The program will begin with a covered dish dinner and fellowship time.

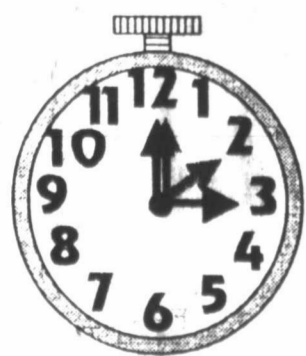

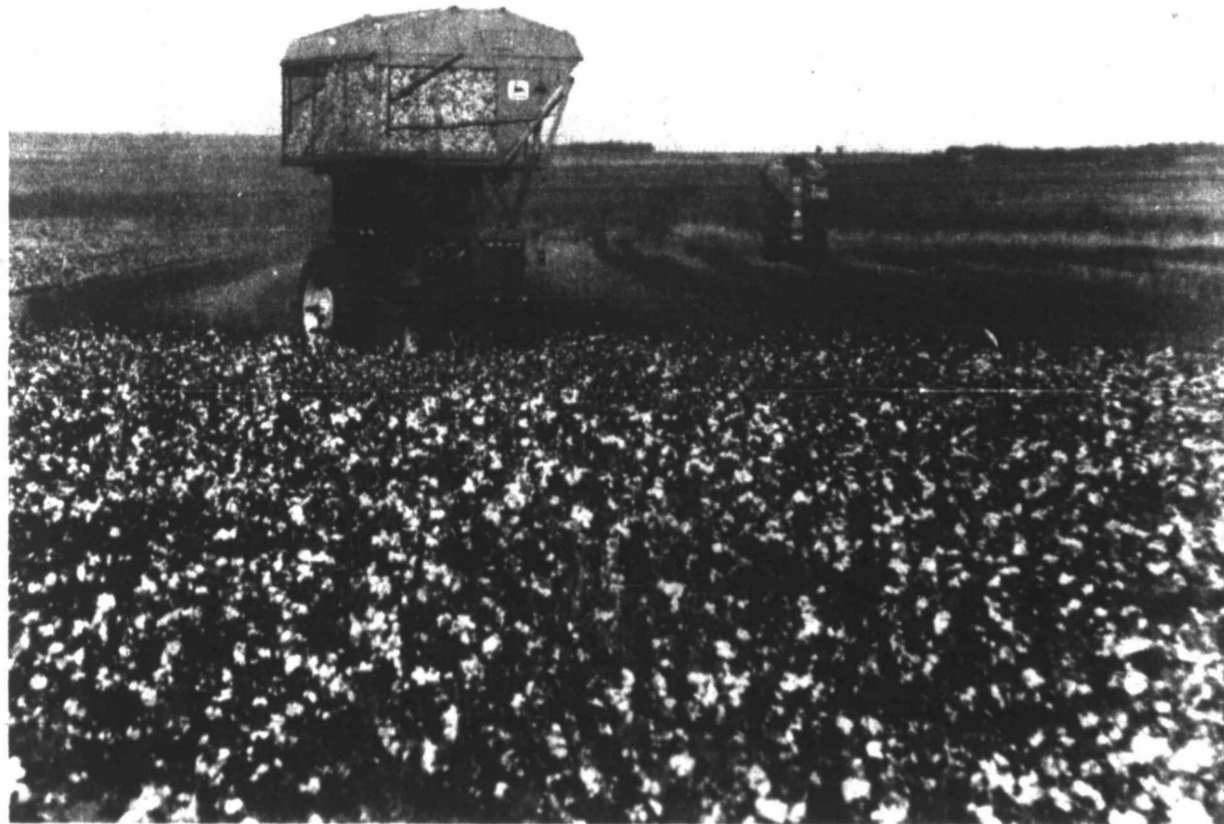

Cotton harvest to begin soon

Bale to acre predicted



HARVEST TIME - A few cotton strippers could be seen in fields north of Loraine this past week. Farmers are gearing up for the harvest which could be best in a number of years. It's estimated that there will be an average of a bale per acre on the 50,000 acres of cotton planted in the county.

Cotton fields in Mitchell County are beginning to turn white as farmers prepare to harvest the 1990 cotton crop.

There are about 50,000 row acres of cotton planted this year, and Mitchell County Extension Agent Bryan Limmer estimates that there will be, on the average, a bale of cotton produced to the acre.

"We're still predicting about a bale to the acre, almost double what we got last year," said Limmer.

