## Pioneer Celebration to Draw Large Crowd

### LAMB COUNTY LEADER IS SOLD TO OKLAHOMA MAN

**Sam L. Williams, Enid, Buys Newspaper From Morley B. Drake, Publisher**

The sale of the Lamb County Leader to Sam L. Williams, Enid, Oklahoma, was announced this week by Mr. and Mrs. Morley B. Drake, long-time owners and publishers of the newspaper.

Until earlier this month, Williams was co-publisher and general manager of the Enid Events, one of Oklahoma's largest weekly newspapers. Ten days ago he sold his stock in the firm and resigned his managerial position in order to purchase the Lamb County Leader.

"We will continue to make our home in Littlefield," Mr. Drake said today in discussing his plans for the future. "Our plans are rather indefinite but we will devote most of our time to our real estate holdings here and at San Antonio."

The Drakes came to Littlefield 23 years ago and began publishing the Leader on July 25, 1930. Prior to that time Mr. Drake had worked for leading newspapers in the United States and Canada, including the Minneapolis Tribune and the San Antonio Express.

"I first heard the presses roar when I was 12 years old and had a newspaper route. I have been in the newspaper business ever since, working in every phase at some time or other," the former Leader publisher commented.

Williams began his newspaper career with the Latimer County News-Democrat, Wilburton, Okla., in 1937. While working in Wilburton, he married Betty Poe of that city. After his discharge from the service in 1945, Williams purchased the Konawa (Okla.) Leader. As publisher of the Konawa Leader, he was named "Editor of the Week" by the Publishers Auxiliary, a national trade journal.

In 1950 Williams purchased an interest in the Enid property. Last year the Enid Events was named the best weekly newspaper in the state by the Oklahoma Press Association.

The Williams have three daughters, Karen, who will be a high school junior this fall; Margo, age 11, and ten-year-old Paula. The family, who will reside at 508 East 13th, are members of the Presbyterian church. Williams is a Mason and Shriner. Mrs. Williams, who will be associated with him in the business, was a member of Enid's Junior Welfare League and the Altura Club. She is an honorary member of the Okla. Sigma Phi, women's journalism fraternity, and Gamma Alpha Chi, women's advertising fraternity.

Cpl. Milburn Hines Starnes, 27, son of J. C. Starnes of Littlefield, was included in the Korean POW prisoner exchange at Panmunjom Monday, as being released from Camp No. 1.

His name was announced over television at 10 o'clock Monday night and over KVOO, the local radio station, Tuesday morning.

Military Headquarters called Cpl. Starnes' sister, Mrs. A. B. Cockrell at Amarillo Monday night to confirm identity.

Cpl. Starnes is a brother of Jimmy Starnes of this city, who is presently employed by Field Cleaners here.

Cpl. Starnes, who served with Infantry Regiment No. 38, in Korea, enlisted about October of 1950. He was taken prisoner May 18, 1951, and spent exactly 27 months as a prisoner.

Noon speaker will be W. L. Stangel, Dean of School of Agriculture, Texas Tech College.

Included in the projects to be demonstrated will be concrete pipe, irrigation, bench leveling, cotton following permanent pasture, cotton following alfalfa, commercial fertilizer on cotton and grain sorghums, soil building crops, peas planted in grain sorghums and livestock farming.

Ordination services will be held at 3:30 p. m. Sunday for John T. Street at the First Baptist Church, Littlefield.

He attended Wayland College, Plainview, and is a graduate of Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene. He attended Southwestern Seminary, Fort Worth, for one semester and will re-enroll there this fall.

During the summer months the young ministerial student has served as pastor of the First Baptist Church, Bull Head, Ariz. Last summer he worked with a Methodist orphanage in Alaska.

Mr. Street has been invited to serve as supply pastor at the Presbyterian church here Sunday morning.

The ordination sermon will be delivered by Rev. Roy Shaban, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Post, a former pastor of the Littlefield First Baptist Church.

Dr. Lee Hemphill will lead the examination of the candidate. Rev. Strauss Atkinson, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Canyon, will give the charge to the church and to the minister. Directing the music for the ordination service will be Mr. Ernest Hock. Rev. D. C. Lindley will direct the ordination choir.

