KIDDIES FROLIC AT FAIRGROUNDS
DALOU MAN STRUCK BY LIGHTNINGFEAR AGED MAN
MAY DIE FROM
TUESDAY BOLTW. D. MARTIN IS IN BAD
CONDITION; OTHERS
STUNNED BY BOLT

Special To The Journal
DALOU, Oct. 3.—W. D. Martin, 72, of this city, was struck by a bolt of lightning about 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon during a severe electrical storm here. The bolt knocked him to the floor and injured him severely. Bill Roberts and "Daddy" McCord, who were standing near, were also knocked to the floor but escaped without serious injury.

The aged man was still in a semi-conscious condition this afternoon but hope was offered by attending physicians for his recovery.

The three men were working in a building at the edge of the business district when the lightning struck. The bolt hit Mr. Martin in the right breast coming out at his right arm. One of his toes was just open by the bolt.

McCord, assessed Jail Term And Fine
After deliberating only fifteen minutes a jury in the Lubbock county court yesterday found Launce McCord guilty of chicken theft and sentenced him to thirty days in the county jail and fined him \$100.

The case has occupied the attention of the court for about four days. A number of other similar cases are to be taken up this week. Judge Wilson was special prosecutor.

Carnes Taken Back To Trial
ATTEMPT TO STIR UP
POPULAR SYMPATHY
SEEN IN OFFER

WINDHROP, Minn., Oct. 3.—The long journey back to Atlanta to face charges of embezzlement began at 9:30 a. m. today for Clinton S. Carnes, former treasurer of the home mission board of the Southern Baptist convention.

Carnes offered to pay his expenses back to the city in which he was to prominence before his disappearance August 15, a move characterized by John Hudson, assistant solicitor general for Fulton county, as a gesture to create sympathy in the South. He was told it would return at public expense to other prisoners.

Hudson and R. T. Tolbert, deputy sheriff, who came here for Carnes, completed arrangements for transportation before going to the police station for his prisoner.

Carnes, who since his arrest Friday had shown eagerness to return to Atlanta, was not told until this morning that the party was to leave. Jail attendants said he appeared nervous when they first saw him today.

Dry Laws Make Men Handsome
CHICAGO, Oct. 3 (P)—Prohibition is making men more handsome, in the opinion of Dr. James Doran, national prohibition commissioner.

Dr. Doran's argument follows this reasoning: Under prohibition the average man has more money to spend and since he can not spend it legally for liquor, he spends it for shaves, facials, haircuts and manicures.

The above message was sent the Associated Press by Captain George Fried at 5 a. m. today, eastern standard time. The position of the America is approximately 1000 miles east of Newfoundland. The Colosso sailed for Boston from Rotterdam September 25.

FLIER BREAKS
LONG SILENCE
ON CAMPAIGNLINDBERGH COMES OUT
IN FAVOR OF HOOVER
FOR PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh today telegraphed Herbert Hoover that he had a strong feeling that the election of the republican presidential candidate "is of supreme importance to the country."

The Lindbergh message, sent from New York, and made public at republican headquarters, said:

"I have recently flown to St. Louis to register. The more I see of this campaign the more strongly I feel that your election is of supreme importance to the country. Your qualities as a man and what you stand for regardless of party make me feel that the problems which will come before our country during the next four years will be best solved under your leadership."

ROME, Oct. 3 (P)—Surrounded by a little group of intimate friends and in the greatest simplicity, Gene Tunney, retired heavyweight champion, and Miss Mary Josephine Lauder, of Greenwich, Conn., were married today at the Hotel Russe.

Two salons of the "royal apartment," normally reserved for visiting sovereigns, were used, one for the civil ceremony which was performed by Signor Brofferio, a leading fascist, and the other for the religious ceremony performed by Monsignor Joseph A. Brelin of the American college in Rome and anetime parish priest of the Tunney family in New York.

After the ceremony a luncheon at which there were twenty five guests was served, and it was announced that the couple planned to leave shortly by automobile for an unrevealed destination on their honeymoon.