Last year, there were 45,000 acres planted, but that only 21,000-22,000 bales were ginned.

Limmer said that some farmers north of Loraine have already started stripping and that the rest of the county's farmers will probably start in the next couple of weeks.

He said that for right now, it would be better if the area did not

have another frost for a while and that rain would stay away.

"We don't need any more rain - that would slow things down a little bit," he said.

"The first frost did harm some of the cotton," he said. "The frost came a little too soon."

"We need two more weeks without a frost to allow time for some bolls on the top of the plants to mature," he said. "Two more weeks are needed to get the full potential out of the plant."

He said that as far as quality is concerned, he said that the cotton could range from high to low. He said the extreme hot weather experienced early in the summer could have some adverse affect on cotton quality.

Limmer said that cotton prices are holding steady, ranging from 70-75 cents a pound.

County jobless rate climbs

Mitchell County's jobless rate climbed to 7.5 percent in September, according to the Texas Employment Commission.

August's rate was 7.4 percent compared to 7.2 percent in July, 6.6 percent in June, 6.3 percent in May, 6.6 percent in April, 6.9 percent in March, 7.9 percent in February and 7.4 percent in January.

In September, there was a labor force of 3,761 of which 3,480 were employed and 281 unemployed.

The local rate compares to a statewide unemployment rate of 6.2 percent.

Area counties and their August unemployment rates include 3.5 percent; Howard, 5.3 percent; Nolan, 7.2 percent; Scurry, 4.2 percent; and Sterling, 1.2 percent.

The metropolitan area with the lowest jobless rate was Bryan-College Station with 3.5 percent and the highest was McAllen-Edinburg-Mission with 16.9 percent.

309 cast absentee ballots

As of Friday afternoon, 288 Mitchell County voters had cast absentee ballots in person for the Nov. 6 general election and another 21 had sent their ballots in by mail, according to the county clerk's

office.

Environmental groups join forces

AUSTIN - "Texans across the state are joining forces at the grassroots level to stop the fouling of our air and water by the burning of hazardous wastes," said Peggy Maddox of Colorado City, a teacher, rancher and co-founder of Texans Against Pollution, a citizens group formed in response to a proposed hazardous waste incinerator site in Mitchell County.

Maddox spoke Thursday at a state capitol news conference where representatives from citizens'

groups opposing hazardous waste facilities and from statewide farm, consumer and environmental groups announced legislative initiatives for the upcoming legislative session to toughen state hazardous waste regulations.

"Rural and urban, farmer and worker, Republican and Democrat - Texans are standing up to these outfits. We've looked behind their innocent-sounding names, like All American Environmental Corporation and National Waste and

Energy Development Corporation and found imposters. City councils in New Braunfels and La Porte have found their so-called 'economic development' plans are actually rip-off schemes of economic and environmental destruction," Maddox said.

"Grassroots environmental groups across the state are calling for a people's agenda for general environmental reform and hazardous

waste reduction. We have asked Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower and the Texas Department of Agriculture to join us in our efforts to push for a people's agenda for dealing with hazardous wastes in Texas," Maddox said.

"Instead of leading the nation in hazardous waste pollution, Texas should be leading the way out of our hazardous waste disposal problems by adopting tough state regulations that protect people rather than polluters," Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower said.

"The Texas Department of Agriculture stands ready to assist in any way we can with efforts to reduce hazardous waste disposal in our state. We'll support efforts to get all of our state's regulatory agencies out of the pockets of the polluters and on the side of the people," said Hightower.