### Homes To Be Opened To Out-Of-Town Visitors; Barbecue and Dance Planned

Over 350 Lamb County pioneers and their families are expected to attend the fifth annual "Old Settlers" reunion to be held here Tuesday, August 25th, in the Community Center building in Littlefield park.

According to officials of the group, this year's celebration will be the largest of any since the activation of the Pioneer Club five years ago. Bob Smith, president of the organization, is in charge of arrangements.

"Everything is all set to make this is the biggest celebration we have ever had," one of the officials said Tuesday.

### Membership Expanding

Any person who lived in Lamb county prior to 1926 is eligible to become a member and take part in annual meetings. Dues are one dollar a year. According to the by-laws of the organization, the eligibility date is moved forward one year every five years in order to keep an expanding membership. The date was advanced this year from 1925 to 1926.

"When we organized five years ago, we expected to have some 35 members but instead ended up with 99," Gus Shaw, the club's first president recalled this week. "The membership now stands at 250 and another 100 members are expected to be added by Tuesday," Mr. Shaw added.

### Homes To Be Opened

Over 500 cards have been mailed out to members and former Lamb County residents in a concerted effort to notify everyone who is eligible to belong. Old timers from as far away as San Angelo, Fort Worth and Dallas have notified the committee they are planning to attend.

"If there is a member in the family, whether it is husband or wife, the entire family is eligible to attend," an official explained.

"However, dues of \$1.00 will be collected from the parents and the kiddies will be admitted free," he explained. The playground in the park will be available for all children.

Homes of the local members will be thrown open to out-of-town members who live too great a distance to return home that day. It was announced this week.

Much of the success of this year's meeting is being attributed to the work done by Mrs. Guy Willis, secretary of the club for the past two years, who has been in charge of notifying former residents who are eligible to become members.

### Rev. Dunnam to Speak

The day's activities will begin at 2 p. m. with a business meeting which will be climaxed by the election of officers. Rev. "Hap" Dunnam, Hereford, former pastor of the Littlefield church, will be guest speaker. An hour of reminiscing, which has proven to be quite popular with the old timers in the past, will be included in the afternoon's itinerary.

A barbecue dinner will be served between 6:30 and 7 p. m. to all members and their families. Pat Boone, a long-time member, will give a beef again this year, and Eldridge Faust, a charter member who lives in Portales, N. M., will barbecue the meat. Bread will be donated by Mead's Fine Bread of Lubbock.

All members who live in Lamb County are asked to bring a covered dish of potato salad, red beans, pies and cakes. Coffee, tea and soft drinks will be served by the club. The menu for the dinner will be barbecued beef, onions, pickles, beans, potato salad, pie, cake and ice cream.

A square dance in the community building, beginning at 8 p. m., will climax the day's activities. According to Mr. Smith, music will be provided by an old-time string band from Ralls. Various members will do the calling. Admission price is \$1.00 per couple to the dance.

## Booster Caravan To Promote County Fair

Lamb County's sixth annual fair will get more than the usual amount of ballyhooing this year as the result of action taken Monday night by the county fair board.

A booster trip with all the trimmings, including a band, honking horns, loud speakers and handbills will invade each of the neighboring towns in the county on September 15 to extend a last minute invitation to the communities to attend the free-gate fair.

Jesse L. Everett, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, J. B. McShann and Lonnie Cole will be in charge of all arrangements for the publicity trip.

V. M. Peterman, chairman of the board, presided at Monday night's meeting. Final details of this year's three-day fair, which begins September 17, were discussed.

The Rocky Mountain Empire carnival will be the chief entertainment at the fair. This decision was made after much discussion of the previous unsuccessful attempts to make other types of entertainment self-supporting. The contract with the carnival company was signed early this year.

### Art Division Revised

A minor revision in the art division was made in order to bring the prize money offered in that group in line with other divisions.

"The art exhibits add lots of color to the entire show and are mighty important to the success of the fair," Mr. Peterman commented. "However, under the present set-up we are offering more prize money for art exhibits than in three or four of the other divisions."