Half Inch Of Rain
Received Tuesday

Rainfall amounting to one-half inch fell in Lubbock and surrounding territory yesterday afternoon in a series of showers beginning at about 4 o'clock.

Although the precipitation was not heavy at any place the moisture was reported general in every direction from Lubbock. Violent electrical storms accompanied the rains in parts of the South Plains, especially around Dalou.

Driven down by the cooling rains the temperature reached a minimum of 53 last night, according to the official gauge at the state experiment farm east of the city.

ZEPPELIN RAIDS DURING WAR ECHOED
AS GERMAN AIR MONARCH GROOMED
FOR ATLANTIC TRIP VISITS LONDON

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Oct. 3.—Having paid a friendly visit to a section of England frequently troubled by air raids during the war, Graf Zeppelin, new German dirigible, today was soaring toward Berlin on a thirty-six hour test flight. This will be Dr. Hugo Eckener's last long trial flight before he starts for the United States.

A dispatch to the Daily Mail from the Hague said the airship on its way to England flew over the mansion at Doorn where former Kaiser Wilhelm is in exile and that the last German monarch and his family joined in cheering the passing dirigible.

OF FIRST TWO DAYS SURPASS
THIRTY-TWO THOUSAND MARK

Turnstiles at the Fifteenth Annual Panhandle-South Plains Fair began clicking earlier today than usual as school children from over the section poured into the exposition grounds. Scowling skies and damp weather meant nothing to the youngsters who were out to peer through "The Show Window of the Plains" from the tractor division to the dog and monkey show.

Although not scheduled to open before noon, the Bill H. Hames Carnival midway was a scene of activity and frolic as early as ten o'clock and the keepers of popcorn and hot dog stands were taking advantage of children's day by hawking their wares at an earlier hour than usual.

Motor cars bearing tags from Slaton, Post, Tahoka, Brownfield and other points were unloading their children for the educational benefits which the fair offers as the third day got under way.

HAZING DRAWS
HORNDISFAVOR
IN ANNUAL TALK

Actual attendance figures for Monday, opening day, and Tuesday, "Lubbock Day," were announced this morning by fair officials. Monday's crowd, by count, was 14,446 while Tuesday's attendance was 17,540, giving the first two days of the fair a total attendance of 32,086. Children's Day, today, is expected to boost the attendance for the first half of the week to somewhere in the neighborhood of 55,000, officials estimated today.

While the attendance of the first two days indicates that the goal of 200,000 will not be reached during the week but it likewise indicates that a new attendance record will be set. Slightly more than 100,000 persons saw the fair last year in the four days that it ran, and set the high water record thus far.

Fair officials pointed out this morning that the attendance figures as announced for Monday and Tuesday were not "wild guesses" but were actual figures. The gates at the park are so arranged that an accurate check on each day's attendance can be made.

MAIL INCOME
TELLS GROWTH

RECEIPTS HERE TOTAL
\$7500 MORE THAN
FOR LAST YEAR

An increase of more than \$7,500 is shown in the postal receipts for the first three quarters of this year over the total for a similar period of last year.

Figures given out by the Lubbock post office this morning show the receipts here since the first of the year total \$68,801 as compared with \$61,294 of that same period of time of last year.

September's postal receipts were \$7,513.62, an increase of about \$1,500 over the \$6,013.62 of September of a year ago.

The last quarter of the year which includes October, November and December is always the most profitable quarter of the year, according to Postmaster John L. Vaughan. It is expected that the last quarter of this year will bring the year's total near the \$100,000 mark. Last year's total was \$90,000.

During the last three months last year the total postal receipts were \$29,697. This was one of the best quarters in the history of the office here and a large increase is not expected in this final quarter.

In the months of July, August, and September the receipts here this year totalled \$23,371.

JURY SERVICE ROTARY TOPIC

MULLICAN URGES CLUB MEMBERS TO SERVE WHEN SUMMONED

Rotary was well attended today in spite of many of its members being tied up on various duties in connection with the fair. For three days the President Roosevelt, Captain Fried's command at that time, stood by the sinking ship, launching six lifeboats and losing two members of her crew before the men on the Antiope were finally rescued. It was during the great storm of 1926 on the North Atlantic during which several boats were sunk and even the big ocean liners were badly battered.