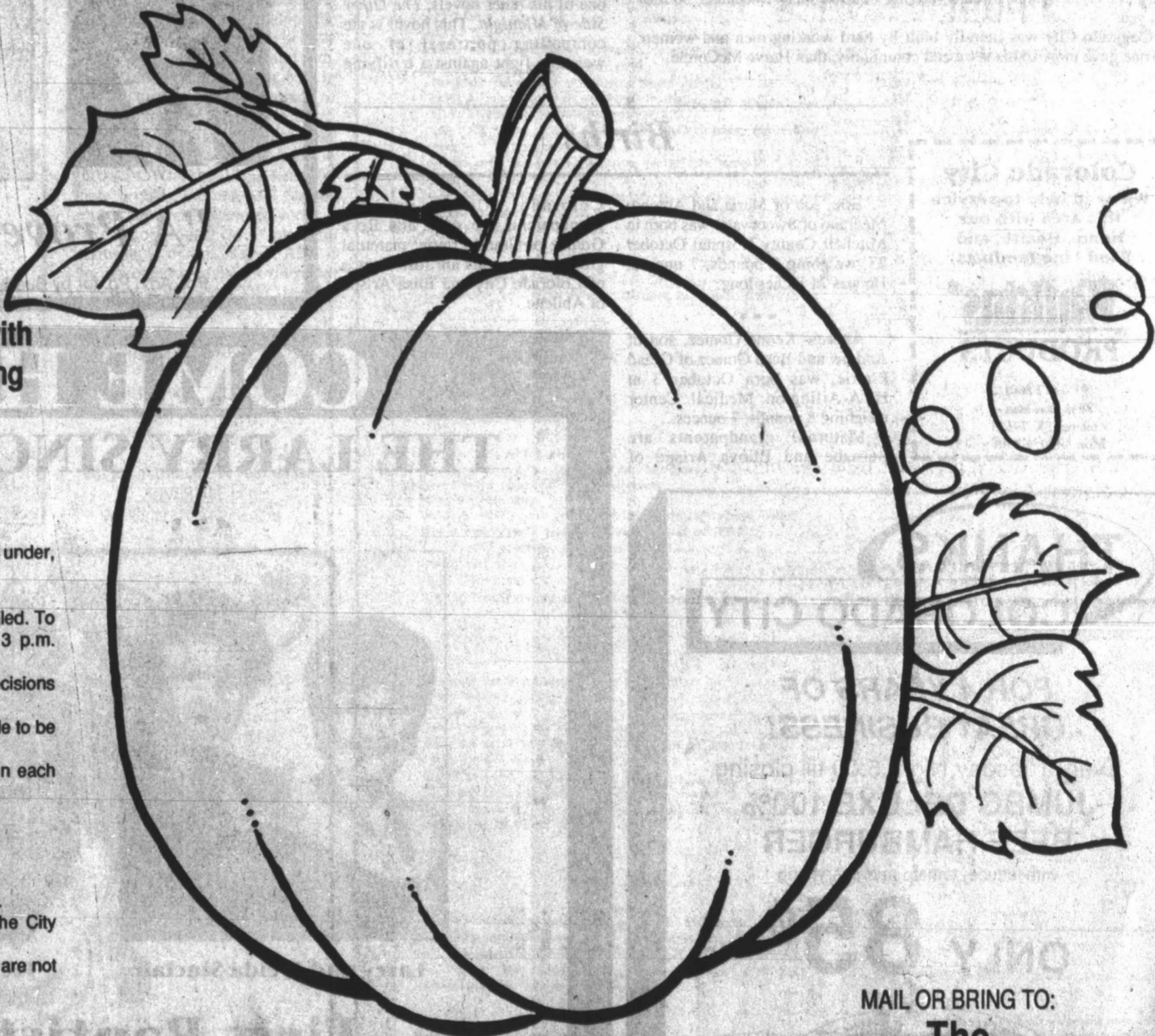

CHIEF LONE WOLF

Who was HARLAND FREEMAN McCORCLE? For openers, he was one of the hardest working men ever to grace the streets of Colorado City. He was born in a half dugout on the southside of town (February 13, 1884) on what is now the Hank Bryant property, near the softball field.

"Harve," as his many friends called him, grew up to be a strapping young man, over 6 feet tall, and admittedly, his Irish temper would flash on occasion.

In 1909 he married the girl of his dreams, Lydia Harbey, who was also a native of Mitchell County. Before long, the happy couple started their family. To support them, Harve held a number of jobs. As a young man he could point with pride to having worked for the public weigher, plus as a driver of a horse drawn hearse (for a funeral home owned by Jim Green), and also as a driver who delivered goods from the T&P railroad, with a horse drawn vehicle. In 1917 he found work in Ranger, Texas, during the oil boom. Again he drove a wagon, this time for O. O. Shurtleff. No doubt he hated to leave his wife and children, but Harve needed a job, so he did what he figured a man should do. He went where work was available.

Eventually McCorcle was able to return to Colorado, Texas, and by the early 1920's was working for the city. He helped build a frame house in 1923, which was constructed by the city at the east water works.

By 1925 Harve was working full time for the water department and the city provided him with a telephone at his residence, just in case he was needed in an emergency. (The 'phone was for the cities' benefits, but Harve paid the bill, until the city fathers discovered the oversight and reimbursed him \$33.65).