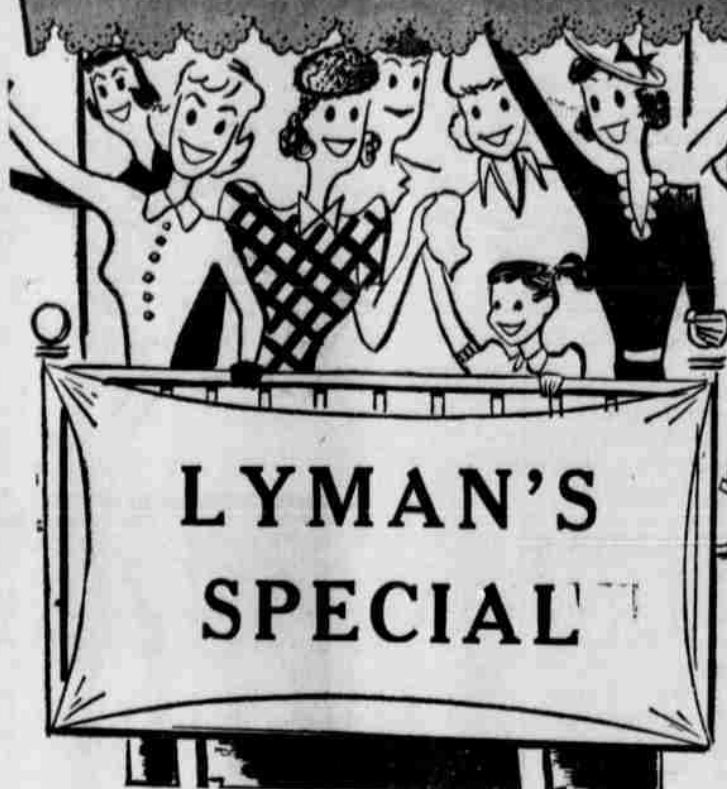

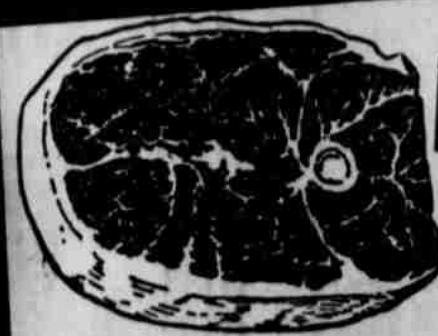

## Eighty Acre Patch of Alfalfa On Shoe String Ranch Cut In 30 Minutes

Did you ever hear of cutting an 80-acre patch of alfalfa in just 30 minutes? That's exactly what happened Wednesday of last week at the Shoe String ranch 7 miles northeast of Muleshoe when a mass demonstration was held using 20 tractor-drawn balers.

The Shoe String ranch is operated by F. L. Shelby and Arthur Kingery, and the 640-acre ranch is one of the biggest privately owned alfalfa farms in the Panhandle. Kingery and Shelby named their acres the Shoe String Ranch because they entered the partner-

ship venture on a shoestring in 1947. Last week's haying operation marked the third cutting of alfalfa on the ranch this season, and a fourth and possibly a fifth one are expected.

They claim they produce more than three thousand tons of hay annually from their first three cuttings. Yields of the final cuttings vary according to the season. During the winter they generally lease the ground and between four and five thousand sheep roam the hay fields for a thirty to ninety day period to graze.