CONDITION OF COTTON VARIES

RECOVERY FROM STORM APPARENT IN EAST; TEXAS SPOTTED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—Crop and weather conditions for the week ended yesterday as summarized by the Department of Agriculture indicate that in the more eastern states of the Cotton Belt, especially in the Carolinas, considerable recovery from the effects of recent storms was reported in places, although some lowlands were still too wet and it was rather cool in northern districts. In Georgia, further rains were unfavorable. Elsewhere the weather was favorable although opening was retarded in the month by low temperatures and there is much soiled staple, with continued reports of boll rotting in the south.

In the central states of the belt much sunshine promoted rapid opening of bolls and produced conditions generally favorable for picking and ginning; there were some local reports of continued boll rotting.

In Oklahoma warm dry weather favored rapid opening, with picking and ginning advancing satisfactorily, though continued dryness, especially in the west, has been unfavorable with the general condition of the crop spotted. In Texas spottedness is also noted with condition ranging from poor in the south to very good in parts of the north and some deterioration in the northern districts because of shedding and boll rot; picking and ginning made mostly good advance.

MEETING ODDS SWING IN FAVOR OF CARDINALS WEDNESDAY

BUFFS HOPE TO CINCH DIXIE SERIES TITLE IN GAME TODAY

SHERDEL WILL OPPOSE HOYT IN FIRST GAME

COMBS NOT TO BE USED DURING SERIES, SAYS MANAGER HUGGINS

NEW YORK, Oct. 3 (AP)—A squad of badly crippled New York Yankees will start the World Series with the St. Louis Cardinals at the Yankee Stadium tomorrow.

With a more or less definite announcement from Huggins that Earle Combs, injured centerfielder, would see action in the big series only as a pinch runner, if at all, the Yankees stock dropped a few points. The odds most frequently today favored the Cardinals at 5 to 3. There was little betting.

To some observers it appeared that the Yankees, in reality, are occupying a rather enviable position, and that Bill McKechnie and his healthy Cardinals should be doing all the worrying. In case of defeat, the Yankees' alibi is prepared in advance, however unintentional upon the part of the reigning world's champions. On the other hand, the Cardinals at full strength, must win and even then may not get the credit due them.

Cards Hard At Work
Apparently the Cardinals realize it. In their practice sessions at the Yankee Stadium where the series opens at 1:30 eastern standard time tomorrow, they have not time for jokes. They are working their business in grim earnest.

The rival managers are reticent as usual as to their pitching selections for the opening game, but they'll cross up a lot of expert observers if Waite Hoyt does not start for the Yankees and "Wee Willie" Sherdel for the Cardinals. Huggins and McKechnie admit these two are "naturals" for the first game but the final selection will have to wait until game time.

Line-up Shift Planned
If Sherdel pitches for the Cards, Ben Paschal will be in centerfield for the Yanks and "Jumpin' Joe" Dugan, in all probability, at third. If McKechnie picks a right hander, Cedric Durst will play the outfield and Gene Robertson third base.

McKechnie's only line-up charge to meet Sherdel's pitching will be in right field. George Harper will play right field against right handers and Wattle Holm against the southpaws. Under present plans, only two catchers will be used, Benjamen for the Yanks and Jim Byrnes for the Cardinals.

Despite precautions by the Yankees management, speculators have gotten hold of some of the precious tickets and are peddling a \$15.50 ticket of three games for \$30 and up. With only 40,000 general admission tickets on sale the day of the game, a crowd of 75,000 or more is expected at the opening game.

SWEET BASES SMITH ATTACK ON WET ISSUE

Urges Voters To Participate
Sweet urged preachers to take up the fight, to discuss all questions of great moral issue, and to use their right of freedom of speech. The speaker was introduced by John L. Ratliff, county chairman of the anti-smoking group, who pictured him as the same caliber of man as Bryan and Wilson.

In closing Sweet said that the coming election would show more crossing of party lines than has ever been known in this country. Democrats were urged to bolt the party ticket, on the basis of placing principle before party.