The following year (August 1926), Harve was denied a vacation, along with another water department employee, "owing to the amount of work to be done," according to the city council minutes. But, the city did agree to pay Harve and his colleague \$60 each, in lieu of a vacation.

In 1927 the Colorado City native was given a pay raise, which brought his earnings to \$110 per month. And those were pretty fair wages for that day. Police Chief Dick Hickman, who also doubled as Fire Marshall, was only earning \$150 per month. Actually, Harve was earning more than the two man police department of T. A. Hickman (\$100 per month) and Homer Key (\$90).

When vacation time rolled around in 1929, Harve heard a familiar refrain from the city council; "owning to the amount of work to be done, etc." So, instead of a vacation, he was paid his regular wages for ten days. \$36.65!!

By 1931 the man who Junior Sadler would later call "a one man water department," was earning \$125 per month. However, tough times set in later in the decade and by 1939, Harve's salary was cut back to \$100 per month. During these years he gave his free time to the Colorado Volunteer Fire Department. He would retire as a fireman with 30 years of service.

Harve continued his labors of the city into the 1940's and then, in late 1946, he suffered a stroke. Although the 62 year old McCorcle survived, his doctor advised him to cut back on his strenuous duties.

The city graciously transferred their dedicated employee to another department. As the year 1946 was about to end, Harve wrote a note to the city council;

"Gentlemen,
I want to take this means of expressing my appreciation to you and to each member of the city council for being kind to me in my time of illness.

I appreciate your providing me with a home to live in and with the job of caretaker at the cemetery and with a truck to do my work.

Also, I want to take this opportunity of telling you that I have enjoyed my many years of service with the water department of the city.

With sincere regards,
H. F. McCorcle"

On April 17, 1947, the indefatigable Irishman got the rest he so richly deserved. He left behind his wife, four sons and seven daughters, including Margaret Oyler who will celebrate her 80th birthday December 30th of this year.

Colorado City was literally built by hard working men and women. No one gave more to his town and community, than Harve McCorcle.

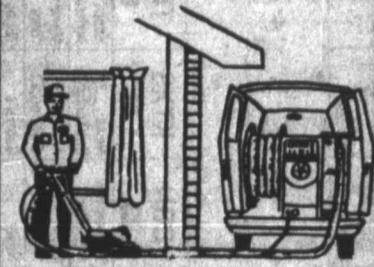

Ban sought

TO THE EDITOR: Enclosed you will find two letters. One was sent to State Sen. Steve Carraker and one was sent to U.S. Senator Gramm and Senator Bentsen.

Dear Senator:

Our state and nation is facing a serious threat to its natural resources, agriculture and the personal health of our families.

My concern is based on the fact that a company based out of Pittsburgh, Pa., under the name of National Waste and Energy Development, plans to construct one or more toxic waste incinerators and hazardous waste landfills

in Western Mitchell County, Texas.

What type of tomorrow will our children face when our air, land, and especially our only source of water is contaminated? The same water source that provides water to many thousands of our fellow Texans, the Colorado River. Will the same lakes that we have fished in, swam in and skied on be off limits to our children because they have been contaminated with DDT, arsenic, lead, mercury, chromium, dioxins and many other toxins? I hope not.

As my representative, I would like you to consider legislation banning further construction of hazardous waste landfills and

incinerators.

In a recent public meeting, representatives of the Texas Water Commission laughed in the faces of the people of Mitchell County when a petition with over 2,000 signatures opposing the landfill and incinerator was presented to them. They said it was up to them and not the residents of Mitchell County as to whether or not a toxic waste landfill and incinerator was placed here or not. It seems as though the TWC wants to play Russian Roulette with a loaded gun pointed to our heads. We can just look at their track record in these matters, such as the hazardous waste injection well in Fisher County and the hazardous waste incinerator in LaPorte. They will always side on the side of big money. Why do they even have the public hearings if they're going to do what they want anyway? No one who is not elected and in turn answers to no one should have this kind of power over the lives of their fellow Texans. We are also asking the governor and the state legislature to restructure the TWC from an appointed post to an elected one.

Our county commissioners and county judge have also sided with big money and have abandoned the people of this county. I believe they plan to get theirs and run, leaving us holding the toxic bag. In the upcoming election, many of these will pay for their misdeeds.