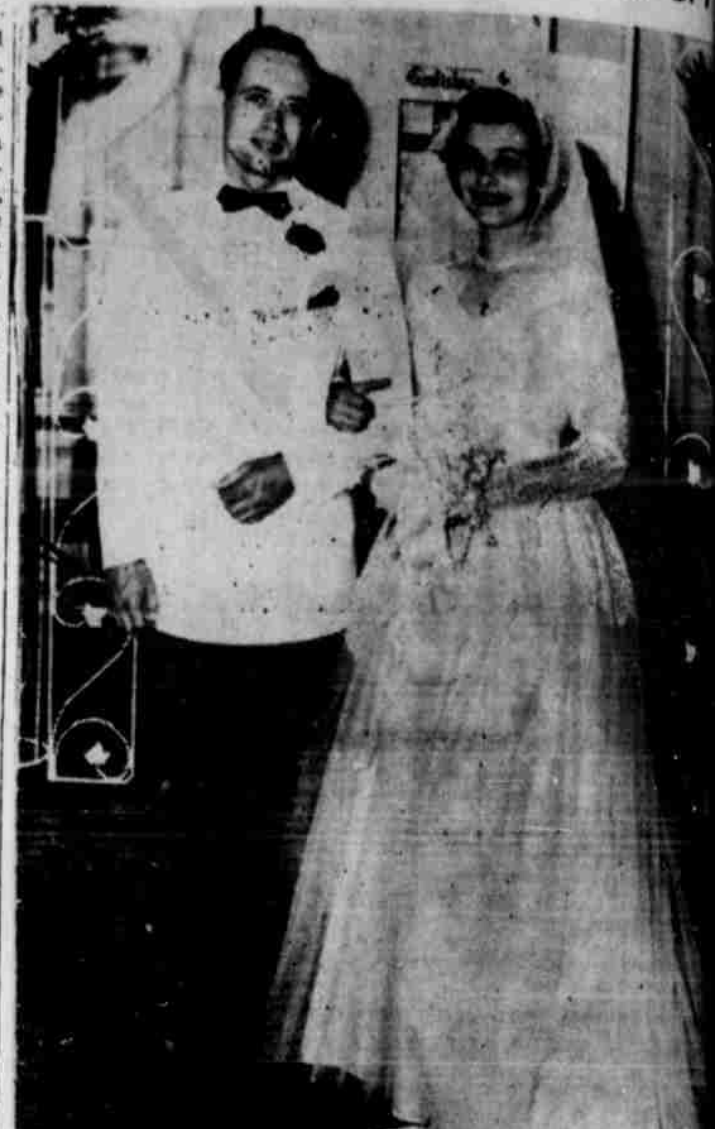

tually become self-supporting through the purchase of farmland to assure their operation after the Marines leave Korea.

"The orphanage opened last year. With the opening of the clinic, the Marine's two-point plan has become a reality. The orphanage is already becoming self-supporting through the ownership of rice and grain lands purchased by the Marines, and the clinic's financial needs will be assured in the same manner.

Staffed by a young Korean pediatrician, Dr. C. W. Kim, and a trained Korean nurse, the clinic

will gradually—as funds become available—expand its activities to include all children in the area. Priority will always be given to homeless youngsters and their care will always be free. Families using the clinic's facilities will pay what they can afford.

F. M. Fuller, Jr., assistant service entomologist from Texas A. and M. College, and top authority on insects, was conducting checks for insects in several South Plains communities last week.

On Tuesday of last week he visit-

ed the Pettit and Pleasant Valley communities, and on Wednesday he was in Bailey County, the YL and the Progress and West Camp communities. On Friday Mr. Fuller inspected fields for infections in Hockley County at Ropesville

and Anton. In Lynn and Garza counties Fuller found several infections of bollworms in numbers to warrant spraying. No infection of insects have been reported in Lamb County.

