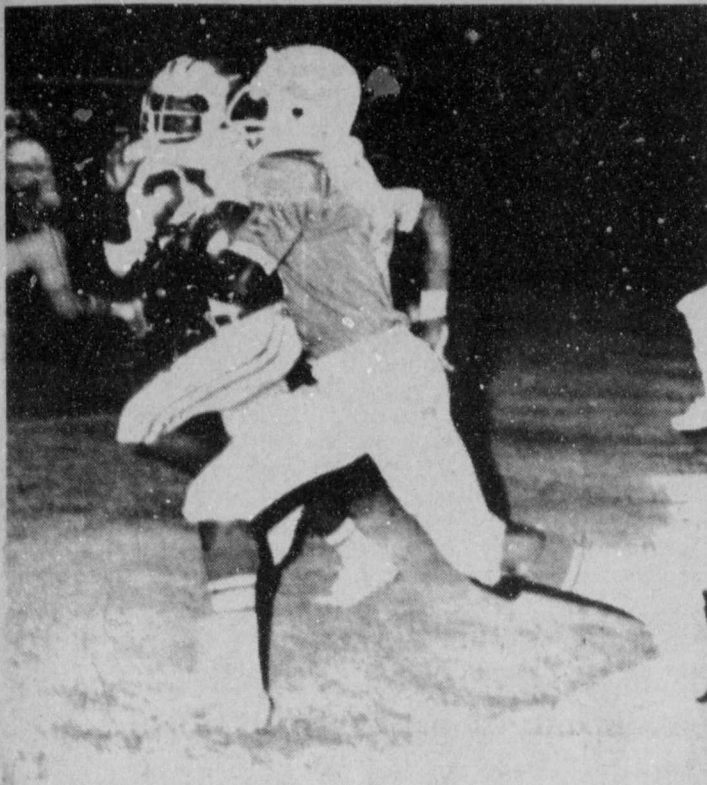

At the same time, any receiver off hook uses equipment in the central office that cannot be used to serve other customers. We can add equipment to take care of the additional need created by this misuse, but that means more money and, consequently, higher telephone rates for all customers.

Mrs. Reed said to keep service levels high and to keep telephone service rates at the lowest possible level, it is company policy to temporarily disconnect lines that are unnecessarily tying up equipment that other customers could be using if a receiver was not left off hook. (Failure to get dial tone can be caused by others leaving receivers off the hook.) When a receiver has been off hook for a prolonged time, our equipment flashes an alarm. After testing to determine that an off-hook situation does exist, the line is disconnected.

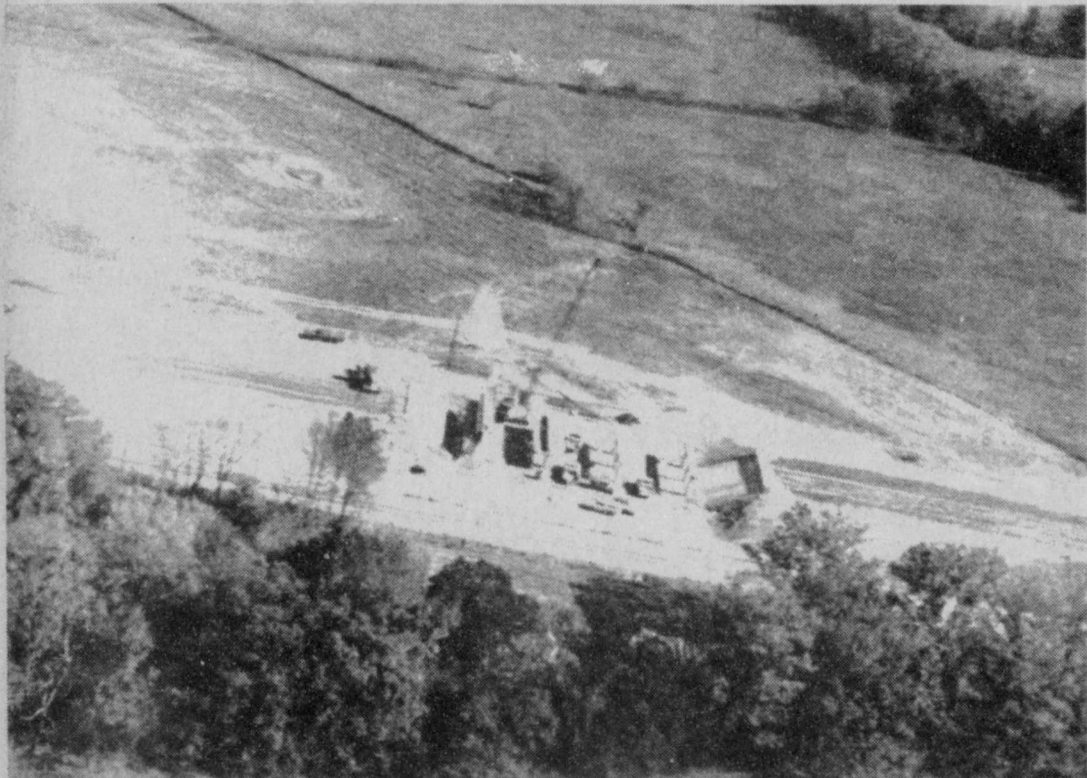
If there are periods when you do not want the ringing of a telephone to interrupt you, call our business office so we can work with you in providing a service tailored to your needs. Services available for a very small monthly charge and initial installation charges include flashing lights instead of a bell, bell cut-off switch and telephone jacks so a phone can be unplugged.