So I ask, please use your power and influence to stop a disaster in its tracks. Why should our beautiful state become the cesspool for the rest of the world? Enclosed you will find documentation on the seriousness of this matter. Also if we can obtain a copy of a video that was shot at the recent TWC hearing held in Colorado City.

Any help you can give us will be greatly appreciated.

The league also has lengthened the season by one week, giving every team a week off, or a "bye," somewhere in its schedule.

My feeling is that we will see nothing but positive results from adding another wild-card team to the playoffs. I certainly don't think it will ruin the playoffs, as some have charged. Teams that have come on strong in the second half of the season after some early losses will now have a better chance of getting in on the post-season action. It will provide incentive for teams to keep playing hard for the entire season. Considering the number of teams that have just missed making the playoffs in recent years and the parity the NFL is shooting for, it looks like a smart move.

I do have mixed feelings about adding a bye to NFL schedules. On the positive side, I'm sure that the bye will benefit injury-plagued teams by giving players a chance to heal and get ready for the rest of the season. On the other hand, teams that are hot and suddenly have to take a week off from competition could be hurt by the bye.

There is one complaint I've heard against extending the season a week that gets no sympathy from me, and that's cold weather. Some people contend that football now should be played only when it's warm or in a domed stadium. I'm sorry, but I'm from the old school, and I remember some of the real classic games played in subzero temperatures. Cold weather is part of the game, something you train and condition for. In the last week of this regular season when Cleveland travels to Cincinnati and Green Bay goes to Denver to square off on frozen fields, people will see football the way it was meant to be played. Thank goodness that hasn't changed about the game.

Which brings us to the real reason the league added the extra playoff game and extended the season: television. Television has brought many changes to the NFL, and some concessions have to be made. Because football is a very expensive sport, especially with escalating salaries, television money is a necessity. I really have nothing against the fact that television has come to play such a big role in professional football.

My one hope is that football never goes the way of professional basketball and ice hockey, where practically every team makes the playoffs and the regular season almost doesn't matter. As the NFL moves toward expansion, it must devise a way to keep the number of playoff teams under control. lol

Feral hog to be target of hunters

OVERTON - When the Texas deer season begins for rifle hunters next month, more of them will be looking for first-time encounters with another game animal, the feral (wild) hog.

"Feral hog numbers have increased tremendously throughout most of Texas during the past few years," said Billy Higginbotham, wildlife and fisheries specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"The numbers are high enough that some landowners are using the hogs as a bargaining point in hunting leases," he said. "Hunters should be able to combine feral hog hunts with their traditional deer hunts in most hog-inhabited areas, where both seasonal leases and day hunts are available."

He said many experienced hunters find a hog hunt challenging because the hogs are smarter and more elusive than deer.

Hogs are basically a wet habitat animal, although they have adapted well to drier climates of south and south-central Texas.

"In wet years, they move out of bottomland and bogs into the uplands," said Higginbotham. "However, under heavy hunting pressure, they move deeper into remote areas and become nocturnal."

There is no regulated hunting season for feral hogs. Hunters should, however, inform their local game warden if they plan to hunt at night or use methods that may be mistaken for deer or other regulated hunting.

"Specialty organizations such as bow hunters, black powder hunters and pistol groups are interested in hog hunting," said Dr. Dale Rollins, wildlife specialist for the Extension Service at San

Angelo. "This has created a ready market for hogs in some areas and will probably become more common."

"We have thousands of feral hogs on this ranch," said Walter Carter, manager of Broseco Ranch in Northeast Texas. "Our operation is beef cattle, and we would love to completely rid the ranch of hogs."

The ranch includes part of the Sulphur River bottoms which provide ideal habitat for the hogs. Hogs have been a part of commercial hunts for years there.

"We have several hundred feral hog hunters each year," Carter said. "Bow hunters are particularly interested in hog hunts following deer season. This gives them several more months of hunting."

Johnnie Hudman, manager of the Nail Ranch in Shackelford County, said the ranch has sold hog hunts for about four years.

"We have a very heavy population," he said. "Our guided hunts have almost 100 percent hunter success."

Randall Ivy in Nacogdoches County began selling hog hunts this year. His approach is a little different.

Harry Wood has conducted hunts in Leon County for the past two years. His primary business is guided bear and deer hunts in New Mexico, but he says the hog hunts are growing.

"We have a good population in Leon County," he said. "The Trinity River flood this year pushed the hogs out onto the upland and they are more accessible."

Higginbotham says hog is excellent to eat and easy to prepare.
