All Around the Town

The wheat harvest is just about over in our locale except for scattered late fields of wheat, a few barley, and some wheat and barley mixtures. Yields have been very good this year and have even exceeded early expectations. Hail damaged some wheat crops but completely destroyed a few, but many had been untouched by the long finger of fate.

From the office of County Agent Robert Ledbetter, we get these estimated statistics on the 1960 wheat crop. Some 41,000 plus acres were planted in wheat. The 7,500 acres of irrigated wheat averaged about 40 bushels to the acre, while the 34,000 acres of dryland harvested an average of 20 bushels per acre. The harvest would be 300,000 bushels from irrigated land and 680,000 from dryland, totaling 980,000 bushels. Do you know how much this crop was sold for? At \$1.70 per bushel, it was worth 1,666,000 dollars!

All Around the Town
Do you know how much the wheat stubble that's left after the harvest is worth? The cost of this fertilizer to be placed on an acre of land would be approximately \$3.70. This is based on the components of the stubble, nitrogen, 15 cents per pound, \$1.50; phosphorus at 4 cents a pound, \$1.40; potassium at 2 cents a pound, 80 cents. And that saving in addition to the loss of valuable organic matter, destruction of bacteria, loss of permeability, depletion of moisture and many other important assets of well managed crop residues. For these reasons we are glad to see so many county farmers plowing their stubble instead of burning it.

All Around the Town
Many local farmers are wondering if this late-planted cotton will reach maturity. This question is one that none of us can answer, but many are taking a chance on it.

D. G. Shelton, who farms in the Creek Community, says that about three weeks' time he planted, cultivated, harvested, sold and replanted a cotton crop. He says that he doesn't advise this procedure. When the hail insurance adjuster visited his place to check on the amount of his loss, he had to scratch around a little and find evidence that it had been planted.

All Around the Town
Everyone keeps on trying. I and these examples of famous people who would be unknown if they had given up early in their careers.

One of America's outstanding playwrights, S. N. Behrman, turned out manuscripts for eleven years before he finally sold his first play. Fannie Hurst wrote more than a hundred stories before one was accepted. Somerset Maugham was an obscure writer for ten years. Then, a producer decided to play to fill in while he was looking around, dug Maugham's forgotten "Lady Frederick" out of his desk. Maugham thereafter became the toast of London. Even his first series of animated cartoons, "Oswald the Rabbit," failed. Then along came Mickey Mouse.

Robert L. Ripley was fired from his first newspaper on which he worked. Zane Grey did not sell a story during his first five years as a writer. When O. O. McIntyre was a copy editor on the old New York "Evening Mail" he was fired. H. G. After thirty-seven years in the public schools of Texas, Superintendent M. G. Moreland is retiring.

Mr. Moreland entered the teaching field as a coach and spent 21 years of his teaching time in Fannin County which was his home county.

He left Fannin County and came West where he has spent sixteen more years, ten of them here in Silvertown as Superintendent of Schools. He came to Silvertown from Petersburg in 1950.

In his resignation tendered to the Board of Education on June 22, 1960, he stated: "Due to other business interest and the fact that I feel that I have served long enough in the public schools, I hereby tender my resignation to be effective as of July 31."

"May I say that it has been a pleasure to have served as superintendent of schools here for the past ten years. As you know, we have seen the schools grow from fifteen teachers to twenty-four. The number of pupils increased from 365 to the 537 we now have on the census roll. Some new buildings were built, eight classrooms and the gymnasium and shop building.

"I have been happy to have had a part in this growth and development of the schools. It has been a privilege to work with you and former members of the school board.

"I expect to continue to live here in Silvertown and want to assure you that I shall be glad to be of service to the schools at any time I may have an opportunity."

Mr. Moreland has seen a continual growth in the schools or the area and predicts that the schools and the area will continue to grow. He expects to continue to live in Silvertown, where he will be engaged in other business.

Wheat Being Received for C.R.O.P.