Congressman Guinn Williams and Sam Rayburn, who spoke here Sunday night for the candidacy of Gov. Smith, were scored by the speaker last night. Statement made by the Monday night speakers that Hoover was a "malicious lie" in closing Sweet said that he proposed to give Herbert Hoover a vote of confidence for prohibition "that he can't mistake it and can rebuke the democratic wet party and liquor interests."

He predicted that Colorado would give Hoover a 40,000 majority. From here Sweet went to Brownwood where he is to speak tonight. He was accompanied here by the Rev. Robert Allingham, pastor of the Congressional church of Amarillo.

The governor shamed ex-Gov. Pat Neff for not bolting the Democratic ticket and taking up the stump against Al Smith, in referring to Neff's stand on prohibition.

If Birmingham wins today's game, the deciding contest will be played in Birmingham.

"At a hearing on Mrs. Sward's sanity, the prosecution produced records showing that, under the name of Dorothy Marchese, she had been in the state hospital three months in 1926 for excessive use of narcotics. She was ordered returned there at the conclusion of the hearing.

boundaries.

It is unnecessary to go over the
old arguments in favor of diversi-
fication. They are obvious, and
accepted. But the argument in
favor of converting the vast feed
crop raised in Dawson county into
finished products such as cream,
butter, powdered milk, etc., has not
been stressed sufficiently.

If it pays now to raise feed and
ship it out to other places where
it is fed to stock, the milk from
which is then passed through a
milk plant, it is obvious that by lo-
cating the plant in Lamesa, the
profits of the dairying and the milk
plant operation will be brought
within the boundaries of the coun-
ty, and added to the profits of
growing the crop itself.

Before the plant can be located
here there must be definite data
prepared to submit to the parties
considering the investment of their
money. They must know approxi-
mately the cow population within
the territory of the plant, and the
attitude of the farmer towards
future increase of stock. To obtain
this information the Chamber of
Commerce has circulated a form of
inquiry which every farmer is ur-
ged to fill in and return to the
Chamber of Commerce.

There is also other work to do.
The milk produced in Dawson coun-
ty must be of high quality, free
from contamination of all kinds. It
is no use hiding the fact that just
now the Dawson county milk sup-
ply is not of the very highest grade.
The farmers have got to alter their
methods.

The Journal is going to do all in
its power to help bring the milk
plant to Lamesa. To this end we
hope to publish week by week prac-
tical illustrated articles on the cor-
rect way to market milk, and we
urge all the farming community to
study these clearly written articles.

"Milk from contented cows" is all
right, but we must go further. We
must have milk from contented
cows owned by prosperous farmers.
We want to see the farms come
into Lamesa without the clouded
brows and line faces which a one-
crop existence produces. We want
them to escape the burden of un-
duly heavy mortgages and to end
those conditions under which their
happiness and health depend whol-
ly on the conduct of a worm: a bug
a market gamble or the particu-
lar date of the first killing frost.

Therefore, we adopt for our at-
titude the words on the red tag
which was distributed at the fair
booth: ME FOR THE MILK
PLANT.—Dawson County Journal.

The people of this country have
at last awakened to the impor-
tance of making the dairy products
of the country one of the leading
industries instead of a secondary
consideration. The South Plains
now has the facilities for producing
milk and butter and cream and
there is no reason that every farm
who owns his own land at least
should not have enough good milk
cows to keep the family and the