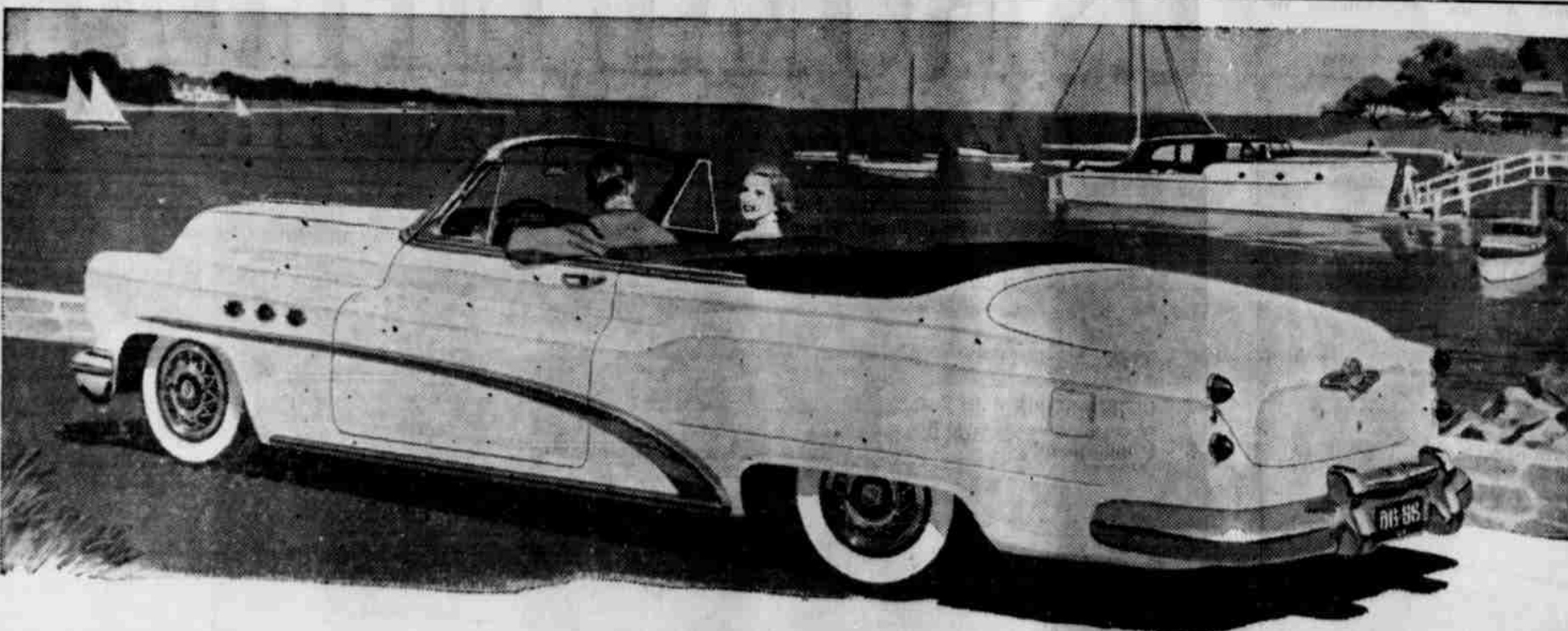

Insect Damage  
Light On The  
South Plains

Insect damage remains light over most of the South Plains, further assuring another bumper cotton harvest, F. M. Fuller, Jr., assistant Extension Service entomologist of College Station, found last week after a 10-day tour of area counties.

Only Lynn and Briscoe counties were found to have "heavy" bollworm infestations while most other points showed almost minimum insects infestations, Fuller reported.

If Lubbock and surrounding counties receive a lot of rain and wet weather in the next few weeks the bollworm will likely become serious, he warned.

The continued light infestation was cited a week ago as a major factor in the expanded estimates of a 1953 crop of 1,212,000 to 1-250,000 bales. Such a crop would rank as the area's fourth all-time harvest despite acreage cuts by continued drought.

ter," Fuller said. "In other parts of the area showed little or no signs of the spider or the mite."

**Leafworm Broods Limited**

Fuller reported an "unusually" light brood of leafworms in the area, but these were not in sufficient number for major damage.

During his investigations conducted with county agents and farmers, Fuller found a good crop of beneficial insects which prey only on undesirable pests and cause no crop damage. Plentiful beneficial insects included flower bug, lace wing fly larvae and hooded beetle.

Fuller explained the life habits of the major harmful insects on the South Plains. The leafworm moth, which winters in Central and South America, migrates into this part of the country every year and there is no method of prevention of the migratory insect, he said.

The bollworm and red spider are local insects that spend the cold months in the soil and revive in the spring and summer when cotton is the major crop. Red spider prefers hot, dry weather and will be killed to a certain extent by a hard beating rain, Fuller said.

**Checking Method Given**

Fuller's method of checking for insects is one devised by the Extension Service. It consists of making several stops in one field. At each stop he checks about 25 plants. If, for each 100 plants, he finds as many as four or five bollworms, he recommends that the farmer start spraying or dusting.