Wheat for CROP is now being received at grain elevators in all parts of the Texas Panhandle. The contributors make it known to the elevator manager the amount they wish to give to CROP as the wheat is brought to the elevator. By making the contribution before the total amount is credited to the growers account, added credit can be secured for income tax purposes. This is true for grain contributed to other worthy charities.

All elevators in organized CROP counties have been supplied with transfers, receipts and other printed matter needed to properly record contributions. A number of elevators in other counties have the same material. Those wishing to help the overseas needy but deliver to an elevator without the CROP supplies can leave the wheat with instructions to the manager to put the desired number of bushels in the CROP account. The manager can contact H. M. Nichols, Panhandle, Texas, and the proper forms will be furnished.

Those desiring added information on the work of CROP are asked to contact Johnny Burson or Mr. Nichols. The demand for added food for earthquake victims and other natural disasters has added much to the load of the Christian Rural Overseas Program. Refugees and others in free countries were needing more than CROP could supply before the earthquakes, floods, etc. occurred in several parts of the world.

CROP is a collecting agency and will see that church denominations receive full credit and that missionaries and others representing these denominations receive the food as designated. All ministers of the area are acquainted with the work of CROP.

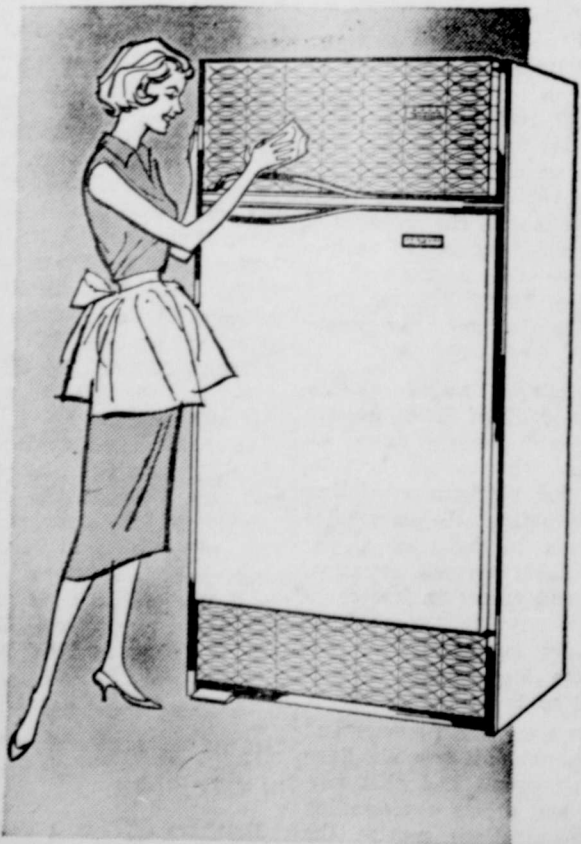

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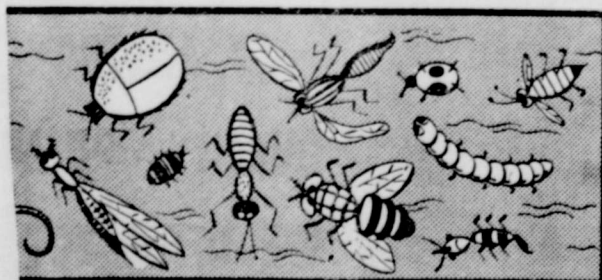

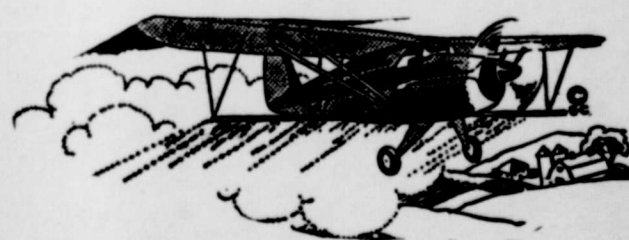
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