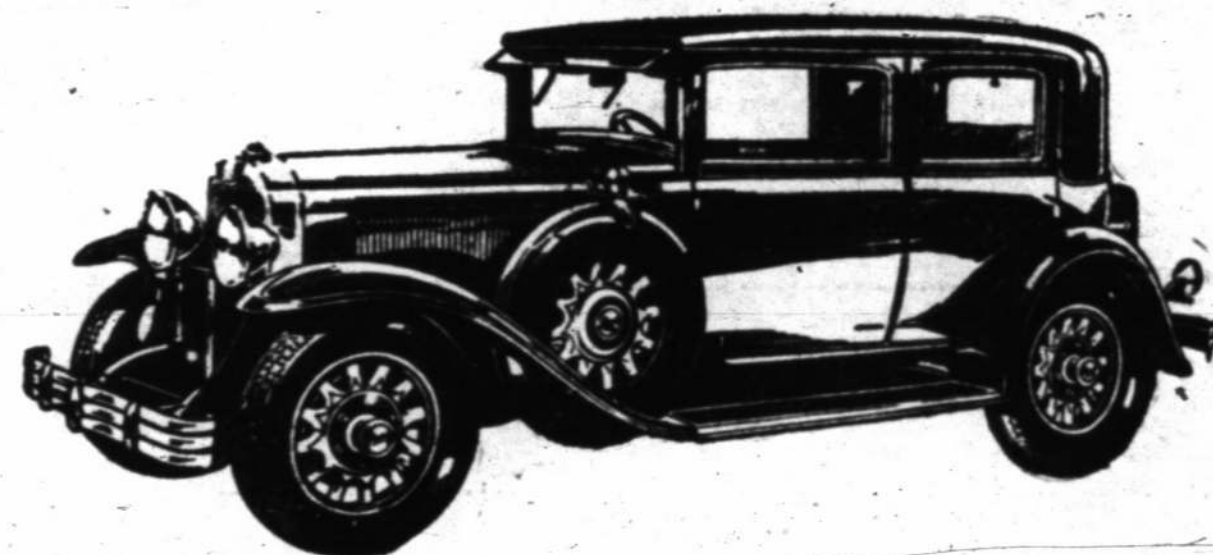

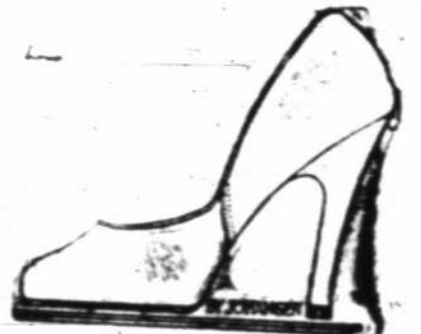

FARM MACHINERY, IMPLEMENTS AND INDUSTRIAL BOOTHS FEATURE FAIR

The greatest array of implements and farm machinery exhibits to be shown at a fair here are on display at the Panhandle South Plains fair this week.

Don L. Jones, superintendent of the state experiment station here, commended this method of placing the latest type of machinery before the farmers. "In addition to showing them the latest equipment this display creates an urge in them to use better farm machinery," he said.

Irrigation Demonstrated
An irrigation demonstration with a 25-horse power Benemer natural gas engine comprises the exhibit of the South Plains Pipe Line company. The pump is capable of pumping 600 gallons per minute. Its fuel operating cost is said to be approximately \$1 per day. Sufficient water can be furnished by the pump for twenty acres of land.

W. R. Boone, of this city, has received considerable encouragement on his newly invented cotton stripper which is on display at the fair. First invented by Mr. Boone two years ago the machine was successfully tried out last year. The model on display was constructed at San Antonio. It is planned to open a factory here within the near future to turn out this new substitute for cotton picking. The cost of gathering the cotton is said to be fifteen cents per hundred pounds.

Russell Road equipment is featured in the exhibit of the Lone Star Machinery company. Graders, cement mixers, and scrapers are included in the exhibit of the Axtell company.

Exhibit of Clem Brothers Lumber company shows all types of the latest in farm buildings. The display includes a poultry house, brooder coop, dairy barn, self feeding bin, and an A type hog house.

ders and is equipped with a glass side so that the mechanisms can be watched. The exhibit features an automatic washing machine, with a special price for the week. Walls and shelves in the women's building are filled with an array of colorful linens, paintings, quilts, rugs, rows of canned produce and flowers, exhibits included in the women's division at the Panhandle South Plains fair.

Mrs. James H. Goodman, director of this division is expressing delight in bringing exhibits and making plans for a better department next year while superintendents remember the changes that will improve each division.

Culinary is Attractive
Probably the culinary division is as attractive to the majority of those who visit the building as any other. Men as well as women throng the aisles of this building day and night viewing the show that is presented there.