These services do not allow you to get those missed calls but do keep your phone from ringing while also keeping equipment free for use by other customers, stated Mrs. Reed.

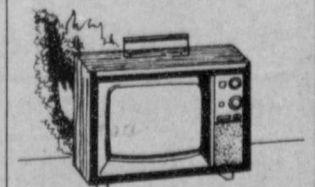

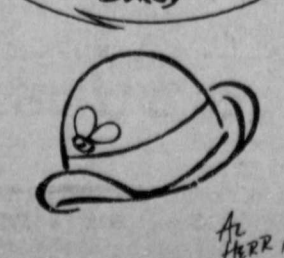

Shocked Beaver Attacks Crew

TYLER — There's nothing more shocking than an angry, electrified beaver attempting to board your boat at night, say Parks and Wildlife Department fishery-crew members Royce Dewey, Moody Meixner and Larry Smith.

Dewey, Meixner and Smith, all from Tyler, were collecting fish at night recently on Cedar Creek Lake by electro-fishing, a method that produces an electrical charge in the water ahead of the boat, when an unseen beaver inadvertently entered the electrical field.

In an obvious attempt to extract itself from the discomfort of the electrical shock, the beaver attempted to board the boat.

"At first, I didn't know what was happening," said Smith, who was navigating the boat. "Royce and Moody began jumping and dancing around the front of the boat and I thought they were being shocked."

"Then they began yelling 'Snapping turtle. Seal. Flathead,' and I knew they were trying to get away from something."

The electrical charge was turned off and Dewey and Meixner successfully rejected the intruder. Falling back into the water, the beaver swam off into the darkness.

Upon inspection, Dewey discovered a hole bitten in one of his rubber boots — and his sock — but no injury.

"The whole episode was startling," said Dewey. "All we could see was something black coming out of the water and trying to get in the boat. I know it's silly, but the first thing I thought of was a seal — and

there aren't any seals around here. "We really didn't recognize the animal as a beaver until it fell back into the water and started swimming away." Experiences like this are rare. In fact, this fishery crew says this was the first time any animal ever tried to board their boat to get out of the electrical field.

Nevertheless, it did happen and Dewey wonders how he is going to justify his request for a new pair of boots.

Highway Department Lays Off 70

R. S. Thornburrow, District Engineer for District One of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, has announced that there will be a reduction of personnel in that department. Approximately 70 employees will be laid off in the nine-county district which includes Delta, Fannin, Franklin, Grayson, Hopkins, Hunt, Lamar, Rains and Red River Counties.

This reduction in work force is necessary because of the reduced funds available to the department. Funding for planning is down approximately 30 percent from last year, maintenance funds are approximately 8 percent lower, and the outlook for new construction in the next several months is rather dim at this time, Thornburrow said.

Thornburrow also stated that the employees that are being laid off are of the highest caliber.

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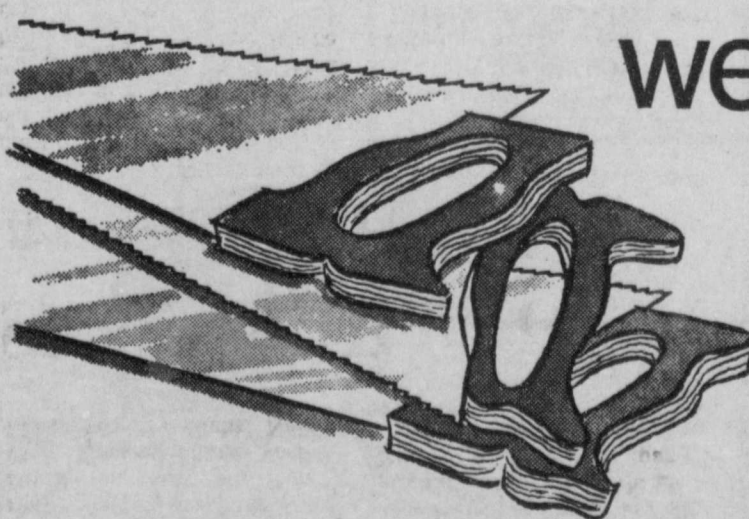