If there is a distinct raggedness of the leaves of the plant he recommends treatment for leafworm. If the leaves have a rusty yellow color and the spiders can be seen on the underside of the leaves, Fuller recommends red spider treatment.

There are several safe treatments for each of the insects, Fuller said. Recommended treatment for red spider area is: Dust 25 pounds of per acre; 1 per cent parathion to 15 pounds per acre are

# Quickies for Labor-Less Day

Here's our annual contribution to Labor Day: recipes that will make the holiday Labor-Less Day for Mother. This year we have three really good tasting canned meat quickies to help Mom's kitchen liberation along.

First dish is for lovers of Southwestern cookery. Heat a one-pound can of chili con carne (with beans) and a one-pound can of tamales with chile gravy separately, according to the directions on the cans. Now stir the chile gravy into the chili con carne and turn into a serving dish. Top with the hot tamales and a quarter to a half-cup of grated cheddar cheese. This will make three generous helpings—so just multiply the quantities to suit the number of folks you're serving.

Have ready a bowl of hot cooked rice and another of shredded iceberg lettuce mixed with a sweet onion cut into thin strips or rings—use a red onion if you can get it. Serve each portion of chili and tamales over rice and top with a generous helping of the lettuce and onion. This way of serving is our own idea, and one always applauded. It may seem strange to you, but just try it! We borrowed the idea from the way Mexican tostados are traditionally topped with shredded lettuce. (A tostado, like the tamale, is a tortilla—but a tortilla that is fried crisp in deep fat and left flat to hold its shape and lettuce topping.)

A first course for this menu might be another Southwestern favorite—Guacamole. This is a ripe avocado mashed fine and enlivened with olive oil, lemon juice, grated onion, and if you like, diced tomatoes. Serve it as a spread for crackers. For dessert you might have fruit or fruit sherbet, with cookies or small cakes.

Our second suggestion calls for a 12-ounce tin of luncheon meat, providing six generous slices. But this is a luncheon meat dish with a difference—it's served with pan-fried shredded cabbage and a wonderful mustard and pickle relish sauce.

Our third easy dish is sure to be popular—corned beef hash patties broiled with fresh tomato halves and onion rings. The seasonings on the vegetables give delicious flavor to the good taste of the savory beef and potatoes.

## LUNCHEON MEAT SKILLET DINNER

Ingredients: 2 quarts shredded cabbage (1 large head), 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-2 cup water, 2 table spoons butter or margarine, one 12-ounce can luncheon meat, Relish Sauce.

Method: Put cabbage in large skillet; add salt to water and pour over cabbage. Dot with butter. Cut luncheon meat into 6 slices; place on top of cabbage. Cover with a tight fitting lid. Cook over medium heat 15 minutes. While cabbage is cooking, prepare Relish Sauce.

## RELISH SAUCE

Ingredients: 1 tablespoon butter or margarine, 1 1-2 teaspoons flour, 1 tablespoon prepared mustard, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 1-4 cup water, 2 tablespoons vinegar, 1 tablespoon mayonnaise, 2

tablespoons pickle relish, 1-8 teaspoon tabasco sauce.

Method: Melt butter in saucepan over low heat. Remove from heat; blend in flour, prepared mustard, sugar and salt. Stir in water and vinegar and return to medium heat. Cook, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens and comes to a boil. Remove from heat; stir in mayonnaise, pickle relish and tabasco sauce. Serve hot with luncheon meat and cabbage. Skillet may be used as serving dish. Makes 4 servings.

## CORNED BEEF HASH GRILL

Ingredients: One 1-pound can corned beef hash, 2 medium-size tomatoes, 4 onion slices, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, 1-4 teaspoon sugar, 1-4 teaspoon basil, 2 tablespoons butter or margarine.

Method: Open can of corned beef hash at both ends to remove in one piece. Cut into 4 slices. Halve tomatoes. Place corned beef hash patties on baking sheet, place under broiler; broil until browned on top. Turn patties; top each with a tomato half. Sprinkle with half the salt, pepper, sugar and

## County Agent Eaton Sticks To His Prediction of 145,000 Bales For Lamb

With the cotton crop rounding the turn and heading toward the home stretch, County Agent Eaton sticks to his guns, and still predicts 145,000 bales of cotton for Lamb County this year. That's despite the fact that some 200,000 acres in the south part of the county is either unplanted or sown in grains, blackeye peas and cover crops due to lack of moisture.