Among the textiles which have been made by local women are a number of imported articles, among them some beautiful laces and drawn work brought from Mexico by Mrs. Harry Roberts. While no premiums are offered for these articles, they are a welcome addition to the show as they attract so much interest, according to Mrs. G. C. Wolfarth, superintendent of the textile division.

The textile display is of a better quality this year than during previous seasons and the response has been greater, according to Mrs. Wolfarth.

Fancy Packs Displayed
Indicative of the trend in cookery, there are many fancy packs shown among the vegetable and fruits on display at the fair this fall. Shelves in this department, of which Mrs. A. W. McKee is superintendent, are filled with canned goods, soups, and other products of the kitchen while display cases are filled with luscious looking cakes and candies over which hang the hungry spectators at the fair.

Every phase of home demonstration work is shown in the exhibition prepared under the direction of Miss Louise Baird, home demonstration agent. Clubs in the country are represented one hundred percent and every woman's club has a

complete display, for the first time in the history of the fair. Lynn and Dawson counties are included in the display.

The house dresses in this department received special mention among the judges as unusually good designing had been employed during the year.

Native Grasses Shown
There are some unusually good specimens of decorative grasses in the flower show this fall. Colorful blossoms of every variety cultivated on the South Plains are included in the exhibit, among which canary birds sing their joy at being placed in a paradise of greenery.

More varieties of flowers were shown this year than in any other year, according to Mrs. W. O. Stevens, superintendent of this department. She is asking however, that the judges, particularly of prize-winning blossoms, be replenished during the week to maintain the beauty of this division.

Mrs. Sam J. McFarland is superintendent of the curio department. Cases in this division are filled with such a diversity of articles, many of them speaking of ages long since past, that one may hang for hours over each show without seeing it all. Quilts and rugs that picture long hours of tedious work, sun-bonnets, old firearms, coin collections, the absurdly decorated chairs of another day, heavily framed photographs of queer-looking peoples are included in this intriguing show.

Painting Feature
Oil and water color paintings represent some of the best features of the art show, which is superintended by Miss Della Wilkinson. Walls of one corner of the women's building are covered. Spanish houses and western landscapes form some of the best pictures. Since no premiums were offered for copies, little except original work is shown in this division. A children's department has been largely contributed to and has added to the interest in this section.

Industrial Booths Show An Array of Products
Many progressive firms of the city have booths in the industrial building at the Panhandle-South Plains fair grounds, advertising a diversity of articles for almost every need of the day.

Down the aisles between these booths are passing the throngs who spend the morning products that Lubbock merchants have to offer.

A replica of an oil derrick, entitled Magnolia No. 1, and through which there flows a stream of oil, is the center of interest in a booth maintained by the Magnolia Petroleum company. Various grades and kinds of oil distributed by this company are on display.

Hodges General Merchandise company has a booth in which women's and men's fashions and accessories and piece goods are attractively and simply arranged against draped background.

Canned is Demonstrated
Demonstrating the National steam pressure, canning demonstrations are being carried out on alternate days in Sherrod Brother's booth. The Burpee sealer is also demonstrated in connection with the canner as products are sealed and placed on display. Sporting goods, gas heaters, refrigerators, radios and other products are shown.

Sandwiches, coffee and other products are dispensed by Miss Lee Tubbs and H. R. Harmon in the M. S. Booth where food products sold by this company, which has several stores in Lubbock, are displayed.

Proper food for hogs, cattle and poultry are on display in the Economy Mills booth and J. R. Newman of that company are in the booth during the fair to answer inquiries and advise stock raisers about balanced rations for animals.

The Hawes Mattress and Upholstery company display is attractively draped in the muslins and in covering mattresses made by the company here and in the center back of the booth is a down cushion, product of the local concern.

Floral Company Displays
Forming an inviting retreat, the Texas Floral company has a booth in the women's building, where the aisles of this building day and night viewing the show that is presented there.

Ready-to-wear for women—coats and dresses—are shown in Grollman's booth, which is softly lighted with a background draped in autumn leaves.