The irrigation belt in the north and east part of the county promises one of the finest cotton crops in years, and parts to the north and west of Littlefield that are dry land, but still fortunate to have rains at the proper time, also will produce a good cotton crop. One farmer north of Sudan, who is farming dry land, says prospects are very bright for a bale to the acre on his farm. This is, of course, barring early frost and insects. Parts of the south-west part of the county which, have been planted in feed, after rains several weeks ago, are reported to be needing rain at the present time.

Lamb County's cotton prospects rank third on the South Plains, with the irrigated farms of Hale County, which even surpasses Lubbock with a booming 215,000 bale crop. Lubbock County's forecast this year is 175,000 bales, compared to 244,726 bales raised last year. Hale County's 215,000 bale crop even surpasses last year's 20,000 bale crop.

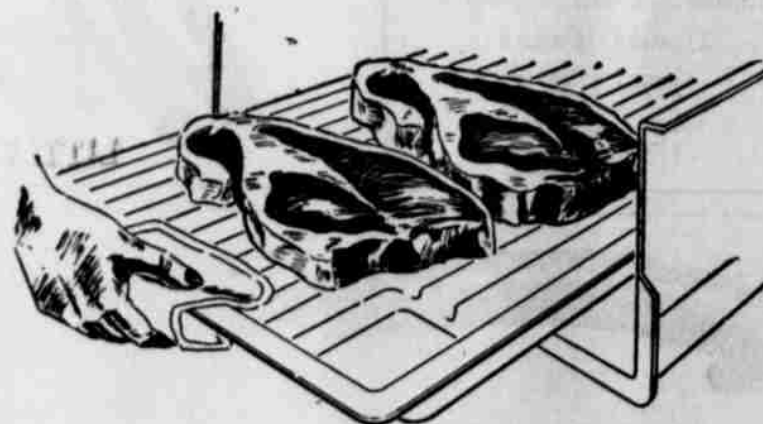

### Almond Meal or Powdered Milk Facials

Smooth it on over a freshly washed face and leave it for 15 minutes. Remove it with warm water on a cotton square. Pink smoothness will be your complexion reward.

### Oatmeal Facials

Mix a handful of oatmeal with enough buttermilk to make a smooth paste. Add freshly-squeezed lemon juice to make the paste spread easily. Apply to the face and allow to dry. Remove with a cotton square and warm water. Finish off with a splashing of ice water.

This mask, which is just as good today as it was in grandma's day, is best applied while you are sitting in a tepid tub. If you do it while not in the tub, cover the face lightly with gauze to keep the mask from crumbling over your rug.

Any facial should be given after a thorough face-washing, and never at all if there are skin eruptions or tiny broken veins in the face.

Part of the success of a facial comes from relaxing, so don't rush through this beauty session. Give yourself time and have your tools right at hand. A sturdy bowl should be used for the mixture, a supply of soft white cotton squares for applying and removing it, a ribbon or comb to keep hair out of the way, and in some cases, gauze to keep the mask in place. An alarm clock or kitchen timer will tell you when the time is up.

Now that melon is in season, a salad-dessert of melon balls makes a refreshing and delightful ending for a meal. Combine cantaloupe or honey dew melon with watermelon; arrange on salad greens and serve with a favorite dressing.

The ballots are prepared to permit voting for three farmers to serve as members of the Community Committee, and for a delegate to the county convention where the delegates will elect the County Committee and alternates.

The caliber of the leadership chosen for these committees will have much to do with the effective operation of price support operations in Lamb County as well as with other PMA administered programs. They are responsible for determination of acreage allotments on any crops for which allotments are in effect. Committees approve applications for price support loans. Storage facility loans are also approved or disapproved by county committeemen. Local administration of crop insurance, with the exception of loss adjustment, is another program under the County Committeemen's supervision.
